

Board Works Toward Blossom Rebuilding

The Prairiland School Board took several actions Monday night to help get the Blossom Elementary School campus back to normal as quickly as possible. The meeting was designated an emergency session concerning the Blossom Campus.

The two-story main building, heavily damaged by fire on November 3, is being rebuilt and remodeled while

classes continue in the gymnasium and other areas of the campus.

The board placed Max Ballard as coordinator of the rebuilding so that he could deal with contractors and speed up the work with a minimum of disruption. Rebuilding is already underway at the building.

The board went into executive session and put the two juveniles accus-

ed of setting the fires, which damaged the school, into a ten-day program at a special assignment center in Paris. According to Assistant Superintendent Richard Nash, the school has now taken all the action it can, within the new laws set by the state. Further action by the courts may be taken later.

The school board made a note of

commendation to all the teachers and students at Blossom, who had "really pitched in to help get things back on the track after the fire". Students have been involved cleaning up smoke damage, and both teachers and students have worked hard to continue the educational process under adverse conditions.

Board policies were adopted to con-

form with State of Texas House Bill 72.

The annual performance report was approved, and Daphne Downs, the school counselor, was put on a twelve month contract. She had previously been on an eleven month contract.

The board gave the go-ahead to extend the present administration

building in order to provide additional space to house the new computer system.

They also set the fees for renting the Blossom and Deport gymnasiums at \$25.00.

Minutes were read and approved, as was the financial report.

They also voted to cast their 180 votes for David Lindsey to be placed on the appraisal board.

Where do they go, the herons, rails, coots and mud hens?

As birds, they cannot be sleeping in the mud like the turtles and frogs. Therefore, since they were fishing the last of summer's minnows out of the pool only a week ago, and now are gone, they must be migrating.

But they don't migrate in huge flocks. Their harsh, croaking cries don't fill the night as do the sad sounds of wandering geese or ducks.

They, like the incredible hummingbird which migrates over thousands of miles, and much open water, must go alone.

It's strange to think of them, and the other summer birds, which we take for granted, going to live in some warmer, kinder place for the winter.

The field larks, hawks and scissor-tails, thrashers and blackbirds all move along some mystic, marvelous path to and from places most of us have never seen.

Even the beautiful butterflies which grace our lands for a few weeks, are going to Mexico!

Also, strange to consider, is that blackbirds, considered ravenous hoards that damage crops here, are considered favorite, privileged songbirds up north!

For many birds, this is the south. They winter here, away from the harsher, bitter winters of the north. Geese feed on wheat and water weeds, ducks too, enjoy the sanctuary of our winters.

And of course, there are so many birds that will flock to feeders during winter. The brilliant cardinal, goldfinches and the list is long.

Through it all, the lowly sparrow is to be seen, scrambling for food on frozen ground or in the mud, indomitable and persistent.

But sometimes now, sitting on the porch in the dark, I hear a flock of geese going over, secure in their V-shaped numbers, and wonder...where are those herons, cranes and coots? What lonely, unnoticed trek do they make, somewhere out there, in the dark? Like humans, birds are different in their souls...and the variety is endless.

