Chem-Securities Abandons Dump Site

Chem-Security Systems, Inc., has decided not to build a chemical waste disposal site six miles east of Cunningham in Red River County, according to Roger Nelson, business development manager for the company.

"We will not exercise the option on the John Ward property," Nelson said Tuesday, June 23, in a telephone call from the Bellevue,

Washington, office of Chem-Security. "While the geology may be such that it satisfies state and federal standards, it is not good enough for our internal standards."

"We said all along that if the geology wasn't right, we would walk away from the site," Nelson said, "and that's what we are doing. We still believe that Northeast Texas is a viable area for a treatment/storage/disposal

site, and we will continue to look for a site. The people of Northeast Texas deserve to have their waste products disposed of properly."

The possibility that a chemical waste disposal site might be located in Red River County was made public in late April, 1971. Core drilling samples of the site were taken at approximately the same time. Analysis of the core samples

taken in late April has just been completed by the company.

Residents of Red River and surrounding counties had organized the Sulphur River Watershed Concerned Citizens Association to oppose the location of the site in the area, and had hired Clarksville attorney Jim D. Lovett to represent the association in the matter.

Lovett mailed a letter last week to the company warning that legal action would be taken if further steps were taken to locate a chemical dump site in the area.

P.C. Abernathy, one of the prime organizers of the Sulphur River Watershed Concerned Citizens Association, stated that "It's

the best news I've heard lately. We've still got the organization, and if they want to try and locate a plant anywhere else in the watershed area, we'll be ready to fight if necessary".

Jane O'Neal, another prime figure in the resistance to the dump, said "It's good news, the best. Even though Chem-Securities says we didn't have much to do with the decision, we feel we've won a victory. We're going to stay organized and keep an eye out for any attempts to put a plant anywhere in the watershed area".

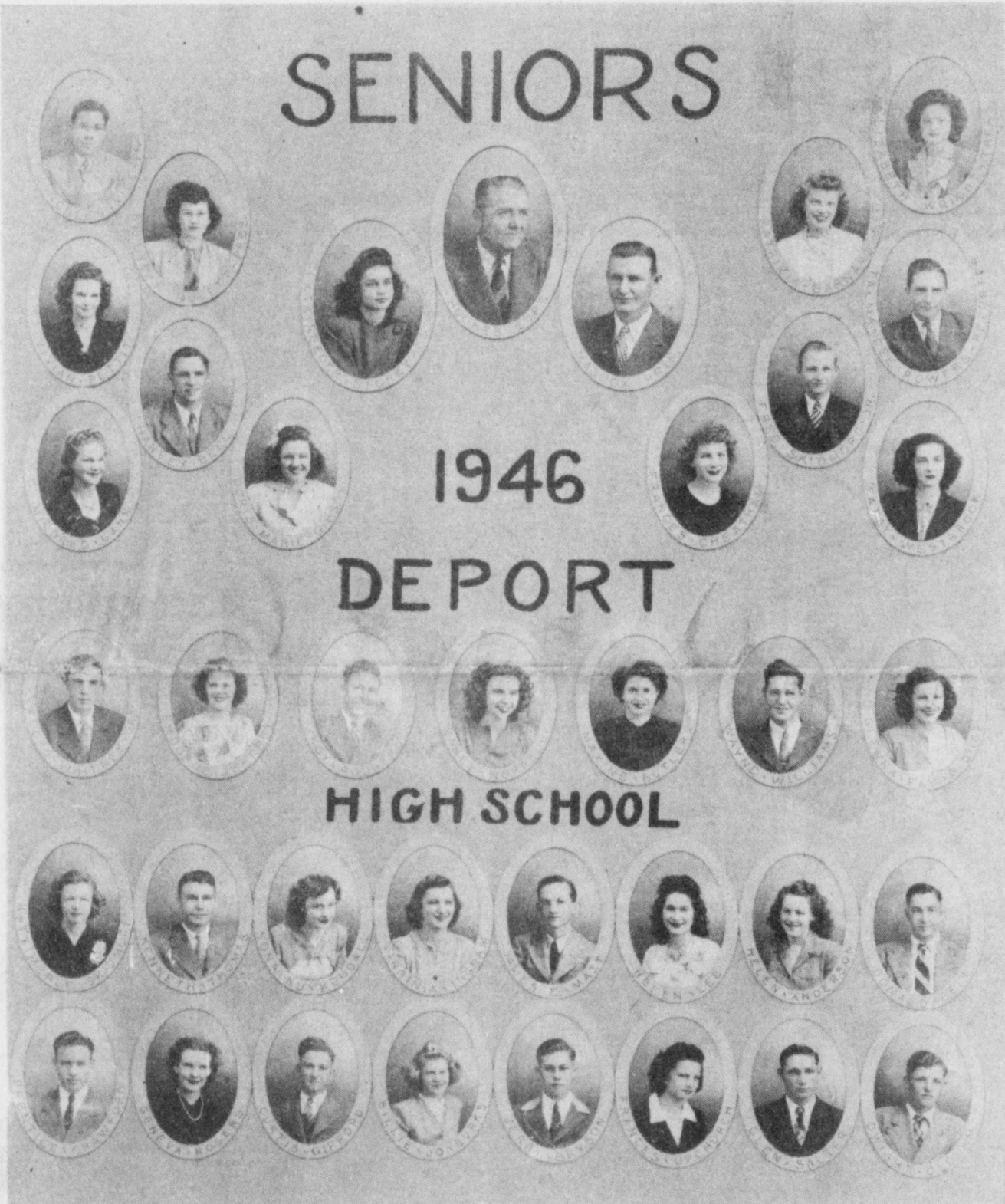
Even folks who don't keep pets are spraying houses and yards as the passing flea army marches by.

