Baird School Enrollment Increases By 17 Students

Enrollment at Baird Public School increased this year by 17 students over last years 447.

The ninth grade is the largest this year with 46 students and fourth grade smallest with 27. Total students in the school this year is 464.

Voters Must Register, Deadline Only One Month Away

Citizen wishing to vote in the upcoming November elections must register before October 3.

A post card application can be obtained from the office of Albert Lovell, Tax assessor for Callahan County. This may be mailed in postage free or brought by in person to Mr. Lovell's office. Mr. Lovell said it would save the county money if they were brought in person, as it cost his office 37 cents for each post card at the post office.

To be eligible to vote a person must register 30 days before an election.

At this time there is 6019 eligible voters in Callahan County registered. Only 180 voters have registered since the count in May, at which time there was only 5839.

If you don't vote you can't have a voice in the government. So we urge you to register before the deadline.

VOTER REGISTRATION INFORMATION

Qualifications for voting:

1. You must be a citizen of the United States.
2. You must be at least 18 years of age on the day of the election.

3. You must be a resident of Callahan County.

4. You must be registered to vote.

Persons Not Entitled to Vote:

1. Those convicted of a felony whose full rights have not been restored.
2. Those persons found mentally incompetent by a court of law.

How To Register To Vote:

1. Complete a post card application for voter registration and mail it postage free or present it in person to the Tax Assessors office.
2. You may register to vote anytime, but your application must be received by the assessors office by Oct. 3, 1982 in order to vote in the Nov. 2, 1982 general election. Because Oct. 3, 1982 falls on a Sunday, persons wishing to register in person at the County Tax Assessors office by the Oct. 3 deadline must do so no later than the close of business, Friday, Oct. 1, 1982.
3. You may register to vote if you are at least 17 years and 10 months of age, but you may not vote until you are 18 years of age.

Man Found On Highway, Starvation Cause Of Death

At 11:45 a.m. Tuesday, Callahan County Sheriffs Department received a call from the Texas Highway and Transportation Department, that a man was down at mile post 312 on the south side of the highway.

Sheriff Bill Skinner responding to the call discovered William Charles Hanson of 9112 Ricky Lane, Little Rock, Arkansas. Justice of Peace Lee Savell was called to

the scene where he pronounced the man dead.

Upon investigation, authorities have ruled out foul play in the death. The body was dehydrated and showed signs of malnutrition.

The body of Henson, who's identification showed him to be 46, was taken to Parker Funeral Home, awaiting decision from the family.

Sheriff Locates Missing Cruiser,

Having only a scimp report and a name on an envelope, Sheriff Bill Skinner and his department unreveled the mystery of the "Missing Cruiser."

A 23 foot cabin cruiser was reported stolen from Lewis Enterprises to the Clyde Police Department on August 12, who in return gave the sparse report to the Callahan County Sheriffs Department.

Sheriff Skinner said upon investigating

two Clyde residents, Kyle O'Bannon and Bryon Smart, Sheriff Skinner and investigators from the department then chartered a plane to Corpus Christi, Texas, and located the cruiser at a local residence there.

Sheriff Skinner at this time has the boat impounded with a local wrecker service there and is still looking for two other suspects believed to be involved in the theft.

Labor Day Fatalities Estimated Five Teams Sign For Coleman Ranch Rodeo

50% Alcohol Related

Although motor vehicle fatalities are down by five percent statewide as compared to this time last year, the Texas Department of Public Safety is estimating 47 traffic deaths over the forthcoming Labor Day weekend.

DPS Director Colonel Jim Adams said he is not optimistic that the holiday period would reflect fewer deaths than anticipated. However, he said that drivers could help limit the number of fatalities by using seat belts, maintaining a safe speed, and refraining from drinking while driving. He said about half of the holiday deaths would probably involve drinking.

"Some people tend to drink more during the holidays and then attempt to drive. By doing so, they show a low regard for the well being of themselves, their passengers and other motorists. Drunk driving is obviously one of the most dangerous risk factors facing motorists today," he said.

DPS statistical reports show 23 per cent of traffic deaths reported last year involved alcohol. However, Adams said, "About 50 per cent or more of the traffic deaths in Texas are alcohol related."