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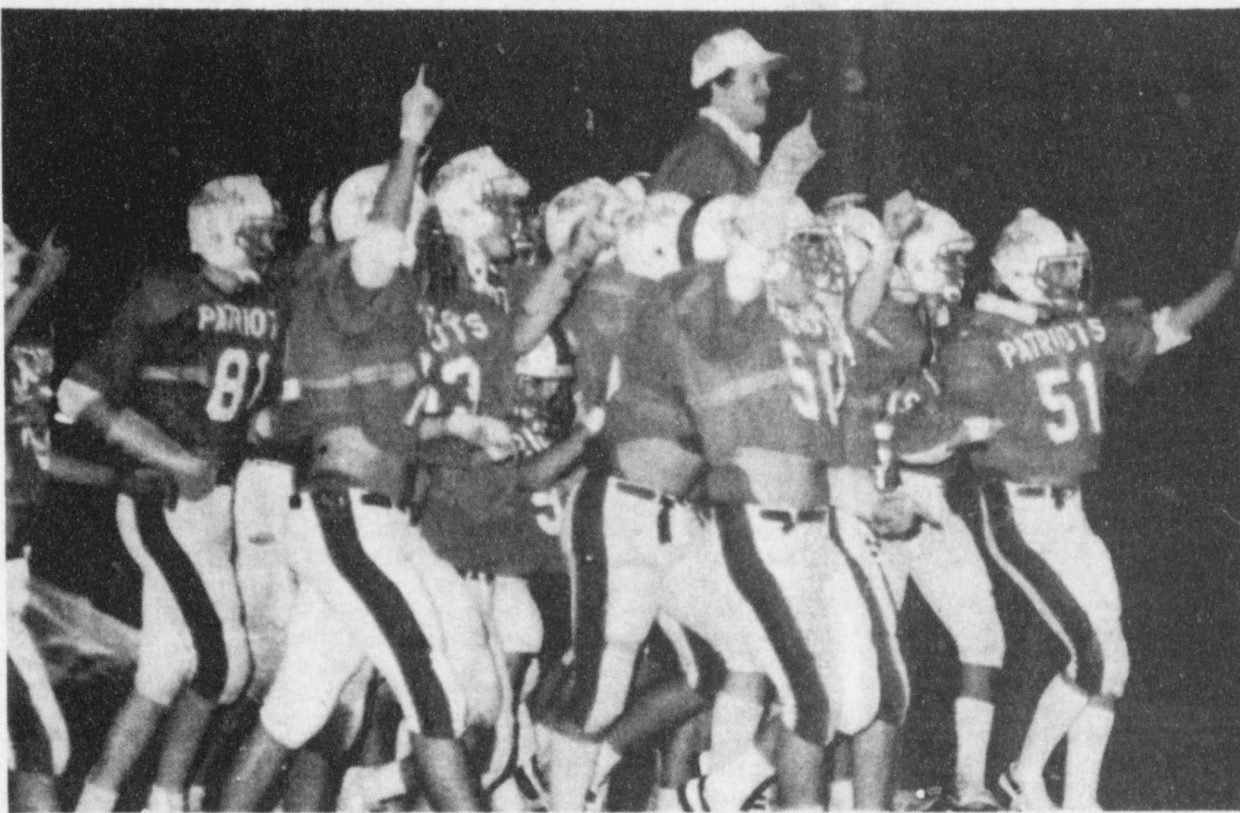

Patriots Give Panthers "Licking" 21-6

Records are made to be broken they say, and the Prairiland Patriots broke the old record of never beating the North Lamar Panthers last Friday night at Patonville, 21 to 6.

The anxious Panthers were determined to beat their Lamar County rivals from the very start. The first three plays of the game resulted in penalties against the Panthers. What started as a first and ten at their own 44-yard line ended back at their own 18-yard line for the North Lamar Panthers.

The Panthers six points came on a spectacular play from their own 41-yard line. Faced with a third and nine for the first and ten to go on a Hail Mary pass, quarterback Craig Jones hit Craig Fleming inside the Patriot 10-yard line.

It took the Panthers three plays to go the short distance for paydirt. Quarterback Craig Jones carried the pig for six points, eight minutes and 35 seconds short of the first quarter of the game. However, the point after failed and the Panthers fought back with some good attempts, but they were no match for a much better Patriot team.

With just over three minutes from the end of the first quarter, the Panthers fumbled the ball on their own eight yard line and the Patriots took over from there to set up their first score of the night. Patriot Mike Connot made a quick journey of the eight yards to the goal line to tie the game, six all.

Place kicker Shawn Philpot split

the goal posts to put the Patriots on top for good.

The second quarter started with a big rush on Panther Craig Jones at the Patriot 21-yard line. The pressure was too much and Jones rushed his pass. Scott Scudder made the interception for the Patriots on their own 15-yard line. The Panthers were penalized for spearing and the Patriots had first and ten close to the 32-yard line.

Patriots Scott Scudder, Craig Burns, Mike Connot and Ronnie Bridges did an excellent job of moving the ball all the way for six more points with Mike Connot making the final march.

Shawn Philpot tacked on the extra point and the Patriots lead 14 to 6 with just over four minutes left in the half.

The half ended 14 to 6 for the Patriots. The Panthers completely dominated by a fired up Patriot team, watched the Patriots take up where they left off in the second quarter to continue through the third quarter.

With just over three minutes in the third quarter, the Patriots marched 80 yards in six plays with big Ronnie Bridges carrying the pigskin over for six more points.

Shawn Philpot, to keep a perfect record on the evening, drilled the uprights for the final score of the evening and the Patriots led 21 to 6.

The Patriots ended their season with a six and four record, the best record ever compiled at Prairiland.

Congratulations to the whole team of 1985 and head coach Mike Allen and his entire coaching staff for a job well done.

