



### **Tax Rebates Announced**

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Thursday said rebates of the one-percent city sales tax for the first five months this year are up more than 40 percent over the same period last year. where it is levied. Bullock said his office is

sending Texas cities more than \$96.1 million in sales tax rebates for May. He said 1981 payments now total \$282.3 million, com-

pared to \$201.5 million during the same time last year. Bullock said he felt an upswing in first quarter

The city sales tax is collected along with the state sales tax by merchants and businesses and is rebated monthly by the Comptroller's office to cities

Herman H. Clement, Rt. 1, Deport, died at McCuistion Medical Center at 8:00 a.m. Saturday.




#### James H. Lawson

### **Beware Of Poison Plants**

can cause death, illness, or extreme discomfort to people, a local conservation leader warned this week. Charles VanDeaver, district conservationist for the Soil Conservation Service, U.S. Department of Agriculture, at Clarksville, said parents should be concerned because many of the plants are common in flower and vegetable gardens; in ornamental landscaping; and in range, pasture, or forest lands. Bulbs, roots, seeds, leaves,

beans, stems or berries may contain poison, depending on the species of plant.

Jimsonweed, sometimes called thorn apple and stinkweed, grows almost everywhere and causes many poisonings. Growing from two to five feet tall, it has large leaves and white funnel-shaped flowers. All are parts especially the leaves Dieffenbachia, or dumb

cane, is a beautiful house plant grown in millions of homes, but merely biting its stalk can cause swelling of "Chewing, swallowing, or the mough and tongue that can be deadly. It is called dumb cane because of its power to strike its victims speechless. The stalks contain needlelike crystals of calcium oxalate that become imbedded the tissue of the mouth and

tongue causing severe swelling and pain. Castor bean seeds are also deadly. Each seed contains enough ricin, a powerful blood poison, to kill a child.

During late May and June, many Texas farmers and ranchers will receive a crop or livestock questionnaire from the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service or will be personally interviewed by the Services field staff. The crop and livestock information gathered through the questionnaires and interviews is kept confidential and it is the basis for setting crop acreages and midyear livestock inventories to be published in June for the state of Texas.

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These crop and livestock reports give a reliable, unbased picture of Texas most important industryagriculture. Futhermore, these reports are tools to help farmers and ranchers work out their planting, breeding, feeding, storing, producing, and marketing plans--in other words, to keep them informed.

These reports are also used by: Farm organizations and legislatures in planning and developing farm programs, Extension econonomists and private and ranch farm management consultants for advising farmers and ranchers, Exporters in planning and promoting the sale of Texas agricultural products