State law does not provide for mandatory blood alcohol testing on drivers who were believed to have been drinking. When we compare accident reports and

national statistics, it is easy to estimate the number of accidents which involve the drinking driver," he said.

Last year during Labor Day, 50 repeaters were killed in urban and rural traffic accidents. Eight more persons died later as a result of injuries suffered from accidents which occurred during the 78-hour holiday.

At the discretion of command officers, the DPS will have extra patrols assigned to areas where heavy volumes of traffic can be anticipated or where drinking drivers can be expected.

"Local highway patrol commanders will assign the additional troopers as they deem appropriate to assist the holiday traveler and to watch for drivers who violate traffic laws," said Adams.

The Labor Day holiday is traditionally one of the last holidays of the summer vacation period and extensive travel and heavy traffic can be expected.

The DPS is urging motorists who take long trips to utilize the many rest stops provided by civic and business clubs and the State Highway Department.

Additionally, the DPS will conduct Operation Motorcade whereby the city police departments, county sheriffs' offices and troopers report the number of traffic deaths directly to the news media.

The events include: horse catching, team roping, team penning, bronc riding, wild cow milking, and calf roping and branding. All contestants will wear full western regalia, including chaps, boots, spurs, etc.

Performances are to be held a 10 a.m. and 7 p.m. Coleman Counties Annual Fair, "fiesta De La Paloma" will host a Dove Cook-off, a dance played by Fiddlin Frenchie Burke, a beauty contest, and plenty of good food.

There will be something for all ages all day in Coleman, Texas on Sept. 25.

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Strake Talk

TWO TERMS IS ENOUGH

Texans have a healthy skepticism of their elected officials, a wariness of entrenched power that they have embodied in the state constitution. They have historically refused to keep top state officeholders more than a few terms.

Now my opponent comes along, having spent nearly ten years in the Lt. Governor's office, one of the top state policy-making offices. Mr. Hobby wants yet another term to make it 14 years in that crucial job. That is unprecedented. Never in Texas' history has any Lt. Governor served that long—or wanted to.

His desire, frankly, puzzles me. You would think he would have other goals, other challenges he might want to tackle. As his primary opponent this year said, "If he had anything to get done, you'd think he would have done it by now."


My opponent will tell you that experience is what counts. I think voters need to look at the experience they have had with him. After ten years, our highways are in bad shape, the quality of education has declined, we still do not have a new, statewide water plan and he has refused to tackle the growing crime problem. We can't afford more of that kind of experience.

I have a long-held belief in what I call the citizen-politician: someone who holds a job, serves his country or state for a reasonable time, then returns to that job and private life. For that reason, the first order of business after I am elected will be to have a constitutional amendment introduced in the legislature limiting the Lt. Governor to two terms—eight years. That is enough time for anyone. Too great a concentration of power for too long is bad. That is a principle of democracy.

Baird School Highlighted For It's 100th Birthday

Sept. 4, 1982 is not only Homecoming but the day the school will observe its Centennial Birthday.

The following is a partial look at the school history. Information sources are limited so we hope we haven't left out anything. If so, we apologize in advance. Happy Centennial!!

1882-Baird's first school was built. The building consisted of one room and was located in the NE part of town. Ly-mon Gould was the first teacher.

1884- School burned.

1884- School burned.

1886- New two-stroy school built in SW part of town. Some of the teachers who taught in this new building included C.E. Smith, Media Douglas, Kate Rich-erson (Mrs. H.H. Ramsey).

1885- First School Board elected.

1896-97- Marked the first graduating class. No names were available.

1908- School burned again, classes were held in churches.

1910-11- The red brick school, which is now part of the cafeteria was construct-ed with R.D. Green becoming the first superintendent. During this period Baird also became an independent school district.

1915- J.F. Boren became superintend-ent and served as such for 22 years until 1937.

1917-18- The school selected its first known president, Caryse Boydston.

1922-23- Baird sported its first football team, with Newell Berry as coach. Baird was defeated by Anson 36-0 during the first game. Woodfine Ray scored the first Baird TD against Clyde, and the first school paper "Baird Bugle" was established.

1923-24- Coach Rudd Hughes and Mrs. Boren changed the team's name from Cubs to Bears, thus leading to a long and illustrious line of Baird Bears.

