being about average this year. The results of the 1980 drought and the last two winters' extreme cold are slowly disappearing on the meadows.

For some reason, autumn air always seems crisper and different than summer air! It always feels as if it is a traveler, stopping by from a different part of the world.

Summer's stifling heat always seems as if it is generated right on the

premises...and at the time seems to promise to never leave.

As usual, and with more abruptness than usual, summer has been defeated once more, and leaves are beginning to tumble down prior to the first frost.

In all probability, there will be some more warm weather, but thermometers will probably not see the

higher nineties any more this year. Another cold front is predicted for this weekend, so dusty stoves and empty wood heaters can look forward to some more usage to take the "edge off the chill" against Saturday and Sunday!

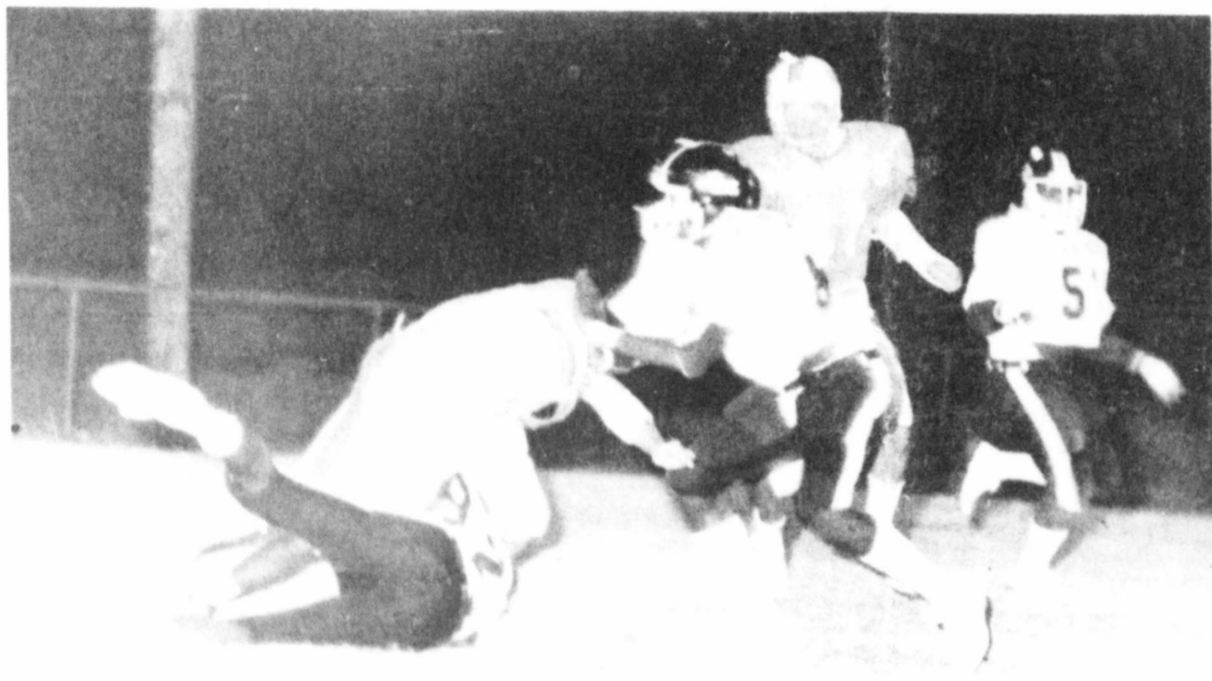

Patriots Slow Pirates Down But Lose 20-6

The Prairiland Patriots, thirty point underdogs by some prophets, fought to a valiant 20-6 loss at their own homecoming last Friday night.

A confident Pittsburg Pirate team found a much improved Patriot team over year's past.

The Patriots lost no time in putting points on the board. The Patriots kicked off to start the game on a breezy fall night. Four plays later, the Pirates fumbled the ball on their own 33-yard line. Quarterback Scott Scudder, on a Patriot first and ten from that spot, passed to Mike Connot for an easy TD. The P.A.T. was no good but with 9:39 left in the first quarter, the Patriots had a six point lead.

A fired up Patriot defense came right back to hold the Pirates to three plays and punt. This time, however, the Patriots were unable to move the ball for much gain, and they, too, had to punt the ball away.

The game became a battle of the defenses with both teams holding tough, not giving up much yardage until the beginning of the second quarter.

The Pirates were faced with a second down and 26 yards for a first down on the Patriot 10-yard line.

Pirate tailback Jimmy Stewart raced by everyone to tie the game at six. The P.A.T. was no good. With 11:54 in the second quarter, it was 6 to 6. Patriot's ball on their own 35-yard line, first and ten. The Patriots on a roll, it seemed, moved all the way down to the Pittsburg 32-yard line before turning the ball back to the Pirates.

