## Steer Wrestling Champion At Bogata

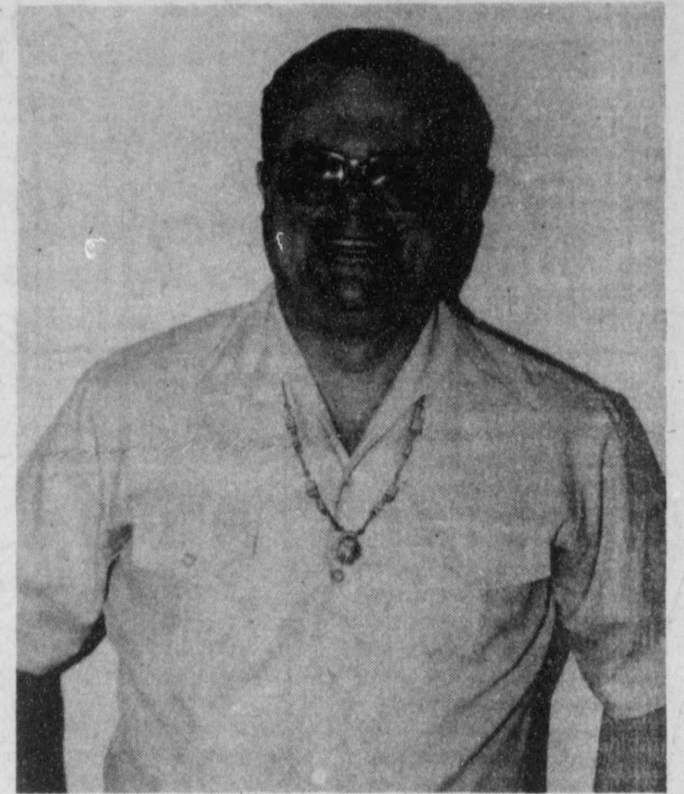
Thurman Russell, current CRA Steer Wrestling Champion, will be among the 400 or more cowboys and cowgirls competing in the Bogata rodeo June 25, 26, and 27. Russell started out as a bare back and bull rider but found the doggin more to his liking. He started out as a 16 year old high school

cowboy and graduated into the pros when he got out of school. He got his card in the CRA in 1974 and has been in the top 15 almost every year since then. 1980 was his best year in money won. He has won two saddles from the CRA and ETRA along with three average buckles which included the L.R.A. All of

this along with over \$15,000.00 was quite a year for Russell. At the CRA Finals in Sulphur Springs in October, Russell placed in three of the four goes and won the average. Thurman Russell will be a favorite for the Steer Wrestling Championship at the Bogata rodeo in Bogata, Texas.

Steer wrestling needs three things for a cowboy to be successful, 1) perfect timing, 2) skill, and 3) muscle. It, like most of the other events, has no roots in everyday ranch work. It was first used as an exhibition at wild west shows but later was used as one of the standard events in rodeo.

Modern steer wrestling utilizes a technique which relies on timing and leverage more than on brute strength. Today's steer wrestler hauls two horses, one which is used by a hazer, and the other used by the dogger. After the dogger jumps from his horse to the steers horns, he stops the animal and twists his head until he falls to the ground with all four feet in one direction. A good run is a time from three to five seconds.

## Rodeo Queen Contestants Needed

A big feature of the rodeo again this year will be the selection of a Rodeo Queen.

In the Rodeo Queen Contest, the entrant must be between the ages of 14 and 19 (inclusive) as of the date of the contest.

Entrants must not be married or ever have been married.

Entrants must live within a 25 mile radius of Bogata, Texas.

Entrants will be expected to ride in the Grand Entry each night of the rodeo and in both the Rodeo and the Frontier Day parades.

Entrants will be expected to wear western attire at the above mentioned events.

Entrants will be asked (but not required) to submit a snapshot for context publicity.

Judges will be from well outside the 25 mile radius such that no girl should have any unfair advantage.

Judging will be based on the following categories: horsemanship, 33 and one-third; appearance, 33 and one-third points; personality, 33 and one-third points.

Candidates will be required to waive all liability.

Horsemanship pattern to be used is reining pattern number one of the American Quarter Horse Association.

This year's Bogata Rodeo Queen, Michelle Thomas, will present the trophy to the 1981 Queen. Those wanting to enter the competition are asked to complete the entry form in this week's paper and mail to Bill Buckman, Bogata Rodeo Association.

