School Board Approves Band House

At the Prairiland School Board a major decision was made which will result in the creation of a band for Prairiland School. The motion was made, seconded and approved to construct a band house. Formation of a band is scheduled for next

year. They also approved the drawing up of blue prints for three additional class rooms and to have whatever was necessary to improve the appearance and workability of both the Blossom and

Deport campuses. They voted to use Deport Insurance Agency for some of the school's insurance, to use McClahanan and Holmes as their auditors for the 1981-82 fiscal year. They also approved the

acceptance of the Danny McCarty scholarship fund. The board then went into executive session and came out. They accepted Mrs. Helen Craig's resignation and approved the hiring of Mrs. Judi Banks for Title I program teacher at

Blossom. Mrs. Craig had been teaching the Title I program. The Board also approved a supplemental teachers salary of \$300 above base pay and become effective immediately. The hiring of a part-time

janitor for the Deport school campus was approved, as well as an additional hour of time for the high school secretary and for the Deport Elementary School secretary. Meeting was adjourned after approval of bill payments and minutes.

The Prairiland Patriots and many of their fans traveled to Wolfe City last Friday evening. The game, which proved to be an exciting one, got underway at 8:00 p.m. Although the game was thrilling, the Patriots still fell to the Wolves by a closing score of 18-13.

To put the game into action the Wolves received the kick, but on their first play threw a lateral to the left side of the field that turned the ball over to the Patriots.

The Pats immediately put their own plays into action as Bill Frolich and Brad Sessum moved the ball into threatening territory. Sophomore quarterback, Ted Davis, then completed a pass to Ricky Harrel who scored the first touchdown of the evening. The Pats also gained an extra point with the effort of Norman Alexander.

The Pats defense looked sharp when the efforts of David Edwards, Billy Frolich and Tim Henry kept the progress of the Wolves at a crawl. Wolf player Skeeter Fields moved the ball to the 50 yard line only to be brought down by the Pat defensive player Billy Frolich. Brad Sessum intercepted a Wolf pass attempt, yet not before Tony Annett made his tribute when he also boke up a pass attempt intended for Wolf tightend Carl Fink.

The Wolves came in for revenge when they recovered a Pat fumble and on the very next play handed the ball to Jimmy Muecke who ran in from 15 yards to score the Wolves first touchdown. The Wolves failed in their attempt for the extra point which left the Pats ahead by a score of 7-6.

During the Pats next possession, they were forced to punt when quarterback, Norman Alexander was sacked on a 3-10 play.

The Wolves then took advantage of the Pats when Randy Allen received a touchdown pass on a first and go play. The Wolves attempted a conversion on the extra points but was pushed out of bounds by Pat defender, Tony Annett.

As the first quarter came to an end, the game was moving slowly as both teams were determined to show the other who was boss.

The second quarter was much of the same. Possession went to one team and then back to the other. The two teams were still battling it out, each showing strong in defense, as they kept the other from scoring. As the half came to an end, the score was 12-7.

