The grand champion steer was shown by Shawn Taylor and the reserve champion by Shawn Keener. Miscellaneous saw Chris

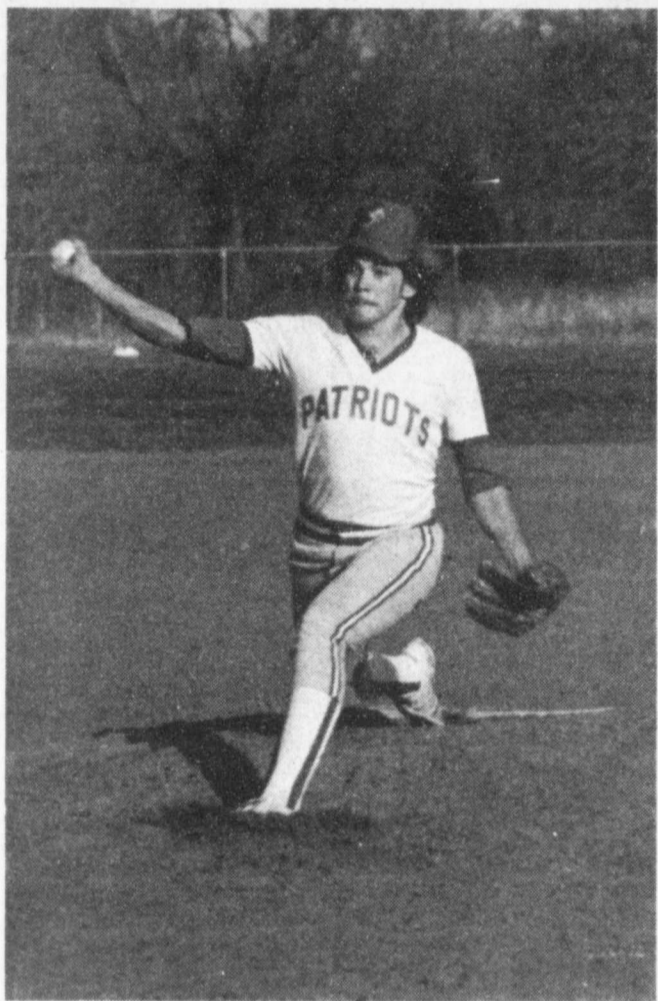

Prairiland Tied For District

The Prairiland Patriot baseball team remained tied for District with Clarksville after an easy game with North Lamar Tuesday afternoon, emerging with a 10-0 win.

Joe Smith and Scott Scudder each hit home runs in the Tuesday game, while Todd Davis slammed home two, in addition to a triple. Scudder pitched a two hitter for the win.

Prairiland tied Clarksville for first place with a 10 to 9 come from behind victory over Clarksville at Prairiland Friday afternoon.

Clarksville jumped on the board first in the game when the leadoff hitter singled and scored two outs later as a Clarksville hitter put them up two to nothing with a home run. Pitcher Scott Scudder struck out the next batter to end the Clarksville rally.

Prairiland got a break from Clarksville in the bottom of the first inning as Joe Smith singled to right field and scored when he ended up in center field to cut the lead to two to one.

Clarksville commenced scoring again in the third inning as they widened their lead. After a strike out by Scott Scudder of the leadoff

man, the next batter walked. The next batter then hit a home run to make the score Clarksville five, Prairiland one. Vern Barker then came into the game to relieve Scudder and got the second out by striking out the next batter.

The next two batters singled and came in to score as the next hitter hit a very controversial home run. The home run ball hit ten feet short of the fence and bounced over which was clear to see by all except the umpire, who was busy making sure the bases were being touched.

After a heated discussion between Patriot coach Bill Scudder and his players, the next batter was retired on a ground ball to Barker.

The mysterious home run gave Clarksville an eight to one lead at the end of two and one-half innings. Prairiland, which was fired up by the bum call, rallied in the bottom of the third inning. John David Lloyd started the rally with a walk but was forced out on Heath Kennedy's fielder's choice. Scudder then walked and moved to third on Joe Smith's ground ball which scored Kennedy.

