## Prairiland Loses To Dekalb 21 - 15

Last Friday night's football game at Prairiland was like two ballgames in one, with the DeKalb Bears serving the most points in their game, beating the Patriots 21 to 15.

The Patriots opened the game strong and impressive, but couldn't "buy" points until late in the second quarter.

Three times the Patriots had the ball inside the 20-yard line, but just couldn't carry the pig into the endzone.

The Bears however, had racked up 13 points with over nine minutes to play in the first half.

The Patriots cursed by fumbles, coughed up the ball on their own 30-yard line to set up yet another TD for the Bears just over three minutes later. It was the Bears' ball on the Patriot 15-yard line. Quarterback

Juan McCullough passed to Eric House for the six points. The score stood at 19 to zip! McCullough hit Mike Dvis for the two point conversion.

On the next series, however, the Patriots got the game rolling by running two minutes off the old clock, and quarterback Scott Scudder broke the endzone barrier from the Bears' six yard line for the Patriots' first points of the game. Patriot kicker Shawn Philpot drilled the uprights for the extra point ending the half, 7 to 21.

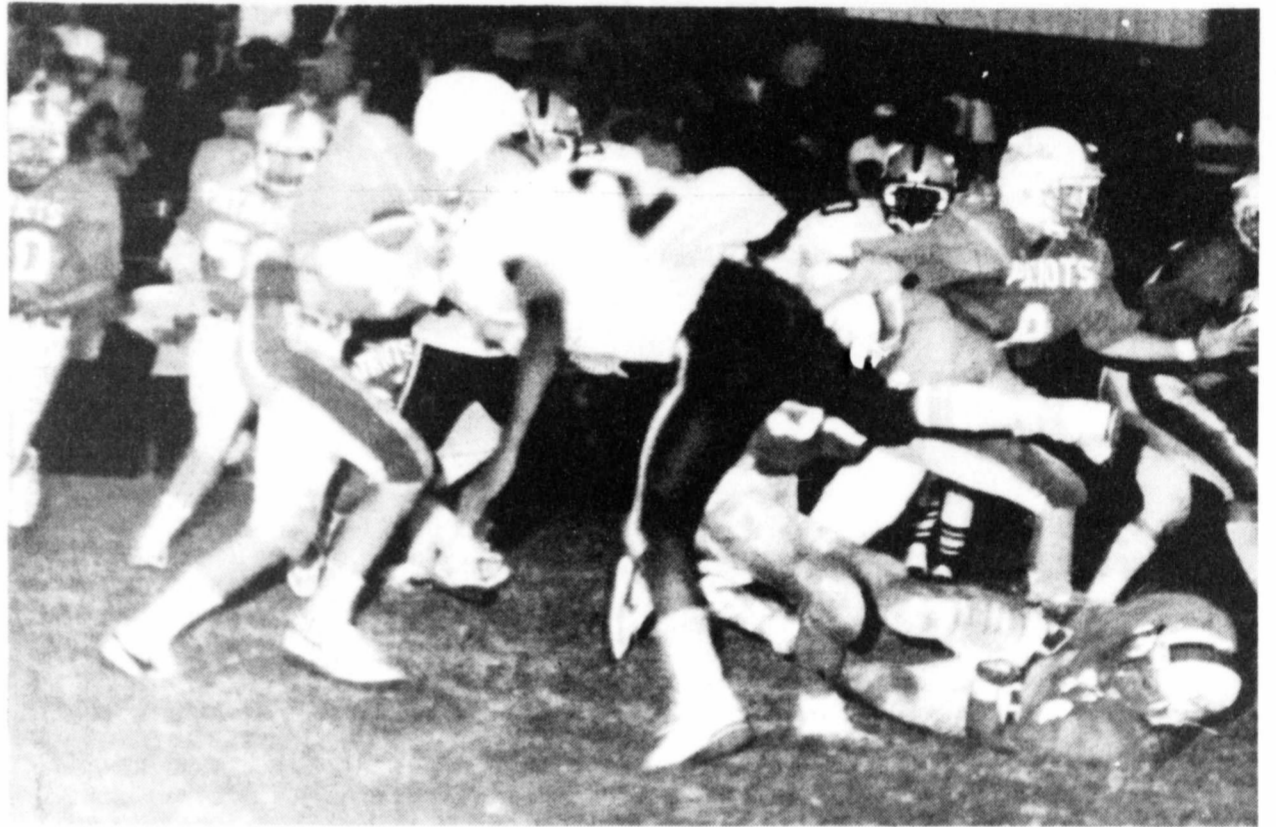
The Patriot defense was awesome for the remainder of the evening, refusing the Bears any points.

