Dairy farming, as most folks know. is one of the hardest types of farming there is. But the Goodings share the chores among the four family members, and accomplish an

astounding amount. About 8 years ago the Goodings bought out the M.A. Keys Dairy. After operating it for awhile, Jese built his own dairy barn on their

They arise around 5:00 a.m., and try to be out of the house by 5:30. Each goes to his or her assigned

Jesse does the actual milking, letting the cows into the stalls, washing them down, putting anti-kicking devices on the flanks of those whose nature tends towards flying

He attaches the electric milkers, and watches carefully that all goes

As each cow finishes her feed and is milked, she is turned out, and more let in, repeating the process over and over until all the cattle are milked. That process, is repeated twice daily, seven days a week. Jesse trys to have 45-50 cows in milk year 'round.

Camey, who is 8, goes to feed the new-born calves that are an integral part of the dairy business. The petite youngster expertly shoves eager noses out of the way with a hip, lines up the bottles, and makes sure each calf gets it's allotted share and no one

Benjy a proud 131/2 years old, has a lot of responsibility. Each morning he goes to feed the heifers, which replace older cows in a well-managed system that keeps the herd at peak production.

In winter they must be fed both hay and feed, and the condition of the cattle checked with a young, but nonethe-less expert eye.


Vicki works at the First National Bank in Deport 5 days a week, but besides keeping the family fed, the house cleaned, she does a lot of outside work too.

The Goodings bale hay for their own cattle, and for others also. Vicki is an expert at raking or baling hay, This summer young Benjy has done

a tremendous amount of the cutting, raking and baling, while his father was busy with the milking. When the dairy has to be scrubbed

down to spotless condition, Vicki and Camey usually head the scraping, scrubbing team. The family has started grinding their own feed lately, and doing some

custom grinding too. Vicki may well end up down in the pit shoveling the last of the grain into (See GOODINGS, P.10)

Texas county.

Along with numerous local county and precinct offices, Texas voters this fall will vote for U.S. Senator, U.S. Congressman, state representative, state senator, governor, attorney general and nearly every statewide office. In addition, there will be six proposed amendments to the Texas Constitution on the Nov. 2

"It is important that all eligible Texans register to vote then to exercise that privilege on Nov. 2." says Joe Rothe, with the county officials program of the Texas Africultural Extension Service.

Rothe points out that only 24 percent of those eligible voted in the May 1 Texas primaries, the lowest voter turnout in 30 years for a gubernatorial primary election.

"Everyone eligible to vote but unable to do so on Nov. 2 should apply at the county voter registrar's office to vote absentee," says Rothe. Oct. 29 is the deadline for voting absentee in person while absentee ballots will be accepted in the mail as late as 7 p.m. Nov. 2

Any of the following conditions can qualify an individual to vote absentee:

1. Absence from the county of residence on election day. 2. Age 65 or older on election day. Inability to appear at the

authorized polling place on election day due to sickness, physical disability or religious belief. Service as an election clerk or a

poll watcher in an election precinct other than the precinct of residence. Under certain circumstances, voters confined to jail may be eligible

to vote absentee.

Although the Dragons haven't enjoyed too much gridiron success over the years, the same cannot be said for their coach of the past 2-3 seasons, Bill Spann.

Spann's years of wide acclaim and honors in the coaching profession started in 1962 and continued for a decade and more as he head coached the Dumas Demons of the then Panhandle district of 1-AAA.

Spann was an assistant Dumas coach in 1961 when the Demons won a district title for the first time in 30 years and parlayed that into the '61' state Triple-A championships. 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