After a strike out, Barry Johnston was walked intentionally to load the bases. Robbie Connot then drove in

Scudder and Smith with a single. Johnston and Connot then scored on Chris Sparks' double. After three innings, Clarksville held an eight to six lead.

Prairiland took the lead in the fourth inning which they never surrendered. Heath Kennedy started the inning with a walk and proceeded to steal second and move to third on Scudder's single. Joe Smith loaded the bases with an infield single. Todd Davis then walked as Kennedy was awarded to walk across home plate. Barry Johnston then doubled as Prairiland took a nine to eight lead as Scudder and Smith came in to score.

Prairiland got its tenth run when Vern Barker singled in Johnston. After four innings, Prairiland led ten to eight.

Clarksville threatened in the sixth inning as they loaded the bases. Scudder then made his second pitching appearance of the game as he relieved Barker and only was touched for one run, which cut the lead to 10 to 9.

Scudder retired the first three hitters in the ninth inning on strike outs to preserve the victory for Prairiland.

Pitcher Vern Barker can be praised for his superb

relief pitching which allowed Prairiland to stay close in a game that first appeared to be a blowout.

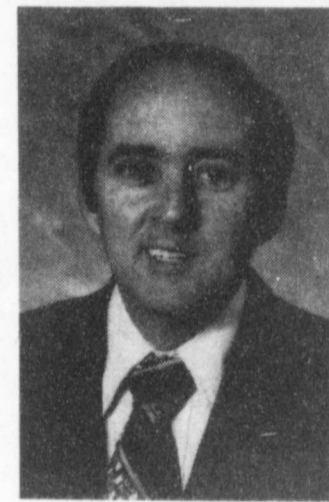
In the game played the day before, Prairiland beat Winnsboro 7 to one at Winnsboro.

Prairiland jumped ahead in the first inning four to nothing, three runs coming on a Barry Johnston home run. Prairiland scored a run in the third, fourth and seventh innings as pitcher Todd Davis kept his unbeaten record for another week as he was touched for only one run as he went the distance for the win.

An award to Nanalee Nichols, writer of "Nichols Worth" was given to Blossom, Talco, Bogata and Deport jointly. The second place award was accompanied by the comments that "How someone can write this many columns and keep anything different is amazing. The quality is newsy but well flowing."

The Bogata News collected second place awards in Best News Story and Feature Story, plus a third place in Sports Coverage.

The feature story on Kridler's Gardens battle to keep their land, was commented on as "Well written, flowing set of materials." The News Story was judged as "really shows the action of the area." Both were written by Nanalee Nichols. Sports coverage was

claimed "Very good information, good photos, put together well, stories a little short, quotes would have helped, but good." Diana Eudy contributed the basketball and football entries to this category, and Cindy Hiner the rodeo story.

Judges for the event were journalism professors at Stephen F. Austin State University in Nacogdoches, under the direction and guidance of Dr. Michael Roach.

