Reduced breakfasts for students will be 30 cents.

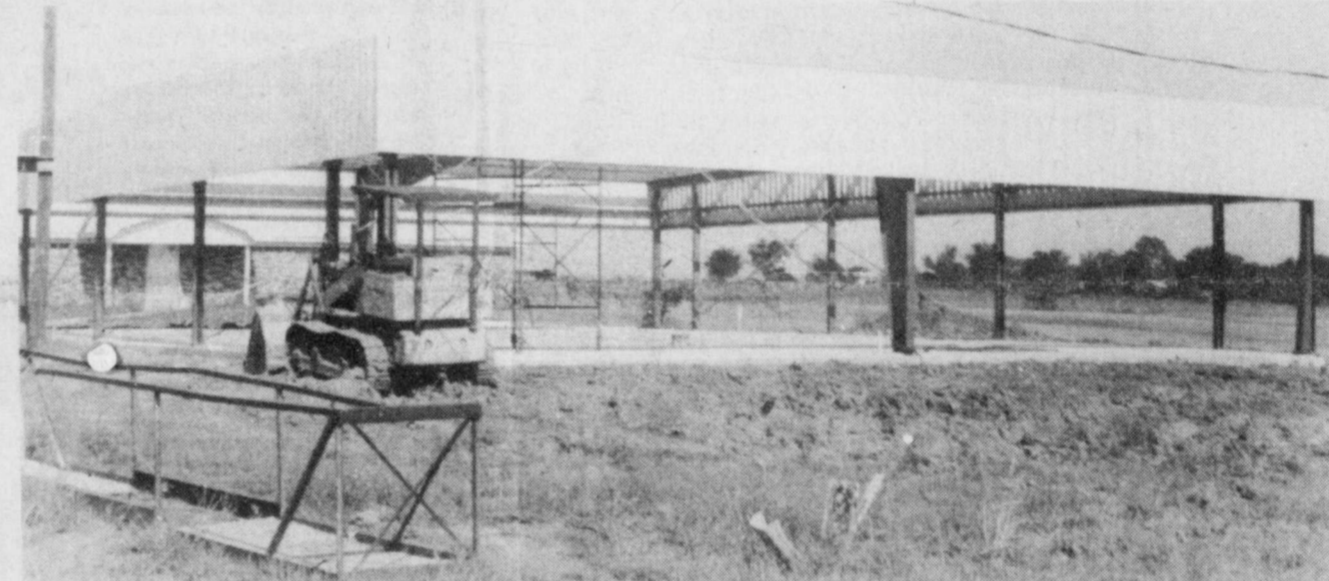
Regular lunches for students will be 75 cents.

Tips For Band

Ed. Note: The Prairiland School District is inaugurating a band program with the coming school year. To assist the student and parent in deciding which instrument may be best suited for the student, Band Director Dave Clark has written a series of articles for The Times to describe some of the instruments and desirable physical features of the student needed to play those instruments.

The popular trend today in percussion is to learn all the percussion instruments as you progress, especially the snare drum and the xylophone.

The techniques learned on these two instruments will allow the student to be able to perform on chimes, tympani, marimba and vibraphone, as well as the bass drum, cymbals, trap drum and all of the smaller ac-

cessory instruments. The percussion students think of the drum as an instrument and not as a toy to be banged on.

The percussion family is very difficult to learn properly and requires a serious student.

Perhaps the descriptions we have mentioned over the past three weeks will help the parent and child decide which instrument is best suited to the particular individual.

As we have stated we will have a night meeting after school begins and I will again describe and play each instrument. After that, we will then talk with each parent and examine the student's lips, fingers and teeth and recommend an instrument for the child.

We are looking forward to meeting all the band students and their parents and working toward an outstanding band program for our school.

Pats Gear-up For '82

The Prairiland Patriots football teams, from 7th and 8th graders up to the varsity will be issued their shorts, socks and equipment today (Thursday) in preparation for the 1982 football year.