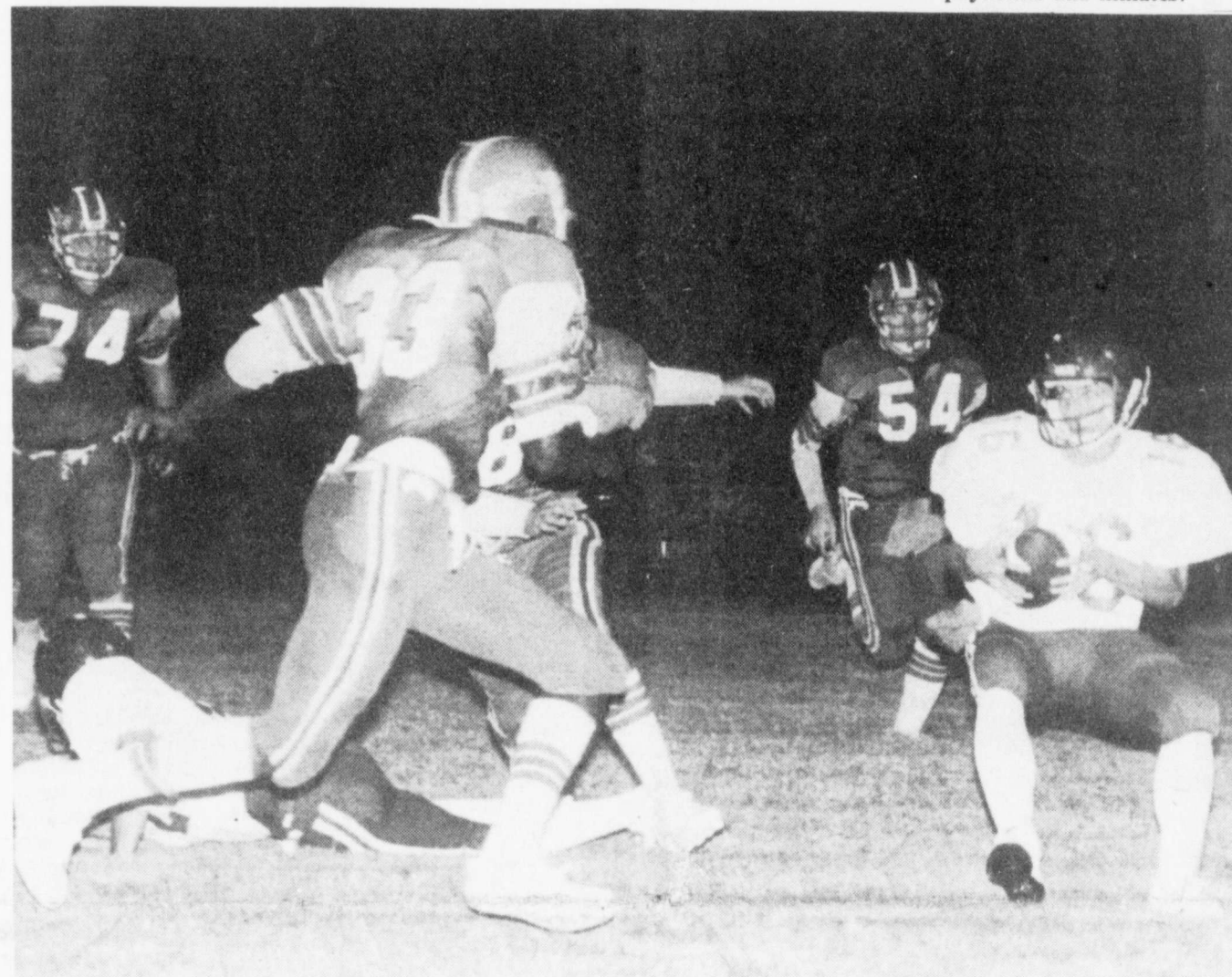
Shady Grove To Hold Revival

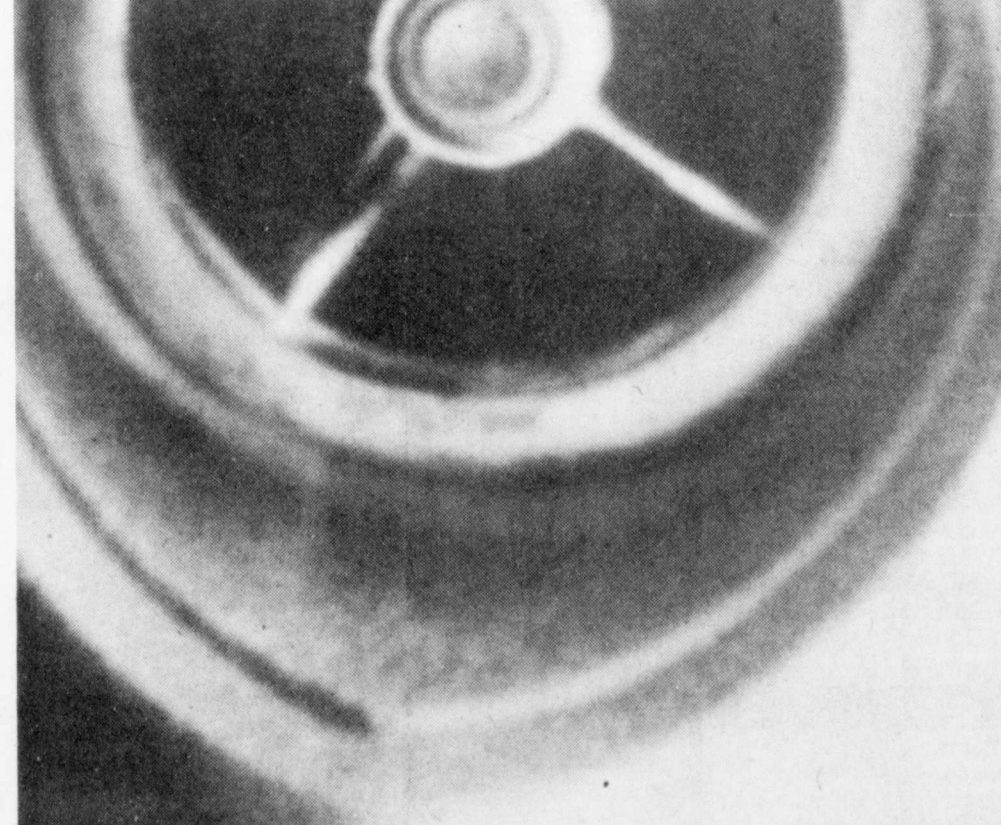


Nichols Worth

Reservations for the courses should be made by paying the fee in the PJC continuing education office,

