Sewer Woes 'Pile-Up' For Blossom

Blossom city officials have called a special meeting of the city council for 7:30 p.m. tonight (Thursday) to discuss what the city can do to correct its sewer plant problems and avoid further legal action by the state.

Attorney Bill Flanary says anticipated federal funds for such projects are no longer available and the Texas Department of Water Resources refuses to approve Blossom's "facility plan".

Blossom is under orders of a 1980 court judgment, sought by the state, to have a new sewer plant constructed by the end of this year.

Flanary, who met with state officials in Austin, says the Department of Water Resources has rejected Blossom's facility plan for the new sewer plant and that the state is not willing at this time, to agree to any modification of the compliance schedule set out by District Judge Henry Braswell.

The facility plan is an engineering document designed to show how the (See SEWER, Page 8)

School Bond Election Set For Sept. 11th

A bond issue election for \$750,000 will go before the voters of Prairiland School District on Sept. 11. The Prairiland School Board made the decision at its regular meeting Monday night.

The bond issue, if passed, would result in a junior high for seventh and eighth grade students at Pattonville's Prairiland campus, and the renovation of the Blossom and Deport school facilities.

An estimated 25-cent tax increase would be needed to finance the bond issue, raising the tax levy from its present level of 53 cents per \$100 valuation to 78 cents per \$100 valuation.

Assistant Superintendent Richard Nash pointed out that voters must be registered to vote 30 days prior to the Sept. 11 date, and urges them to do so. Registration is done through the Lamar County Tax Assessor-Collector's Office, and can be done through the mail. Voter registration cards can be obtained at a number of locations, including the courthouse in Paris.

If the bond issue passes four new class rooms would be added to the band hall and class rooms already under construction at Prairiland, and a junior high gym and cafeteria-kitchen facility would also be constructed.

The Blossom campus would have

the two-story red brick building's lower floor completely remodeled, with air conditioning, lowered ceilings, floor covering and new wiring and other structural improvements.

The Deport two-story building would receive a complete remodeling and air conditioning. A cafeteria would probably be constructed in the building, school officials say.

The main building, known as the old high school building, would be air conditioned, rewired, and have metal windows and other needed repairs.

Funds which are already available, probably \$10,000-\$15,000 worth, would also be used to help bring the schools up to standard.

In other business at the Monday session, the board agreed that the bookkeeping, which has been handled through the Region VIII computer, would be switched back to a manual system at the school.

Bills were approved, as was the bus warrant for the new bus recently purchased. Keystone Life Insurance Co. was selected to provide school activity and football insurance, and the Title I budget was okayed.

The purchase of all electric typewriters for the typing class was discussed and finally approved.

The board closed the session with the next meeting set for 7:30 p.m. on Aug. 9.



Pattonville Youth Is Killed When Truck Strikes Tree

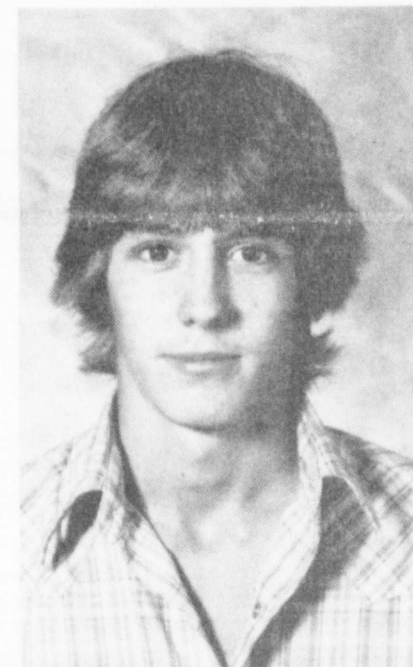
A 17-year-old Pattonville youth, Charles Todd Harvey, was fatally injured early Sunday when his pick-up truck smashed into a tree and burned, at the Pattonville roadside park along U.S. Highway 271.

Young Harvey was driving alone at the time of the accident, reported at 1:45 a.m. Sunday. He was pronounced dead at the scene by Justice of the Peace Fred Nutt.

The youth, son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Harvey of Pattonville, would have been a senior at Prairiland High School this fall and was a member of the Prairiland Future Farmers of America.

According to investigating Department of Public Safety troopers, young Harvey was traveling southeast on Highway 271 in his 1979 Chevrolet pick-up truck when he apparently fell asleep at the wheel.