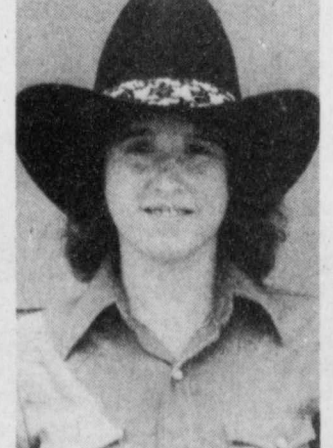

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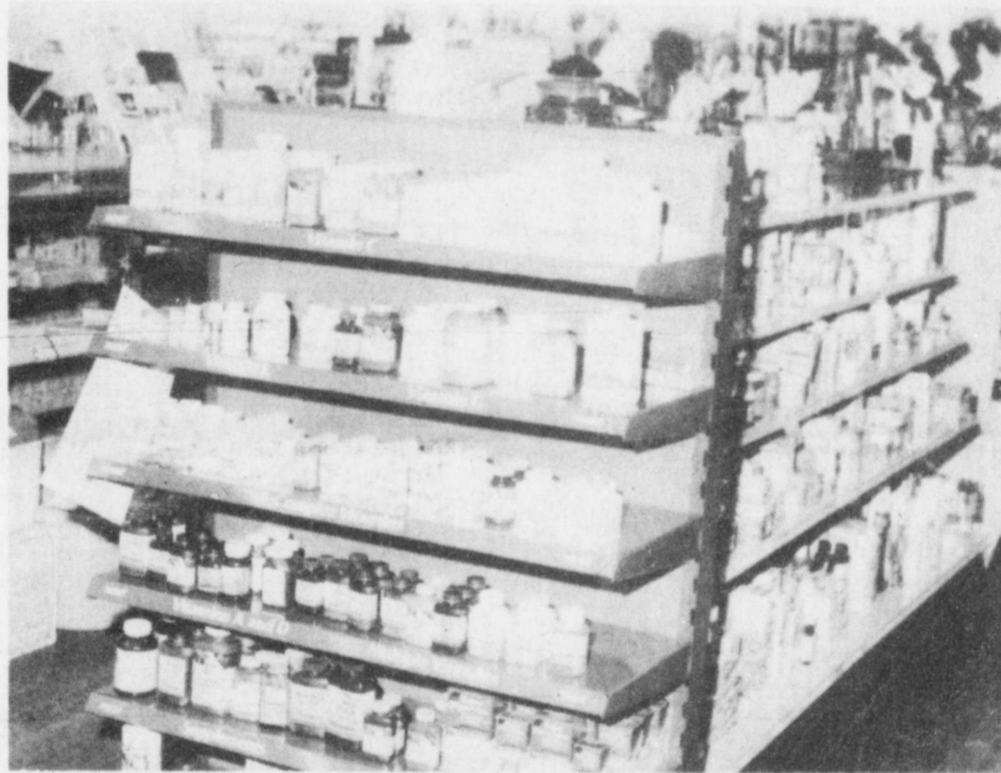

Photography Course Scheduled At PJC

Beginning Photography, a four-week course on Tuesday and Thursday nights, will be taught by Jim Brookshire, Paris Junior College Media Specialist, starting Tuesday, July 7, from 6 to 9 p.m. and end on July 28. The class will be held in the PJC Art Building.

Board Should Be Cautious

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Thursday said the Legislative Redistricting Board should proceed with caution in redrawing new state senate districts.

"Our work shouldn't be rushed or we're likely to become as entangled as the Legislature when it tried to reapportion the Senate," Bullock said.

The constitutional provision that hands the authority to the five-member board to redistrict when the Legislature fails to do so allows the board to wait up to 90 days before meeting to decide on reapportionment.

Bullock said waiting until the clock runs nearly out will lessen the prospects that the final maps will be unconstitutional.

