

Most Area Sales Tax Shows Increase

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Friday sent checks totaling \$56.6 million in local sale tax to the 1,010 cities that levy the one-percent city tax.

Houston's check was the largest, \$9.1 million, bringing total payments in 1985 to \$123.4 million, up four percent over 1984. Dallas received \$6.9 million for a total of \$91.2 million in

total payments for this year, an increase of 13 percent.

San Antonio's payment of \$3.5 million increased that city's 1985 payments to \$45.3 million, up 13 percent over last year. Austin's check for \$2.8 million pushed payments to \$35.8 million, a 20 percent increase over 1984 payments.

Fort Worth received \$2.1 million for a 1985 total of \$27.4 million, up 10 percent. El Paso's payment of \$1.3 million brought its total to \$16.9 million, a 14 percent increase over payments last year.

October checks represent taxes collected on sales made in August and reported to the Comptroller by

September 20.

Locally, Blossom received \$960.77, for a yearly total of \$11,207.89 for a 12.94 percent increase.

Deport received \$728.02, for a yearly total of \$8,065.60 for a 13.90 percent increase over 1984.

Paris received \$126,873.86 for an 8.01 percent increase over last year.

Bogata received \$1,622.01 for a yearly total of \$19,637.00, marking a 7.65 percent increase from last year. Clarksville received \$11,535.93 for a 2.78 percent increase.

Detroit received \$713.71 for a 41.09 percent increase over last year's payment of \$586.65.

Mt. Pleasant received \$68,410.29 for

a 5.71 percent increase over the 1984 payments to date.

Talco received a check for \$1,540.15, bringing their 1985 total to \$19,159.66 for a 0.67 percent increase over the 1984 payments to date for the same period.

Pattonville Youngster Dies In Accident

A Pattonville man and his son are reported doing better, while another son is dead after a two-vehicle traffic accident near Bonham last Thursday.

Kevin Craig, age 7, was pronounced dead on arrival at Fannin County Hospital.

Kenneth Craig, age 45, and son Kaleb, age 5, were transferred from Fannin County Hospital to Wilson N.

Jones Hospital in Sherman after the accident. Both were in the intensive care unit, but were showing some signs of improvement.

The mother of the two oys, Linda and David Craig, age 21, a nephew, were treated and released at Fannin County Hospital. Robert Allen, 19, of Bonham was the driver of the other vehicle involved in the accident. Allen was eastbound in a 1974

Cadillac, and according to DPS Officials, had gone into the wrong lane, striking the Craig car. He allegedly drove from the scene of the collision, and was arrested about 5:00 a.m. at his home, and charged with a felony count of failure to stop and render aid and involuntary manslaughter.

The Craigs were all residents of Rt. 1, Pattonville.

Dismal Night Against Daingerfield

The Prairiland Patriots were rained out on last Friday night by the elements, and, more simply, by 7th ranked state hopeful Daingerfield Tigers, by a score of 34 to 6.

The Patriots were held scoreless for the first half, but played through, hard hitting football on offense and defense in the rain and mud all night long.

The Tigers struck first late in the first quarter from the fifty yard line. Tailback Johnie Hurdon, a 160 pound Senior from the Tigers, felled to the right side of the field to find clear sailing all the way for the six points. The Patriots luck seemed to run out however, and Tigers Johnie Huanđen streaks in the end zone from the Patriot 14 yard line for six more points with 3 minutes, 35 seconds in the first half to play. The point after attempt was no good and the Tigers led the contest 12 to ZIP.

The third quarter action started to the Patriots advantage. Halfback Craig Burns playing special team returned the Tigers kick-off eighty plus yards for the Patriots six points of the evening. The point after attempt was no good leaving the score twenty to six in the Tigers favor.

A few penalties and fumbles later, for both teams, the Tigers tacked on six more points from the Patriot forty yard line. Patriot Richard Eatherly blocked the point after attempt and the Tigers lead 26 to 6.

The Tigers went on to drop Patriot quarterback Scott Scudder for a safety with 4 minutes, 15 seconds left in the game to raise their lead to 28 to 6.

With just over 3 minutes left in the game, Tiger quarterback Gregg Evans escaped a wall of Patriot defenders to end the score with six more points to raise the score to a grand total of 34 to 6.

The 5 and 2 Patriots will host DeKalb at Patriot field next week looking for their sixth win this year. GOOD LUCK TEAM!!!

Burglars Take Cigarettes, Lighters From Grocery

Burglars used bolt cutters to shear the lock from the door of Frank Rhoades Grocery on Hwy. 271 in Deport Monday night or early Tuesday morning.

Once inside they used large cardboard boxes, which they unloaded in the storeroom, to pack out cigarettes and cigarettes lighters which Rhoades estimated to be between \$700 and \$900 in value. Loose cigarettes were packed into paper bags.

Rhoades says that the meat locker door had been tampered with, but was apparently frozen shut tight enough that they didn't gain entry into it.

The Lamar County Sheriff's Department has the matter under investigation at this time.

