Commissioners Court and the Deport City Council have adopted resolutions opposing a Chemical Dump Site, which Chem-Securities. Inc. has proposed to locate in Red River County, just East of the Lamar County Line near Cunnningham.

The council also approved some necessary business on the plant, and considered installing a street light near the newly constructed Faith

Baptist. That was carried unamiously, and a street light will be installed.

A motion to pay the liability insurance bill was approved and the meeting was adjourned.

> Nelson denied Tuesday that Chem-Security has any corporate ties with Southwest Nuclear, Inc., a firm which tried to located a low-level nuclear waste dump in Delta County, then near Roxton.

Nelso added that eighty to ninety percent in areas where Chem-Securities sites are located are happy with the facilities once it is in place, but that the company always faces strong opposition before it can prove itself to be a good neighbor.

One thing about it though. it still beats the dickens out of watching things shrivel up under drought and 100 plus