Head Coach Chet James says "we have more participation than we have ever had before, and that should help the program".

Some 92 youngsters, from freshmen through the varsity, have signed up for the program this season.

James says that "We're still building a team, and had a real good summer program. We're looking forward to the year. We have a whole new look, and all new uniforms and helmets, and excitement is high".

James also expressed his ap-

preciation for the loyalty and patience both of the Prairiland school and the fans.

The new uniforms will be a deep red, and white, and will provide the team with a distinctive look.

Practice will begin in shorts and T-shirts Monday, and workouts in pads and equipment on Aug. 13.

The first scrimmage game will be at Valliant, Okla., Aug. 20, and the next scrimmage will be at Hooks on Aug. 27.

Due to the change in the UIL playoff system this year, that will send both the district champion and runner-up into the expanded playoffs, the regular season will be 10 consecutive weeks with no "open" dates.

The Patriots, who will open the

season Sept. 3 at Rivercrest, will play only three homes all season. One of the road trips will be to Oklahoma City where the Patriots will play Northeast Oklahoma, a 5A school that will come to Prairiland next year.

The Tale Of The O-R-T

How Deport And Blossom Gambled On A Railroad...And Lost

The O-R-T railroad, whose torturous path we have been following over the past few weeks, was apparently a fearsome sight.

P.B. Bailey, whose information was used for these articles, stated that "While standing near this railroad between Hovertown and the Garner home place one dark night with only the stars to light the way, and holding my horse to keep him from being scared and leaving me, I had the opportunity of seeing the reeling, rocking, smoking locomotive pass

by." Fire and smoke puffed from the stack, and Bailey was reminded of the tale of two Irishmen who had landed and were spending their first night in New York. They were in a hotel room when awakened by the fire siren. Pat ran to the window in time to see two horse-drawn fire engines go rushing by with gongs clanging, smoke and fire belching from their stacks. Pat ran back to the bed, shook his partner and cried "Mike, wake up, they're moving hell and two big loads just went by and more are coming!"

Apparently the wheezing, coughing fire-fingling O-R-T locomotive would have frightened old Satan himself.

The fireman on this train seldom had to ring the bell, as the swaying and delapidated engine rocked and lurched so badly that the bell dinged incessantly as the old engine waddled across Blossom Prairie.

The locomotive incurred much wrath from farmers, whose teams had never been confronted by such a contraption, and were prone to bolt at the sight of it.

The old engine had some annoying drawbacks, particularly to the train crew. One such was caused by some of the cars leaving the track, causing considerable delays in the schedule.

Curtis Glover of Deport recalls as a child going over to the tracks, which ran not far from his home north of town, to watch them trying to lever the cars back onto the tracks.

Glover recalls that in the summer the ground would crack so that the tracks would often hang over a dip in the ground, not touching by several inches. In winter he recalls that the rails often sank down so deep in the mud that they had to be cleared or the

train could not proceed. Another problem was the sparks from the old wood-burner, which settled in a farmer's meadows or pastures and obliging train crews would have to stop and put out the grassfires before they spread.

The clothes-burning, britches-tearing old train is gone forever. It is a faded dream now, with no signs left of the old roadway. Older folks remember that it passed near Hovertown, in front of the old Hignight place, but the proof is gone.

Raymond Hignight remembers sitting on his front porch and watching the old train storming by, and he and his mother and family used to catch the train to go shopping in Blossom.

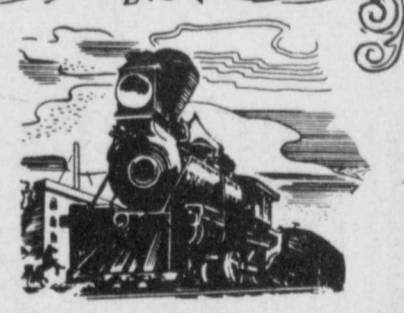
Russell Grant remembers a trip at age 3, sitting on his father, Dr. Stephen Grant's lap, or on his mother's lap on the way home from Blossom.

