Now most hunters have a respect for the law...other people's property and other people's wishes.

But it only takes a few to cause a lot of trouble and friction. The group that invaded our cotton field during dove season, dumping cans and bottles and plastic shotgun shells everywhere...and clomping around tromping cotton into the ground...did nothing to further the cause of hunting in our eyes!

Many people are not aware that under Texas law no posted signs are required...only a fence. Signs are all that is necessary on unfenced land.

For hunting with any weapon...be it firearm or bow and arrow - the law says that's a Class A misdemeanor. It carries a fine of up to \$2000 and -or- a year in jail!

For simply taking a stroll...or pictures (something I've been guilty of many times) the penalty is 1000! and or 180 days in jail! Believe me...next time I'll be more careful.

Crossing a fence or other enclosure is trespass. If a landowner tells a person orally or in writing to keep out, neither signs nor fences are needed.

Most people will give their permission to hunt or fish if they want folks on their property...and it is their right to say yes or no.

Hunters and fishermen need to be aware of these new laws, especially since judges are reported to be backing landowners wholeheartedly...so take care...and remember, it only takes a phone call to check and see if its OK to hunt or fish!

## Life Insurance Not Mandatory

# Insurance Sales Pitch Draws State Probe

Investigators from the State Board of Insurance are in the Bogata area this week, investigating possibility that a Sulphur Springs insurance salesman may have given false statements in his effort to sell life insurance to senior citizens who have Medicare coverage.

At least two women in the Bogata area say they were told by the same insurance agent that mandatory life insurance would be required of all persons with Medicare, effective Jan. 1.

The salesman promoted his company, the women told The Bogata News, by claiming he could offer a life insurance policy at a rate much lower than what will be required of a state-issued mandatory policy.

One of the women said she paid the agent a one-year premium of \$249.36 for a \$2,000 life insurance policy. The other said she paid \$169 for a six months premium for her \$2,000 policy. The woman who paid for the full year says she has since stopped payment

## School Tax Rate Is Same

The tax rate for the Prairiland CISD will not change this year, as the School Board made a unanimous decision at a special session Thursday night Oct. 14, to leave the district's tax structure at the current rate of 53 cents per \$100 valuation.

The decision came after a public hearing was held Oct. 11, with only 12 residents of the district attending. Those attending were mostly interested in finding out how the agriculture land usage evaluations were figured, especially according to the classification of land.

The school board will hold its next meeting on Nov. 8, at the Blossom Elementary School, and the December meeting will be held at the Deport Elementary School.

At those meetings the board will look at the buildings, and an architect will be present to help plan for renovation of the buildings at both locations over the next few years.

Supt. Leslie (Buddy) Taylor says that some renovations will probably begin before summer of 1983.

# Improved Pats At Clarksville

The Prairiland Patriot football team dropped a heartbreaker last Friday night, losing to North Lamar 7-6 in a game which saw the Pat defense putting on a tremendous display of skill.

This Friday they face the tough Clarksville Tigers on Tiger turf, and to top it off, it's the Tiger's homecoming. Kickoff will begin at 7:30, and head Coach Chet James says "Clarksville has the best talent in this part of Texas right now, even though

they lost several close games."

"They have two tight ends that are 6-5 and 6-6, and have great speed. Dubal Sanders is one of the best quarterbacks in District 13-AAA and we know we'll have to play them a great game to beat them."

Offensively, James says, the Patriots will have to execute well. He also says the boys are in great shape, but will be doing special running this week to give them a boost for Friday night.

About last Friday's game against North Lamar James says that "our defense played as good as they ever have. It shows that we can play good, aggressive football, and that when we do, we can compete with anyone."

James pointed out that "last year at this time we'd been outscored 100 points to 0! This year in district competition we've been defeated 7-6 and 13-6. That's a drastic improvement."

A capacity crowd turned out to see the Patriots meet the Panthers, and the first stanza opened with the two teams trading blow for blow, punt for punt, and neither getting anywhere.

But late in the last part of the quarter Patriot QB Todd Davis connected with his favorite receiver, Jeff Ballard, on a long pass, and Ballard legged it down the field full speed for an 83-yard touchdown. The point after attempt was blocked, however, a factor that was to be crucial at the end of the game.

The North Lamar Panthers spent most of the night trying to deal with a Red Pride defense that would have credited a college team in many ways.