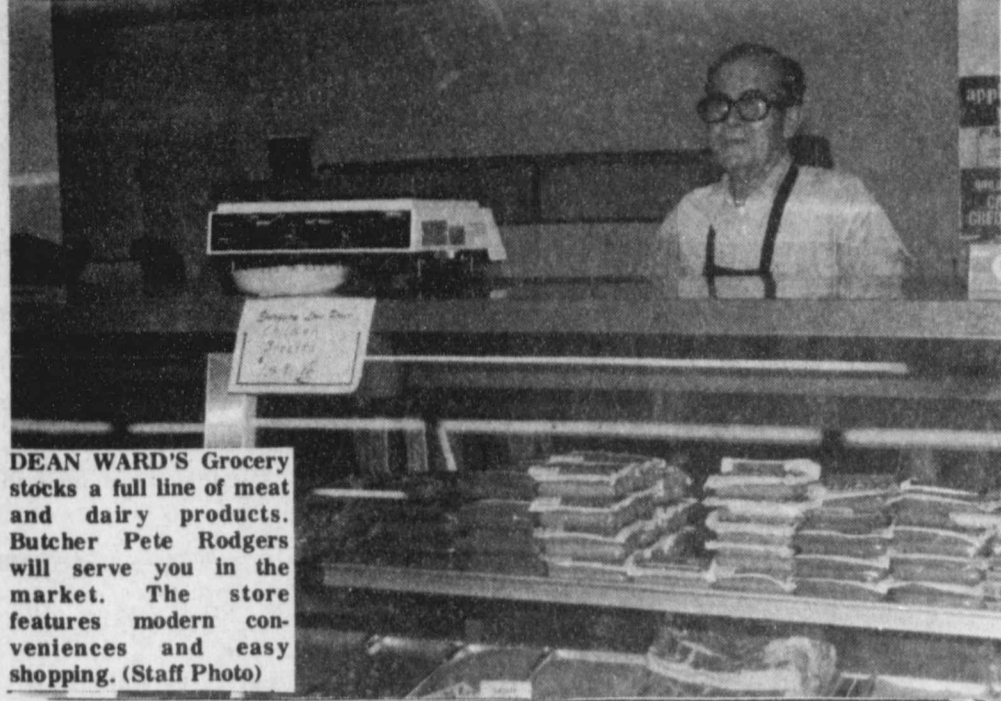

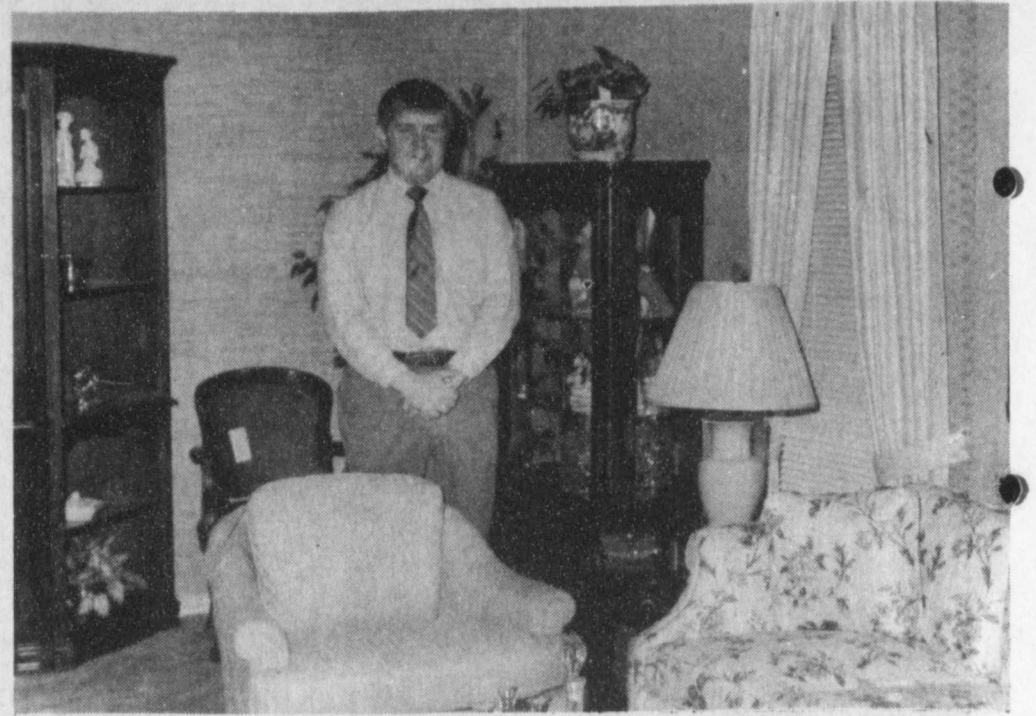

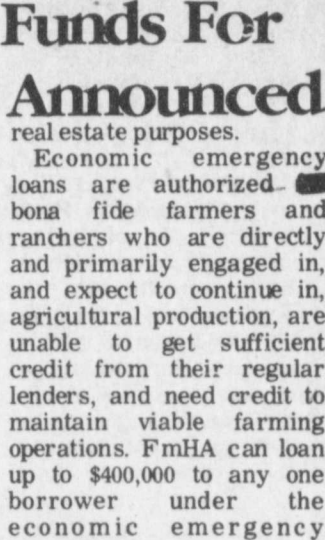

Emergency Funds For Farm Loans Announced

Texas' allocation of funds for direct loans in the economic emergency farm loan program has been increased from \$5,890,140 to \$18,415,000, State Director J. Lynn Futch of the Farmers Home Administration announced recently.
The increase will be distributed through state offices of the FmHA, the U.S. Department of Agriculture's farm credit agency. Nationally, the direct loan portion of the \$600 million economic emergency program was raised to a \$310 million share.
Interest rates for direct loans obtained from FmHA county offices are 10.25 percent on loans made for operating purposes and 10.75 percent on loans made for

real estate purposes. Economic emergency loans are authorized bona fide farmers and ranchers who are directly and primarily engaged in, and expect to continue in, agricultural production, are unable to get sufficient credit from their regular lenders, and need credit to maintain viable farming operations. FmHA can loan up to \$400,000 to any one borrower under the economic emergency program.
Permitted use of loan funds include financing of 1984 crop production, purchasing essential livestock, feed and equipment, and paying delinquent installments on farm and real estate debts if a lender is demanding payment.

Weekly Ag Update

By Herb Brevard
About the time grazing gets good on crimson clover, it begins to bloom and its time to pull the cattle off. Cattle should be pulled off crimson clover by April 15 in order for seed to develop.

Different species of clover should be planted in different fields. Since the maturity dates differ, this practice will allow grazing the clovers as they mature. Crimson clover should be grazed early in the year. After April 15, cattle can be moved to other clovers such as arrowleaf which should provide grazing into June.

Bermudagrass springing should be completed in the next few weeks. The sprigs should be transplanted in time to benefit from spring rainfall. Check the springs to make sure they are alive and healthy. The cold winter may have killed some of the rhizomes in the ground. If the rhizomes are dark or have a watery appearance, they are probably cold damaged and survival may be greatly reduced.

At the time of springing, put down a balanced fertilizer. Apply preemerge herbicide after springing to reduce competition from weeds and allow the sprigs to spread faster. Tifton 44 is more susceptible to damage by herbicides than coastal, especially during the first year. Label directions on the use of all herbicides should be followed carefully.