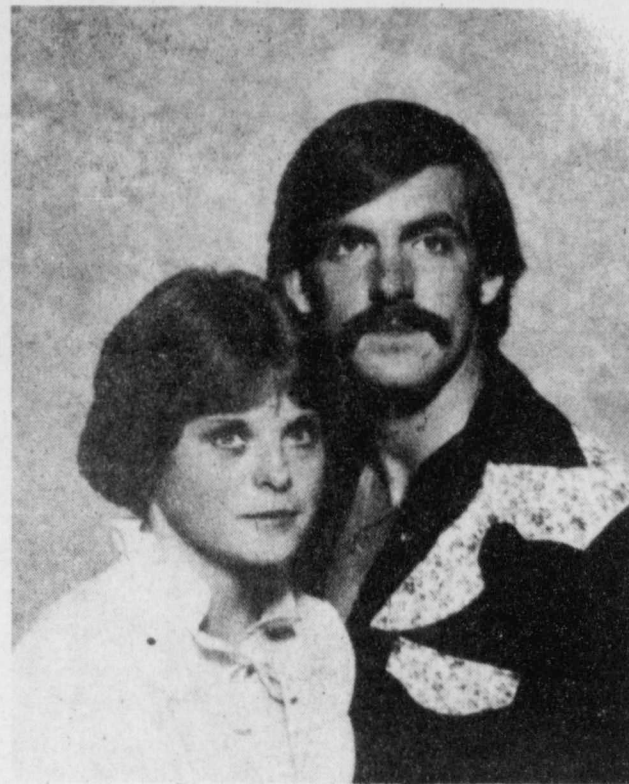

"Cole will work under the guidance of Lamar County Extension Agents Paul

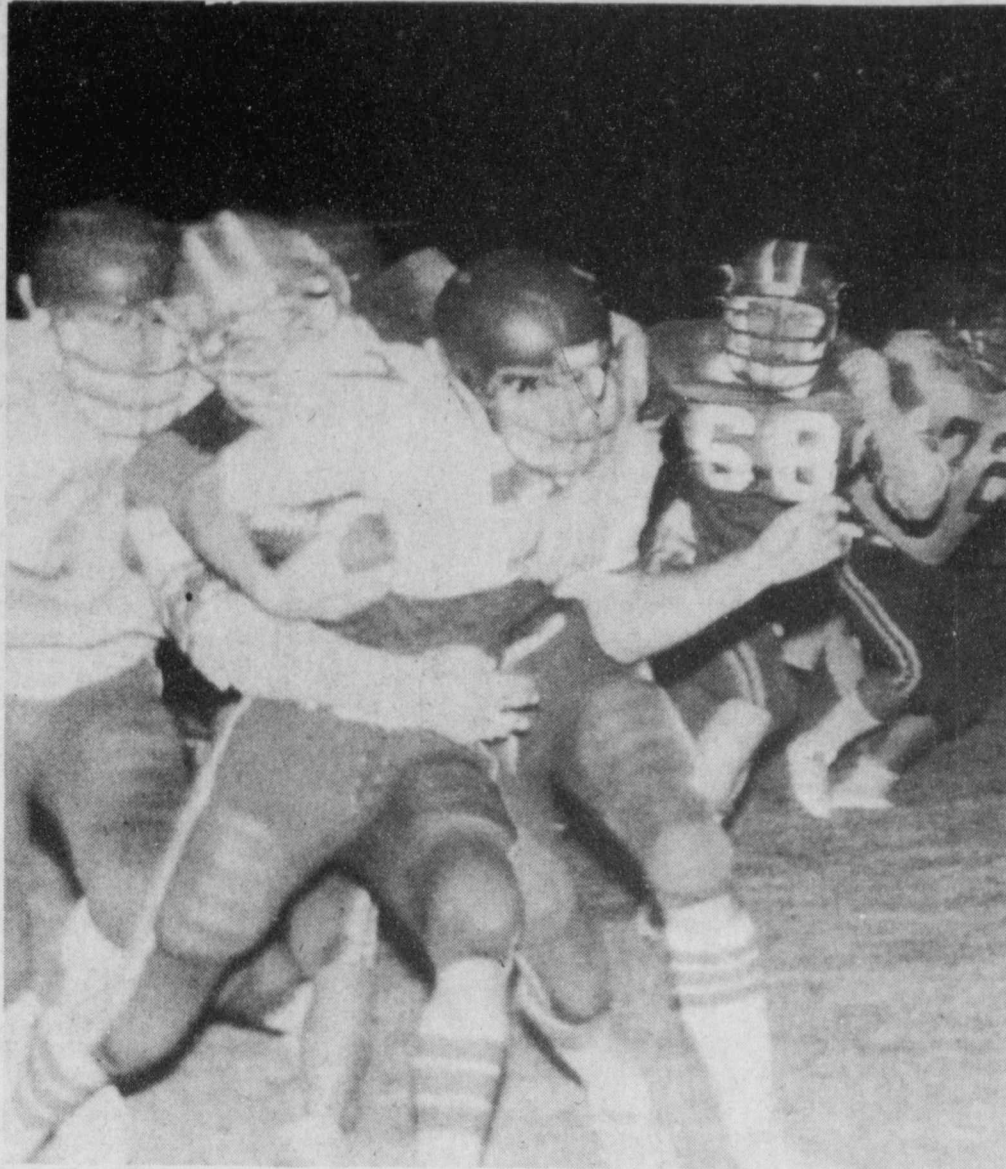

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS
SPECIAL ELECTION
NOVEMBER 3, 1981

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT
Senate Joint Resolution 8 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the legislature to authorize cities, towns and other taxing units to grant exemptions from ad valorem taxes on an unproductive, underdeveloped or blighted area in order to encourage its development. The amendment would also allow the legislature to authorize a city or town to issue bonds or notes to finance this development and to pledge future increases in ad valorem tax revenues from the property in such areas to repay these bonds or notes.
The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to authorize cities, towns, and other taxing units to encourage the improvement, development, or redevelopment of certain areas through property tax relief and the issuance of bonds and notes."