The vehicle ran off the north side of the highway and smashed into some small posts before striking a tree.

The front half of the pick-up truck burned immediately after the impact with the tree, the DPS officers say.

Fire departments from Deport and Pattonville, along with a rescue unit from Paris, were called to the accident scene.

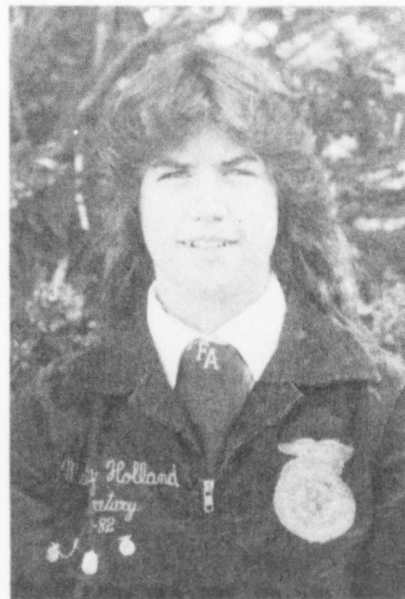

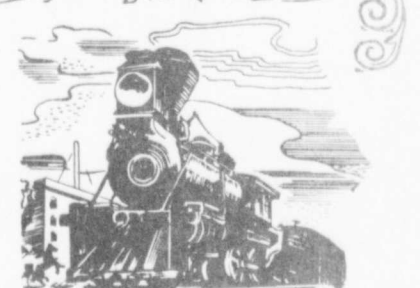
Three games are billed for Thursday night, another three on Friday night, then Saturday could develop

The Tale Of The



How Deport And Blossom Gambled On A Railroad...And Lost

Note from Nanalee:

I've discovered a series written by A.W. Neville on the O-R-T railroad, which ran from Deport to Blossom, and was started in 1908. I was fascinated by the tale of the railroad, which was later replaced by the Paris-Mt. Pleasant track, and hope other people find these articles as informative as I. There is no date on the articles, but they are obviously very old.

This enterprise, according to P.B. Bailey, brought "nothing of value into the area, but brought wild hopes that were soon dispelled by bitter disappointment."

As it took its departure like a midnight phantom it carried away several thousand dollars of Blossom and Deport people's money, without

leaving behind value received.

No one could blame the Deport and Blossom citizens for this unprofitable venture. The fact was that the communities were in a predicament, with seemingly no hole through which to escape.

Deport then was, and yet is, surrounded by acres of rich farming land that was yielding greater and greater crops of corn, cotton and other products each year. With the bulk of these crops to be taken to a shipping point there, was a problem difficult to solve. The shipping points were: Blossom, Detroit and Paris, the nearest of which was ten miles away.

At that time there were few graded roads and no hard-surfaced roads in that section. These roads could be relied on only during dry weather.

On many occasions when I lived on the Pattonville and Blossom road, one of the blackest, muddiest roads in the State, I have seen men riding one horse and leading another loaded with groceries as they were unable to get to town with a wagon.

Many wagons had to be left stuck in the mud until it dried up.

The people of Deport also had no sufficient means of getting merchandise from a shipping point into Deport, and at that time the little town was about to bloom and was growing by leaps and bounds.

The population was increasing daily, new dwellings were being built and brick buildings were going up on

both sides of Main street.

With new and greater enterprises being started the merchants business was increasing, and there was demand for others and wagons and teams could not keep up with business needs.

Therefore, we have laid the groundwork for WHY the people in Deport and Blossom wanted a railroad, and in further articles will explain the details and ending to the story.

GENEALOGY BEGINS WITH U

Chamber of Commerce Is Good Source For Leads

Few people think of the Chamber of Commerce as a vast depository of genealogical records. This may surprise many when we call the Chamber of Commerce our fifth principle of genealogical research.

The information you can obtain from the Chamber of Commerce is very good for developing leads and tracking down further information. When you write to the Chamber of Commerce ask for information on schools, housing districts, churches, a map of the area and a telephone book if possible.

Locate all of the schools, colleges and universities. If you know which schools your relatives went to, write them and ask for any information about your relatives they may have.

Once you have obtained a map, locate where your relatives lived. Here, you may have to refer to the courthouse records (wills or deeds).

After you have established

where they lived you need to ask the following questions. Did your relatives live in a rural or urban area? If they were rural, you may want to draw a four mile radius circle around their house.

