Tractor Pull Doesn't Just Happen

Most people are familiar with tractor pulling, especially the pull sponsored by the Paris Young Farmer Chapter. Most people are aware of the time, money and energy put into creating the big machines that roar down the track. But few give thought to the amount of work that goes into creating the pull event itself.

The Paris Young Farmers have members from all over, not just within the city of Paris.

This year they moved from the Rodeo Arena to a leased piece of land. That gave them a longer track, more room, and more parking. It also required solving new problems.

The amount of work that

went into converting a piece of bare ground into a track was formidable.

The track was probably the most difficult part, with maintainers, scrapers and rollers being used over and over, with a watering in between.

The bleachers had to be erected, some at the last minute when they were shipped in.

Concession stands had to be moved in, not to mention the incredible amount of volunteer work by the women who ran the stands. Crowds were six and ten deep all evening long both nights as they fixed nachos, cokes, hot dogs and other "goodies".

One of the Young farmers involved, Royce Fouse, who

works at LaRue Ford Tractor Co. in Paris, replied to a query as to "Why?" with "because we enjoy working together, and providing quality entertainment for the area". Audie Niesler said "Oh, it's not too much work, just a little every day." That "little every day" was each evening till about midnight for a month!

David Basinger, Jack Nelson, many, many other members of the Young Farmers all expressed the same goals. Providing entertainment of family quality, and raising funds for their projects is their primary reason for going to such a vast amount of work.

The Young Farmers provide scholarships, provide FFA project animals, present savings bonds and put almost all of their money right back into the area. When the Emberson Tornado hit, they were quick to donate.

Two thirds of the young farmers involved are full time farmers, some work in part time jobs and farm on the side, others are involved in agri-business. All are united in the effort of making the tractor pull, the Chapter sponsored Agriculture Day and their other projects the best available.

One member said that he felt the entire group had worked together more closely this year than ever before. Just the schop of erecting the generator powered lighting system,

arranging the invitations to the pullers and doing the measuring, announcing and officiating would daught many organizations!

And everything they created, the track, lighting, bleachers, all had to be removed almost as quickly as it was put up.

In the actual pulling competition itself Locals James Keys, Melvin Webb, David Basinger, James Winters, and Mike Winters all participated. Keys won first place, Webb second in stock classes.

T.J. Basinger of Deport, who had never driven a tractor pull machine before, delighted the crowd with his antics. In high gear, and not knowing what to do, he

waved his arms, bounced up and down, threatened to run over people and generally created a show.

A new addition was army tanks from the National Guard. Their display of strength as they casually dragged the weighted sled at full capacity the length of the track brought roars from the crowds.

The new locatio created a track problem that had to be corrected the first night, but by the second everything was better than ever!

The Paris Young Farmers are to be congratulated on the excellent entertainment they provide for the entire area.

Mrs. Marvin Bruce. Mrs. Crawford and Mrs. Ray brought the 42 trophy to Blossom as they won the championship.

