After such a petition is completed and filed it must be presented to the Lamar County Commissioners Court, and each signature certified.

The local option election must then be called not less than 20 days nor more than 30 days after the court meets.

that problems might arise from liquor sales, in the forms of crime increase. littering or disturbances. Others whole-heartedly support the issue, being anxious for increased tax revenue, and stating that liquor is within easy reach

Farmers with heavy weed infested wheat should consider an application of sodium chlorate at this time. This material will burn the green vegetation and enable one to harvest a quality grain resulting in less price discount. The special emergencyuse permit for the chemical was issued by the Texas Department of Agriculture June 25 to alleviate this situation in wheat. The urea

fire retardent sodium chlorate should be applied at the rate of four pounds per acre in eight to ten gallons of water. There is a seven day wait

until harvest and 14 day delay before grazing. The special permit expires on July 9.

Bill Hatch, who farms in the Taylortown Community of Lamar County, planted Guar this past week. Bill planted 37 acres. It was drilled in 10 inch rows and 0-40-40 fertilizer and Treflan herbicide was applied. It was planted on fairly light soil, so this should give us some indication of Guar potential for the area.