Bogata, however, has one of the finest rodeos around, and should take great pride in the quality performances they produce.

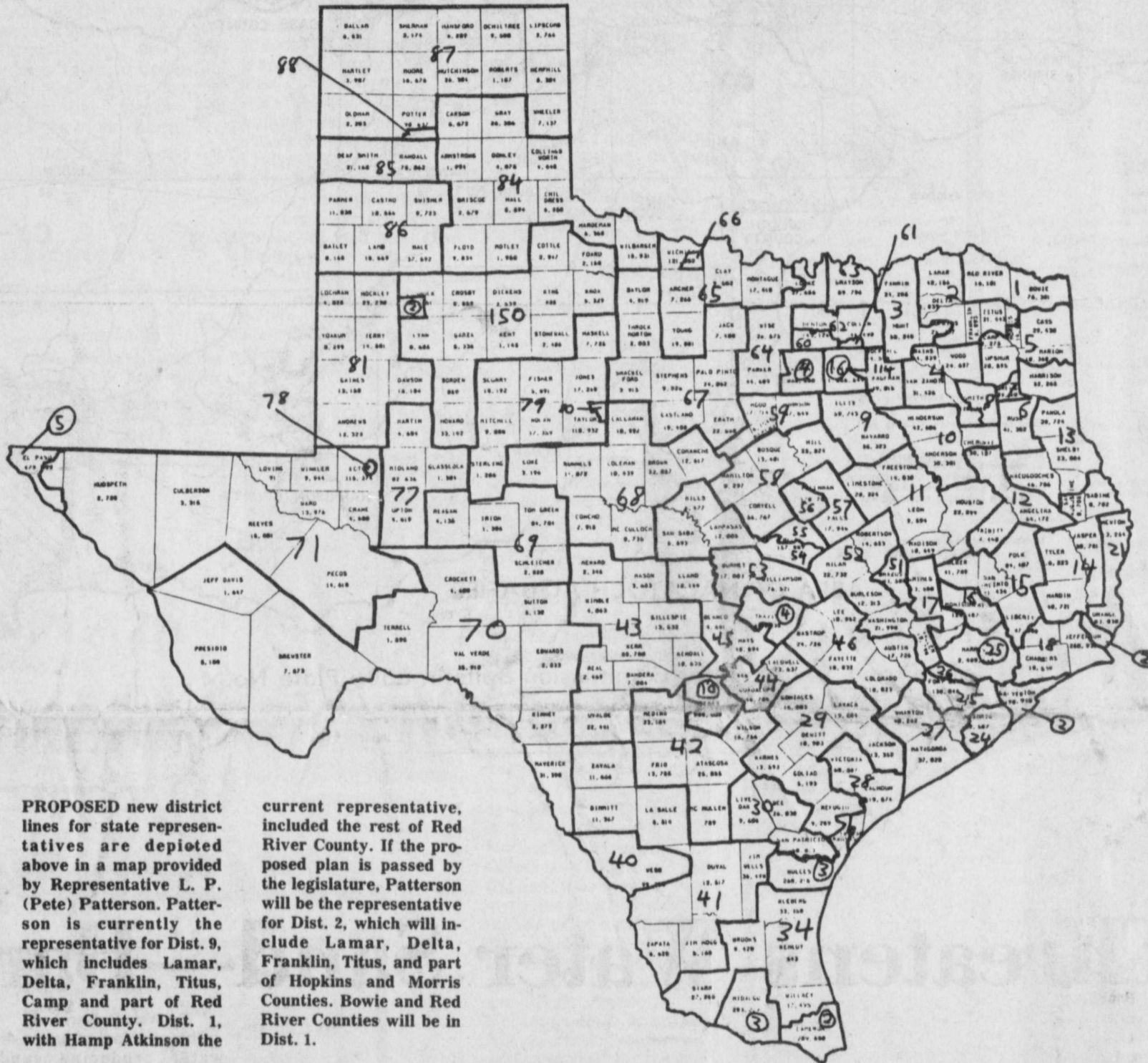
It is astonishing how many folks go to every performance of the Bogata rodeo, and the variety that they can find there.

## Roach Elected Head Of State Conservation Board

Albert Roach, member of the State Soil and Water Conservation Board, was recently chosen by the board's four other members to serve as Board Chairman.