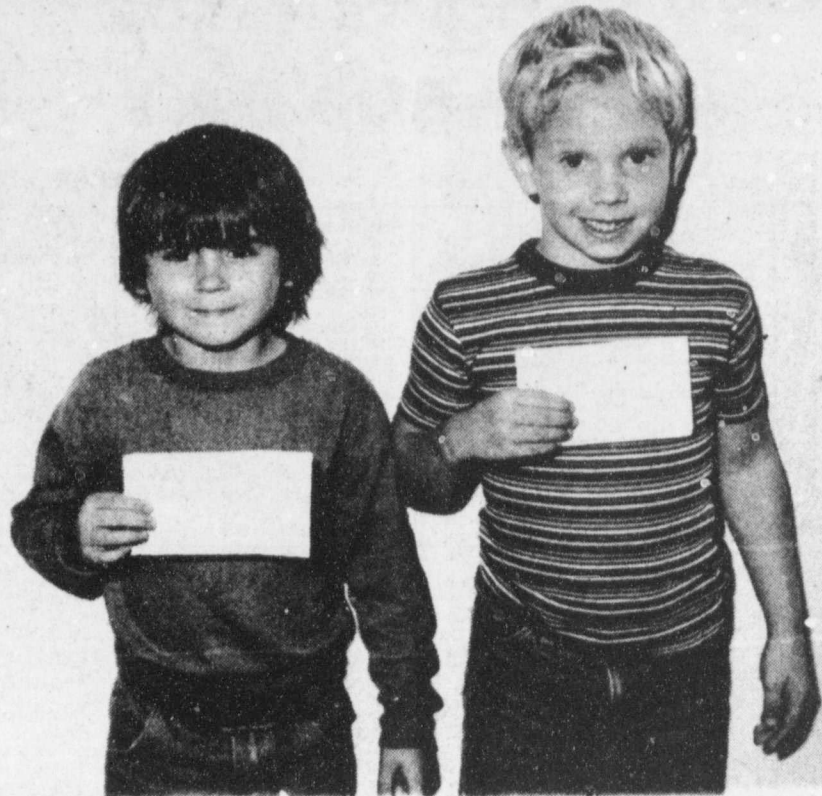

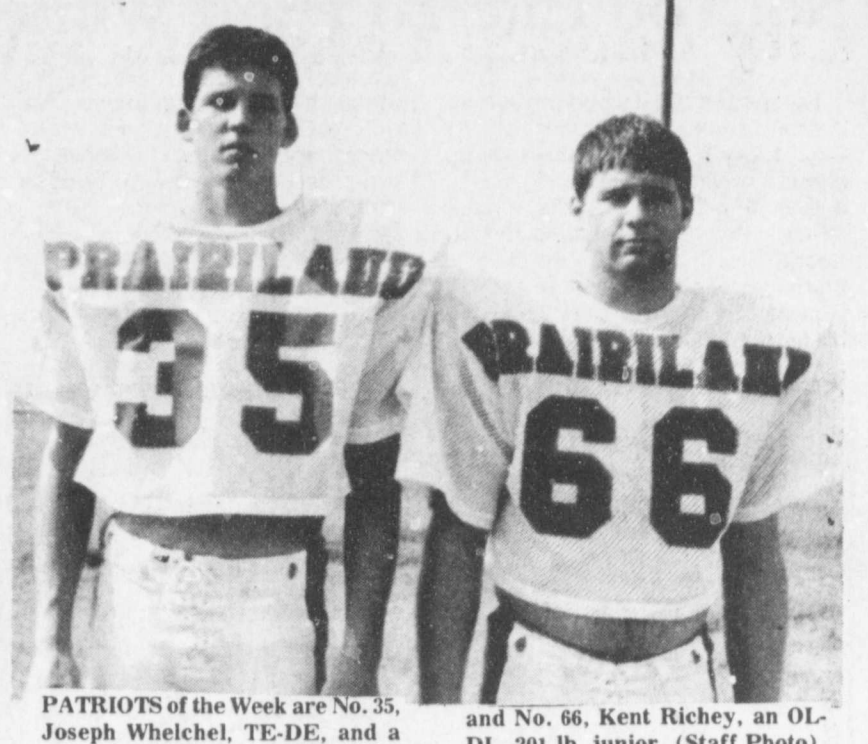

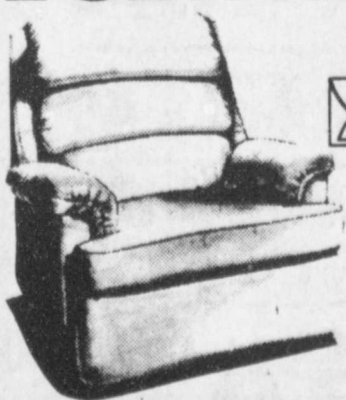
