Patriots Out-Manuever Dogs

Strategy was the key word in last Friday night's football contest between the Prairiland Patriots and the Cooper Bulldogs.

The Patriots upped their record to 3 and 0, defeating the Bulldogs 28-6 on their home turf. What was supposed to be a close game turned out to be a blow-out based on two main events in the game.

The Patriots scored first on the bottom end of the first quarter, from the Bulldog's 11-yard line. Patriot quarterback Scott Scudder ran the option play for six points. Shawn Philpot quickly added the extra point, making it 7 to zip for the Pats with 1:18 left in the first quarter.

Two plays after the Patriots kicked off to the Bulldogs, the 'Dog's fumbled the ball away to the Patriots deep in Dog territory.

Scudder handed off to halfback Craig Burns, who blasted down to the Dog's 40-yard line. Mike Connot got the nod for a 3-yard gain. Craig Burns went for two more yards, but the Patriots were penalized for an illegal block, backing them up to the Cooper 13-yard line. Mike Connot and Anthony Whitley each carried down to the Cooper 6-yard line. With 4th and 6 yards to go, Scudder passed to tight end Joseph Whelchel for the TD. Again Shawn Philpot kicked the point after, making the score 14 to zip for the Patriots.

Cooper fought back with a touchdown of their own late in the half, but Patriot Eric Foster sent the point after kick astray leaving the Bulldogs with just six points. This could have been a very important play in the ballgame where the Patriots were picked by just two

points. It appeared the prophets might be right too, as the Patriots coughed up the ball almost immediately on their own 30-yard line.

The Bulldogs appeared to really make a game of it as they seemed to move the ball with ease for the first time in the game. A very alert Coach Allen called for what might have been the most important call of the game, time out!

After a very serious pep talk to his team, Allen sent his defense back to battle. The Bulldogs were not only contained on their next series, but backed up to the Patriot 25-yard line where the Patriots took over on downs. The game was over for the Bulldogs as they weren't able to secure any more points the remainder of the night. The first half ended 14 to 6 for the Patriots.

Prairiland's Craig Burns scored from 10-yards out for six more points with just over one minute left in the third quarter. Shawn Philpot, to keep a perfect record for the night, added the extra point, giving the Patriots a 21 to 6 lead.

The Patriots were not through yet, however, as on the next series, the Bulldogs tried a halfback pass only to have it intercepted by Patriot Mike Connot. The Patriots moved down to Cooper's 8-yard line where Mike Connot got the call for the final touchdown of the evening. Shawn Philpot drilled the uprights for the 28th point.

The Bulldogs tried unsuccessfully to sure for the remaining 10 minutes and 10 seconds of the game, but were unable to outmaneuver a very able Patriot defense.

Next week, it's homecoming against Pittsburg. Good luck team!

Congratulations to everyone that helped...thanks are due, and you deserve them!