He recalls watching the lanterns swinging back and forth on the ceiling as the train lumbered along.

Both Hignight and Grant remember that the passenger car was an old box car with benches nailed along the walls. One couldn't see out unless the door was open, which it was in the spring and summer, but in the winter time the door remained closed.

The train came into Deport about where the Deport Housing Authority is now, than ran across to the old Paris and Mt. Pleasant track, whose path is now slowly fading too.

Mrs. John Sasser of Blossom wants me to talk to her, as her father was the only man ever killed on the O-R-T railroad. Next week we should have something on that story.

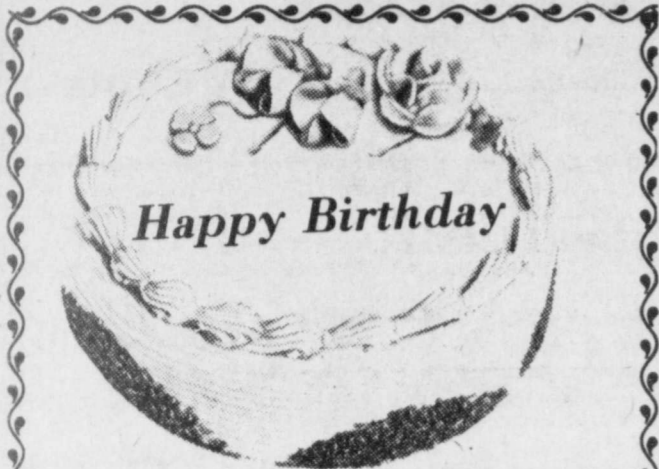


GENEALOGY BEGINS WITH U

"Trail On Map" Key To Tracing Ancestors

Remember the saying, "where you live will have a lot to do on what you do". This was even more true in earlier centuries. Even though in our early history we had many modes of travel and people crossed

many of miles of ocean to get home, the everyday routines of life was pretty well confined to a certain small area. For example, it would be virtually impossible in the middle 1800's for a person to commute 75 miles to work everyday.

Now this is common place in many areas of the country. Because of this, the ninth principle of genealogical research is the principle of location.

When starting research on your relatives you need to obtain a map of the county where they lived. In the fifth lesson, I told you how you could obtain the map.

Once you receive the map, you need to find the location of where your relatives lived. Now, locate all cemeteries, schools, churches and libraries near their

location. Proximity of their location to your relatives will be the first rule here. You should check for information on your relative at these local churches, cemeteries and libraries.

You should be able to eliminate many of these places because of their distance to your location.

When plotting relatives' movement on the large physical map, you should notice four important factors. First, most movement on settlement patterns for the United States were from east to west. Secondly, many people who started to move west stayed several

generations in one area. Some of their descendants may still be living in these areas today. Thirdly, many cities develop as "jumping off" points for further western movement. Fourthly, most movement between areas were dependent on physical terrain.

All of these factors played an important part on where relatives settled and why. By keeping these factors in mind, it will be far easier to obtain genealogical information.

Native of Deport

Wichita Philanthropist, Gordon W. Evans, Dies

Word has been received on the death of Deport native Gordon W. Evans, recognized as an outstanding civic leader and philanthropist in Wichita, Kans., where he had lived since 1947.

Mr. Evans, 77, died July 10 in Grand Junction, Colo., where he had suffered a heart attack while returning to his home in Wichita after a month-long trip to California.

At the time of his death, Mr. Evans was the retired chairman of the board of Kansas Gas and Electric Company.

He was born in Deport in 1904, the son of W.P. and Alice Evans. He attended Trinity University, the University of Texas, the University of Southern California and studied law and law and accounting at the Oklahoma School of Accountancy and Law.

Survivors include the widow, Mrs. Jessica Evans of Wichita; one son, Dennis Evans, also of Wichita; one brother, William Evans of Deport; one sister, Mrs. Esther Bird of San Antonio and two grandchildren.

