Prairiland CISD Budget Finalized

The Prairiland CISD has assembled its budget for the Fiscal Year 1981-82. The tax rate will remain the same, with local money and state and federal funds being sufficient to cover expenses. Salaries, teachers, administrator and all others, (janitors, cooks, aides, etc.)

were budgeted at \$1,220,217. Purchased and Contracted Services will amount to \$142,227 and Supplies and Materials will be at \$83,650. Supplies and Materials includes all teaching aids. Other Operating Expenses is set at \$31,700 and Debt Service, Loan Interest and

Lease-Purchase is \$29,790. Capital Outlay, which consists of such things as repairs, remodeling, construction, and similiar things, is set for \$65,097. Capital Outlay includes anything permanent, such as text books, also. The total expenditures will

amount of \$1,572,681 for the fiscal year. Revenue from Local and Intermediate Sources, Transfers and Non-Revenue Receipts will come to \$235,634. State Programs will bring in an additional \$1,310,702 and Federal Programs will

bring in \$47,001. This makes a total revenue of \$1,593,337. In addition there is \$249,822 in Bonds and CD's which when added to the year's revenues brings the total to \$1,843,159. Some of those bonds and CD's are obligated. This leaves a surplus of

\$270,478. A surplus is necessary in case of emergency or large unforeseen expenditures. The entire budget, broken down into categories, is available to the public upon request.

Eligibility Changes For Free Or Reduced Meals

Recently enacted Federal legislation made some changes in the income scale used at the beginning of the school year to determine students eligible for free and reduced-price meals. The new law requires that each application be examined and determination made regarding eligibility for free and reduced-price meals, based upon the new income scale. The income guidelines are as follows:

\$13,080, reduced meals; family of four with \$10,990 or less, free meals and \$10,990 to \$15,630, reduced meals; family of five with \$12,780 or less, free meals and \$12,780 to \$18,190, reduced meals; family of six with \$14,570 or less, free meals and \$14,570 to \$20,740, reduced meals; family of seven with \$16,370 or less, free meals and \$16,370 to \$23,290, reduced meals; and a family of eight with \$18,160 or less, free meals and \$18,160 to 25,840, reduced meals. For each additional family member after eight, add \$1,790 for free meals and \$2,550 for reduced meals. These figures are based on yearly incomes.

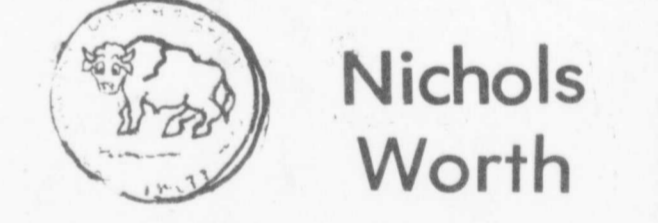

Area Residents Graduate From ETSU

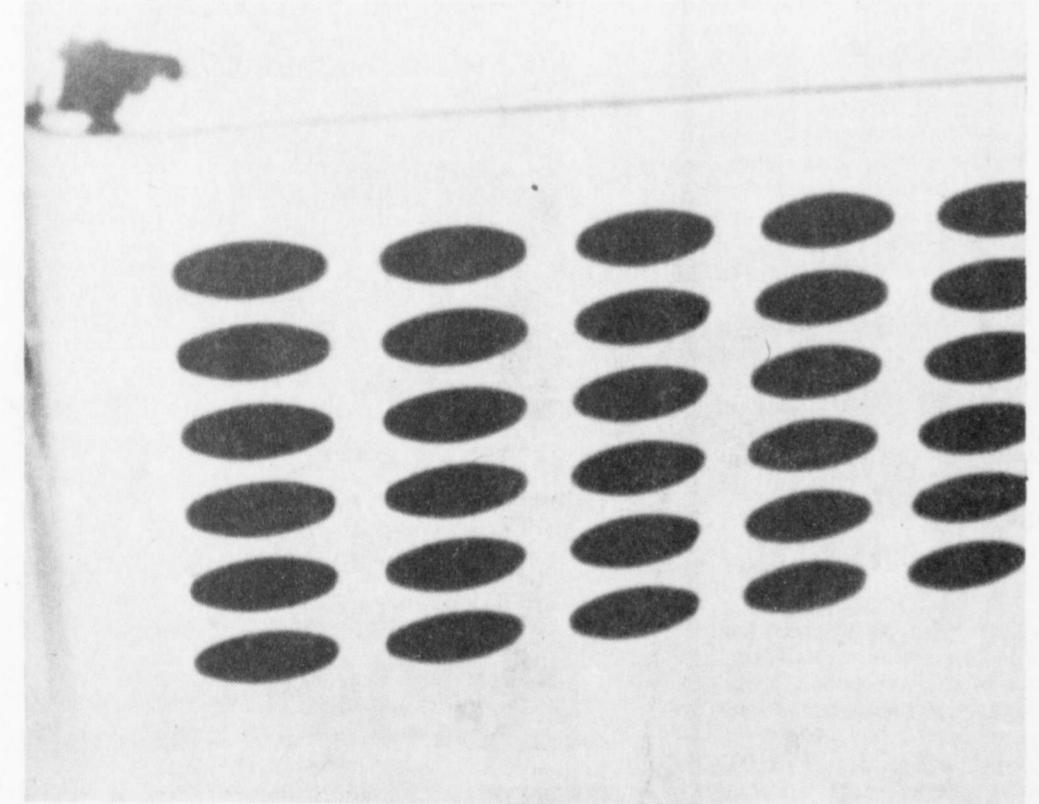
