Prairiland Takes First, Consolation

The Prairiland Patriots defeated the Roxton Lions 47-30 Saturday night in Rivercrest to win first place in the Rivercrest Tournament.

The first quarter early on was a tight one as the lead changed with each basket. However, Scott Scudder made a field goal with five minutes to go in the quarter to give Prairiland a lead which they kept throughout the game. Scudder scored six points in the quarter and Prairiland led 16-11.



Lamar County Jail In Compliance D. Leddy, jail physician.

Lamar County Sheriff Jim Parker and Lamar County Judge Brady Fisher have announced that the Federal Court injunction that has dictated the county's jail operations for four years has been dissolved.

A ruling by United States District Judge Robert M. Parker has held that county officials are operating the jail in compliance with the rules and regulations of the Texas Jail Standards Commission and that no further monitoring or inspection of the jail by plaintiff's counsel will serve any useful purpose.








SCOTT SCUDDER shoots past a leaping Roxton guard during the Rivercrest tournament over the past weekend. The Prairiland var-


Heath Kennedy led the scoring in the game with 15 points and Mike Connot followed with 13.