Most all of their daily business (including going to church) would transpire inside of this circle.

If you know what religious preference they were, then write for information about this at the church of this persuasion nearest to them. Invariably churches traditionally have kept

records much longer than any political entity in this country. Using what we have just learned, always start with the nearest church first.

After obtaining a telephone book, look up all the surnames of your relatives which lived in that area. If you find any people living there today with the same surname contact them for additional family information.

Remember to file all information in your folders. Next week we will discuss further on what type of information you may obtain from our sixth principle church records.

"All the uncles and aunts are dead now. But before they died, they said nothing about Grandpa; they said Grandpa never talked about his early life or George. George has a son named Homer Ary and he lives in Howe, Okla. I've been to see him and we talked, but he said he never heard Grandpa talk about his childhood or about brothers and sisters.

"My father, Earl Ary, and

my uncles and aunts, were born in and around Wilburton, Okla. I've been there to the county courthouse, but no records. Have both my grandmother and grandmother death certificates. His birthplace one is listed as Illinois and the death certificate as Tennessee. The information was given by my grandmother's sister.

"There are several other "Ary's" that I've been in contact with, but no relation as far as we know. I've been told that there are more Ary's in Stigler, Okla. Several weeks ago I wrote to the Stigler newspaper requesting information and charges for running an ad in their paper, but have not heard from them.

"I'm searching for any brothers or sisters or other relatives of Lee Ary, born Jun 17, 1860 in either Illinois of Tennessee."

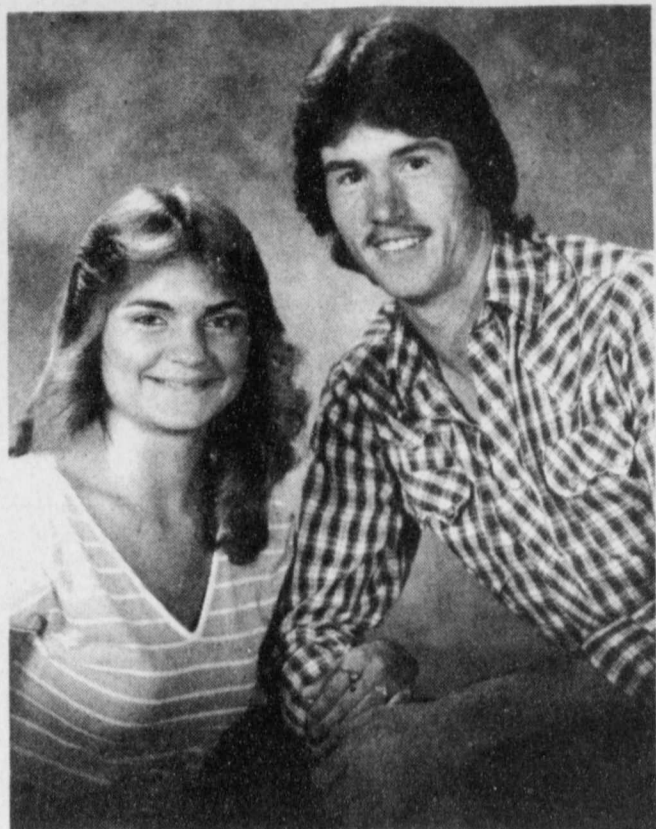

The big 2-year experiment by the UIL, which will admit the No. 2 team in each sports district in each classification into the state title playoffs--doubling the number of teams going into bi-district, starts with the 1982-83 Texas school year.

Actually what the expanded playoffs mean, in football, is no more open weeks during the regular season for most schools and the addition of one more week to the playoff season.

For teams in conferences Five-A, Three-A and Two-A, the playoff season will be six weeks, starting with the usual bi-district, then comes a new round, "area", followed by regional, quarterfinals, semifinals and finals. There will be one less playoff week for Four-A and One-A schools.

It is somewhat startling to realize that the two teams playing for the state championship in each the Five-A, Three-A and Two-A conferences, will have played a 16-game high school football season! That's the same number of regular season games that the pros play and four or five more than a college team that even goes to a bowl game will play.

Tack on the two pre-season "Scrimmage" tests, and that makes for 18 straight weeks of football for high school boys on teams that make it to the state finals.

There are some who will claim that is just too much for teen-age high schoolers.

Under the new UIL realignment which will

remain in effect for the next two school years, membership in District 13-AAA remains the same as last season: Prairiland, Clarksville, Mt. Vernon, Pittsburg, North Lamar and Winnsboro.