The Patriot defense held until late in the second quarter, before Pirate Jimmy Stewart exploded for the go ahead TD. Again the P.A.T. failed, leaving the Pirates with a 12 to 6 lead. The half ended unchanged.

The third quarter started with the Patriot defense holding strong, but with just one minute and 51 seconds left, the Pirates scored from 34-yards out on a pitchout to tailback Jerry Jackson, for the final TD of the evening. This time, however, quarterback Ricky Crowder passed to tailback Jerry Jackson for the two point conversion, making the final score 20 to 6.

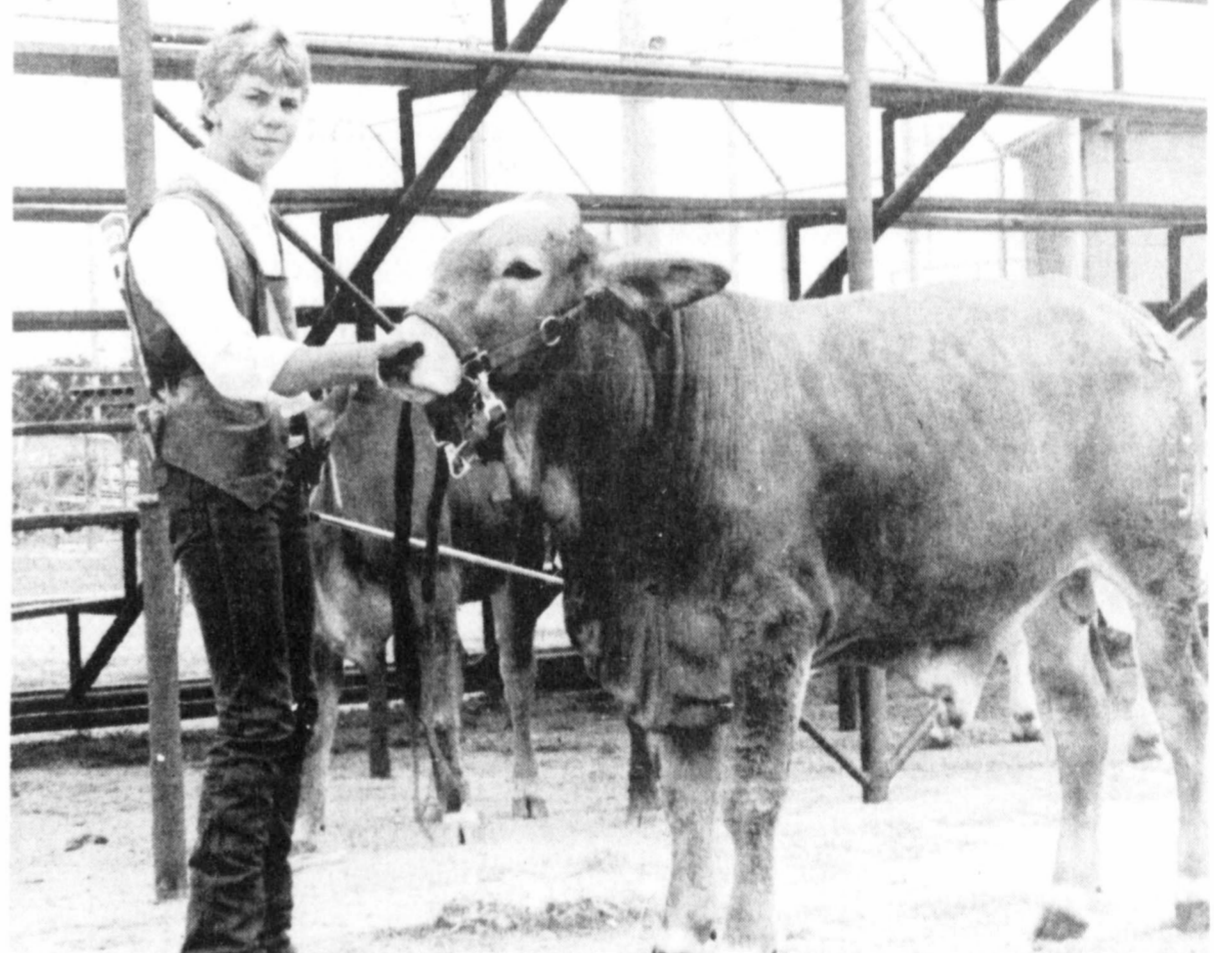

J. A. Underwood III Dies At Age 78

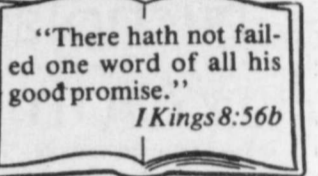
James Andrew (Jimmy) Underwood III, 78, of Bogata, died Sunday, September 29 in Red River General Hospital.
