

Area Agriculture Picture Not Improved

The agriculture picture in the area has not improved this year. In fact, conditions probably went the other way as unprofitable situations remain in virtually all agricultural enterprises.

Low prices for all commodities is the number one problem. Farmers and ranchers are caught in the middle of low prices for their products and an escalating cost for all of the supplies they purchase. To com-

plete that picture, producers have seen their collateral base shrink as real estate values have continued to drop. All of a sudden their land is not worth as much, and the lender is unable to loan as much to make a crop, etc., etc., etc.

The agricultural situation is a complicated one and there does not appear to be an easy solution to the situation. Little by little the farm bill is taking shape in Washington, but no big improvements are anticipated by

local agriculturalists.

One of the big problems is over production in this country and in other nations. This simply means low prices, to the producer. For years, our nation's best agricultural know how has been shared with other developing countries. They have utilized this knowledge and are now competing with the U.S. producer. Brazil is one such nation.

Not all producers are going broke even though a number in the area are

cutting back on the size of their operation. Some producers are working more off the farm and more and more wives have a job. Many property owners will have different tenants in 1986 and some will not have a center at all, as some farmers reduce the size of their operations.

1985 got off to a good start early summer as winter, spring and early summer rains were ideal for plant growth. In fact, too much fell in the early part of the year and reduced wheat yields

to the 20 and 30 bushel range.

Wet weather also delayed the spring planting of corn, grain sorghum and early maturing soybeans. However, all of these crops came on and produced average to above average production. A bumper hay crop was harvested this year and cattle will have a surplus of hay to chew on this winter. Even though the amount of hay was up over last year's production, the income from the crop will not be up as prices have remain-

ed weak throughout the year. In order for prices to be up, a drought in the five state area must occur. This did not happen in 1985.

As we close out 1985, we can apparently expect to see a continuation of dispersals, bankruptcies and retirements of farm producers. We will see fewer and fewer people involved in the production of agricultural products. Those with no debts or low overhead cost and utilizing smart farm management practices will be able to survive.

Take A Train Trip To Relax

Looking for a pleasant, relaxing weekend away from home? Try the Rusk-Palestine steam train, and perhaps add a night at the Thomas J. Rusk Hotel for a little added appeal.

Right now, with fall colors just beginning to throw their last fling, temperatures nearly perfect and winter coming on fast, is a good time to slow down the pace of life and ramble around. The train provides a way to do just that.

There are four completely restored locomotives in operation on the Texas State Railroad, which plies its way between Rusk and Palestine on Saturdays and Sundays during the fall, and into November.

They all look as if they had just rolled off an assembly line weeks ago instead of at the turn of the century.

The huge machines crouch on the silvery rails breathing with a life of their own. Steam pours into the cool air, the fire roars with intensity, and for those who have never seen a functioning steam locomotive, the opportunity to inspect one is a treat. Children are fascinated by the big engine, and the railroad personnel, clad in overalls and peaked caps, are friendly and helpful.

Loaded into the seven or eight cars, passengers find the old vehicles spotless and fairly comfortable. There is the usual all-aboard cry, and a long, heart-trembling blast on the whistle.

Then the rocking motion of the old-time train begins, lulling passengers into a state of relaxation bordering on sleep!

"Butcher boys" hawk soft drinks, chips, ice cream and souvenirs up and down the aisles. There are restrooms

available, and seats can be changed and the entire long conveyance explored while outside the open windows the woods roll by.

Meals of sandwiches can be obtained at the half-way point (either Rusk or Palestine, depending on which point you left from), but many experienced travelers bring picnic lunches, which are faster and less expensive. The sandwiches at the depot are fresh and good, however.

On the return run, the variety of trees passing by can be observed carefully. The run is one and one-half hours one way, with an hour to eat at the depot. The clicking rails and changing rhythms of the trestle bridges continue to be relaxing, and the dogwood, beauty berry and maples provide an ever-changing vista outside the widows.

After the journey, there are plenty of motels around Palestine to stay at, and in Rusk there is one motel and the hotel mentioned earlier.

The Thomas J. Rusk Hotel is inexpensive, restored and although the rooms are small, the atmosphere is pleasant.

The food in the dining rooms is excellent. Their biscuits are delicious, desserts fabulous.

