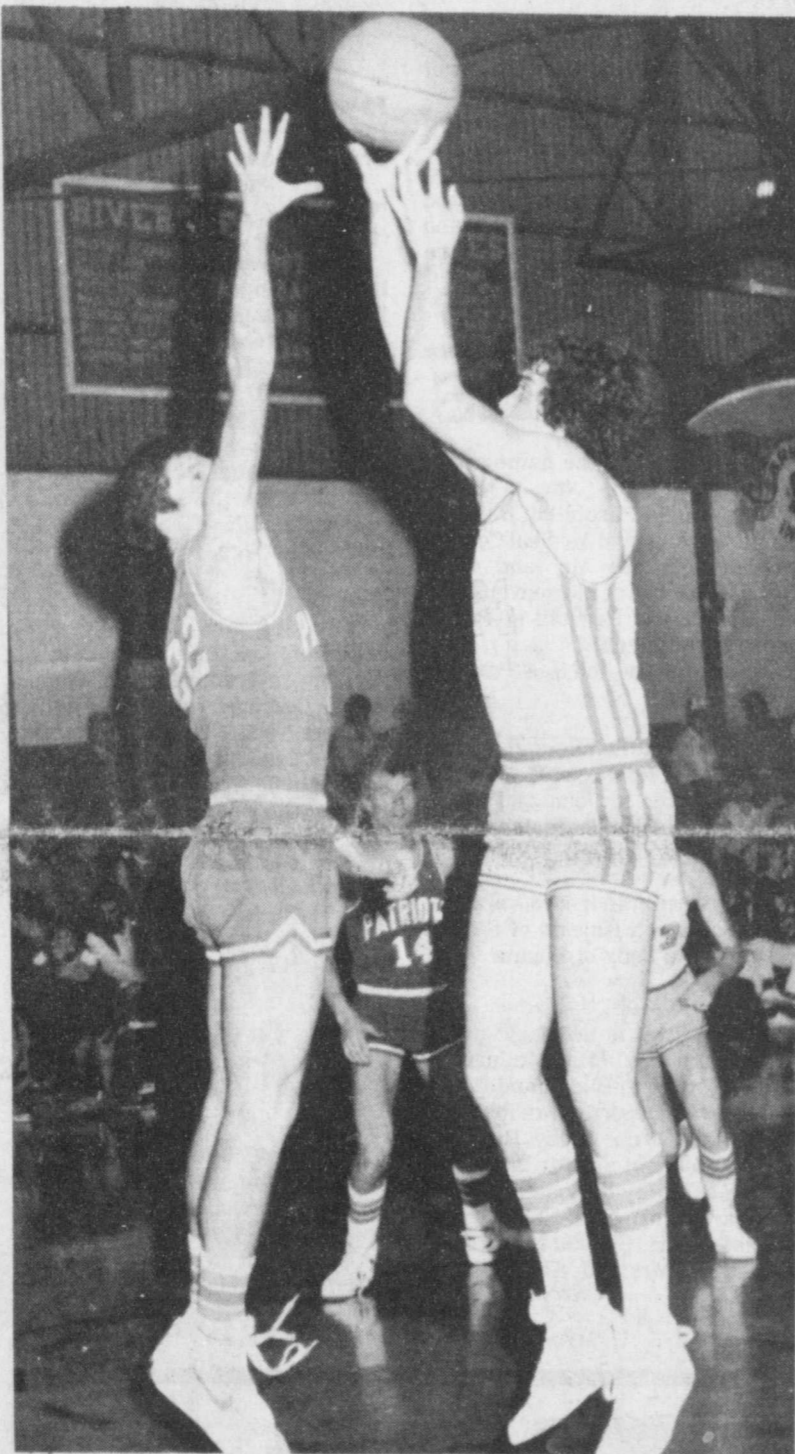

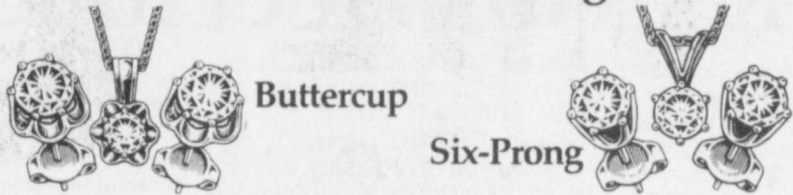

A. L. Vickers Dies At Age 63

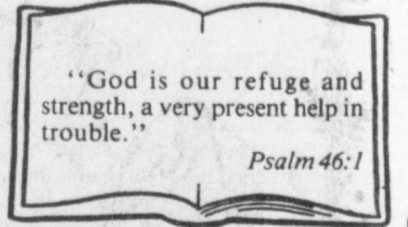
Autis L. (Dude) Vickers of Blossom died at his home Tuesday, Nov. 19.

On November 14, the Good Neighbor Club of Fulbright met at the Fulbright Community Center. They played bingo and had an auction to raise money for the center.

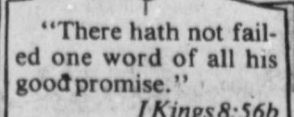

Olga Pearson Memorial In Magazine

"WE" is a monthly magazine by and for employees and retirees of the Texas Department of Human Services. This article appeared in the November issue.

Olga Read Pearson was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Bob Read of Deport, and mother of Eric Pearson of Deport.

Sometimes tragedy has a way of turning into something good. This is the turn fate took with Olga Pearson. Pearson had been a day-care licensing representative in Tyler for eight years until she died of cancer in December 1984 at the age of 58.

It was because of her dedication that the Tyler Association for the Education of Young Children established the Olga Pearson Memorial Scholarship. The \$100 scholarship is awarded yearly to a deserving early childhood professional in the Tyler area.

"Olga was very active as a community volunteer," said Jennie Buck, Paris regional director for day-care licensing. "She was involved with the East Texas Crisis Center and TAEYC. She was also a very dedicated licensing worker and a good friend."

Buck, Pearson's supervisor, tells of when she and Pearson went to a conference in Williamsburg, VA. "Olga never wasted time or complained. She was very brave. While we were in Williamsburg, she had a seizure which affected her leg. She suffered all night but never mentioned it to me."

"She wanted to make the most of her life by seeing and doing as much as possible. On our return trip, we had a four-hour layover in Washington, DC so we spent the time at the mall and viewing a Shanghai art exhibit."

Pearson displayed the same kind of bravery and zest for life when she fac-

ed tragedy in her family. The second of her three sons, Monte, died in an oil rig accident in January 1982. And just two months before her own death, her husband, John, died.

Pearson's co-workers got to know her positive side. One co-worker described her as "full of fun". Another said, "I always felt that when I talked to Olga, she was really listening to me. She was interested."

But another co-worker said it all. "She lived with class and died with dignity."
