good friend." Buck, Pearson's supervisor, tells of when she and Pearson went to a conference in Williamsburg, VA. "Olga never wasted time or complained. She was very brave. While we were in Williamsburg, she had a seizure which affected her leg. She suffered

all night but never mentioned it to me. "She wanted to make the most of her life by seeing and doing as much as possible. On our return trip, we had a four-hour layover in Washington, DC so we spent the time at the mall and viewing a Shanghai art exhibit." Pearson displayed the same kind of




