
#### **Travis Gray** Dies In California



11/2 lbs. round steak

1 tsp. salt

1/8 tsp. pepper 1 onion, sliced

4 tsp. garlic salt1 tbs. Worcestershire

sauce 11/2 cups beef bouillon

tbs. ketchup 2 tbs. dry white wine

1/4 lb. fresh mushrooms, sliced

1/3 cup flour 1 cup yogurt

Cut steak into 1/4-inch strips. Coat with salt and pepper. Drop into bottom of slowcooking pot with onion. Mix garlic salt, Worcestershire sauce, bouillon and ketchup. Pour over meat. Cover and cook on low for 6 to 8 hours or until tender.