The Wichita Eagle-Beacon newspaper, in reporting on his death and funeral services said: a crowd of more than 400 of Wichita's business and cultural leaders attended Evans' funeral service on July 15, and then, about an hour after the service they celebrated Evans' life with a party in the Wichita Concert Hall - all at the wish of Evans himself.

According to the Wichita Eagle-Beacon, Evans requested "a room large enough to entertain as many friends as you think will come" to a party after the entombment. "This should be a time of pleasure and not sadness. I will have lived a full life," Evans wrote. Old friend Bill Cochran,

who was in charge of the funeral, was quoted by the Eagle-Beacon as saying, "If Gordon were here, this whole party would transfer to his home, and he'd play the piano all night long."

Evans worked throughout his professional life for public utilities, going to Wichita in 1947 as assistant to the president of KG&E. He quickly rose to the president's position, even though he was actively involved in numerous civic projects, such as The

Wichita Metropolitan Council, the Music Theatre of Wichita and the United Way of Wichita.

In 1977, when the Eagle-Beacon surveyed a dozen civic leaders an asked, "If you were putting together a civic project and wanted to guarantee its success, what few persons would you have to have on the project? All of them named Gordon Evans.

A memorial has been established with Music Theater of Wichita, Century II, 225 W. Douglas, Wichita, Kans. 67202.