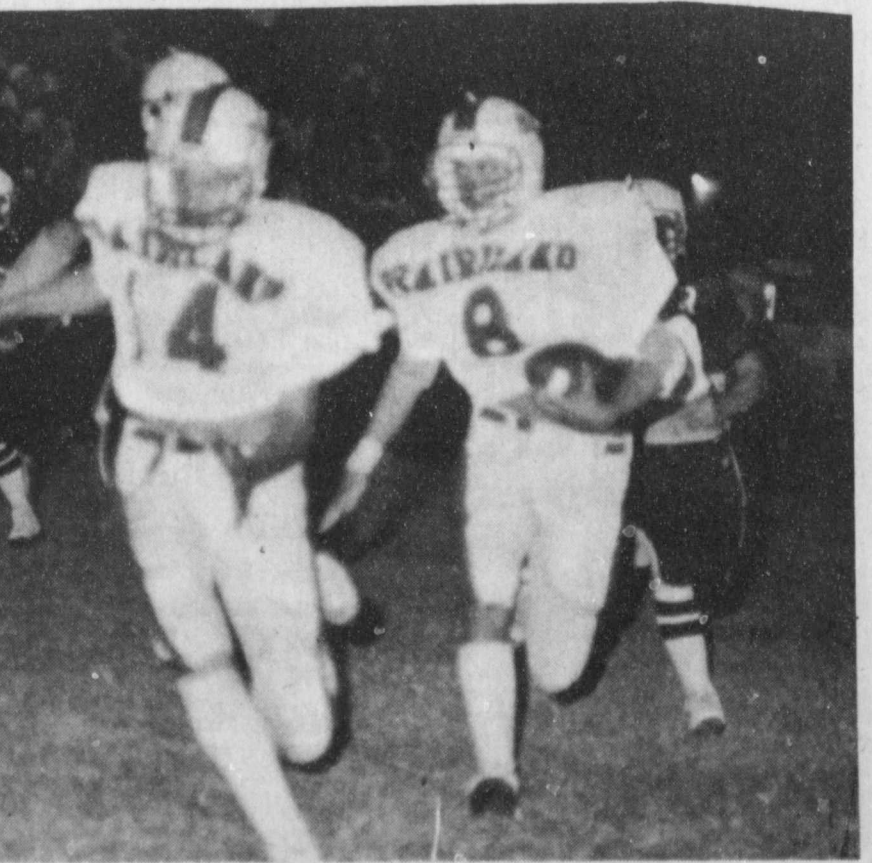
Exes Reception Sponsored

Detroit Church To Receive Historical Marker

A Texas Historical marker for the First Christian Church of Detroit will be unveiled and dedicated on Sunday, October 6 at 2 p.m.

On March 13, 1901, T.E. Griffis sold four and one-half lots to members for the purpose of building a church and a parsonage. The first pastor, A.H. Darnell, organized the church and started the building. The building was completed in the spring of 1902, soon after the town of Bennett Station became known as Detroit.

Early members of the church included members of the family of John Nance Garner, who served as vice-president of the United States from 1933-1941. Some members of the Garner family are still members of the church.

The First Christian Church is one of the oldest buildings still standing in Detroit. It has been in constant use as a church since its completion and

has had no changes made to the exterior.

Rev. V.O. Kyle, minister of the church, will preside at the unveiling. The invocation will be given by Rev. Kyle, followed by greetings given by Dale Miller, Mayor of Detroit and chairman of the board of the church. Mr. Miller will also recognize those who were responsible for the work and research for the marker. Rev. Raymond A. Armstrong, pastor of the First Christian Church of Paris will give the address. Mrs. Bettie E. Millikan, president of the Red River Historical Society, will give a history of the church. Mrs. Dorothy Van Dyke Breneman, whose father, Dr. J.L. Van Dyke, was one of the founders of the church, will unveil the marker.

The benediction given by Robert Giboney, a reception will be held in the Fellowship Hall of the church.

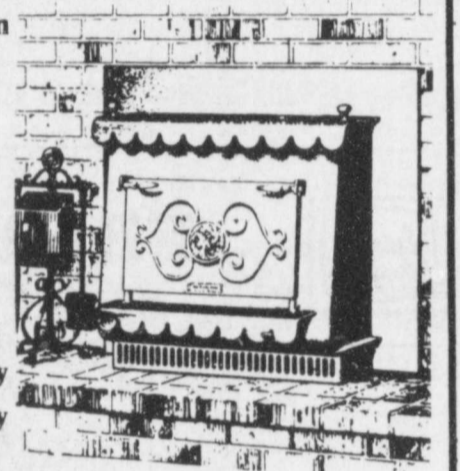
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Faber-Van Der Schaaf Exchange Wedding Vows

Mr. and Mrs. Edward Nowell were hosts for a dinner at Chisum on August 30 following the wedding rehearsal. Thirty-eight guests attended.



