

Many of the errors that writing incorrect or illegible delay tax return processing, slow refund checks, and inconvenience taxpayers are avoidable, the Internal Revenue Service said.

The most common math error on both forms last year was incorrectly reporting the tax table for their filing status, following the line for the wrong income level, and looking under the incorrect column for number of exemptions for that tax-