A Prairiland fumble on the six yard line gave the NL bunch an opportunity to even the score, but the combined skills of William Newman, Scott Dunagan, Chris Spann, Jon King and the other members of the defense not only prevented the fumble from resulting in a score, but took the Panthers for a loss every time they tried a play.

The Patriots, in what would become

## Deport Holds Hearing On Grant Funds

The City of Deport held a public hearing on Monday, Oct. 18, concerning the Community Development Block Grants which they have applied for.

Six people attended the hearing, mostly concerning rehabilitation and weatherization of their homes.

An area of East Deport, which takes in Depot, Nobles, Dewey, Bell and Clarksdale streets, has been targeted for assistance.

The funding would be provided on an individual basis according to needs, if the grant is obtained.

If passed the grant would provide \$100,000 for extension of water lines. This would not only provide better water service to the city, but better fire protection, allowing for several additional fire plugs in the area.

\$45,000 would be obtained for extension of sewer line services, and \$153,000 for weatherization and rehabilitation of older dwellings in the target area. Administrative fees would be set for \$27,000.

The total grant would amount to \$325,000 which would be a straight grant and not have to be matched by any state or local funding.

A concession stand will also be open during the evening.

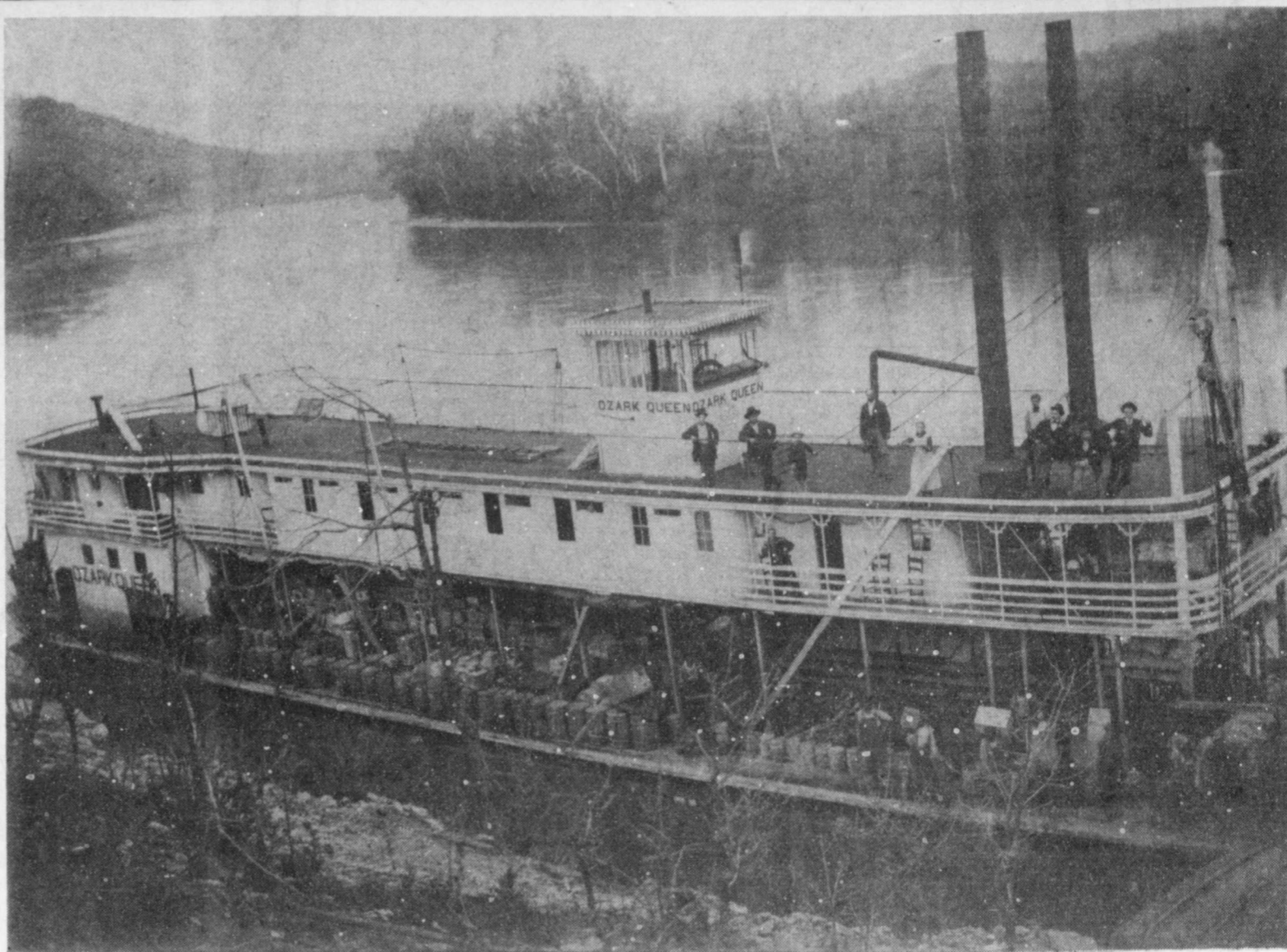