Bullock said a fair redistricting plan won't be produced overnight although he noted that months of groundwork by this office will not make the task impossible.

"I'm concerned that the plan be fair and as squeaky-clean as possible from a legal standpoint."

FOOD ADDITIVES
Food additives are carefully monitored by the Food and Drug Administration to assure their safe use in food. Many additives increase the nutrient value of foods. Vitamins and minerals are added to salt, milk, margarine, breakfast cereals and enriched grain products. Natural colors such as carotenes (yellow), beet powder (red), and caramel (brown) are often used in cheese, bread and soft drink mixes. Only a few natural colors can be used easily in food manufacturing, so most of the colors added to foods are synthetic. These can be used only so long as there are no questions about their safety. Additives are also used for their anti-caking, anti-foaming and bleaching properties. One example is sodium silicoaluminate which is used in dessert and soft drink mixes.

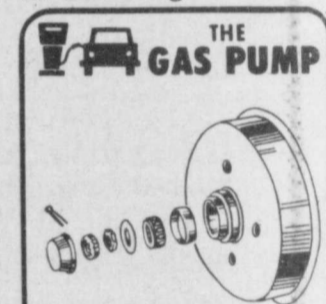
Tennis Lessons Available At PJC

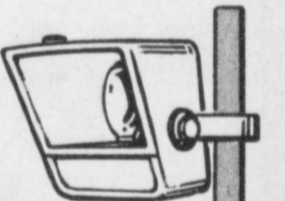

Agricultural Briefs

CATTLE GRUBS
Do you recall having those grubs in the backs of your cattle this past winter and promising yourself that that would not happen again to your cattle? If you did, then now is the time for action. Cattle grubs are very easy to control through a timely application of a systemic insecticide. Producers in our area should treat between May and August, but the very best time would be between May 15 and June 15. There are several excellent systemic insecticides available for treatment of grubs that may be used as dips, sprays and pour-ons. Additional products are

available that may be fed as part of a mineral or feed mix, however, those products must be consumed at a certain level daily to be effective. This would necessitate the mineral mixture to be palatable for the animal. This may present a problem since cattle have an abundance of lush pasture. Therefore, feed mixes may not fit into many beef cattle operations. The pour-ons chemicals have become a favorite of many cattlemen because of its effectiveness and ease of application. It may not be necessary to run the cattle through the chute when applying the chemical. It is

suggested that the material be applied evenly along animal's backbone. Several brand names of the chemical are available. The include Co-Ray, War-bex, Tiguvon, Neguvon, GX-118 and Spotton. In addition, Co-Ral and Prolate GX-118 come in either a dip or spray formulation. In order for the spray to do a good job, the animal's hair coat must be saturated. **SPRAY PECAN TREES NOW** All indications point to the need for spraying pecan trees at this time for control of casebearers. Casebearers are responsible for knocking off the small pecans. These affected nuts will begin to fall off in about three weeks. However, one must apply insecticide when the eggs are being laid on the tips of the young nut which is about this time. Once the eggs are laid, it is too late to spray. Those spraying their trees for casebearers should add some zinc sulfate or NZN to the spray solution. The insecticide is compatible with the zinc. Homeowners will have difficulty reaching the tops of large trees with small hand sprayers and may find that the hose-on sprayer does a better job when a high pressure sprayer is not available or is not economical. Educational programs conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service serve people of all ages regardless of socio-economic level, race, color, sex, religion or national origin.

Selective Service Revitalized

As part of the revitalization of the Selective Service System, Colonel Paul Dean Aikin, the State Director of Selective Service for Texas, says he expects almost one thousand individuals and organizations in Texas to receive a letter from him asking for help in recruiting local board members. Colonel Aikin, a National Guard Officer, has been ordered to active duty for approximately 90 days for the purpose of recruiting a minimum of 690 local board members in Texas. Each of the 254 counties in the state must be represented on the 138 boards that will be established. The Colonel's letter, sent to individuals, civic and ethnic organizations in all parts of the state, asks for names of highly respected and responsible citizens who may volunteer their services as local draft board members. Persons being considered for membership must: Be citizens of the United States between 18 and 60 years of age; Not be members of the Armed Forces (including reserve and retired status); If previously a local board member, having served not more than 15 years; and be willing to attend a few hours of training and later to devote an adequate amount of time serving on the boards without pay (Probably one to two hours per month, or less). Colonel Aikin urges each individual and organization receiving his letter to respond as soon as possible with names of qualified persons, both men and women. He also asks anyone interested in serving to contact him by mail at Box 5218, Austin, Texas 78763 or phone Area Code 512, 397-5945. The boards will not be activated immediately, but selected members will be placed in standby status for possible future need.