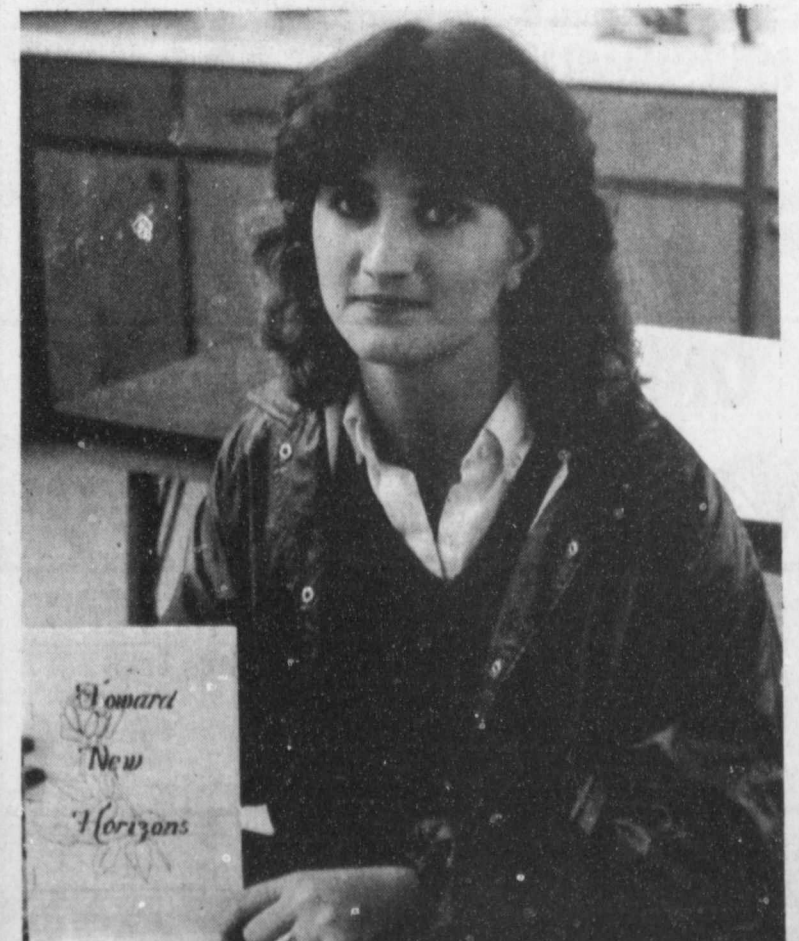
Lamar County Court Docket

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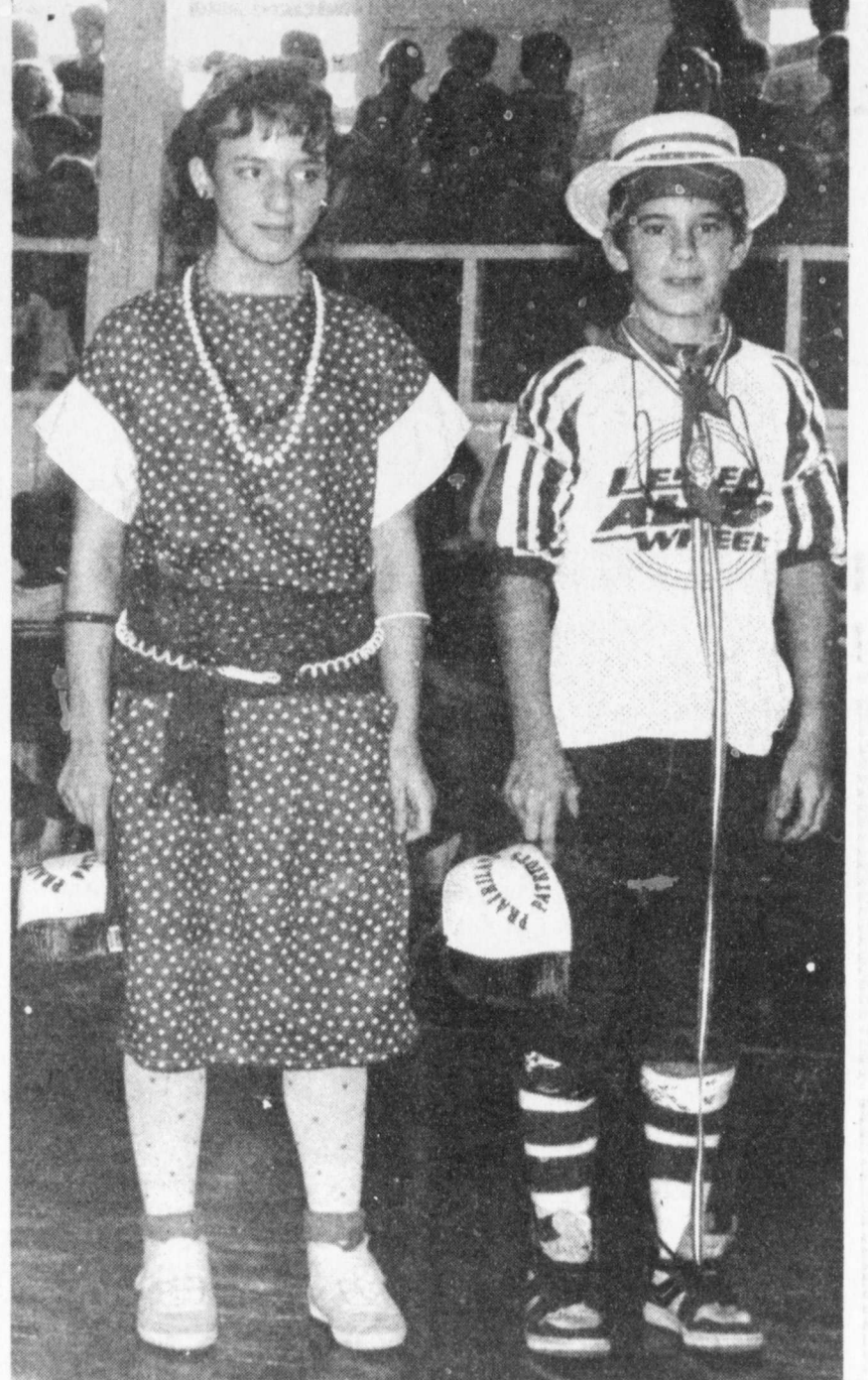