Pittsburg, as predicted by the Harris Rating System, won district last year; although Texas Football Magazine had picked North Lamar not only to win district but tabbed the Panthers as the No. 2 team in the state--before the season started; and Texas Sports Magazine had guessed Clarksville would win.

This year, the 13-AAA champ goes into bi-district against the runner-up in 14-AAA, while the 13-AAA runner-up will meet the 14-AAA winner in Bi-district. District 14 has a new member this year in Daingerfield, which has been demoted from Four-A to Three-A and the Blue Tigers will replace Jefferson which was shifted to another district.

The remainder of District 14 will be the same as last year: Paul Pewitt (the defending champ), DeKalb, Hooks, Hughes Springs, Linden-Kildare, New Boston and Queen City.

Rivercrest will operate in the new District 18-AA this season, along with five fellow members of the old 20-AA, plus two new additions. Holdovers from the old district with the Rebels are Ore City, Maud, Redwater, New Diana and Bowie. Joining the group are Comopickton, promoted from the

One-A ranks; and Big Sandy, which has been moved from the old 19-AA that included Hawkins.

This year, the 17-AA champ will play the 18-AA runner-up and the 17 runner-up will meet the 18 champ in the bi-district round.

The District 17 members this year are Cooper, Quitman (Down from the Triple-A ranks), Grand Saline, Rains, Wolfe City, Edgewood, Honey Grove and

Leonard. Cooper is the returning king.

Another area district of much local interest and one that has undergone substantial changes under the UIL shuffle is District 7-A. The family members in this loop are Paris, Mt. Pleasant, Atlanta, Hallsville, Sulphur Springs and Liberty-Eylau.

COMING DATES: The

start of high school football activity is just around the corner. Here are some official UIL dates:

Aug. 4 (three weeks from yesterday)-first day to issue shoes and socks.

Aug. 9 (three weeks from next Monday)-first day for conditioning drills, although contact activities are not legal until Aug. 13.

Aug. 19 (five weeks from today)-first day for interschool scrimmages.

Sept. 2 (seven weeks from today)-first day for official games, although most schools won't fire-up until Sept. 3.

VOLLEYBALL, TOO: There also are some official UIL start-up dates for the volleyball playing girls.

Aug. 9 is the first day that volleyball workouts can start. First volleyball scrimmages or games can be played on Aug. 16.