All persons and entities who paid their membership dues to Loyd's Ambulance Service in Red River County, Texas for the period of July 1, 1979 to July 1, 1980, and who have not previously opted out as members of the class are hereby notified that your class representatives previously certified by the Court, to-wit: Duane Benson, Bobby Brem, Olen Douglas, and James Wood, have submitted a proposal for settlement of your claims to the Court.

Under the proposed settlement the class would receive a default judgment against the Defendants in the amount of \$52,178.40, which represents the full amount of the membership dues paid for said period less a credit for the period of time that Loyd's Ambulance Service did provide services to its members from July 1, 1979 to October 10, 1979. Total amount collected by Loyd's Ambulance Service was \$72,470.00. They fulfilled 23 percent of their obligation, thus leaving \$52,178.40 owing to the class. Jim D. Lovett of Jim D. Lovett & Associated, P.C. has donated all legal services to the class conditioned upon approval of the settlement.

Your class representatives have recommended that this settlement be approved even though it is not expected that the judgment can ever be satisfied from any property belonging to the Defendants since no non-exempt property can at the present time be identified. However, your class representatives have recommended its approval since it is as favorable a settlement as could be entered considering all the conditions. It does give a possibility of the future satisfaction of some portion thereof, it is probably not dischargeable in bankruptcy since it would be entered under the Texas Deceptive Trade Practices-Consumer Protection Act, and it will serve the purpose of deterring the Defendants from attempting similar future businesses, thereby giving some protection to the public at large.

If you approve of this proposed settlement it is not necessary for you to do anything further. However, if you do not approve of the settlement then you must file your written objections and the reasons for such objections with the District Clerk of Red River County, Texas on or before the 3rd day of July, 1981 and serve a copy on the attorney for the class of Plaintiffs, Jim D. In the event members of the class wish to communicate further about the settlement they are instructed to contact the Plaintiffs' attorney, Jim D. Lovett at the above address or at 214-427-2724. Do not, under any circumstances contact the Judge or try in any way to discuss the case with him since that would constitute a violation of the criminal laws of the state of Texas.

This notice shall be published one time each in the Clarksville Times, Bogata News, Detroit News, Paris News, Texarkana Gazette and the Mount Pleasant Tribune, which are all of the newspapers in general circulation in Red River County and the surrounding areas, at least ten (10) days prior to the hearing. The notice shall also be announced on three separate days on radio station KCAR. The Court has found that notice in this manner is proper and will provide adequate notice to the members of the class consistent with constitutional and statutory requirements relating to such notice.

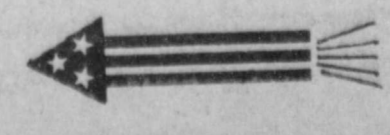

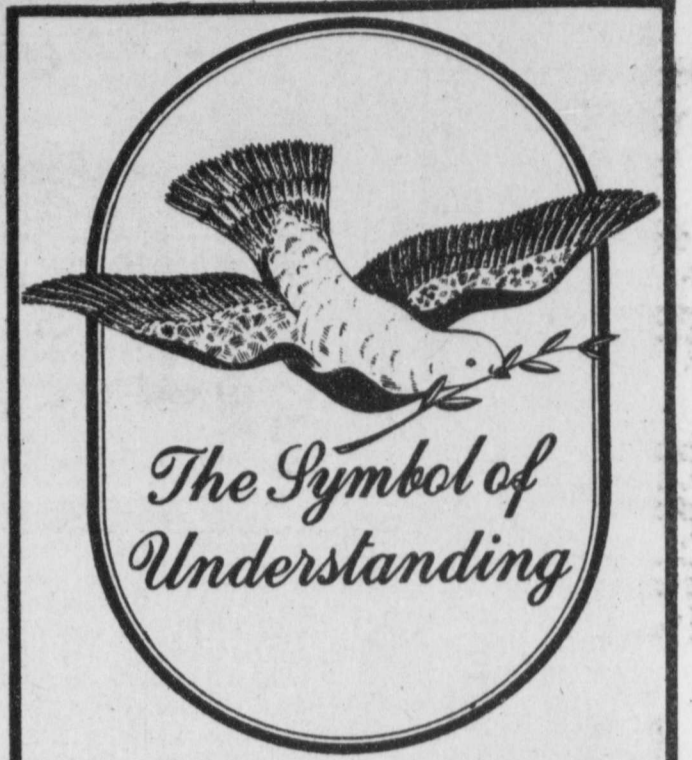
Tornado Results In Designation

Persons can come to the office to discuss application procedures with the loan representative on duty. Victims of the tornado may visit the SBA office before gathering their information for loan processing.

SBA disaster loans are available to eligible businesses which sustain losses to their property as a result of the tornado. Interest rates on these loans are five percent. These loans may not exceed 60 percent of the actual amount of damages.

Stir in pineapple, cottage cheese, celery and horseradish. Pour into 5-cup mold. Chill until set.
