Meeting Results In Dumpsite Opposition

One hundred and seventy-six people rallied at the old Cunningham School Gym in Cunningham on Thursday, May 21, to discuss means and ways to block the proposed chemical dumping site which Chem Securities, Inc. is considering locating six miles east of the small community.

The meeting resulted in the formation of a Sulphur River Watershed Concern Citizens Committee, and a more organized approach towards blocking the dump site.

Those attending the meeting were from five counties which would be affected, Lamar, Red River, Franklin, Titus and Bowie. The majority of the crowd was from Lamar and Red River Counties.

A display map of the Sulphur River, and its flow to Lake Wright Patman, which supplies Texarkana and

most of rural Red River County with water, was set up at the entrance, and petitions opposing the dumping site were available there for signing.

Prairiland School Superintendent Leslie H. (Buddy) Taylor, opened the meeting by stating that the purpose of the gathering was for "seeing how everyone felt, and what should be done."

Mrs. Jane O'Neal, one of the primary organizers of opposition to the dump, recapped what has appeared in newspapers. She pointed out that the location of the site, only three miles from the Sulphur River, and located in soil which has a high shrink and swell factor, didn't seem very desirable. Mrs. O'Neal also expressed concern over the transportation of the chemical waste to the disposal plant.

She mentioned that chemicals disposed of at the

Chem-Security Inc. plant in Arlington, Ore., include PCB, Mercury waste, acids, caustics, solvents, ink and paint residues, and that such things, if put into a local dump, would be extremely hazardous.

John Swinson of Cooper, who was involved in blocking South West Nuclear locating a Nuclear dump site at Cooper, advised that the group should immediately hire an attorney.

Among those attending the meeting were Red River County Judge Connie Sullivan, who was thanked for the action she and the Red River County Commissioners had taken in passing a resolution against the dump. Judge Sullivan stated that no one from Chem Securities, Inc. had as yet contacted any officials in the county.

Others attending the meeting, some making brief remarks in opposition were

Lamar County Judge Brady Fisher, Lamar County Commissioner Jimmy Sparks, City Manger of Paris Bob Sokoll and Paris Mayor Billy Joe Burnett, John Mac Howison of Bogata, Raymond Haygood of AMPI and several people from Roxton and Cooper, who have been instrumental in blocking the establishment of a nuclear waste dump in their communities.

Albert Roach, Chairman of the Texas Soil and Water Conservation, sent word stating that he had serious doubts about the soil in that area as being suitable.

Mrs. O'Neal stated that over 1,100 signatures had already been obtained on petitions opposing the site, and that only half of the petitions had been called in.

P.C. Abernathy, another primary organizer against the dump site, told how he and traveled the south side of Sulphur River all the way to

Atlanta, and then back up the north side, stopping each community along the way. He informed people of the proposal, and left petitions to be signed. Abernathy said "I found a lot of folks who hadn't heard about this, but I didn't find one in favor of it."

Mrs. O'Neal read a letter from State Representative L.P. (Pete) Patterson, in which he assured them of his continued opposition to the location of a chemical waste dump at the location.

Lamar County Judge Brady Fisher mentioned that he and Jimmy Sparks would sponsor a resolution opposing the site at the next Lamar County Commissioners meeting.

Fred Skidmore of the Red River Valley Water District Association turned in a petition with the names of water operators who opposed the site from all along the Sulphur River Area.

Associated Milk Producers

areamanager Raymond Haygood announced that the AMPI would probably be willing to take action to block the dump.

John Mac Howison and W.C. Barnard of Bogata expressed concern over the possibility of seepage into the water sand which provides Bogata with its water supply.

The meeting concluded with the formation of a committee, known as the Sulphur River Watershed Concerned Citizens Committee, which was made up of John Mac Howison, Bogata, P.C. Abernathy, Red River County, Jane O'Neal, Lamar County, Martha Hare, Franklin County, John Swinson of Delta County, and Neva Merle Crump of Titus County.

The committee will apply for a non-profit organization number, and will accept donations for the hiring of a

lawyer and geologist. A number of donations were taken at the meeting. Further donations, it was decided, could be sent to Jane O'Neal, Box 714, Cunningham, Tx.

The committee, and speakers, all stressed over and over that one of the best ways to get things accomplished was for individuals and groups to notify their congressman and state and national officials. A list of names and addresses and phone numbers was available also.

Another function the committee would have is to be a "recordable" voice at any public hearings scheduled on the subject.

Although anyone can speak at such hearings, only a designated party to the hearings can be recorded in Austin as opposing the project.

Estell McDaniel Hines of Talco died Thursday, May 21, at her residence on Wilson Street.