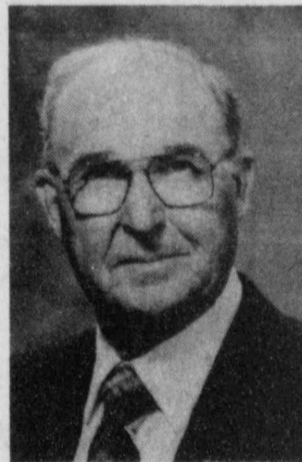
Each of the board members represent one of the five soil and water conservation district zones in Texas, with Roach representing District 4, which includes 52 Counties of East Texas in an area extending from the Red River on the north to the Gulf of Mexico, including Lamar and surrounding counties.

Roach, who has held numerous offices in the Lamar County Soil and Water Conservation District, has been a member of the State Board since 1967. He has also been active in the local Resource, Conservation and Development (RC & D) program, the Lamar County Chamber of Commerce, the Lamar Avenue Church of Christ, the Knife and Fork Club, and the Lions Club.

A Lamar County farmer and rancher, Roach has received numerous awards and honors for his soil conservation work including the state "Hobletzelle Award" which he received in 1964 for his contributions to the advancement of rural life in Texas; "The Outstanding Conservation Farmer" in Texas, 1956; the state's "Most Unselfish Service To Soil Conservation Award" which was given him by the Fort Worth Chamber of Commerce in 1972; and recognition by the National Bicentennial Committee as an "Outstanding Leader in

the Bicentennial Celebration of 1976". Roach also was recently commissioned as a "Kentucky Colonel" by the Kentucky State Legislature and Governor John Y. Brown, Jr. for his work in conservation.

Roach, who has been included in the "Who's Who" publication for the Southwest, the South, America, and the International edition, is also chairman of the board of directors of Paris Milling Company.

## Family Land Heritage Programs Registration

"This year we're hoping to surpass the 1,500 mark in the total number of Texas families registered in our Family Land Heritage Program," Agriculture Commissioner Reagan V. Brown said recently.

"And we certainly hope individuals interested in history or agriculture in Red River County will help us by bringing as many qualified applicants into the program as possible."

"Doug Evetts, Red River County Historical Commission Chairperson and Red River County Judge Connie Sullivan, will be working with us on the program," Brown said.

Since 1974, the program has honored 1,392 Texas

families, 17 from Red River County.

The Texas Department of Agriculture (YDA) is entering its eighth year in sponsoring the program which honors "those families that have persevered for a century or more in the cultivation and production of food and fiber," said Brown. "Undoubtedly, these families, with their unfaltering determination have been the backbone of Texas agriculture."

The registration period will extend from May 15 to August 15.

Those who qualify are honored in state ceremonies and receive a certificate and

a copy of the Family Land Heritage Registry. The publication has a brief history of each farm or ranch and includes old photographs of the family and homes as well.

Basic requirements include the following: Continuous agricultural production on the farm-ranch for 100 years, land ownership within the family, complete operation or supervision of the farm-ranch production by family members who are Texas residents, and a size of at least 10 acres with a minimum of \$250 income from farm or ranch products. TDA is the final judge of eligibility.

Persons who meet the basic qualifications and wish to enter can obtain an application from the county judge, county historical commission chairman, the nearest TDA district office, or by writing to Commissioner Reagan V. Brown, Texas Department of Agriculture, P.O. Box 12847, Austin, Texas 78711.