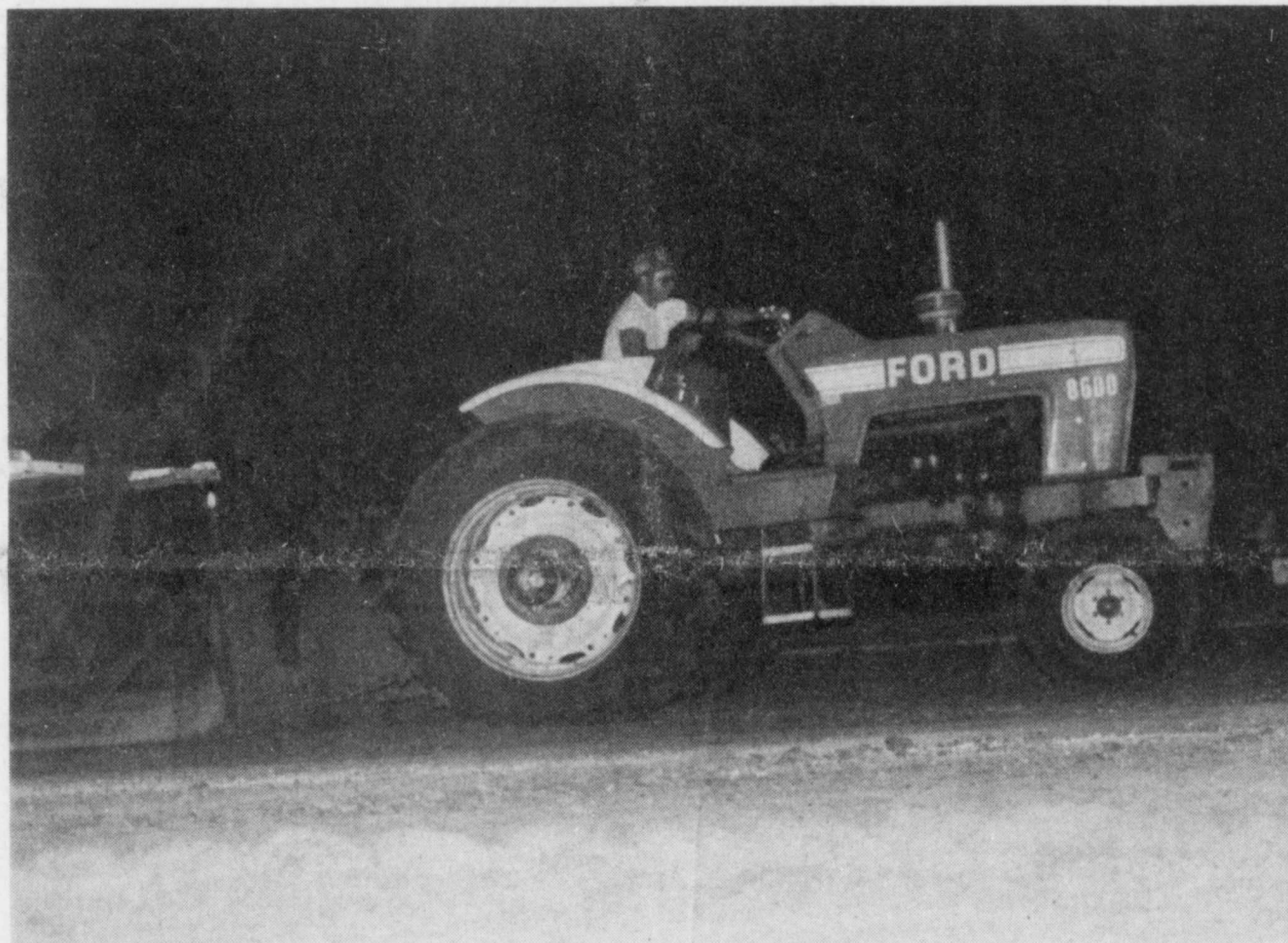


PROMISED LAND-the third and fourth grade class at Methodist Presbyterian Bible

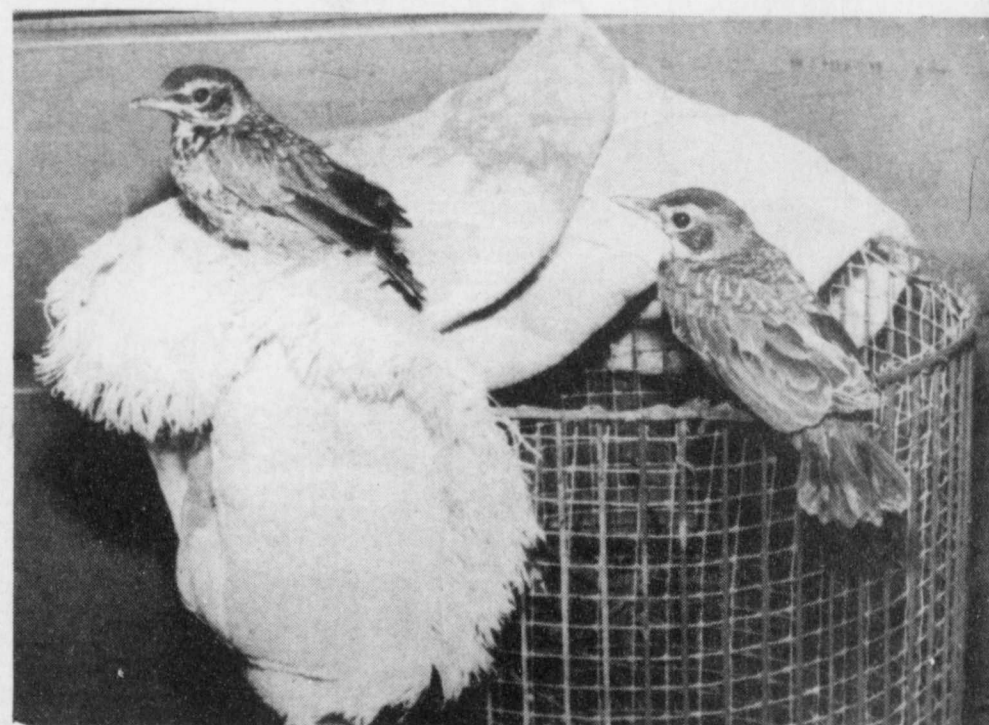
SAYINGS MAKE SENSE, a collection of advertising slogans.