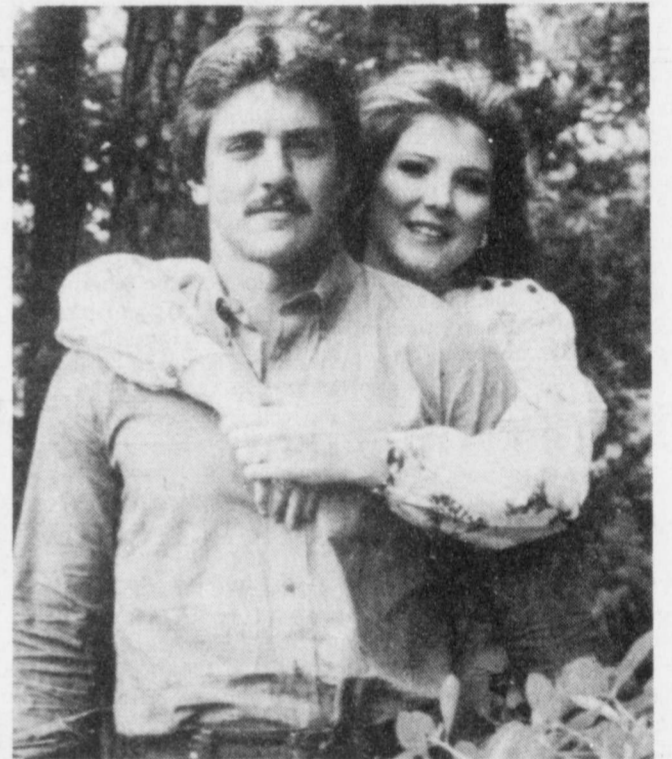

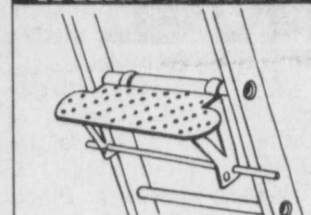
Workshop Will Be Conducted

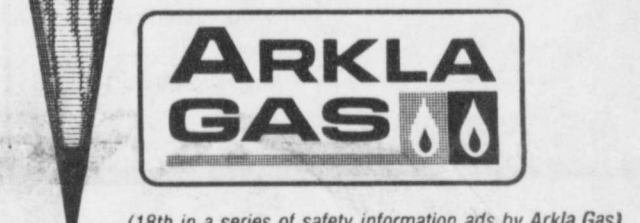

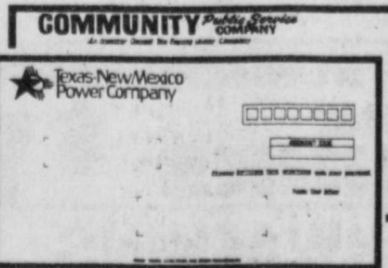
An ordinance amending and changing a franchise ordinance enacted by the City of Deport, Lamar & Red River County, Texas on September 13, 1966, and being partly styled, "An ordinance granting to Lone Star gas company, a corporation, its successors and assigns, a franchise to furnish and supply gas to the general public in the city of Deport, Lamar & Red River County Texas"; and providing for a modification of the definition of the terms "Service Lines" and "Yard lines" referenced in section 4 thereof.
Be it ordained by the city council of the city of Deport, Texas:
Section 1. As of the effective date of this amendatory ordinance, and upon acceptance by Lone Star Gas Company of the provisions hereof, Section 4 of the aforesaid captioned franchise ordinance enacted on September 13, 1966, shall be stricken, cancelled and nullified and there shall be substituted in lieu thereof a new provision reading as follows:
Section 4. In addition to the rates charged for gas supplied, Company may make and enforce reasonable charges, rules and regulations for service rendered in the conduct of its business including a charge for services rendered in the inauguration of natural gas service, and may require, before furnishing service, the execution of a contract therefor. Company shall have the right to contract with each customer with reference to the installation of, and payment for, and all of the gas piping from the connection thereof with the Company's main in the streets or alleys to and throughout the consumer's premises. Company shall own, operate and maintain all service lines, which are defined as the supply lines extending from the Company's main to the customer's meter where gas is measured by Company. The consumer shall own, operate, and maintain all yard lines and house piping. Yard lines are defined as the underground supply lines extending from the point of connection with Company's customer meter to the point of connection with consumer's house piping.
Section 2. Enactment of this amendatory ordinance shall in no way ever be construed so as to diminish or impair any consumer's ownership interest in service lines (or portions thereof) installed prior to the effective date of this amendatory ordinance.
Section 3. The terms and provisions of this amendatory ordinance shall be deemed to be severable, and if the validity of any section, sentence, clause or phrase of this amendatory ordinance should be declared to be invalid, the same shall not affect the validity of any other section, sentence, clause or phrase of this amendatory ordinance.
Section 4. Except as heretofore and hereinabove changed and amended, the terms, provisions, conditions and requirements of the aforesaid franchise ordinance shall remain in full force and effect.
Section 5. This amendatory ordinance shall become effective as of May 11, 1981 if the Company files its written acceptance of the provisions of this ordinance within sixty (60) days after its final passage and approval by this City and upon acceptance, the provisions hereof shall be binding upon City and Company, their successors and assigns.

Control Aquatic Weeds Now

Now is a good time to control aquatic weeds in farm ponds, according to Dr. Joe Lock, area fisheries specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. The weeds may not be appearing in abun-

dance this time of year, but during the cooler weather is the best time for control. If control measures are delayed until the plant are large and the weather is hotter, problems may be encountered with oxygen depletion. County agents throughout the area have publications available to help identify the aquatic weeds and give suggestions on control.

Persons interested in fruit and vegetable production in East Texas should mark their calendars for June 23, 1981. That is the day for the Horticultural Field Day at the Texas A&M University Agricultural Research and Extension Center at Overton. Many items of interest are being planned. Tours of research plots showing the current research efforts in peaches, plums, apples, blackberries, sweet potatoes, southern peas, tomatoes and other

vegetables will be conducted. Additionally, demonstrations in drying fruits and vegetables for preservation will be given by county Extension agents-home economics. Commercial displays of equipment relating to fruit and vegetable production are being scheduled. A tour involving landscape plants and Christmas trees will also be given.

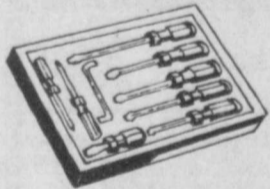

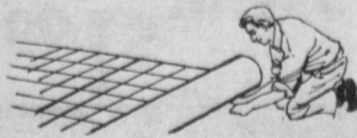

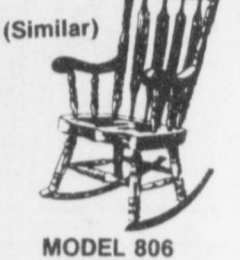