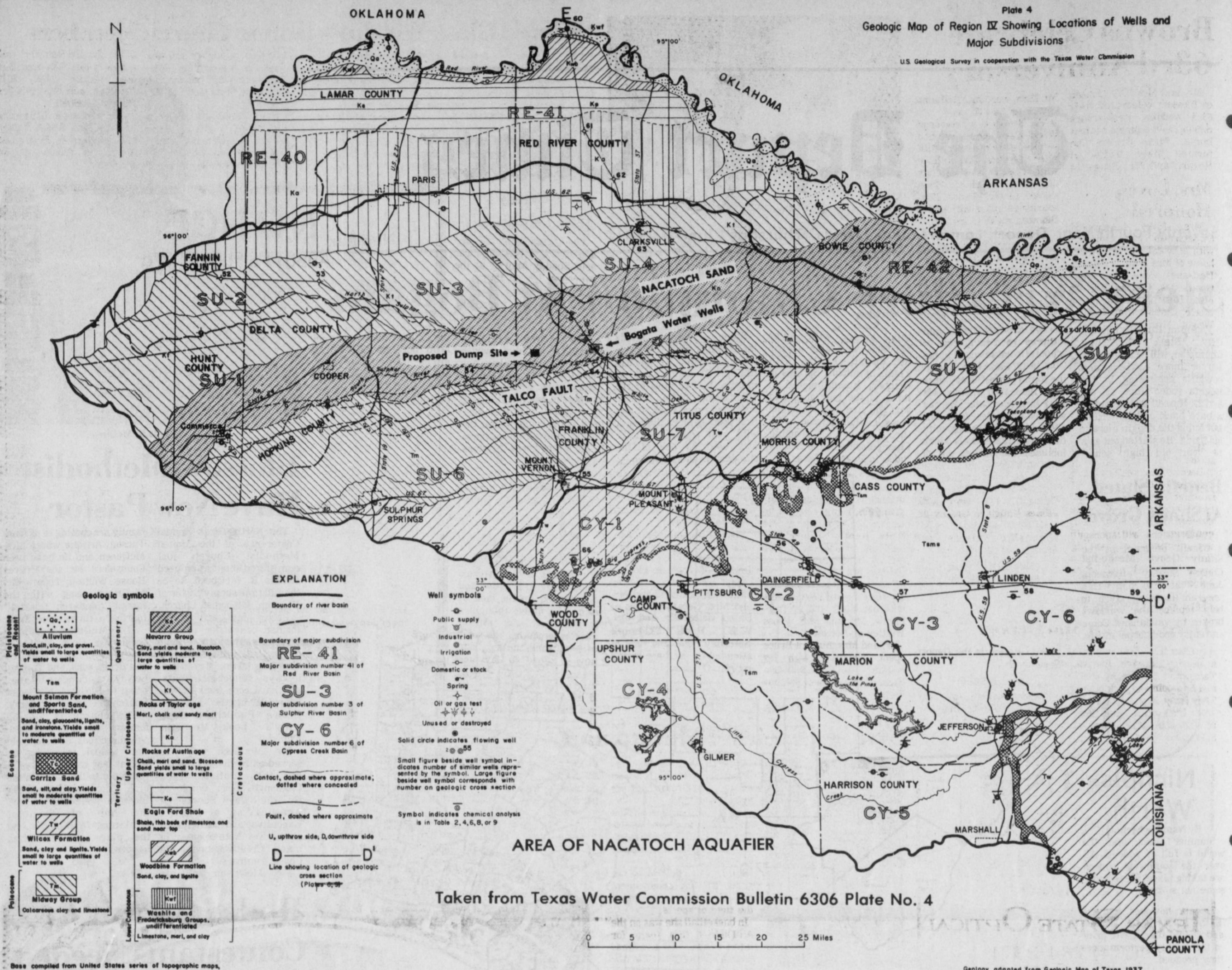

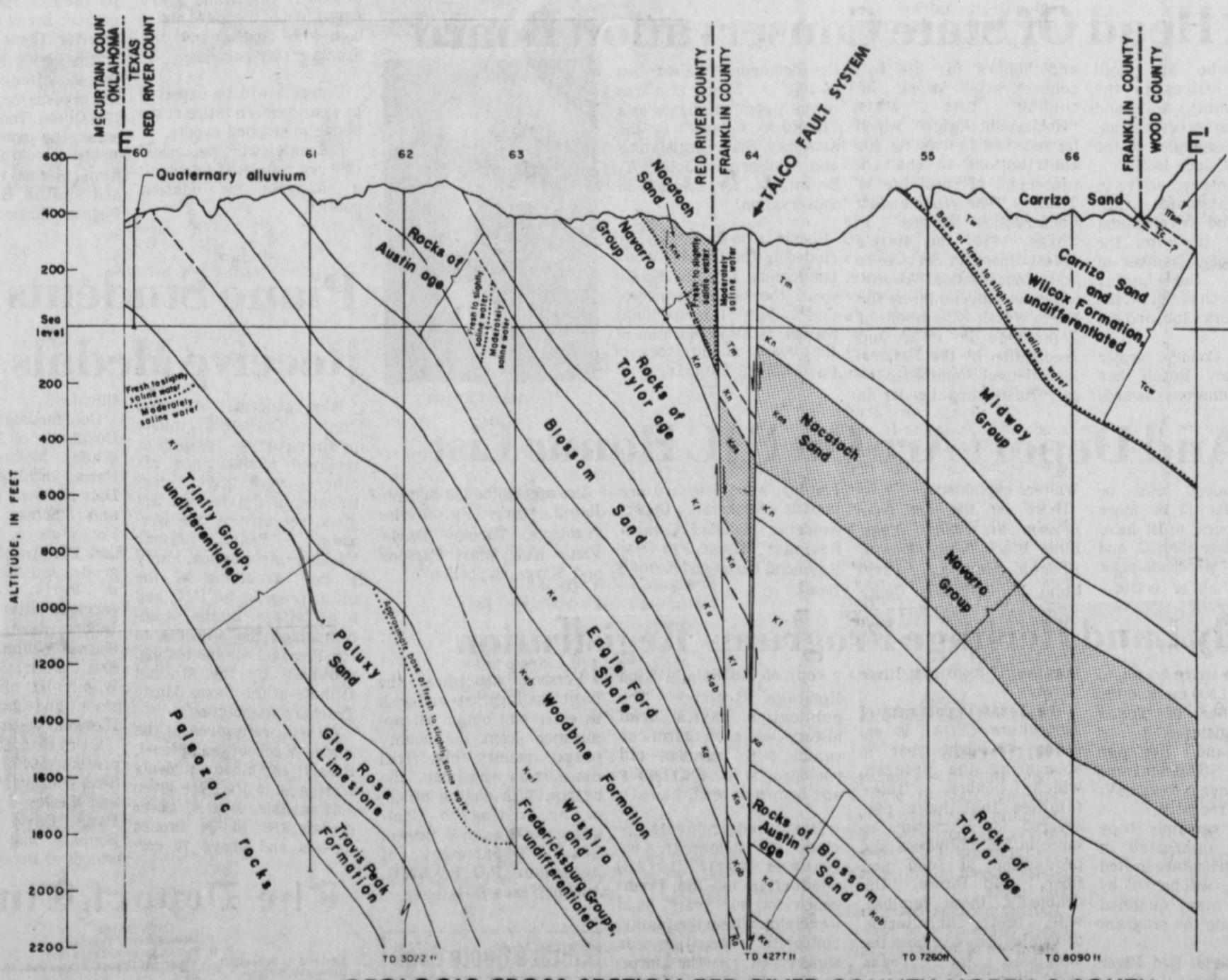
# Dump Site Threatens Water Sand—Barnard

The principal aquifer or water producing sand stratum in south Red River County is the Nacatoch sand. The city of Bogata and many private users take water from this formation. The Nacatoch sand is a narrow belt reaching from Hunt County to the Red River in Bowie County. The stratum is about five miles wide on the west side of Red River County and some six miles wide on the east side. The bedding plane of the formation slopes to the south at about eighty feet per mile. It outcrops along the northern edge and is from 200 to 400 feet thick on the south, where it is blocked by the Talco Fault system along and parallel to the Sulphur River. The stratum is made up of numerous layers and lenses of sand and marl. The water is generally of good quality, but may be slightly mineralized near the fault line. The sand is covered by a thin mantle of terrace deposits and alluvium. This surface deposit is pervious to water and in some places is saturated. It is the principal means of recharge of the aquifer from the high rain fall of the area. The movement of the water in the aquifer is to the south in the direction of the dip and toward the areas of withdrawal. The cities of DeKalb, Talco, and Commerce as well as the city of Bogata and many private users take water from the Nacatoch Sand.

The proposed location of the chemical waste dump in southwest Red River County is about six miles from the Bogata City water wells. It is in an area that is occupied by the Nacatoch Sand. Any leakage from the dump would infiltrate into the waterbearing stratum and ultimately contaminate the water wells. After the sand and wells are polluted, there is no way to reverse the condition. The pollutants are not degradable. If the water from the Nacatoch becomes unusable by the people who now depend upon it, it will be necessary for area residents to go out of the area and into another aquifer and another watershed that is clean and undamaged. The cost would be prohibitive and time required a burden. Let us not consent for the dump in this area. There must be other alternatives.