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT
House Joint Resolution 117 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize a person to receive a patent to land from the Commissioner of the General Land Office under certain conditions. Application for the patent must be made within five years from approval of the amendment. The land must be surveyed, public free school land not previously patented. The person must have a properly recorded deed to the land, which he acquired without knowledge of the patent defect and which title he and his predecessors in interest have held for at least 50 years. The person and his predecessors in interest must have continuously claimed the land and paid the taxes for at least 50 years.
This amendment does not apply to beach land, submerged land, or islands. An applicant may not use this provision to

resolve a boundary dispute. This amendment will not apply to land which has been determined to be state-owned by a court of competent jurisdiction or that has a productive state mineral lease on the effective date of the amendment.
The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the commissioner of the General Land Office to issue patents for certain public free school fund land held in good faith under color of title for at least 50 years as of November 15, 1981."

PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT
House Joint Resolution 38 proposes a constitutional amendment that would enable the legislature to grant to a state finance management committee the authority to manage state funds. Funds constitutionally dedicated to specific purposes would not be subject to committee management. The committee would be composed of the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Speaker of the House of Representatives, Chairman of the Senate Finance Committee, Chairman of the House Appropriations Committee, Chairman of the Senate State Affairs Committee, and the Chairman of the House of Representatives Ways and Means Committee.
The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to allow the legislature to grant to a state finance management committee the power to manage the expenditure of certain appropriated funds."

PROPOSITION NO. 4 ON THE BALLOT
House Joint Resolution 6 proposes a constitutional amendment that would provide that one-half of the surplus tax revenues

above the spending limit provided by Article VIII, Section 22, of the Texas Constitution would be placed in a Water Assistance Fund to be used as provided by law, including projects for water development and conservation, water quality enhancement, and flood control purposes or any combination of these purposes.
The amendment also provides \$500,000,000 of the general credit of the state to guarantee bonds issued in commercial markets by local political subdivisions, including cities, counties, and special districts. The amendment allows amounts to be established to decrease or retire state debt, which is defined as that debt secured by the full faith and credit of the state. The amendment would raise the interest that could be paid on authorized, but unissued, bonds guaranteed by the full faith and credit of the state from 6% to 12%.
The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the use of a portion of the excess revenues of the state for water development, water conservation, water quality enhancement, and flood control purposes; authorizing the use of the state's credit, not to exceed five hundred million dollars, to guarantee the bonds of cities, counties, towns, and other units of local government in the financing of projects for such purposes; increasing the interest rate that may be paid on previously approved, but unissued, state bonds; and authorizing a program to retire state bonds."

PROPOSITION NO. 5 ON THE BALLOT
House Joint Resolution 49 proposes a constitutional amendment that would exempt livestock and poultry from taxation. Currently, farm products in the hands of the producer and family supplies for home and farm use are exempt.
The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to provide for the inclusion of livestock and poultry with farm products as exempt from taxation."

PROPOSITION NO. 6 ON THE BALLOT
House Joint Resolution 81 authorizes the governing body of a county, city, school district or other political subdivisions to exempt from taxation a portion of the market value of a residence homestead. The portion exempted may be as much as 40% for 1982-1984; 30% for 1985-1987; and 20% for 1988 and after. The amount of an exemption may not be less than \$5,000 unless the legislature by general law prescribes other monetary restrictions on the amount of the exemption. An eligible adult is allowed to receive other applicable exemptions provided by law. An exception is made where ad valorem tax has previously been pledged for the payment of debt.
The amendment further directs the legislature to require that notice be given to property owners of a reasonable estimate of tax on their property in certain situations.
The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing a political subdivision to provide property tax relief for owners of residence homesteads and changing certain property tax administrative procedures."