1922- Mrs. Lee Ivey, Baird teacher, inspired the school song, "Joyous and Ever Loyal".

1926-27- Clyde White was elected president of Baird's first Homecoming. Homecoming last for 2 years.

1927-28- First pep squad was formed and, of course, Baird's first cheerleaders were elected: Madge Hokmes (Mrs. Frank Bearden) and Ruth Simons (Mrs. Ruth Bowlus).

Frank Bearden made the longest run-to-date 98 yards, for a touchdown during the Baird, Albany game. The Bears emerged vistorious 25-0.

1928- Baird high school was comple-ted, and students moved into the build-ing on Monday, Dec. 10, 1928.

The first annual named "Headlight" was published. Vernon Johnson was editor. The annual was dedicated to Mrs. Clyde White and Miss Winifred Camp. Miss Camp was the sponsor of and the inspiration of the "Headlight".

The school's first paper, the "Tail Light" originated. R.W. Varner was editor of the paper, which was later named the "Bear Facts."

1929-30- First Headlight Queen was elected- Juanita Finch.

1936-37- The Bears Den and Gym were

built. Bears Den named by Mrs. A.E. Dyer, Sr. Rocks furnished by Col. A.E. Dyer Sr.

1938-39- The Baird band was organi-zed with Billy Hollingshead as president and Sydney Robbins as Drum Major.

Laura Windham was named First Carnival Queen.

Clyde Yarbrough was the first 4 yr. letterman and Gene Finley was the first county and district tennis champ.

1940-41- Baird was placed in the Class A division football.

1950-51- Present Grammar school was completed.

1953-54- Cafetorium completed.

1954-55- Mrs. Archie Nichols and Mrs. Irma Crow revived the school homecom-ing. Mr. J.F. Boren, ex-superintendent, was guest speaker and no queen was elected.

1955-56- Baird's very first Homecoming

1954-55- Mrs. Archie Nichols and Mrs. Irma Crow revived the school Homecom-ing. Mr. J.F. Boren, ex-superintendent, was guest speaker and no queen was elected.

1955-56- Baird's very first Homecoming Queen was elected. She was Mrs. Bessie Short of Baird, ex-teacher of 36 years.

1957-58- The present high school was completed. Bill K. Ford was super-intendent.

1960-61- Mrs. Archie Nichols formed the first Beta Club. Bears won bi-district in football.

1963- Baird girls' basketball team was defeated in the regional finals.

1964-65- The highlight was the arrival of 100 Perucians at BHS for registration and sightseeing of a Texas town and school. The Baird girls' basketball team captured the state title.

1968-69- Baird students had their first "Homecoming Queen" nominees and the Ex students changed their queen's title to "Coming Home Queen".

1970-71- A modern gym and a vocational agriculture shop were added.

1972- Mrs. Archie Nichols retired after 37 years of teaching, the longest tenure of any teacher at BHS.

1973-74- Kindergarten classes were started at the school.

1974-75- Reading progress classes were started at the school.

1976- Virginia Gary Dixon, Class of 61, was elected "Coming Home Queen". She was the youngest "ex" to ever receive the honor.

1977- A portable double-classroom was added to the elementary school.

1977- A portable double classroom was added to the elementary school.

The Bears won district in football, bas-ketball and tennis.

1978- Two portable double-classrooms one at elementary and one at high school, were added.

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A drill team was established with Mrs. Roger (Barbara) Corn as sponsor.

A 9 foot high, 4 foot wide Bear and a victory bell was unveiled at the first pep rally of the season.

WHO AM I?

I was built in 1882 and vurned down in 84 but I came up our of the ashes and got myself rebuilt in 86 only to be burned down AGAIN. That was in 1908. Guess you could say I "SET THE WOODS ON FIRE" in my youth. But I never gave up because I knew my purpose in being here. So in 1909-1910 I was again rebuilt and out of brick this time! Pretty red ones at that! My I was fancy! A few years later it was decided that I wasn't large enough, so in 1928 the "fourth" me was built. A part of the third me is still here but I am hidden away under a cafeteria. Does that ring a bell? I've always liked bells myself. Well, back to my life history. The newand present me was completed in 1957. Yes, I said present! I AM STILL HERE!!! One hundred years old, I am, and proud of it!!! My memory is good too--I've been told more than once that someone wishes they had never heard of me, I've had my walls written on, I've

been used and abused and, I'm still curious about those fires. But, I have had the last laugh because YOU have come back to see ME all through the years. Just thinking about it I get "JOYOUS" and, knowing you are coming again on Sept. 4 proves you are still "EVER LOYAL".

