How Deport And Blossom

Gambled On A Railroad...And Lost

In previous weeks we have told how Deport and Blossom were talked into a railroad, this week will continue with how actual construction began on

The proposition made by the promotors and their explanation that the short line would soon become part of a larger track convinced the folks from Deport and Blossom that the whole thing was a good idea, and after a brief survey on the route they were to follow a contract was drawn up and work on the project began. A bonus for early completion was stipulated for both the promotors and their road

The laying of the first rail elicited no speeches or ceremony, no one drove a gold rail spike, because builders were in nothing but a hurry!

There seems to be some doubt as to whether the engineer's surveying instrument was working, or whether one was even used, as the rail bed was routed through stands of timber, sometimes just missing a stump on one side of the track, dodging a tree on the other. A make-shift switch was laid, connecting the new road with the Texas and Pacific railroad, about a half a mile east of Blossom.

There the rolling stock and building materials were transferred from the T&P to the new railroad.

carts and three box cars were secured, much used: from somewhere-it has been speculated that they came from a northern railroad junk yard-then with a full crew the work on the track began moving rapidly.

As one crew was placing and spacing the ties another crew lay the rails down and spiked them. Fair weather prevailed and soon there was quite a stretch of track finished.

There was none of the 'railroad track straight as an arrow" business on the O-R-T railroad. The builders simply sought the smoothest ground.

The road had no grade, and wasbuilt across cotton beds, down corn rows and through pastures, heading a ditch here, dodging a house there, or a barn or a pool, meandering across the countryside with it's general direction towards Deport.

As they neared Deport the builders had great hopes of success and the workmen envisioned a large pay

envelope with a bonus for their pay, but soon disappointment arose.

It was discovered that they had run short of building material, and as the contract called for completion of a railroad into the town of Deport the promoters found themselves facing a difficult situation. But, typical of the minds behind this scheme, a solution was worked out.

A crew of laborers were sent back to Blossom, where they took enough of the track there to finish the road into Deport, thereby complying with the "letter" of their contract!

This made it possible for them to collect their bonus promised them for quick completion, and when the road was run into Deport a box car was sidetracked on a couple of rails to

serve as a make-shift station. Mr. Palmer, a pal of the promotor of the railroad, Mr. Moore, was put in

charge of the freight station. More of the tale of the shady O-R-Ttrack and it's zig-zag path through history next week!

Unexpected Rain Is A Million \$ **Treat For Area**

Rains reported in amounts of up to six inches over the area could very well make a million dollar difference to area agriculturists this season.

Heavy thunderstorms and slow gentle rains fell from about 2:30 a.m. Tuesday on through Tuesday afternoon in the Lamar, Red River and Titus county area.

The rainfall relieved fears that the too-abundant spring rains had turned into a drought during the month of July, and brought smiles to the faces of area farmers and gardeners.

The rains, at times were accompanied by high winds and a

Blossom Up 40 Percent In Sales Tax

Blossom has received nearly 40 percent more in its penny city sales tax revenue through the first seven months of 1982 than it did through the same period of last year, while Deport is \$46.96 behind in its revenue for the same period.

The state comptroller's office reports that Blossom has received a check for \$579.51 in sales tax rebate for the period ending July 7. That boosts the Blossom total for the first seven months of the year to \$5,790.95, compared to \$4,138.82 the city had received through the same period a year ago

Deport received no rebate this month, as reimbursements from the comptroller's office are held until the next period when the amount is less

than \$500.

Deport, however, has received \$3,012.79 in sales tax rebates for the year to date and that compares to \$3,059.75 the city had received through the first seven months of last

All other Lamar County towns are running ahead of last year in their sales tax revenues. Roxton is the leader in percentage of increase. Although it did not receive a rebate this month, Roxton has received \$2,798.40 this year and that's a whopping 178.2 percent better than a

Paris remains the county and area leader in total revenue. Paris' check for the July 7 period totaled \$78,279.56, to hike that city's total for the year to \$790,400.05, which is an increase of 31.4 eprcent over the initial seven months of 1981.

In Red River County, all towns except Avery are running ahead of last year. Bogata's July check totaled \$620.64, to give that city a total of \$10,481.52 for the year, or an increase of 11.1 percent.

massive display of lightning, should complete the milo harvest by allowing individual grains on the heads to fill out to firm, weighty capacity.

Cotton, which had not yet begun to suffer, will now hold blooms, squares and bolls.

Thousands of acres of soybeans planted behind wheat harvest will now have a chance to sprout, or if already up, continue development. Early beans, nearing harvest, will fill out for additional quality and weight.

Cattlemen and hay producers were particularly glad for the moisture, since pastures were already beginning to show signs of stress and overgrazing, and hay harvest for the second cutting should yield well.

