Even though most mail order firms are honest, providing the buyer with exactly what was ordered and on time, the tiny percentage of promoters offering something worthless, or almost worthless, is still ripping off millions of dollars from thousands of Amer

each year. for "free" vacations continue to ruin holidays for tens of

thousands of people each year. Hyman Weiss, now vacationing in jail, sent out 300,000 postcards at a time nationwide, requiring those who responded to pay between \$20 and \$30 for handling, postage and processing, plus another \$15 to make reservations. He was the operator of Continental Vacations, American International Travel, World Class Travel and Trans Global Travel. Weiss admitted during his trial in Phoenix, AZ that no more than four to six people out of the thousands who sent money actually received a free vacation.

unusually low prices. Don't be rushed. Avoid offers that

claim to be your "last chance" to get

Keep a copy of the advertisement from which you ordered, a record of the date of your order and the number of your check if you pay by check, and retain the cancelled check when it is returned to you.

Never send cash. Use a check, money order or credit card because they can be traced.

If you have doubts about a company, check with the Postal Inspection Service, the Better Business Bureau or a local consumer protection agency to see if there are any complaints on record against the company. And do the checking before



Treda Norwood was checked, and the Ticks, Fleas Abound This Year

A bumper crop of fleas and ticks had been produced in the area this year much to the displeasure of everyone. Many calls have been received from pet owners, outdoormen, city dwellers as well as rural residents, so they are no respector of persons

In order to control the pest, one will need to be persistent. A single shot treatment of your pet will not get the job done. One will want to treat the pet, the inside of the house, yard and surroundings at the same time and then repeat in about ten days in order to break the cycle.

Dursban insecticide is a fairly new chemical and good reports have been received from those using it. We have used so much Diazinon and Sevin in the past that some resistance is beginning to show up. Other materials are labeled and should be effective, but persistency is the key to success.

Red Spider Mites are back again with us this year and individuals with tomatoes, peas and marigolds should go ahead and make an application of Kelthane at this time. You will recall that this is a tiny insect about the size of a needle point. They suck sap from the plant and a heavy infestation will kill plants. in the advanced stages webs are evident on the leaves, and one really does not want to wait until that stage of development before attempting to control. A mitacide, such as Kelthane, is the only chemical about which I know that will control.

It is just about time for mildew problems to appear on crepe myrtles, watermelons, cantaloupe and cucumbers. You will recall that mildew is greyish powder on the leaves.


A new fungicide, Bayleton, is labeled for use on these plants, and it will do a super job of preventing the disease. Bayleton is a systemic fungicide that gets into the sap stream of the plants and fights the disease. It is generally thought that upwards of three to four weeks of protection is received from a single application.

Rains cnanot wash this material off the plate as it does other fungicides. It is a wettable powder and must be mixed with water and applied to the plant. The fungicide is higher than other fungicides. You will not be able to find it at retail outlets. It is manufactured by Mobay Chemical