Truman Foster Dies

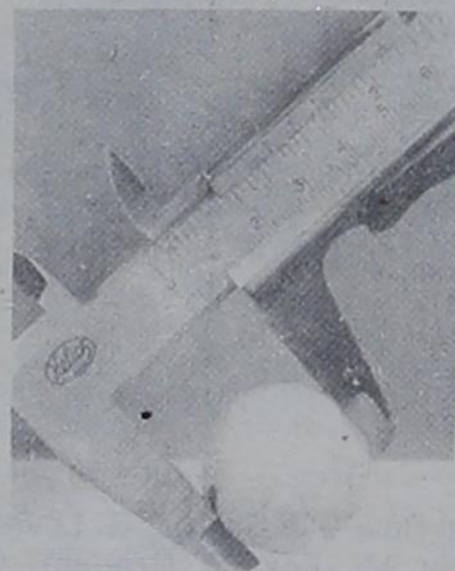

Round-up For Crippled Children Appoints Co. Chairmen

Hugh Ross, James Snyder, Jim Snyder (Baird) and Weldon Edwards (Clyde), have been appointed Callahan County chairmen for Cattlemen's Round-up for Crippled Children according to Jim Alexander, general Round-up chairman. The Cattlemen's Round-up for Crippled Children benefits the West Texas Rehabilitation Center with campuses in Abilene, San Angelo, and Snyder, stated Shelly V. Smith, WTRC's Executive Director.

"Livestock donated by ranchmen are collected at a designated point in each community and transported free to the auction site," Alexander explained. "The county chairman's role is to make a personal pledge, then ask friends and neighbors to join them in the annual CRCC drive."

Sales of livestock are converted to dollars and the amount provides care for about 10,000 handicapped persons throughout the Southwest at Rehab campuses.

Scheduled sales include Abilene Auction, September 27; Abilene horse sale, Oct. 2; Junction sheep and goat sale, Oct. 4; Coleman sale, Oct. 6; and Brownwood sale, Nov. 3.

Jim Franklin of San Angelo is CRCC co-chairman in the Southwest region. Midwest Feedyards in San Angelo serves as the regional collection point.

CRCC is now 22 years old. The idea began in Bronte on the late Conda Wylie's Fort Chadborne Ranch. He came to Smith with the suggestion that 20 top steers be cut from his herd and sold to help defray operational expenses of WTRC.

The results speak for themselves. Today WTRC reaches out to all handicapped in the Southwest. With a goal for treating the whole patient rather than just the handicap, services offered include physical therapy, social services, psychology, orthotics, diagnostic services, educational, adaptive equipment shops, audiology, medical clinics, genetic counseling and transportation.

DPS Warns Motorists To Watch For School Children

The summer vacation is over and thousands of youngsters are starting back to school, many of those for the first time.

Captain G.J. Matthews of the Texas Highway Patrol said "Last year in Texas, the pedestrian death accounted for approximately 16% of our total traffic fatalities with many of those being school age children."

"The Texas Department of Public Safety wants to remind all motorists that with the start of school, you will be seeing those big yellow school buses where

they have not been all summer," said Captain Matthews. He said that all drivers are required to stop for school buses when the bus is stopped to load or unload school children and has its overhead lights activated. Captain Matthews pointed out that the law concerning stopping for a school bus applies to drivers in the city limits as well as out in the rural areas. He also stated that drivers must stop from either direction before passing the bus.

The only time a driver can legally pass a stopped bus is for the flashing red lights

to be turned off, the bus driver to motion a vehicle by or for the bus to resume motion. Captain Matthews was careful to point out that in either of these situations, a driver needs to remain alert for school students. They could still dart into the path of your vehicle, he said.

Captain Matthews said, "With the start of school, all drivers need to be extra cautious around schools." He said, "the children will be excited about a new school year and might not be thinking about all the safety rules in bike riding and crossing streets so it will be left up to the motorist to protect them." "Drive as if you have a child attending that school," he said.