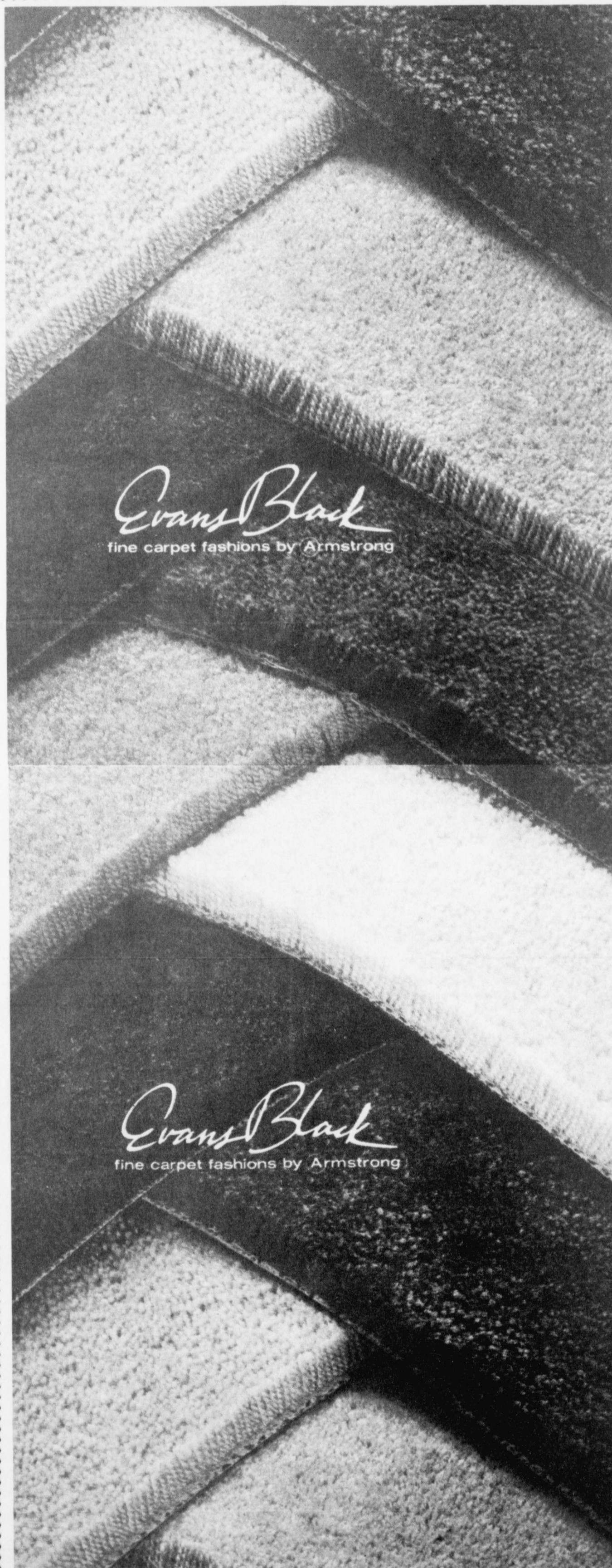

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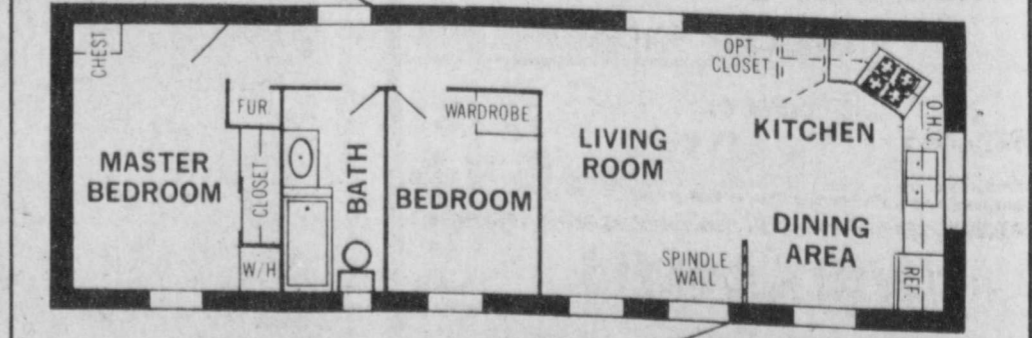

Magazine Favors Clarksville For Title

Dave Campbell's 23rd annual Texas Football Magazine with its previews on the 1982 high school football season has hit the newsstands and if the magazine's pre-season forecasts prove correct, Clarksville will win the District 13-3A championship.

As to the Prairiland Patriots, Texas Football predicts that with 17 returning starters, the Pats won't go winless this season.

Prairiland will be seeking an upward turn this season after last year's winless drought followed two straight years of 1-9 campaigns.

The Texas Football Magazine labels Clarksville as the team to end Pittsburg's reign which produced back-to-back titles. However, it adds that Winnsboro and perhaps North Lamar "will be

lurking close behind if the favorites (Clarksville) falter."

Here's what the magazine has to say about Prairiland: "Prairiland won't go winless again—not if 17 returning starters have their way. FB-LB David Edwards (6-0,180, 4.6) is "the best hitter on the squad," says coach Chet James.

"QB Todd Davis is a skilled runner behind the blocks of tackles William Newman (235), Barry Johnston (225) and guard Dennis Bedford (215). TB Ronald Niehow, TE Lowell Ford and SE Darrin Gifford also return offensively.

"The defense features salty LB Nelson Hevron and DEs Jeff Ballard and Chris Spann. TB Craig Gibson also should help."

proposed plant will be built, where it will operate and its sewage capacity. It was reported drafted for Blossom by Dallas engineer Jerry Land.

Flanary says the TDWR has "nine pages of inadequacies against the facility plan."

Blossom has complied with most of the items in the compliance schedule, Flanary was quoted as saying last week, with exception of the facility plan—which was supposed to have been approved by last June 1.

Correction of the plan's deficiencies to receive state approval still would not solve Blossom's problems. Cost estimates for the sewer plant have ranged from \$500,000 to \$750,000. Federal financing of such projects with the Environmental Protection Agency providing grants to cover up to 75 percent of the costs was one of the first programs eliminated by the present administration in Washington.

Alternative financing for the project, if a facility plan can win acceptance, would probably call for the city to either pass a bond issue or borrow the funds through some type of state program.
