SBA Speaks At **Chamber** Meeting

J. B. Hare and Millard Townsend of the Lubbock District of the Small Business Association, were guest speakers at the chamber of commerce sponsored meeting of Haskell business men and women held here on Thursday night.

A good turn out of business men and women attended the two hour session at the Haskell Steak House. Particular emphasis was placed on management of business and the changing times that are creating untold problems for small business today. The difference in operating a business and managing one was discussed in detail and some of the pitfalls cited as a result of poor management.

Mr. Townsend pointed out that 450,000 small business firms were opened each year and that reliable records showed that 400,000 of them went broke and ceased operations. In most cases the failures could be the direct result of poor management by executive leaders who failed to adapt their type business to the changing times and habits of the buying public.

Hare devoted a major portion of his talk to the relations between management and employees and the competitive effect of numerous factors involved in the operation of a present day business. Nineteen people were present

Easter Sunday, April 22, at 10 a. m., the annual Haskell County Singing Convention, will be held in the Rochester High School auditorium.


Several special singing groups and directors are expected to attend and a noon meal will be sponsored by the American Legion Post.

Fillingim Accepts Post In Nogales




Fillingim's wife, Lanelle, a teacher in elementary school, and Alice, a sophomore at Haskell High, will remain in Haskell until the end of the school term.





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

1973 Fertilizer Application May **Present Problems**

LUBBOCK- "Old timers are saying we have never before had a year like this on the Texas High Plains.

So says Jim Valentine, soil chemist with the Texas Agri-cultural Extension Service, whose job it is to assist West Texas farmers in planning their programs of fertilizer use.

"Extremely late harvests hampered fall fertilizer applications, and continuing wet soil conditions have greatly curtailed applications for the 1973 crop," Valentine asserts. "Much of the acreage is still unfertilized."

The situation is further complicated, he says, by severe shortages at the dealer level of nitrogen materials other than ammonia. All phosphate materials are reported to be in very short supply.

"Because of these unusual problems, post-plant applications merit careful consideration," the Lubbock-based specialist declares. "In many cases, these can be as effective as pre - plant applications. And there is still time to have soil tested for nitrate nitrogen and phosphorus, along with other plant nutrients. County Extension agents can supply information on sample collection and mailing."

Many of the heavy soils are showing considerable nitrate carryover resulting from heavier than required previous applications, Valentine reports. If this condition exists, lighter ap-

plications or the possible omission of nitrogen may be in order for this growing season. 'Most soils contain sufficient

nitrogen to get the crop started; therefore, nitrogen can be applied as soon as possible afer planting when moisture conditions are favorable for cultivation. For sorghum and corn, applications made 35 to 40 days after planting can be expected to produce top yields. Regardless of the carrier used, the nitrogen will soon be changed to the mobile nitrate form which is readily available to the rapidly expanding root system. Care should be taken in all instances to avoid root pruning," he warns.

Valentine reports that phosphorus is not nearly as deficient as nitrogen in the area, as a whole.

"If soil tests show adequate phosphorus, the grower is well ahead and phosphate applications for 1973 can be omitted without reduction of yield," he explains.



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