Despite the fact we were elected as Democrats, we are united in our en-

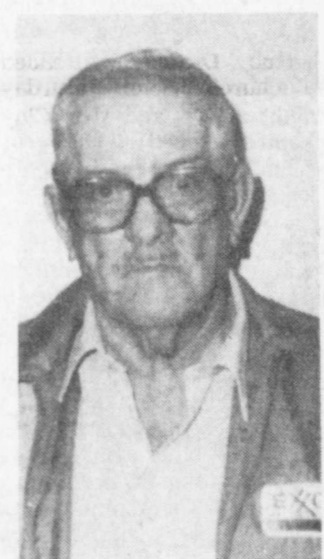

# 5 Tie For First Place

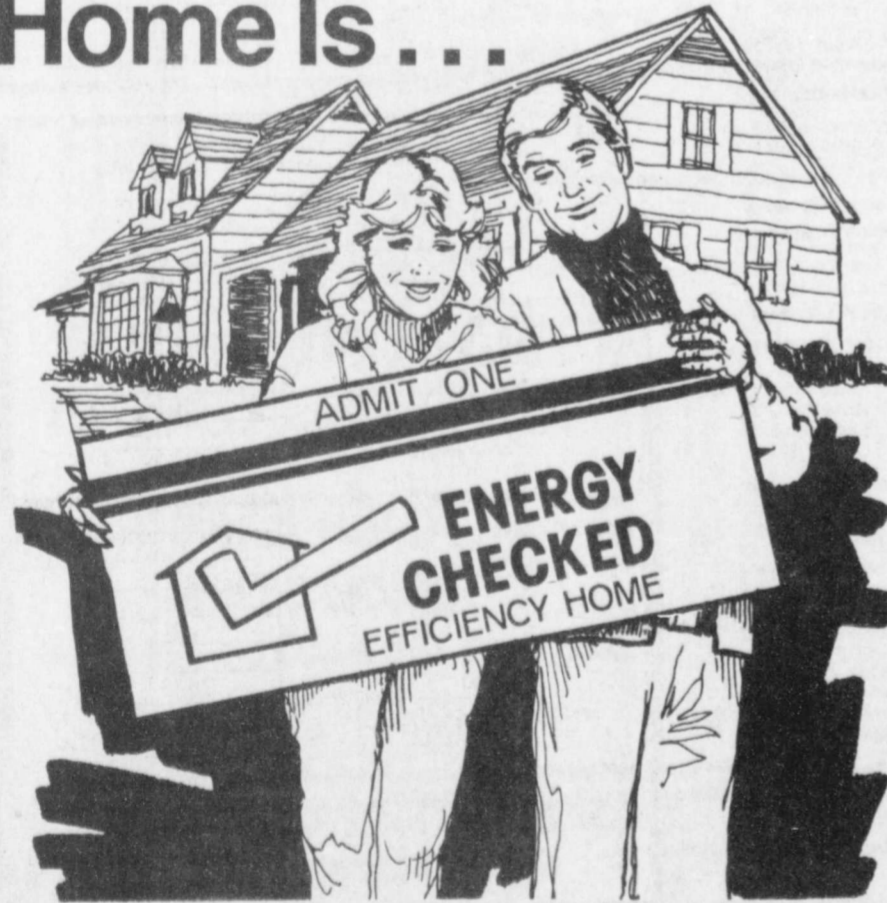

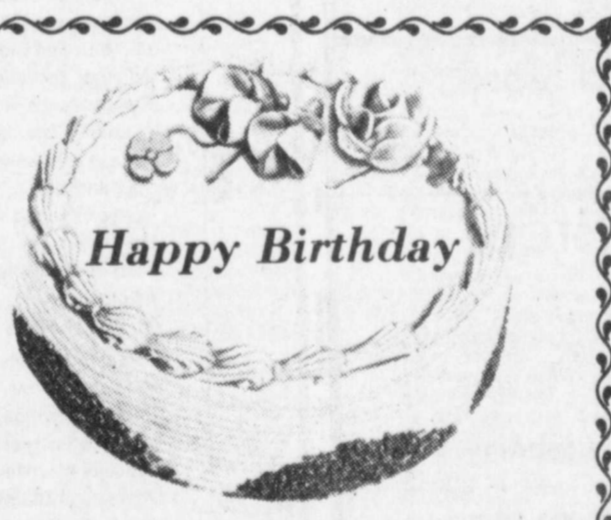

Bogata women and accepted payment, said their policy would not be mailed to them but that he would deliver it, according to one of the women. She has yet to receive her policy, although it is not overly past due at this time.

Gibson said field investigator Bill Hamby will arrive in the area either Tuesday afternoon or sometime

Wednesday and would interview the two women, along with anyone else who may believe they were given misrepresentation by the agent.

Gibson, a native of Lamar County, says the agent named by the two women represents a small Texas-based insurance company that specializes in supplemental insurance to Medicare. He says his office has received no serious complaints in the past against the company and that no previous misconduct charges had been lodged against the agent. The

agent does have a state license, he added.

"This could be a case where the agent got a little anxious to make a sale, or it could be a misunderstanding in what he may have said. In either case, our field investigator will make a thorough investigation and report back to us," Gibson says.

"We want to make it clear to everyone that life insurance for anyone is not compulsory," added Gibson.

He also pointed out that his office wanted to hear from anyone having a problem with their insurance, or who may believe an insurance salesman may make a misrepresentation. "All anyone has to do is to send the State Board of Insurance in Austin their policy number, the name of the company and tell us what the problem is. We will take it from there and make an investigation," Gibson says.

## Career Potpourri

About one year from now, many of you who are high school seniors will be going to college and preparing for your various careers.

That time may seem to be a long way off, but the next nine months will pass quickly. Therefore, you must take care of many matters before you graduate from high school:

First, don't let your grades slip. These grades will go on your transcript just as all of the others did. Keep them up.

Second, take as many solid courses as you can in high school. You will need

these when you start your college work.

Third, make arrangements to take either the ACT or the SAT as soon as possible this year. Most colleges require that you have at least one of these. (I suggest that you take both of them.)

Fourth, check on the possibility of completing some college courses by examination (CLEP, etc.) so that you can skip these courses whenever you actually enroll.

Fifth, start early to complete the necessary paperwork for admission to college or vocational school. This takes time and effort to complete. (You will feel rushed enough without having to do a lot of last-minute running around.)

This also applies to applications for financial assistance.