The Patriot offense fought back with nine more points, with a 22-yard pass from Scudder to Jeff Morrison for the TD with less than two minutes to play in the game. Halfback Craig Burns carried the pig over for the two point conversion.

The Bears grateful for the clock ticking in their favor, were content to

just let time expire giving them the edge 21 to 15.

## Bomb Threat Proves Hoax

Last Friday, someone with a rather warped sense of humour apparently decided to indulge in it by calling in bomb threats to Prairiland schools.

The call, made by a male voice, came in to the Prairiland High School during the morning, and a voice simply stated that the building had to be evacuated within eight and a half minutes because a bomb would go off.

At almost the same time, a call was received at Blossom Elementary School, stating that there were eight minutes and forty-five seconds before

a bomb would go off there.

Both buildings were evacuated in a quiet and orderly manner, according to procedures, and the Lamar County Sheriff's deputies came out.

After thoroughly checking the campuses, no bomb was found, and students were allowed to return to their classes.

No reason for the bomb threats has been discovered.

Superintendent Leslie H. Taylor stated that "we are looking into ways in which these calls can be stopped".

## Patriots JV Drops One To Bears

The Patriot JV lost a heartbreaker Thursday night as the DeKalb Bears fought back from a 7-0 defeat to take an 8-7 win.

The Patriots scored quickly as Steven Johnson carried four times for 31 yards and set up the Patriots only score of the night. Cary Bordon carried it in from 37 yards out on a reverse play to give the Pats a 6-0 lead. Jack Kindle's extra point with 3:47 left in the first stanza put the tally at 7-0.

The stubborn Patriot defense held and the offense was on the move again. Johnson again had large running gains and the Pats had driven down to the DeKalb 42 yard line. The drive was stopped abruptly as the Bear secondary picked off a pass from QB Martin Babb and returned it to the 47 yard line. The Bears were threatening as they converted two fourth down plays into first downs and were inside the Patriot 15, but on fourth and three from the 12 yard line, the Pats held strong and repelled the Bears, forcing them to relinquish possession of the ball. The clock ran out and the Patriots lead still held up at the half.

The Bears must have had a good Jim Wacker type of pep talk at half time, because when they emerged from the dressing room, they were ready to play ball. The Bears took possession at the 35 yard line, follow-

ing the Patriot kickoff and proceeded to drive the length of the field as the defense weakened. The Bears punched it in to close the gap to 7-6. The Bears then gambled as they opted to go for the two point conversion. The gamble paid off and the Bears took the lead for the first time.

The final quarter and a half was filled with turnovers by both teams. DeKalb committed the first of three Bear turnovers as a pass on second down found its way into the arms of Patriot Wade Sparks. The Patriots couldn't capitalize on the Bears misfortune and DeKalb reclaimed possession of the ball, only to be stopped by the Patriot "D".

The game then got messy as the Bears turned the ball over to the Pats only to have it returned to them via a pick-off of another Babb pass. The Bears really didn't want the ball, so they fumbled it back to the Patriots with 1:02 left in the game. The Patriots final hopes were dashed as the final play of the game ended, fittingly enough, on a DeKalb interception thus preserving the 8-7 Bear victory.

The Patriots played well but three costly turnovers in the final period proved too large of a burden.

The Patriot JV will have a week of rest next week due to Paul Pewitt not having a junior varsity team. The Patriots will meet North Lamar on November 7 in their final game of the season.

**Ink Stains**  
Some permanent ink cannot be removed. But first try running cold water through the stain until no more color is being removed. Rub in lemon juice and detergent. Let stand five minutes, then launder. If stain persists, spread paste of baking soda and hydrogen peroxide on stain and hold over steam from tea kettle. If yellow stain remains, use oxalic acid.

**4-H Shows Upcoming**

By John R. Senter

There are several junior shows scheduled between now and the end of November. I have tried to condense all the important information for each one in the following list. If any more come up any changes need to be made, we will let you know.

