

Sales Taxes Vary From Town To Town

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Friday sent checks totaling \$56.6 million in local sales tax payments to the 1,015 cities that levy the one-percent city tax.

Houston received the largest check, \$8.8 million, bringing Houston's total 1986 payments to \$82.2 million, down

four percent over last year. Blossom received \$671.79 for this period, compared to \$788.34 for the same period last year for a 0.51 percent increase in total payments to date.

Deport received no payment this

period, as compared to \$677.22 for the same period in 1985, marking a 12.48 percent decrease in payments to date for 1986.

Paris received \$132,553.76, for a 1.85 percent increase over the 1985 payment.

Bogata received \$1,592.65 for its payment this period for a 35.15 percent increase over last year's payment of \$1,303.22, bringing the 1986 total to \$17,866.80 to date.

Clarksville received \$11,183.30 for a 7.88 percent increase. Detroit

received \$701.66 for this period for a 20.41 percent increase over 1985.

Mt. Pleasant received \$65,806.52 for a 5.28 percent increase over the 1985 payment for the same period while Talco received \$934.71 for this period payment, compared to \$1,430.29 for

the 1985 payment for the same period, marking an 8.66 percent decrease.

July checks represent taxes collected on sales made in May and reported to the Comptroller by June 20.

Deport Ball Association Has High Expenses, Needs Funds

The Deport Little League and softball teams are beginning a fund raising effort in order to try and meet some of their expenses for the season.

Many people are unaware of the expenses teams incur during the year, which are higher than one might suppose.

There are seven teams, which

means that a large percentage of Deport's youngsters, both boys and girls, are involved in this activity and they deserve support in whatever way is possible.

The list of expenses for this season is as follows: Trash Pickup (to empty the barrels at the concession stand) \$33; a load of sand for the field, \$30; League fee, \$253.26; Insurance (how many of us ever thought about that as being necessary? It is!) \$420; baseballs, \$140; softballs, \$143.52; score books \$29.75; rule books \$6.25; bases \$34.64; caps \$220.00; bats, softball \$178.29; equipment such as bags, \$35.85; knee pads \$4.95; catcher's softball mask, \$21.95; shin guards \$35.00; Guest Paper Company (paper products such as snow cone cups) \$425.00; light bulbs (for the big field lights) \$321.93; four water coolers \$81.92; uniforms \$425.25; umpire fees and mileage \$380; and concession stand workers \$168. This makes a total of \$3,203 spent for the season's

activities!

After it was all tallied up, the association is short about \$1,500.

The association has hopes of making money from a variety of fund raising activities, such as a tournament, and hopes that people who are in-

terested in seeing youngsters able to continue in this worthwhile program will donate.

Donations can be made to any of the coaches, or to the league head, Mark Figueroa.

Future plans include another field

or two, since the single field at Deport is becoming inadequate, but more community participation will be required to make that a reality.

To compete on an equal basis with other area teams such as Blossom,

Losses From Round Hay Bales Calculated

A great percentage of hay harvested in the area is now being put up in the large round bale as opposed to the small square bale that was the predominate method 10 years ago. Hay producers have gone to the big bale mainly to cut down on labor required in hauling and at feeding time.

However, many producers are having second thoughts about the economics of using big bale in light of the big losses in hay and also quality. I ran across some information the other day that should be of interest to hay producers.

A fellow County Extension Agent down in South Texas conducted a demonstration last year aimed at studying weathering losses. They studied sorghum sudangrass that was baled in July and stored until the following January. Approximately 20 inches of rain was received during that time which is comparable to our area.

Five different storing methods were used: in the barn; uncovered, outside on the ground; uncovered, outside on a pallet off the ground; covered with plastic outside on the ground; and covered with plastic and stored on a pallet off the ground.

Weathered parts were removed and weighed to determine loss. Bales averaged 1575 pounds at harvest and 1400 pounds at feeding.

Largest losses were in bales stored on top of the ground because the hay acted as a wick and soaked up moisture from the ground. Uncovered bales on the ground lost 220 pounds on the average while covered bales on the ground lost half that amount.

However, those that were uncovered but stored on pallets off the ground lost 80 pounds while the covered bales on pallets lost only 35 pounds.

So hay producers need to give some thought to storing hay outside up off the ground. In this instance there was 63 percent less loss by just storing the hay off the ground.

The Lamar County Crops Tour will be Tuesday, August 4 beginning at 1 p.m. at the Byrdtown Community, located south of Blossom and northeast of Pattonville.

Individuals interested in these two crops should make plans to go on the tour.

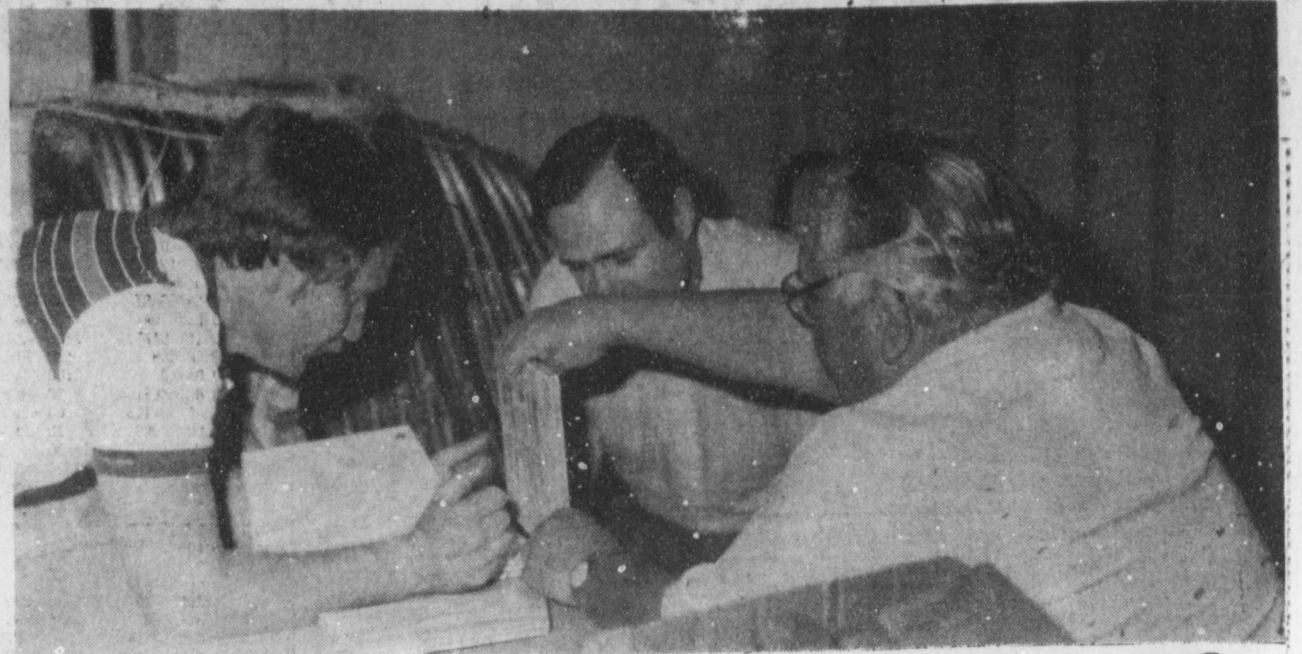

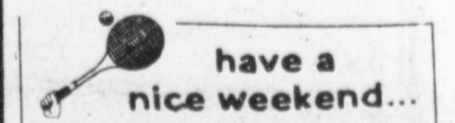