The entire drive down through East Texas' piney woods is worthwhile by itself.

There are the Tyler Rose Gardens (the Rose Festival is this weekend) shopping, nurseries and vegetable stands, and flea markets to counterpoint the drive.

The trees are going to be at their peak soon, and the whole trip can make a relaxing, timeless weekend for young and old to enjoy.

Reservations for the train ride, and

more information about it, and local attractions, can be made by calling toll free 1-800-442-8951. The helpful staff there will also provide phone numbers for lodging, camping or area attractions.

Miss Edith Fuller discussed the Fellowship for the Least Coin, stating that in the 29 years of existence,

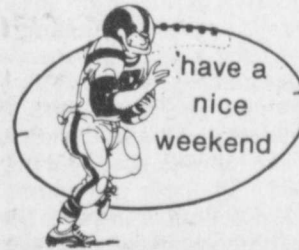
amazing sums of money have been given. One Least Coin, at a time, toward evangelism, relief and fellowship projects on six continents.

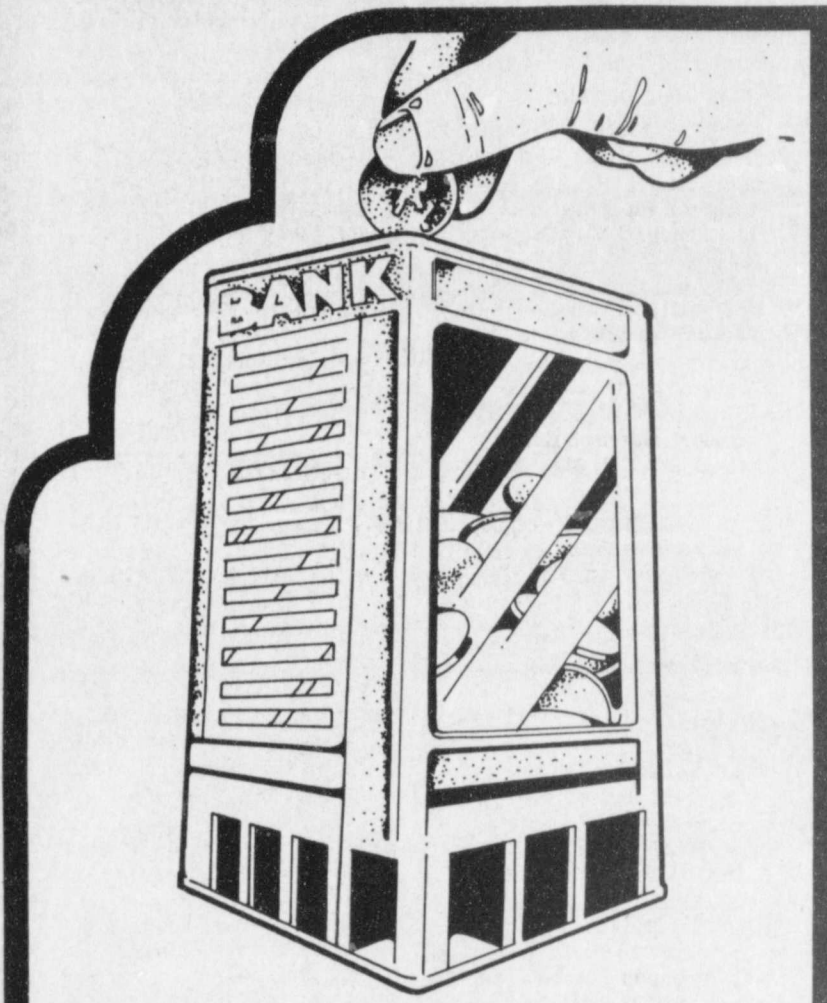

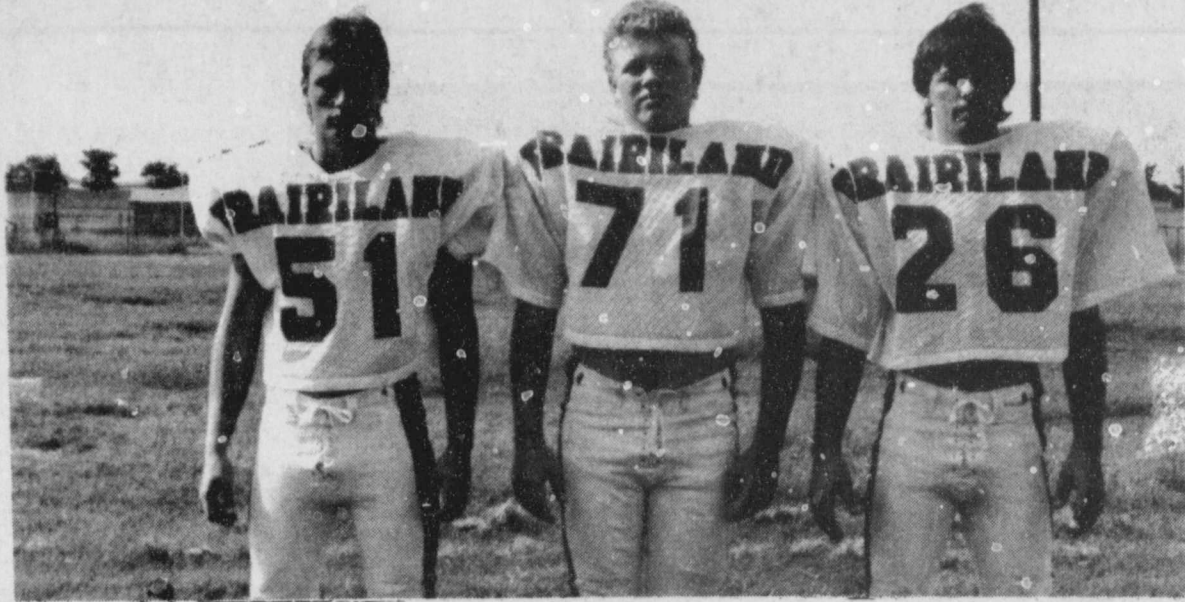

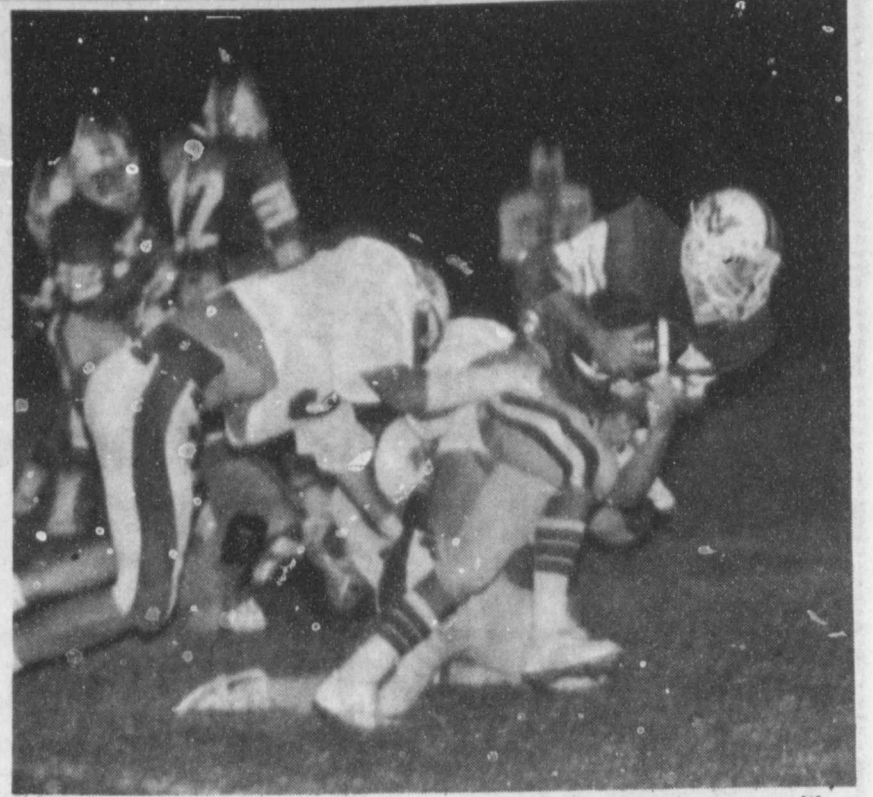
Pattonville Homemakers Meet