The impact on insects is somewhat indecisive at present, although the rains should decrease hatching of grasshopper eggs, which are particularly susceptible to fungus during wet weather. Other insects, such as boll worms and boll weavils, may become more of a problem.

The rains were somewhat unexpected, since only scattered thunder storms had been forecast, and no wide, over-all band of rain had been predicted.

The fact that the T-storms formed and produced moisture during the early hours of the morning was a furthur unexpected development, since metorologists say that formation of such clouds are rare during July and August due to the cooling of the earth preventing their formation.

Unpredicted or not, it would be difficult to find anyone who resented the advent of the rains, which should help the area's economy by boosting agricultural yields substantially.

Health Officers Sound Warning **About Tick Bites**

State and area health authorities are urging residents of Lamar, Red River. Titus and surrounding counties to guard against tick bites because of the risk of Rocky Mountain spotted fever.

Dr. James S. Lovick, regional zoonosis veterinarian for Public Health Region 7 based in Tyler, says one case involving a Lamar County resident and two involving Franklin County residents, have been reported

"Most of these are occuring in the northeastern counties of Texas," Dr. Lovick reports.

Rocky Mountain Spotted Fever is a seriuos disease that has a high death rate if not diagnosed and treated early. children are often the victims.

Ed. Note: The Prairiland School District is inaugurating a band program with the coming school year. To assist the student and parent in deciding which instrument may be best suited for the student, Band Director Dave Clark has written a series of articles for The Times to describe some of the instruments and desirable physical features of the student needed to play those instruments. Today's article is the second in the series.

By DAVE CLARK This week we will discuss in-

struments in the Brass Family, which include the cornet, trumpet, French horn, baritone, trombone and bass.

Deport Times

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The brass family's tone is produced by buzzing the lips together into a mouthpiece. Cap braces are usually painful. Wax can be placed over the braces to help retard the discomfort. The larger mouthpieces such as the trombone, baritone and bass don't usually cause as much pain as the smaller mouthpieces on the cornet, trumpet and French horn. Brass players need to be able to

distinguish pitches, that is being able to hear two tones and deciding which is higher or lower.

CORNET & TRUMPET: The prospective cornet and trumpet player needs to have even front teeth and a normal jaw structure. Extreme overbite and underbite will hamper the student's success.

As mentioned above, the cap braces will cause pain as they tend to cut into the inside of the lip. The lips should be of normal thickness. Thin or thick lips usually are not desirable

TROMBONE & BARITONE HORN: The prospective trombone player needs to have even teeth with a normal jaw structure. The lips need to be medium to full. This mouthpiece is larger and is recommended for cap braces as being less painful to the student. The arms for the trombone player should be long enough to reach the slide in its extended position. The baritone player should be large enough to cradle the instrument in his arms without being fatigued.

BASS, TUBA & SOUSAPHONE: The prospective bass player should have a normal jaw structure and medium to full lips. The instrument is large and cannot be carried home for practice everyday. Cap braces don't usually hinder progress

FRENCH HORN: The French horn is a very expensive instrument and is delicate to handle. Only the most serious-minded and intellectual students begin on French horn.

Usually, the student will begin on cornet and switch over at a later date.

Next week we will discuss the Percussion Family. As we said in the first article, we will have a night meeting for parents and students after school starts and I will again describe and play each instruments. At that time I will also talk with each parent and examine the student's lips, fingers and teeth and recommend an



> In regard to the proposed Cooper Lake project, Hall reminded his colleagues that the Water Resources Subcommittee had first authorized it in 1955, but that environmental litigation had delayed construction since 1971

> Hall pointed out in his testimony that in recent weeks over 30,000 acres of prime farm land has been flooded with a loss in the millions of dollars along the Sulphur River. Adding that, according to the former Fort Worth Corps District Engineer, over 80 percent of the flood damage could have been avoided if Cooper Lake Dam had been inplace.

Hall told subcommittee he was hopeful the Federal District Court vironmental injunction against Cooper would soon be lifted.

"The Corps has requested \$1.5 million for construction and real estate for Cooper this year, and this amount would be sufficient for the time being and once, hopefully, the court injunction is lifted, we can ask for additional money," Hall

Another project that Hall asked the subcommittee to fund is Big Pine Dam, a multi-purpose lake in Red River County authorized by Congress in 1962.

"Severe economic problems have left Big Pine without a sponsor, but about \$1.7 million has already been spent, and it would be a shame to see the project dropped after years of time, effort and money," Rep. Hall

Other projects receiving a boost from Hall included navigation of the Red River above Shreveport, Trinity River improvements, Arkansas-Red River Basins chloride control, Red River emergency bank protection, and the newly proposed Lake Ray Roberts.

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