LaPoyner: November 9. The show will be held at the rodeo arena behind the high school. Check in time is 7 a.m. Entry fee is \$5 per head.

Dairy cattle, breeding beef cattle, steers, rabbits will be shown. Ages will be determined as of November 1, 1985 for dairy and breeding beef. Dairy males are not eligible. Females

do not have to be registered. In the breeding beef cattle show, all non-registered animals will show in other breeds so take your registration papers. No age limit on heifers but bulls have a 30 month age limit. Steers will be weighed and divided as evenly as possible into three classes.

Rabbits: all breeds show together and there is no limit to the number of entries. Classes will be held for bucks, does and doe and litter. There will be showmanship classes for under 14 beef and dairy; 14 and over beef and dairy and adult showmanship. Steers will weigh on from 7 a.m. to 9 a.m. The show will start at 10 a.m. with dairy cattle.

E.T. at Greenville: November 16. Check in is 8:30 a.m. to 9:30 a.m. the 16th. There will be classes for beef heifers, breeding, sheep, dairy females, market lambs and steers, no bulls.

Health and registration papers will be required according to what rules we have. Entry fees before November 8 will be \$3 per head in sheep and \$5 in cattle. Entries the day of the show will be \$5 for sheep and \$7 per head for cattle.

**Time To Plan Winter Feeding**

The time to plan wintering feeding is before winter sets in, says Dr. Sim A. Reeves, Jr., agronomist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Hay costs can be greatly reduced by proper feeding of hay and the use of appropriate equipment.

Large round bales should be fed in a ring designed for feeding hay. As much as 20 to 30 percent savings can be realized by using the feeding rings. The feeding area should be located on a high spot so that water will not stand under the hay.

Reeves suggests feeding hay stored outside first. Hay stored inside will maintain quality much longer than hay exposed to the weather.

The lowest quality hay should be fed at the beginning of the feeding season and the highest quality hay fed to cows just before and after calving. If the cattle are separated according to nutritional needs, the hay can be better utilized. Do not waste high quality hay on animals that can get by just as well on lower quality hay.

Reeves also suggests that a savings can be realized by reeding only enough hay to last one or two days at a time. If enough hay is put out to last a week, the losses are much greater.

**Halloween Needs Some Safety Precautions**

As the October onslaught of Ghastly ghosts, terrible trolls and startling skeletons approaches, Texas Safety Association suggests sensible precautions to keep Halloween happy and safe for your children and home.

"When in doubt, throw it out," advises George Gustafson, Executive Vice-President of TSA, when discussing Halloween treats. "If a food or candy item has no wrapping, or the covering is loose or torn, discard it. Wash and slice fruit before allowing your child to eat it. Concerned and considerate treat-givers might help by providing non-food items, such as pennies or nickels, snack food coupons or bright decals for the children's school binders," he adds.

Common sense and prior planning play a big part in assuring your youngsters' safety and enjoyment, while still allowing them the thrills of this fall celebration. A few suggestions include:

-Pre-planning the route, staying in familiar neighborhoods and only visiting homes that show the trick-or-treat signal of a lighted porch or yard.

-An older teenager or adult should accompany young children on their journeys. Older children walking their route with friends need to thoroughly discuss safety rules with parents beforehand.

-Set time limits for their travels. Some communities designate Halloween treating hours. Also, take into account that Halloween falls on a week night this year, which means that the costumed imps and aliens turn back into students early the next morning.

-Costumes and masks should not restrict movement or eyesight, or trail on the ground. Face paint or normal make-up products can provide frightening effects while allowing freedom of sight. Use lots of light colors in costumes, or reflective tape, and pass out plenty of flashlights. Dark of night adds to the thrill of the celebration, but hides the dangers of curbs, stones, and cracked sidewalks.

-Make certain your yard, driveway, porch and sidewalks are free of obstructions if you are handing out treats to the tiny revelers. If you're driving, take extra care to watch for small, ghostly pedestrians.

"Remember to check your local newspaper for holiday activities," Gustafson adds. "Group activities at organization-sponsored haunted houses, recreation center parties or neighborhood celebrations often offer a fun-filled alternative to the traditional Halloween trek."