PROPOSITION NO. 7 ON THE BALLOT
House Joint Resolution 4 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the Veterans' Land Board to issue and sell an additional \$250,000,000 in bonds increasing the Veterans' Land Fund's total bond issuance authorization from \$700,000,000 to \$950,000,000. The amendment would increase the maximum interest payable by the state on these bonds from 6% to 10%, and permit an even higher rate, if specified by the legislature.
The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the issuance of additional bonds to finance the veterans' land program and to increase the maximum interest rate allowable on veterans' land fund bonds."

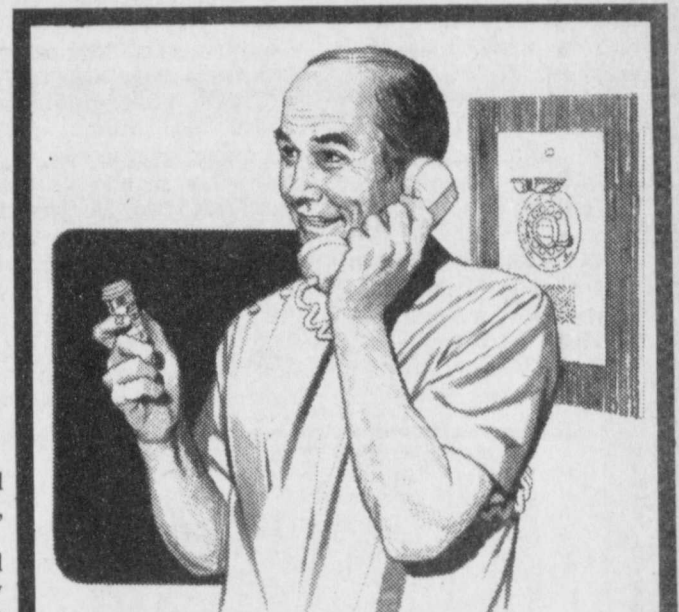

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Indian Artifacts Being Collected For Exhibit

Indian artifacts made and used by the early Indian settlers of Northeast Texas are being collected for the next interpretative exhibit at the R.F. Voyer Regional Museum in Honey Grove, according to Mary Lou Williams, Paris Junior College's coordinator for historical collections.

Area residents who have such artifacts and are willing to place them on loan for the exhibit are asked to call Paris Junior College, 785-7661, extension 164, or Bettie Jackson at the Honey Grove Center of PJC, 378-7171. The museum, which is operated by PJC and the David Graham Hall Turst, features exhibits from a regional area including

Lamar, Red River, and Delta and Fannin Counties, Mrs. Williams explained.

"Functional tools and ceramics made by the early native Americans reveal the culture of the Caddoan people and their predecessors who lived in the Red River Valley hundreds and thousands of years ago. The lakes, creeks and rivers of Northeast Texas and Southeast Oklahoma have provided rich sources for archeological research; through identification and documentation of findings, we have increased our understanding of the Indian way of life," the museum coordinator said.

The Indian exhibit, which will open sometime in October, follows an exhibit on toys which closed in August. Opening dates for the next exhibit will be announced later, Mrs. Williams said. "By sharing collections and findings, area residents can add more information about the various tribes of this area," she added.