**EDITOR'S NOTE:** Wm. C. Barnard, former mayor of Bogata, worked most of his life as a civil engineer, on projects of such magnitude as the Pan American Highway in Central America and the Delta-Mendota Canal in California. After 22 years in heavy construction work with the L. S. Lacey Co. in Dallas, Barnard returned to Bogata to retire. 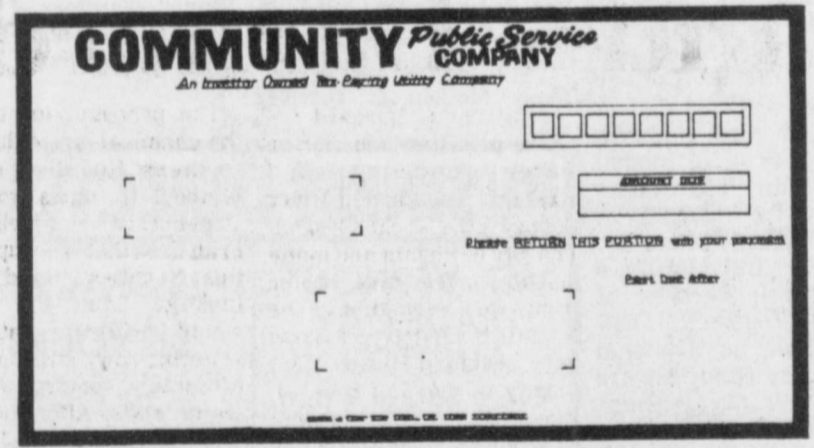

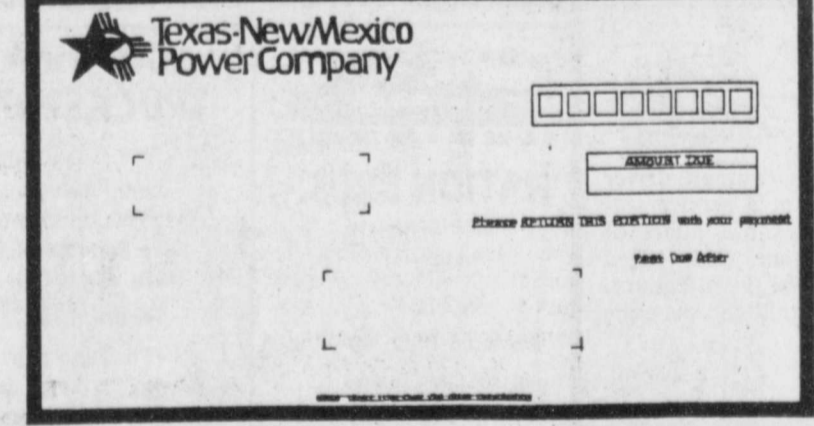

## Public Notice

An ordinance amending and changing a franchise ordinance enacted by the city of Blossom, Lamar County, Texas, on June 2, 1942 and being partly styled, "An ordinance granting to Lone Star Gas Company, a corporation, its successors and assigns, a franchise to furnish and supply gas to the general public in the city of Blossom, Lamar County, Texas"; and providing for a modification of the definition of the terms "service lines" and "yard lines" referenced in section 5 thereof.

Be it ordained by the City Council of the city of Blossom, Texas:

SECTION 1. As of the

effective date of this amendatory ordinance, and upon acceptance by Lone Star Gas Company of the provisions hereof, Section 5 of the aforesaid captioned franchise ordinance enacted on June 2, 1942, shall be stricken, cancelled and nullified and there shall be substituted in lieu thereof a new provision reading as follows:

SECTION 5. In addition to the rates charged for gas supplied, Company may make and enforce reasonable charges, rules and regulations for service rendered in the conduct of its business including a charge for services rendered in the

inauguration of natural gas service, and may require, before furnishing service, the execution of a contract therefor. Company shall have the right to contract with each customer with reference to the installation of, and payment for, any and all of the gas piping from the connection thereof with the Company's main in the streets of alleys to and throughout the consumer's premises. Company shall own, operate and maintain all service lines, which are defined as the supply lines extending from the Company's main to the customer's meter where gas is measured by Company. The consumer shall own, operate, and maintain all yard lines and house piping. Yard lines are defined as the underground supply lines extending from the point of connection with Company's customer meter to the point of connection with consumer's house piping."

SECTION 2. Enactment of this amendatory ordinance shall in no way ever be construed so as to diminish or impair any consumer's ownership interest in service lines (or portions thereof) installed prior to the effective date of this amendatory ordinance.

SECTION 3. Ther terms and provisions of this amendatory ordinance shall be deemed to be severable, and if the validity of any section, sentence, clause or phrase of this amendatory ordinance would be declared to be invalid, the same shall not affect the validity of any other section, sentence, clause or phrase of this amendatory ordinance.