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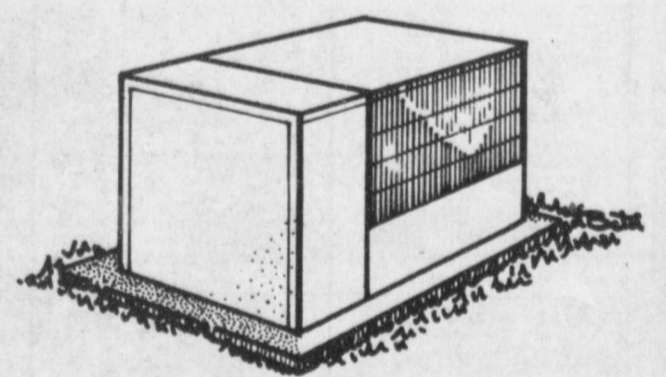

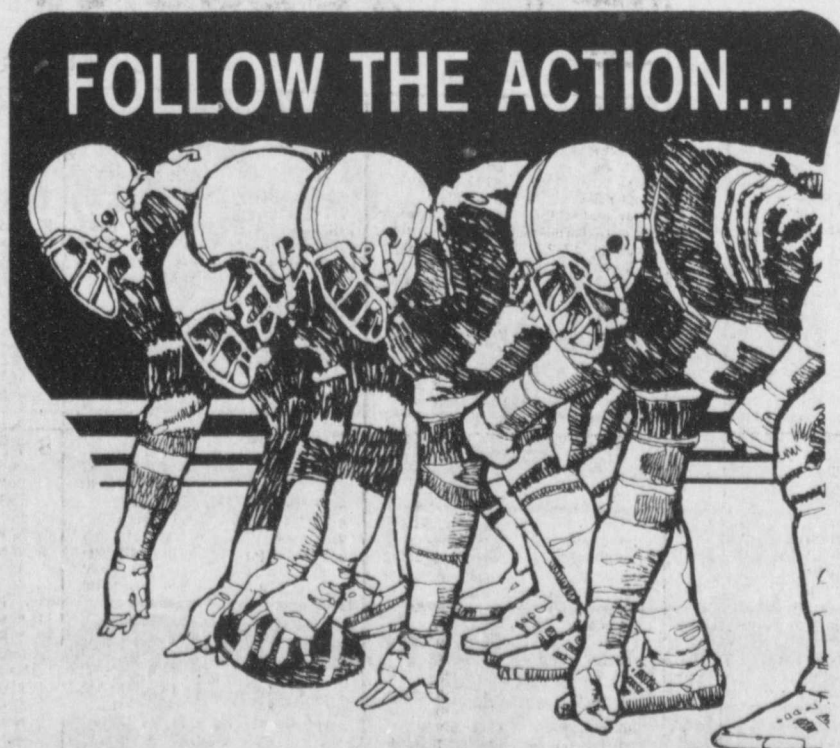

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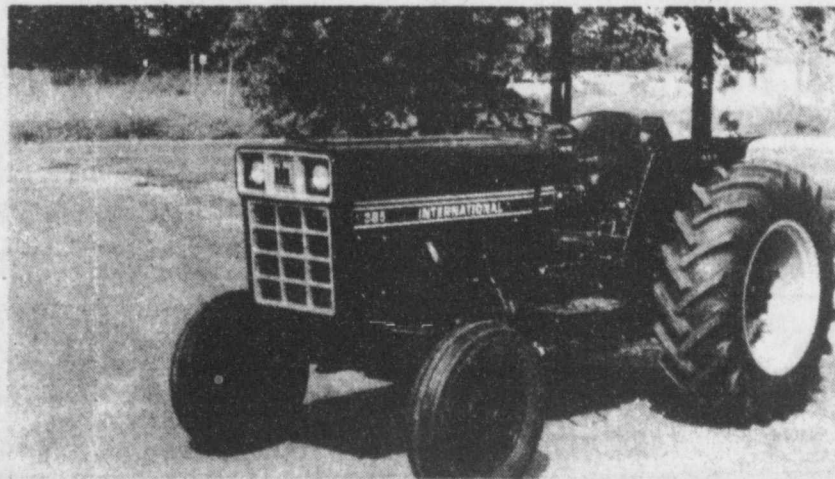