Art Fair Provides Fun

The 1984 Paris Art Fair brochure states that competitive art entries for non-professionals will be accepted from 8 to 10 a.m. on Saturday, May 5, the day of the fair. The entry fee is \$4 for each piece entered and must be paid at the time of registration. Registration will be set up at a tent in front of the Paris Junior College administration building.

Non-professional art competition is open to any artist, including students, whose work is totally original in conception and execution. Work must not have been entered in previous YWCA-Paris Art Fair competition and an artist may not be entered in both non-professional and professional competition.

All paintings must be wired and ready for hanging. Drawings, prints, watercolors and photographs need not be framed but must be mounted on a heavy support and wired for hanging. An item identification card must be placed on each piece entered, listing title, medium, price, artist's name, full address and zip in that order. The card should be attached to the right front of each entry folded so that just the title, medium and price shows. After judging, cards will be opened so that all the information is visible.

Judging will begin at 10:30 a.m. Winners will be presented their awards at 4 p.m. at the entertainment area located at the front steps of the administration building.

Entries which are for sale must have a price shown on the identification tag on the front. Sales are to be arranged through the YWCA sales booth and a 20 percent commission will be deducted from the price. Artists whose pieces are sold will be given a check at the close of the fair at 6 p.m.

Over \$1,500 in cash prizes is available for awards given in several categories. The divisions of media are divided into seven sections. Section I is oil, acrylic, encaustic, collage or any other media painted on canvas, masonite or similar support. Section II is transparent water media or pastel worked with water. Section III is prints and drawings. Section IV, sculpture and Sect V is pottery, handbuilt or hand

thrown. Sections VI and VII are each subdivided. Section VI is called Special Original Design. Class A under this section is soft media such as needlepoint, macrame, quilting, stitchery and batik. Class B is hard media such as jewelry, woodcarving, stained glass and metal work.