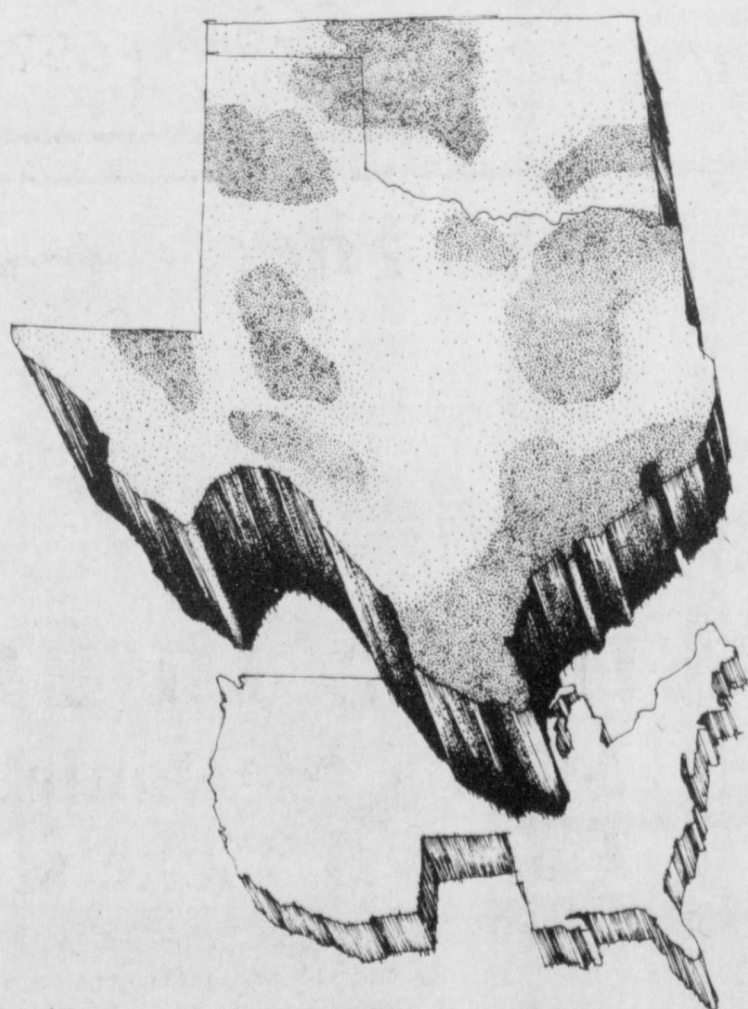
High School Athletics - Help or Hindrance?

