#### BRIGHTER LIGHTS

The significant phrase so often used when dishonesty is heard. "Turn on the light," has more meaning for us as farmers than would at first appear. The politicians may be contended and thrive better in darkness or at least the absence of information, but farming to be successful and profitable must be under light and with definite information. The time has come for more information, for more light and for more

knowledge in farming. We as farmers seldom do anything in our business of farming that we should wish to keep concealed. Farming is not a business that tempts us to act dishonorably or to contrive to take advantage of our fellow man. We need no admonition to "turn on the light" to show any crooked dealing. What we deed is the light of knowledge that will make us more

The average farm home is very poorly lighted. It is not impossible to "turn on" the bright light in some farm homes, because the facilities for illumination are inadequate. In such homes lights are needed to encourage reading, accounting, planning and learning.

There are many farms today producing poor returns because of poor lights in the home.