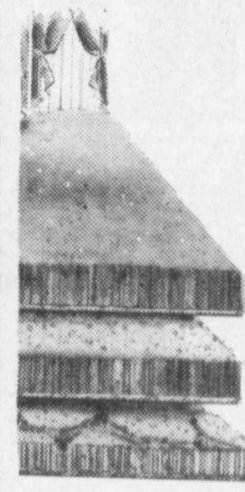
Section VII is photography and is divided into Class A, Color and Class B, black and white. Entries must be a minimum of 8x10 and must have a card attached stating the type of camera, film and by whom it was developed and printed. This card is in addition to the identification card which must be on all the non-professional entries.

TODAY'S PSYCHOLOGY

Q. What has been said over the past decade about the use of meditation as a way of combatting stress?

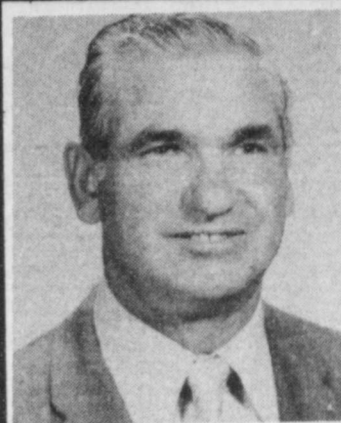
A. There is some fascinating evidence that many heart diseases are particularly caused by stress.

Coronary disease has increased 5 times over in our country in the last 50 years. And hypertension, or high blood pressure, affects some 15 percent of our adult population.

If our stressful style of life is literally killing us, then some form of slowing down is in order. Meditation appears to be one such method.

During meditation, breathing and heart rates slow and blood pressure drops. One study noted the heart rate slowing down from the usual 72 beats per minute to 24 during meditation.

If you're trying to slow down, a meditation class might be just what the doctor ordered.