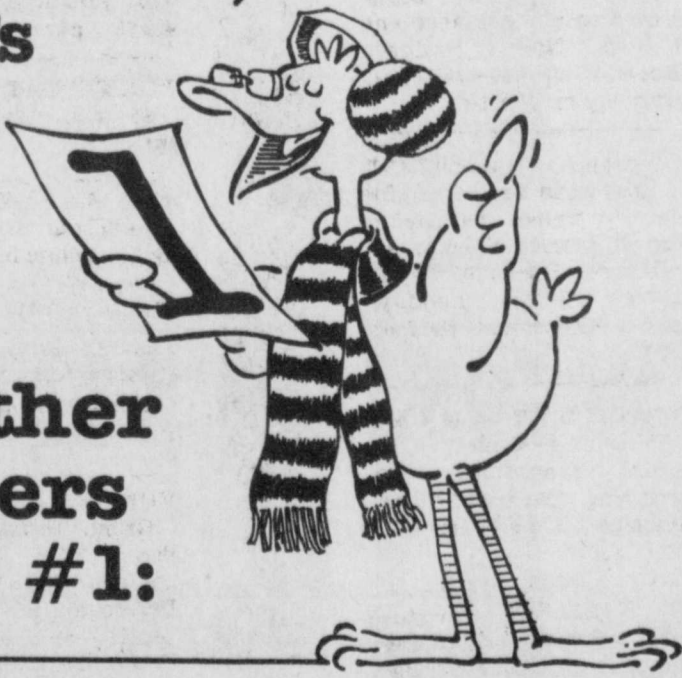

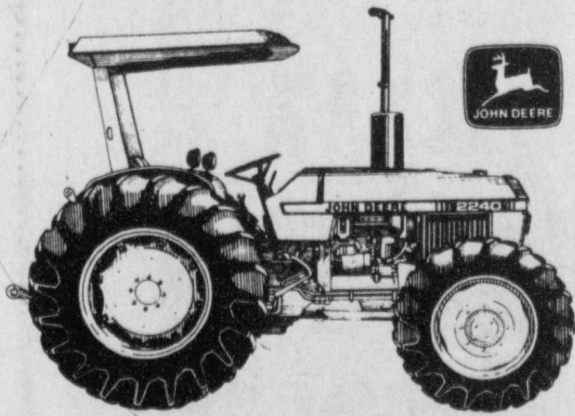

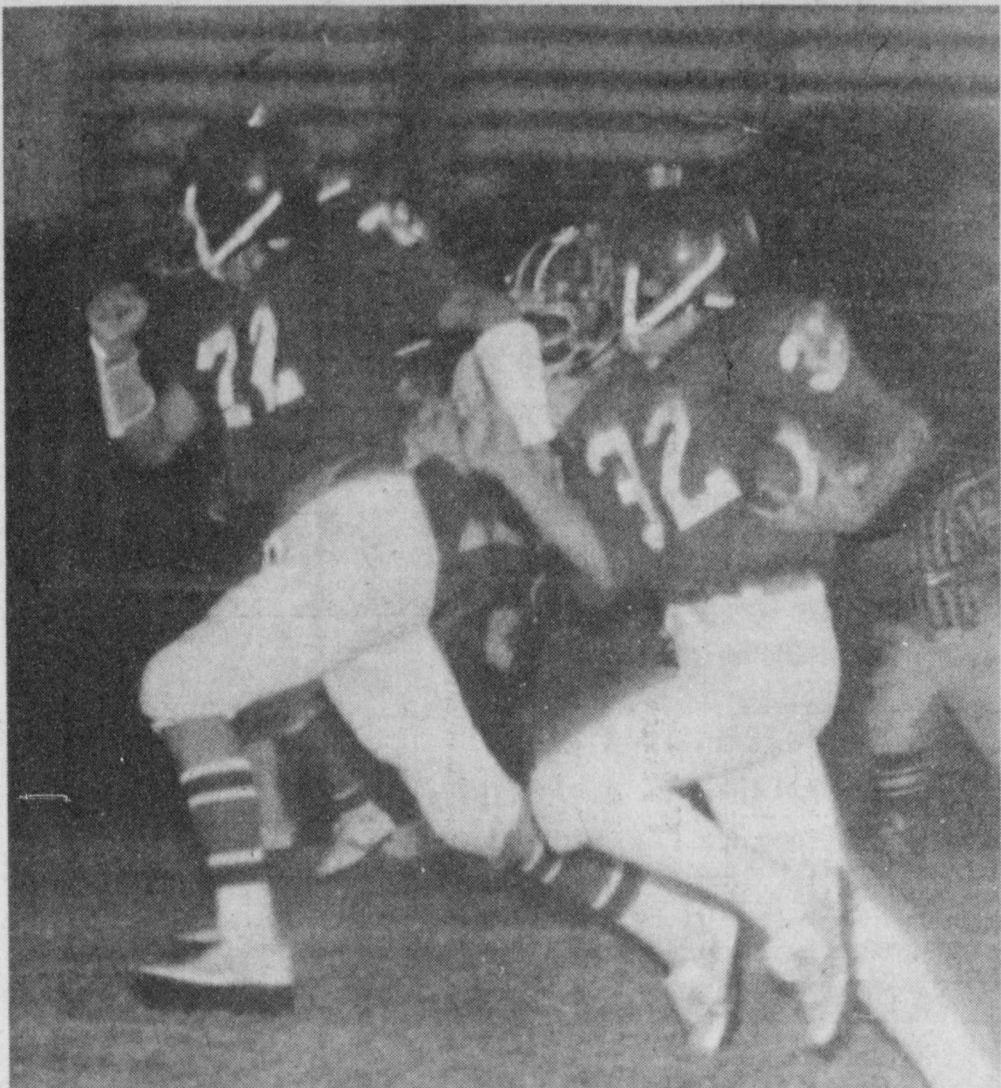