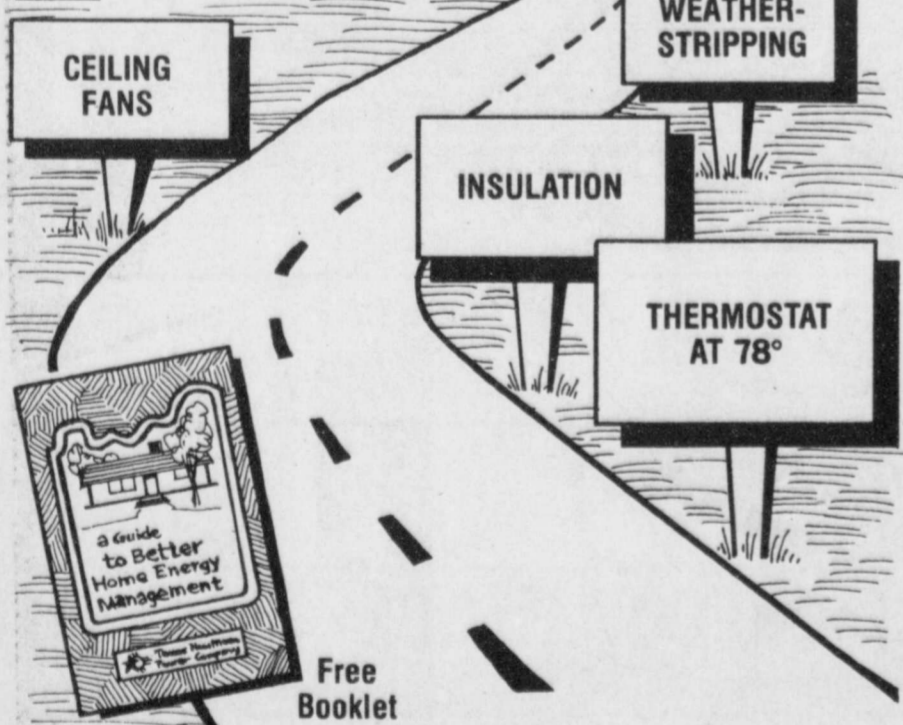

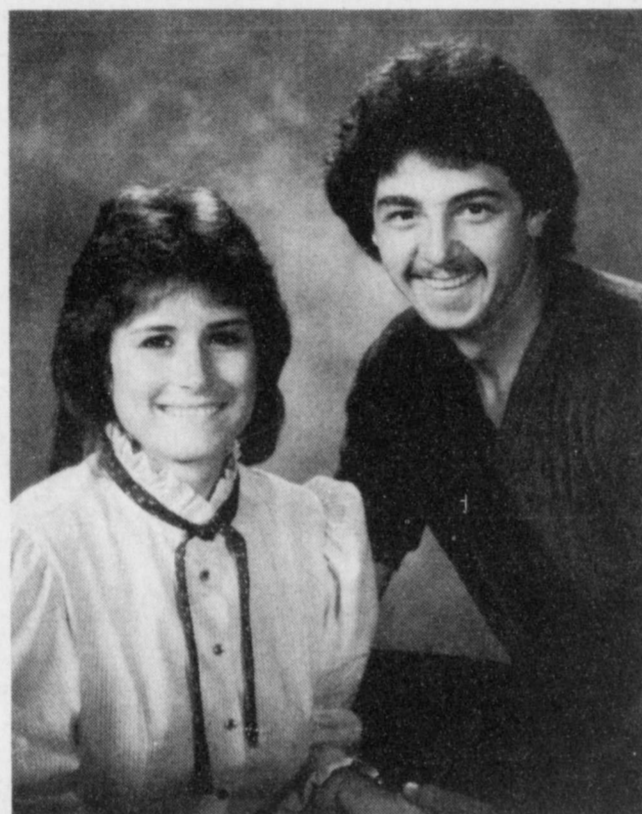

Lone Star Gas Hike Delayed

The Railroad Commission has suspended a \$90-million natural gas rate increase requested by Lone Star Gas Company. The proposed increase would affect 451 Texas cities and outlying areas and more than 1.1-million bill-paying customers.

The 120-day suspension order will delay the effective date of the proposed increase while the Commission's Gas Utilities Division examines the Lone Star request in detail. The company had asked that rates be increased effective Aug. 1.

A hearing on the Lone Star application has been set for Sept. 14. The statement of intent filed with the Commission by Lone Star asks for an increase in its city gate rate. The city gate is the delivery point at which a city distribution system receives gas from its supplier.

In examining the proposed rate increase, the Railroad Commission will analyze Lone Star revenues and determine the reasonableness of the company's expenses.

30 YEARS AGO-Aug. 7, 1952 Dan Kenemore of Deport had shown the first open boll of cotton from the area. It was grown on the Lloyd Hayes place.

Death had claimed Edgar S. Scudder of Blossom, Mrs. M.L. Warren of Fulbright,

Test Drilling for oil at Sugar Hill and Dalby Springs was underway.

drawn work were also on sale at two for \$1.

20 YEARS AGO-Aug. 2, 1962

Jamey Barham of Deport had discovered 3 tiny eggs and put them into a small dirt-filled jar to hatch. A week later one did, producing a rare blue-tailed lizard. He was raising the tiny lizard on insects.

Deport Volunteer firemen had answered 2 calls, one to a small house fire at the R.L. Herd house, and another to the home of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Wilson, whose electric stove had caught on fire.

Gary Ballard of Clardy had received a state FFA award for his superior beef production.

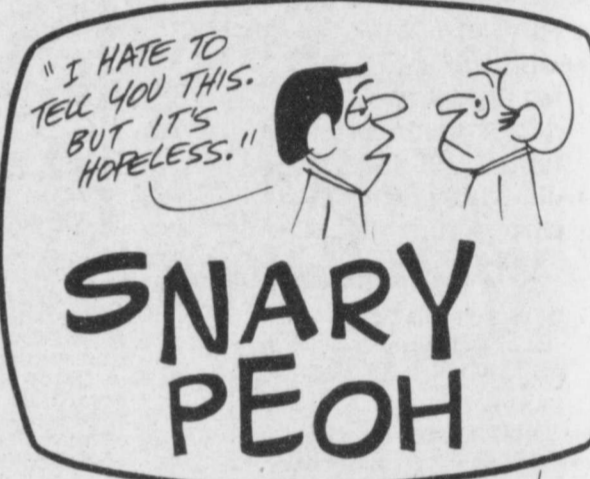