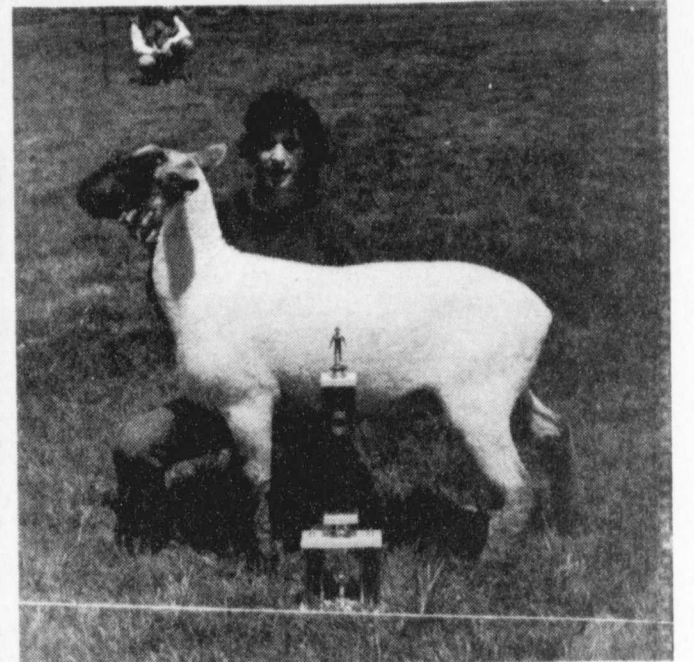

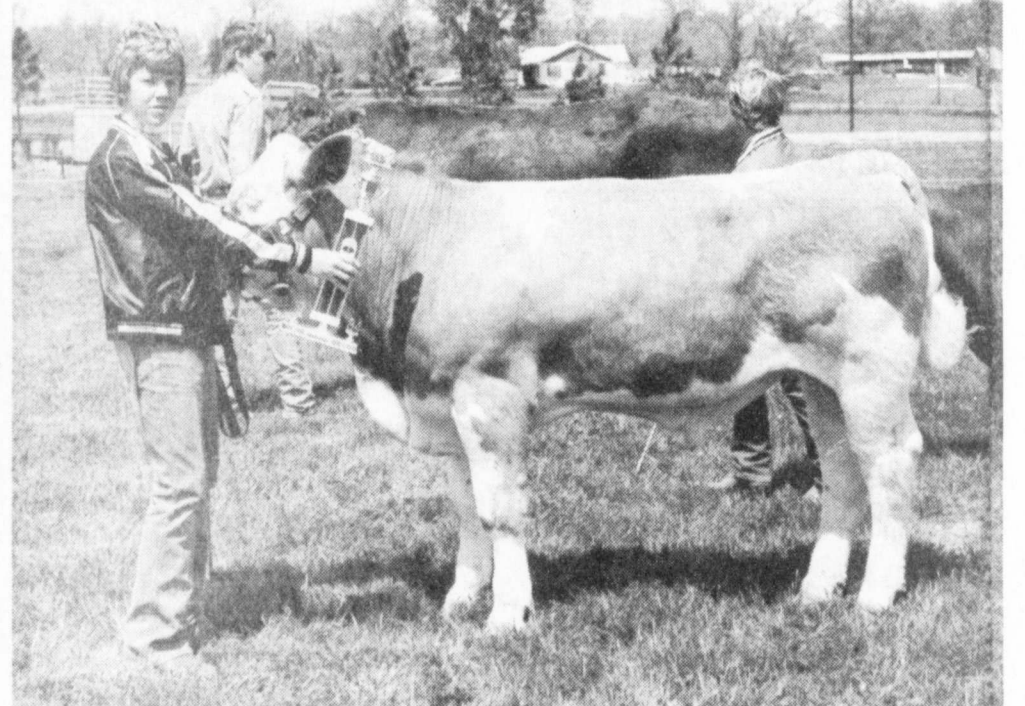

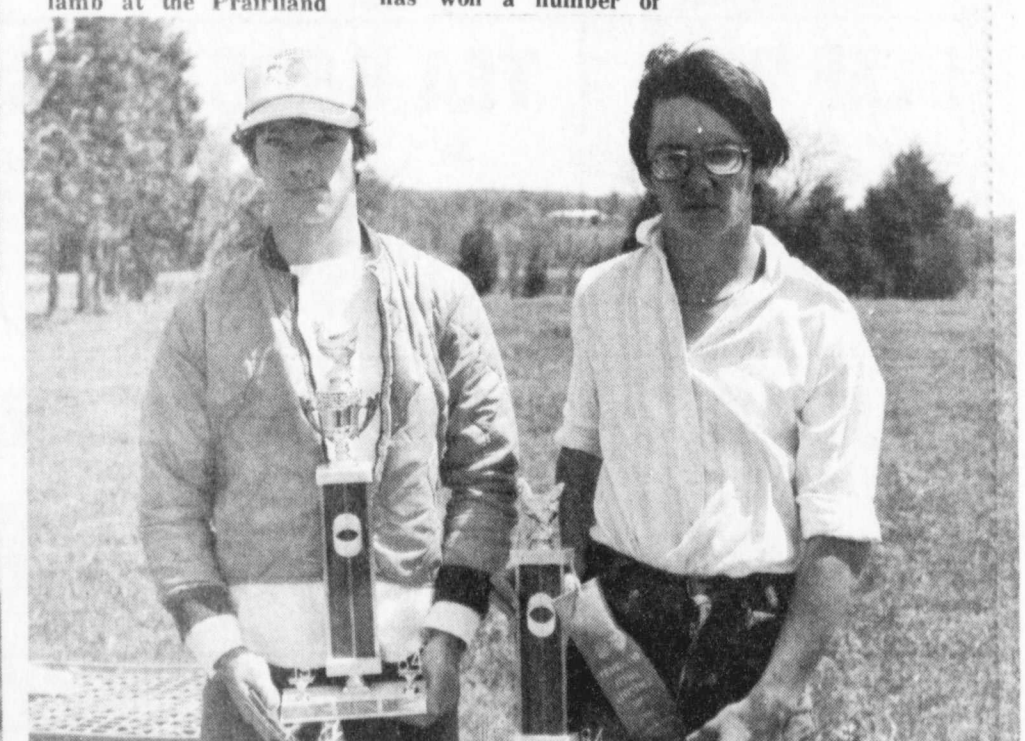

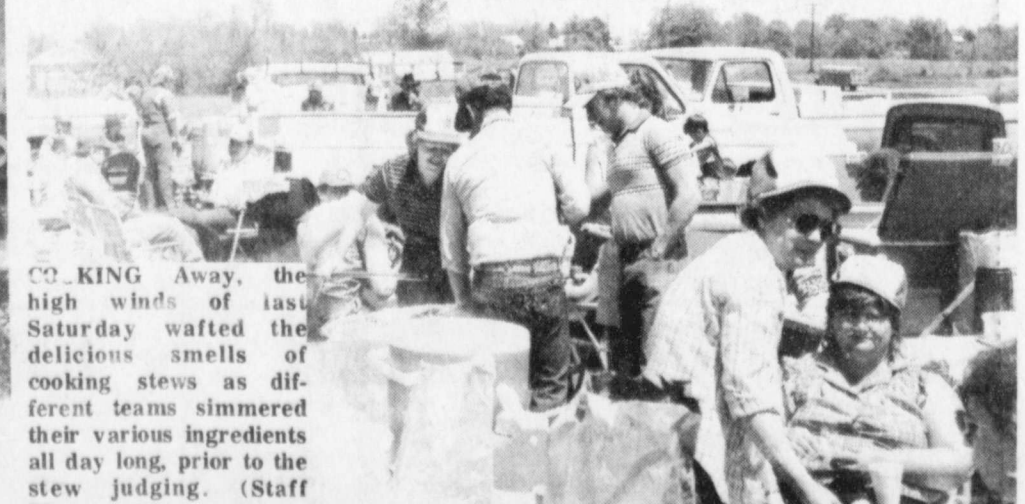

Steps To A Great Lawn

Use adapted grasses. Bluegrasses are favorites in the midwest. Common, Delta, Glade, Park, Adelphi, Baron, and Wabash bluegrass varieties may be blended for disease resistance and vigor. Perennial rye grass may be added for early growth. Red fescue also may be added for shady areas. Always buy seed which is free from weed seeds and has a high percentage of bluegrass within the mix. Zoysia grass may provide a dense cover on droughty soils in sunny areas. However, be aware that zoysia grass will turn brown as soon as cool weather approaches. Mow regularly at the correct height. At a 2-inch height, bluegrass lawns will withstand disease damage and weed competition better than if they are cut more closely.

