HOUSTON POST PAYS FERGUSON LIBEL SUIT

Temple. Texas, April 23.—The case of James E. Ferguson, former Governor of Texas, against the Houston Printing Company, publishers of the Houston Post, which have been pending in the Bell County District Court, have been settled out of court on compromise payment of \$8,000. The cases grew out of articles published during the campaign two years ago in which it is alleged the loyalty of the former Governor was mougned. Austin, Texas, April 22,-While the exact date for the convening of the special session of the Thirty-sixth Leg- last week, islature by the Governor has not as yet been indicated, it is the general impression here that it will be Tuesday. May 25th. The Governor has merely said the lawmakers would be called the "latter part of May"

There are several vacancies in the Legislature to be filled, and special elections have been called in the counties where these vacancies exist, for May 15, so there will be no session before that time.

Governor Hobby is on a campaign tour of the State in the interest of his candidacy for delegate-at-large to the National Democratic Convention, and is not expected to return to Austin until May 1, when the precinct conventions are held to select delegates to the county convention.

No intimation has been given by the Governor as to whether the special session will be confined to the consideration of the pink boll worm problem, or whether other matters will be submitted for consideration. In the event other matters are submitted, it will mean a thirty-day session.

"Brownwood, Texas, April 16.-Buscarloads of eggs will be shipped from Brownwood this season. There are 500 cases in a car and thirty dozen eggs to a case, making about 9,000,000 eggs to the car.

"Local prices have been about 30 cents per dozen, which indicates that not less than \$225,000 will be paid out for eggs. It is believed that at least \$500,000 worth of eggs will be produced in Brown County.





Cheese Balls

1 1-2 cups grated cheese, 1 tablespoon of flour, 1-4 teaspoon of sait, dash of cayenne pepper, whites of 3 beaten eggs. Make into balls size of a large marble, roll in shredded wheat and fry in deep




