

Prairiland Patriots Win State 3-A Title !

At the University of Texas' Disch-Falk Field Friday afternoon, the Prairiland Patriots won their first ever baseball state championship as they defeated the Brownfield Cubs 7-4.

In the top of the first inning, a Brownfield victory appeared to be probable. Although the Cubs only managed to get one hit in the inning, Patriot pitcher Mike Blackburn experienced a case of wildness. After issuing three bases on balls and giving up two runs, Coach Bill Scudder went to the bench and found freshman pitcher Jack Kindle. Although lack-

ing a booming fastball, Kindle showed the importance of ball control as he got the final out of the inning on a force play at second. Even though the half inning was incredibly long, the Cubs had only three runs to show for their six base runners.

After both the Patriots and Cubs failed to score in their next time at bat, Prairiland set out to narrow the Brownfield lead in the bottom of the second inning. Heath Kennedy started off the inning by reaching first base on an error and then moved on over to second courtesy of a Chris Sparks single to left field. Two outs later, Kindle was hit by a pitch to load the

bases. Mike Connot then singled to right to score Kennedy and the score was 3-1. With Prairiland gaining more and more confidence, the Patriots trailed 3-1 after two complete innings.

Kindle was once again impressive in the third inning. With the help of a dazzling play by Kennedy and a Kindle strike out, the Patriots got out of the inning unscathed.

Perhaps Kindle's fairy-tale style of pitching pumped up the Patriots in the bottom of the third inning. Whatever the reason, the Patriots looked like state champions in the inning. After back to back singles by Joel Ballard and Scott Scudder, John Dusenberry and Kennedy hit some

extra long outs. However, Chris Sparks, who usually comes through, doubled to left field to score Ballard and Scudder and tie up the game at 3-3.

Tony Duncan made the final out of the inning by popping out to the catcher and the score was 3-3 at the end of three innings.

In the top of the fourth inning, the Cubs scored their final run of the game. Like in most innings of the game, the Cubs blew their chance to score in bunches. Although the Cubs got three hits in the inning, they only got one run and led 4-3 after four and one-half innings.

In the bottom of the fourth inning, sandwiched between outs, Kindle walked and Joel Ballard singled for his second hit of the game. Then Scott Scudder came through as he had done less than 24 hours earlier by hitting a 375 foot double to score both Kindle and Ballard and giving Prairiland a 5-4 lead. John Dusenberry followed suit with another double to score Scudder and suddenly the Patriots were ahead 6-4. Kennedy popped out to end the inning and the Patriots led 6-4 after four innings.

After first baseman Scudder threw to Dusenberry to cut down a possible run in the top of the fifth inning, the Patriots were looking for insurance in

the bottom half of the inning. After a Sparks ground out, Tony Duncan singled and moved to third on an error. Then, Craig Burns singled in Duncan for the final run of the inning as well as the game as the Patriots led 7-4.

Kindle only allowed one baserunner in the final two innings and showed the exuberance and poise of a Mark Fidrych. Duncan ended the game by catching a popup to left to end the game with the score 7-4 and the Patriots' state championship.

The victory ended the Patriots season with a record of 30 wins and only one loss. However, Coach Bill

Sales Tax Reflects Economy

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Friday sent checks totaling \$54.5 million in local tax payments to the 1,017 cities that levy the one percent local sales tax.

Houston received the largest check \$8.5 million, bringing 1986 payments to 73.4 million, down four percent from last year. Dallas' payment of \$6.8 million, down five percent from 1985, brought the yearly total for the city to \$53 million.

Locally, Blossom received \$620.71 for a 1986 total of \$7,160.42 for a 2.23 percent increase over the 1985

payments to date. Deport did not receive a payment this period and marked an 0.52 percent decrease over the 1985 payments to date of \$4,956.41.

Paris received \$121,196.69 for a 1.17 percent increase over the payment for the same period last year.

Bogata received \$3,885.66 for this period as compared to \$1,237.09 last year for a 36.56 percent increase over 1985 while Clarksville received \$11,988.50 for this period for a 9.36 percent increase over last year.

Mt. Pleasant received \$70,796.29 for

a 7.41 percent increase over the 1985 payments while Talco received \$617.83 as compared to \$1,773.39 for the 1985 payment, marking a 5.36 percent decrease over payments to date of \$10,648.03, comparing to \$11,250.63 for 1985.

To get to the finals of the state playoffs, the Patriots defeated the Medina Valley Panthers 8-6 Thursday afternoon at Nelson Field in Austin.

Similar to their earlier playoff games, the Patriots got on the board in the first inning. Leadoff hitter Mike Connot started off the inning with a double to left and then was sacrificed to second by Joel Ballard. Then, Scott Scudder scored Connot for the only run of the inning with a sacrifice fly.