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Davidson, Skidmore, Scudder Collect Football Money

Keeping Healthy

Preventing Heart Attacks
Conclusive evidence that reducing elevated blood cholesterol with a cholesterol-lowering drug and diet can prevent heart attacks and death from heart disease was presented recently by the National Heart, Lung and Blood Institute (NHLBI). The study was the largest, longest and most closely monitored to date of cholesterol and its relationship to heart attacks. Directed and funded by the NHLBI at 12 U.S. medical centers, the Lipid Research Clinics Trial demonstrated that combining the cholesterol-lowering drug, cholestyramine (Questran), with a moderately low-fat diet, reduced heart attacks by almost 20%. The NHLBI scientists estimate that if Americans would reduce their blood cholesterol levels by 25%, this would eventually lead to a 50% reduction in the incidence of coronary heart disease. The study participants were 3,806 men between the ages of 35 and 59, but the NHLBI believes that the results are also applicable to both men and women of all

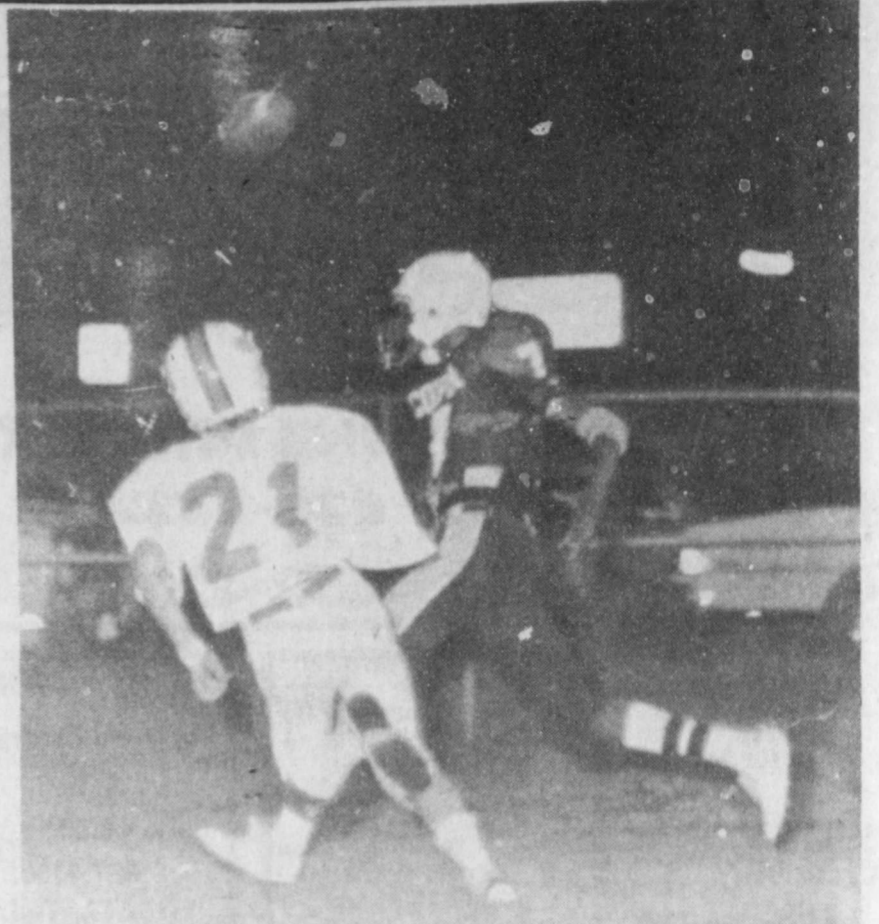