Head-On Crash Kills Two

Two young men were killed and two received injuries, one seriously, in a head-on collision one mile south of Bogata on Hwy. 271 around 2 a.m. Sunday morning.

Darrell Glen Evans, age 22 and a Pattonville resident, and Robert Lynn Edge, age 25 of Talco were pronounced dead at the scene by Bogata JP James Watson. Both men were drivers in the accident.

Monty Lee Johnston, 22 of Blossom, who was a passenger in the vehicle driven by Evans, was kept overnight but has since been released. He suffered scalp lacerations.

Charles Ray Savage was treated and released from

Red River General a spokesman said. Savage was the passenger in the pickup driven by Edge.

Evans was driving a 1979 Mercury northbound on Hwy. 271 with Edge traveling in a 1973 Ford Pickup truck heading south.

The Evans' vehicle is reported to have crossed the center line into the south-bound lane and collided head-on with the pickup truck.

Both funerals were held on Monday. The Edge funeral at 4 p.m. at the Talco Church of Christ and the Evans funeral at Grant Funeral Home in Deport at 5 p.m. Monday, July 27.

Robins, Songsters Of Spring

The robin, perhaps one of the best-known birds in the United States, is abundant in the East Texas Area.

The black capped head and bright red breast catch the eye, as well as the somewhat pompous strut he affects when hopping jauntily over lawns.

They are a member of the true Thrush family, a medium sized bird with a song that is, perhaps, somewhat overated. They do not sing in long, melodious stretches, but rather short, and very cherry bursts.

The fact that the robin's snatches of song are often the first sounds of spring heard throughout a cold and bitter winter's end undoubtedly has endeared both song and bird to many.

The bird was named for the robins of England, when colonists, homesick for their native countryside, noticed the strong resemblance of the American bird to that of the English one. The English cousin has a much brighter, redder breast, and a sweeter song.

In the East Texas area the birds are often found nearly all year long. The birds hatched up north replace those hatched in the local area in the fall. The local birds move further south and the norther ones settle in during all but the coldest part of the winter.

They are remarkably tame and friendly, often

nesting on porches, or in bushes and trees right nest to windows. Their fear of man seems minimal.

The carefully tended lawns of today's homeowner are perfect for worm, beetle and insects hunting by robins. Mr. Robin may think the lawns provided for his benefit, and thus consider mankind his benefactor.

At one time, in the early part of the century, robins were classified as game birds, and hunted by the thousands. People today consider them almost a symbol of spring, and would never consider making a robin pot pie, but it wasn't unusual back then. Such hunting has long since been outlawed, however.

A harmless, cheerful little bird, they are prized by many with their antics of hopping about, singing, and providing a bright flash of color throughout our area.

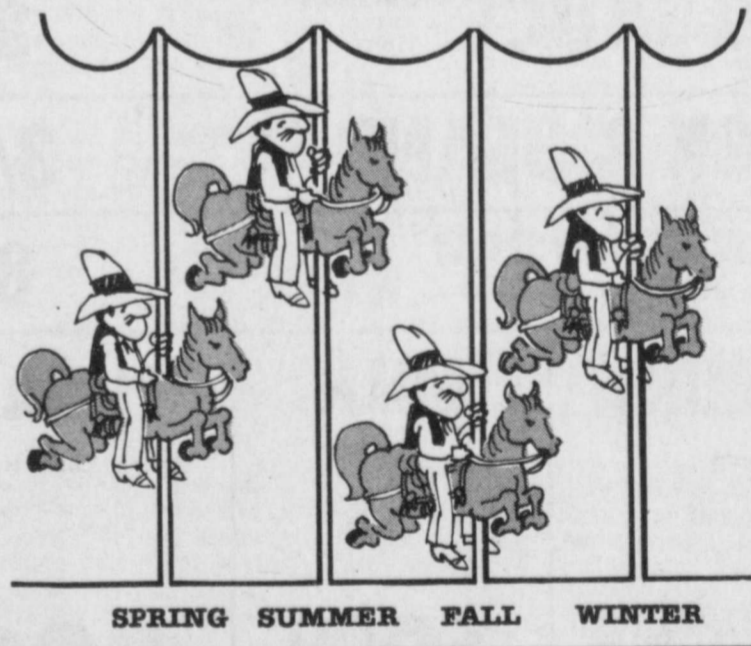