In the bottom of the first inning, pitcher Scott Scudder was in complete control. The first batter hit a pop fly to Tony Duncan and then Scudder struck out the second batter. The third batter, however, hit a pop fly to left which looked like a sure single before Craig Burns made a spectacular daring catch to end the inning with Prairiland on top 1-0.

With both pitchers looking sharp, neither team scored again until Medina Valley came up with a tying run in the bottom of the third. The run occurred when Scudder walked the leadoff man and then made a wild throw to first on a sacrifice bunt. After three complete innings, the Patriots and Panthers were tied at 1-1.

In the fourth inning, with the game still tied at 1-1, the Panthers came up with a cheap run. The first batter reached on an infield hit, and two outs later was on third base. Then, a Scudder fastball broke through John Dusenberry's mit which allowed the one costly run to come in.

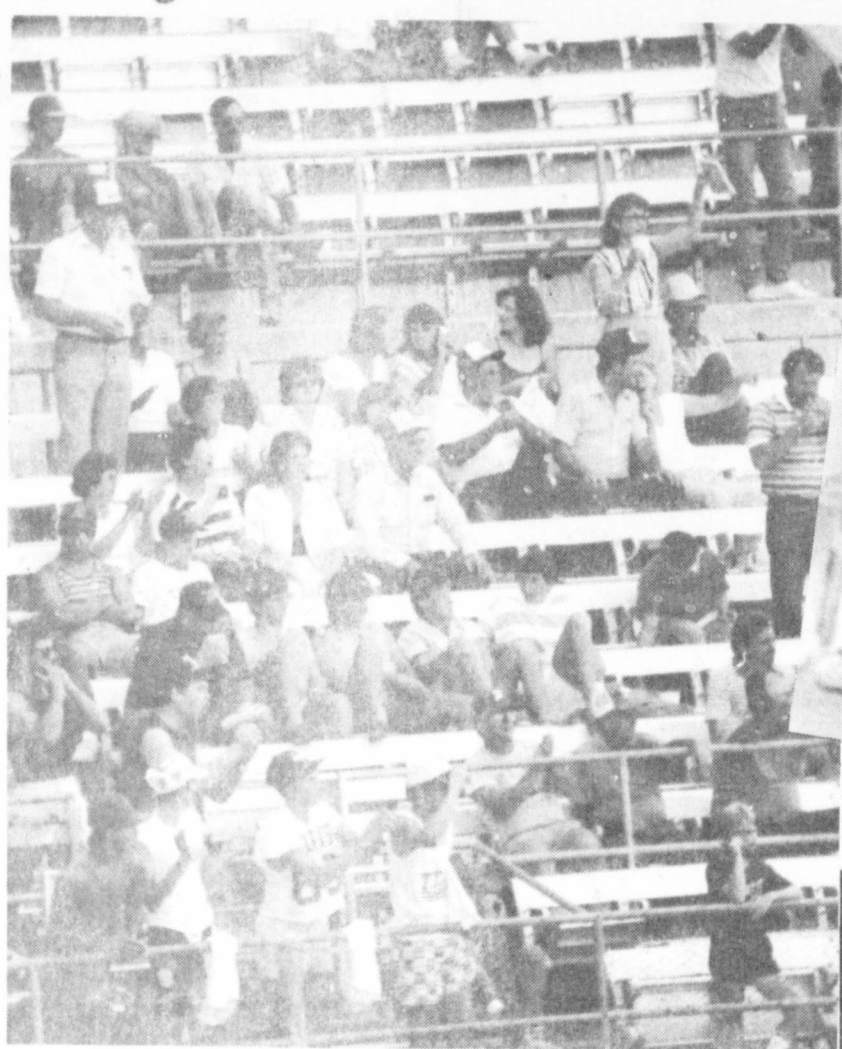

Foster Is 1st Division Commander

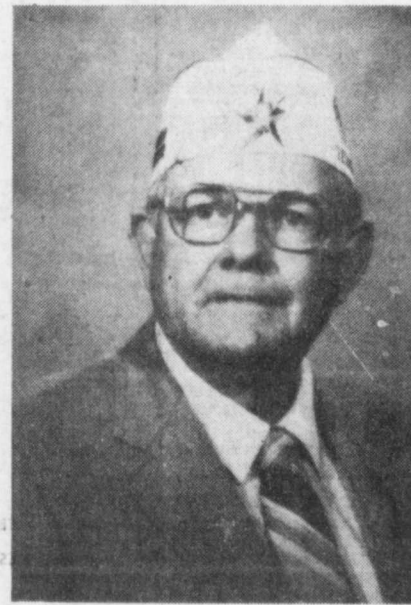

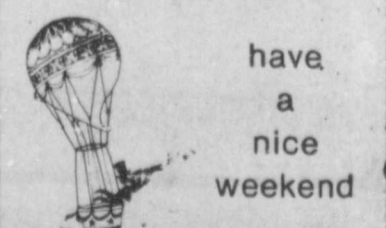