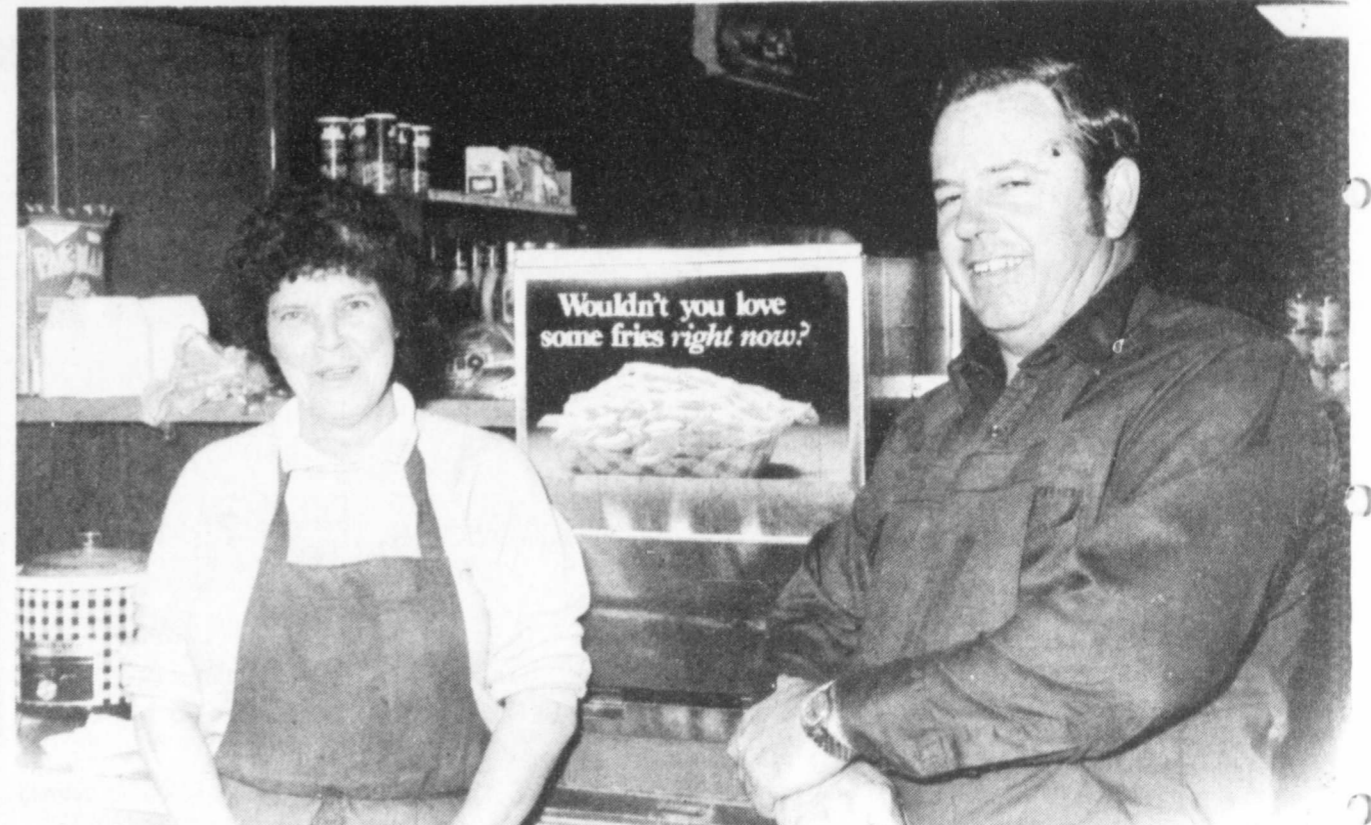

Methods For Decorating Eggs

With Easter just around the corner, I thought it would be interesting to investigate early methods of decorating eggs.

The first Easter trail Peter Cottontail hopped down was in Pennsylvania, and the first trip took place in 1728, long before commercial egg dyes became popular. Back then many Pennsylvania Dutch children used natural dyes from herbs and foods to dye the eggs that were then exchanged as tokens of good times to come.

This Easter your children might enjoy making their own dye as well as coloring the eggs. They might even learn something about the many uses of foodstuffs along the way. For softer, lighter shades, prepare the dye and strain it to remove the herbs, roots or foodstuff used to obtain the color. Then dip and turn pre-cooked eggs in the dye until you get a pretty shade. To create a deeper shade, simply make the dye and cook the eggs at the same time. Allowing the eggs to simmer for as long as 20 minutes reaches the deepest hues.

Another method of dyeing eggs is to wrap raw eggs in bits of the dye making plant and then tie them in cheesecloth. When the eggs are boiled the dye is transferred directly to the eggshell, leaving a unique mottled effect. Adding vinegar or alum to the dyeing mixture will increase the strength of the dye.

For yellow dye use chamomile tea or dandelion blossoms, pour boiling water over the tea blossoms, cover and let stand for half an hour. Strain the liquid and add a teaspoon of vinegar and the dye is ready.

Make gold dye by simmering two tablespoons of tumeric for 20 minutes. Add a teaspoon of vinegar before dyeing eggs. Since tumeric does not dissolve, the coloring will be slightly marbled.

A brass brown shade results from onion skins, even red onion skins. Place the skins in a pan of water and simmer until the desired shade is obtained. Strain the liquid and add a teaspoon of vinegar and the dye is ready.

Lavender blue eggs can be made with blueberries or grapes. Crush the berries or grapes by hand or in a blender. Add water and simmer for a few minutes. Strain the mixture and add a teaspoon of vinegar to complete the dye. Use a similar method to make robin egg blue from cabbage. Mint leaves will make pale green eggs. Pour boiling water over mint leaves, cover and let simmer for half an hour. Strain the mixture and add a teaspoon of vinegar to complete the dye.