SECTION 4. Except as heretofore and hereinabove changed and amended, the terms, provisions, conditions and requirements of the

aforesaid franchise ordinance shall remain in full force and effect.

SECTION 5. This amendatory ordinance shall become effective as of May 5, 1981 if the Company files its written acceptance of the provisions of this ordinance within sixty (60) days after its final passage and approval by this City and upon acceptance, the provisions hereof shall be binding upon City and Company, their successors and assigns.

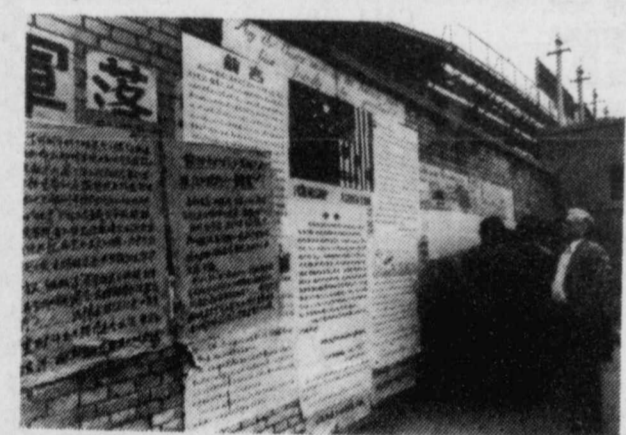

## BUDDY'S WORKSHOP

My husband and I recently purchased an old house and spend our weekends working to renovate it as a retirement home. With the help of friends, we hope to keep contract labor expense to a minimum. This summer, we will be ready to paint, inside and outside, and we are getting ready. My husband is making it difficult to hold down expenses. He thinks we must have the most expensive paint and the costliest brushes available to do a proper job. I tell him the most expensive is not necessarily the best. I may concede that expensive paint may be worth the money, but to me a paint brush is a paint brush. You need a small one for painting trim and tight spots and a wide one for flat and wide surfaces. Am I right?

Both choices are important, but price is not the deciding factor. Choose a paint with a recognizable brand name. There are paints for every purpose, paints for various types of wood, outside paint, inside paint, latex paint and oil base paint. Each is formulated for a specific use. If you are inexperienced where paint selection is concerned, ask your paint store manager to help select the type of paint you need for each phase of your painting program. He can recommend quality paints in different price ranges.

Quality brushes are as important as quality paint. But, the most expensive may not be the best and may be suitable only for one or two specific uses. Regardless of size or style, hog bristle or synthetic bristle, paint brushes are designed for use with specific paints. A calcimine brush should be used when applying water-thinned paints to large areas. Enamel and varnish brushes are required for application of oil-based paints and lacquers. Seek the advice of your paint store manager.

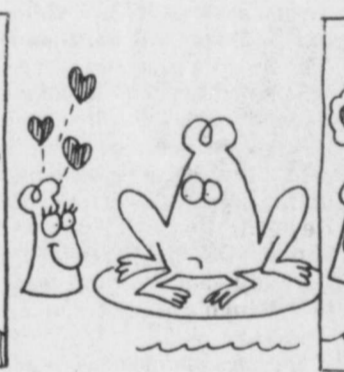

## GARDEN

### Azalea And Rhododendron—In The House Or Garden

Azalea and rhododendron are both members of the Ericaceae family. Azaleas were introduced into Europe from China shortly after the beginning of the 19th century. The type specie of the rhododendron, a garden hybrid, had arrived from Asia Minor almost a half-century before. Today, they bloom in a variety of colors around the world.



In some areas of the United States, outdoor blooming of azaleas is heralded as the arrival of spring. Winter and early spring are normal flowering times, but earlier or later blooming can be induced with house plants. Summer cuttings should be placed in peat compost, located where light is available (yet not in direct sunlight) and frequently watered. When danger of frost is past, outdoor relocation is accomplished by plunging the pot into peat or good soil in a shaded area.

Hybrid rhododendron may be tall or short and may bloom early or late, but usually in spring and early summer. They prefer light shade with some sun and do best in acid soil that contains no lime. In fact, in areas where the water supply is known to contain lime, it is recommended rain-water be collected and used in preference to tap water. Rhododendron add color to a spring or summer garden and are widely used as a patio pot plant.


