Time To Plan Winter Feeding The time to plan wintering feeding
is before winter sets in, says Dr. Sim A. Reeves, Jr., agronomist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Hay costs can be greatly reduc-
ed by proper feeding of hay and the use of appropringte equipment.
Large round bales should be fed in a ring designed for feeding hay. As
much as 20 to 30 pern me realized by using the feeding rings. The feeding area should bee located on

outside firs. outside first. Hay stored inside will hay exposed to the weather
The lowest fed at the beginniing of the feeding
season and the highest season and the highest quality hay fed

If the cattle are separated according to nutritional needs, the hay can be
better utilized better utilized. Do not waste high
quality hay on animals that can get quality hay on animals that can get
by just as well on lower quality hay. Reeves also sungests that a savings
can be realized by reeding only enough hay to last one reer twing onday at
a time. If enough hay is put out to last a week, the losses are much greater.