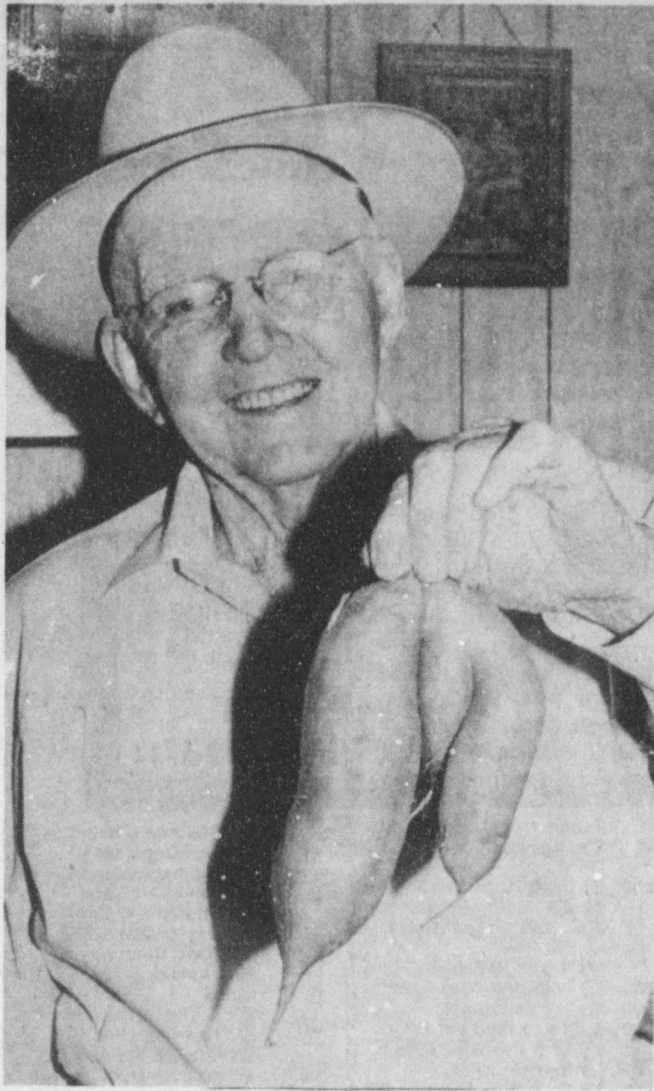
Sixth, plan now to visit your prospective school early this year in order to firm up your plans and to meet with those who can answer any questions you might have.

Seventh, prepare for yourself a list of dates when certain actions on your part must be completed and strive to be ahead of those deadlines.

## FHA Told About Art of Karate

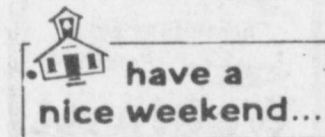
Rivercrest FHA members got first hand information on the art of Karate during their regular meeting for October.

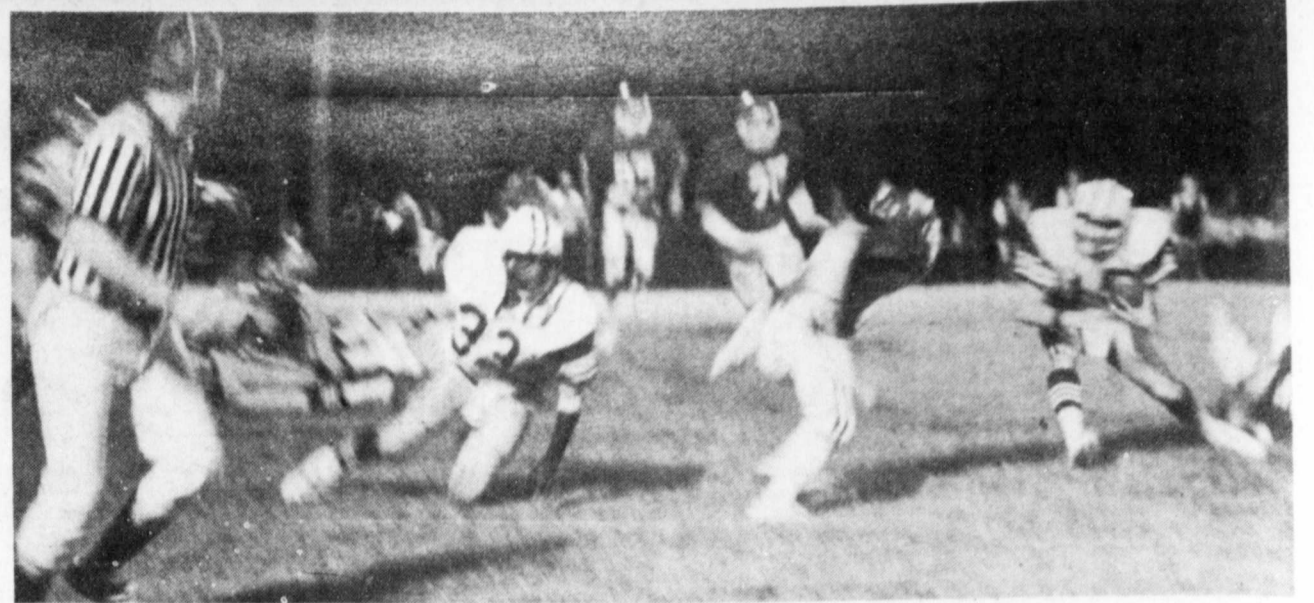
