

# Schools Begin Sept. 2, Caution Urged

Area schools begin on September 2, with the last minute rush for school supplies, clothing and registration often obscuring something crucially important...the fact that school buses will run once again.

Last year in the state of Texas, there were 1,228 accidents involving school buses, with seven fatalities and 323 non-fatal injuries.

Area drivers are cautioned to keep

a sharp eye out in and around school zones and school buses in an effort to prevent these accidents.

An increasing problem in recent years has been drivers who either ignored or were unaware of the law restricting vehicles from passing a school bus while that bus is loading or unloading children.

Children often cross the street in front of the bus, and a car that's try-

ing to pass may not see them. Children also frequently do not use good judgment, darting out to catch up with companions, or forgetting to check and see whether their path is clear.

The problem became so bad two years ago that the Texas Legislature considered requiring buses to have mechanical arms at the driver's window that would extend into the traf-

fic lane while the bus is stopped. At present, Texas buses have flashing lights at the front and back of the vehicle when stopped, as well as signs noting that vehicles are required to stop for the buses.

A problem exists, too, around school. Parents or people driving by must keep an extra-wary eye out for youngsters coming from behind parked cars or structures which might


obscure them until it is too late to stop.

The problem doesn't exist only where small children are found, older children frequently have their minds anywhere but on crossing a street.

Those old enough to drive sometimes fail to control their speed entering or leaving a high school parking lot, and should remember they are responsible, too.

Even though most people are in a hurry, the life of a child can be saved by slowing down whenever a school zone is near.

This year, when school begins, let's everyone work to make it a safe and happy time, without accidents.

## Fellowship Hall And Library Added To Life Tabernacle

The Cunningham Community was doubly honored Sunday, August 17 when the Life Tabernacle Fellowship Hall was dedicated, and as a tribute to the community he loved, the personal library of the late Mr. F.E. McGahan was placed in the hall by his widow, Mrs. Carolyn McGahan, to be used by the community.

It has been named the "McGahan Memorial Room", the library also contains the personal library of the late Dr. T.W. Buford of Minter, which was willed to the McGahans upon his death.

The funding of the memorial room was a gift of Dr. and Mrs. R.L. Tindel of Houston.

Mrs. Carolyn McGahan of Paris, widow of the late Mr. McGahan and daughter, Joyce Wolters of Deer Park, were special guests. Mrs. McGahan shared with the audience "What We are Grateful To the Cunningham Community for Doing For Us."

Rev. John M. Bell of San Antonio was speaker for the dedication service. He is a Cunningham native, a 1940 graduate of Cunningham High School, and a former student of the

McGahans.

Larry Bell of Paris, also a former student, made a complimentary talk on the contributions of Mr. McGahan to the community.

Mr. McGahan was superintendent of Cunningham Schools for 15 years. He never allowed a student to accept defeat. His ideas and encouragement to instill in each student the desire to better themselves has left an indelible mark on each one. His motto, which was clearly visible as one entered the door of the memorial room was "Every Child on the Same Level". He lived that motto each day.

During his 56 years in the field of education Mr. McGahan was a teacher, an administrator, and a University lecturer. For the last 18 years of his life he directed the Northeast Texas Educational Services as his private business. This business is still being carried on by Mrs. McGahan and daughter, Dave Broadway.

Mr. and Mrs. McGahan co-authored 23 education publications dealing with approaches for helping educate children.

## Labor Day Death Estimates Released

Officials of the Texas Department of Public Safety estimate that 43 persons could be killed in traffic accidents across the state during the Labor Day period.

The 78-hour holiday period begins at 6 p.m. Friday, August 29 and ends at midnight Monday, September 1.

"During this period, the Department will have additional troopers on duty," director Adams said. "We know that some drivers will be determined to violate the traffic laws. DPS officers will be taking enforcement

action against as many violators as they can to increase the safety factor for law abiding motorists."

Adams said the final fatality count for the 1985 Labor Day period was 52.

Adams said the DPS deeply appreciates the positive response shown by Texas motorists to the safety belt law.

"We'd like to mark the first anniversary of the seat belt law by having far fewer fatalities occur than our statisticians have estimated for the holiday period," Adams said.

During the July 4 holiday period earlier this summer, 8 of 9 persons killed in motorcycle accidents had not been wearing helmets.

"Though only those motorcyclists 18 and younger are required to wear protective headgear, statistics show overwhelmingly that helmets save lives," Adams said.

As part of the increased driving awareness program, the DPS will furnish revised fatality counts to the news media during the Labor Day period.

## Highlands And Whales Highlight Cruise

Sherbrooke Village is a page from the past...and one not dressed up with ice cream stands and souvenirs. In Nova Scotia, we wandered through the village streets, with charming houses in which people live, and workshops of boat builders, potters, weavers, small farm holders and general stores. The courthouse features a kerosene lantern chandelier that holds two dozen lanterns, the kitchen in one home has bubbling pots of lye soap and homemade jams.

Perhaps the most interesting thing of all was the sawmill, a water-powered building with an alarming arrangement of pulleys, belts and gears which saws huge logs into boards, from which window frames and doors are built.

Late in the evening, bidding ducks, horses, and people goodbye on the shores of the village river, we wandered off to Antigonish, to have a sea food stew that would make the heart sing.

Next day, upon the advice of a very nice gentleman, Bernard Allard, we began our way up to Cape Breton Island to follow the Cabot Trail, a famous trail wandering beside the ocean, flanked by mountains on the other side.

All street and road signs were in French and English, and many people spoke French entirely.

The man we met who told us about the beauties of the Cabot Trail was Acadian French, and waxed enthusiastic about the joys of his native Nova Scotia. Communication wasn't difficult, and he explained what lobster pounds and fishing weirs were to us.

The stop signs read "Stop" at the top, and at the bottom "Arret". Thomas zoomed right through the first one we saw, saying "Stop Arret, what's that mean?"

The breathtaking scenery along the Cabot Trail is made more interesting by the Scots names that abound. Settled by the Scots, probably because of the extremely strong resemblance of their native highlands, the names preceded by "Mc" are the majority.

At the lonely, isolated town of Cheticamp, we boarded a lobster boat along with other tourists to cruise seven or eight miles offshore in the hopes of seeing whales.

The boat's pilot said they had been out fourteen times so far that summer, and seen whales eleven of those times.

Before the afternoon was over, they had been out fifteen times and still seen whales only eleven times.

The cruise was delightful, however, with a bald eagle making the day worthwhile. Sea caves and lighthouses decorated the cliffs, and the boat's pilot delighted the youngsters on board by teaching them to run the boat.

He left one girl at the helm, told the

kids not to touch anything, and strode to the back of the boat for a moment. Unfortunately, the kids didn't listen, and touched something, throwing the craft about violently. Yelling and running, mostly in French, he tore for the bow, laughing and shaking his head. From then on, he kept a watchful eye on his youthful crew!

Back on shore we drove higher and higher into mountains, and the fog became thicker and thicker. Soon, the magnificent vistas were obscured by the thick blanket, but we stopped to photograph another eagle, and began a descent into a valley more beautiful than anything so far.

The sun began to keep out as it set, and the Bras d'Or Lake glistened in golden light while yachts in bright colors bobbed on the surface.

Tired out, we found a small motel for the night and settled in for a good night's sleep. Unfortunately, our next door neighbors thought otherwise, and at two in the morning we were awakened by banging, yelling and fussing!

The next morning began another day, however, and we headed on for the ferry landing to take us to Prince Edward Island.

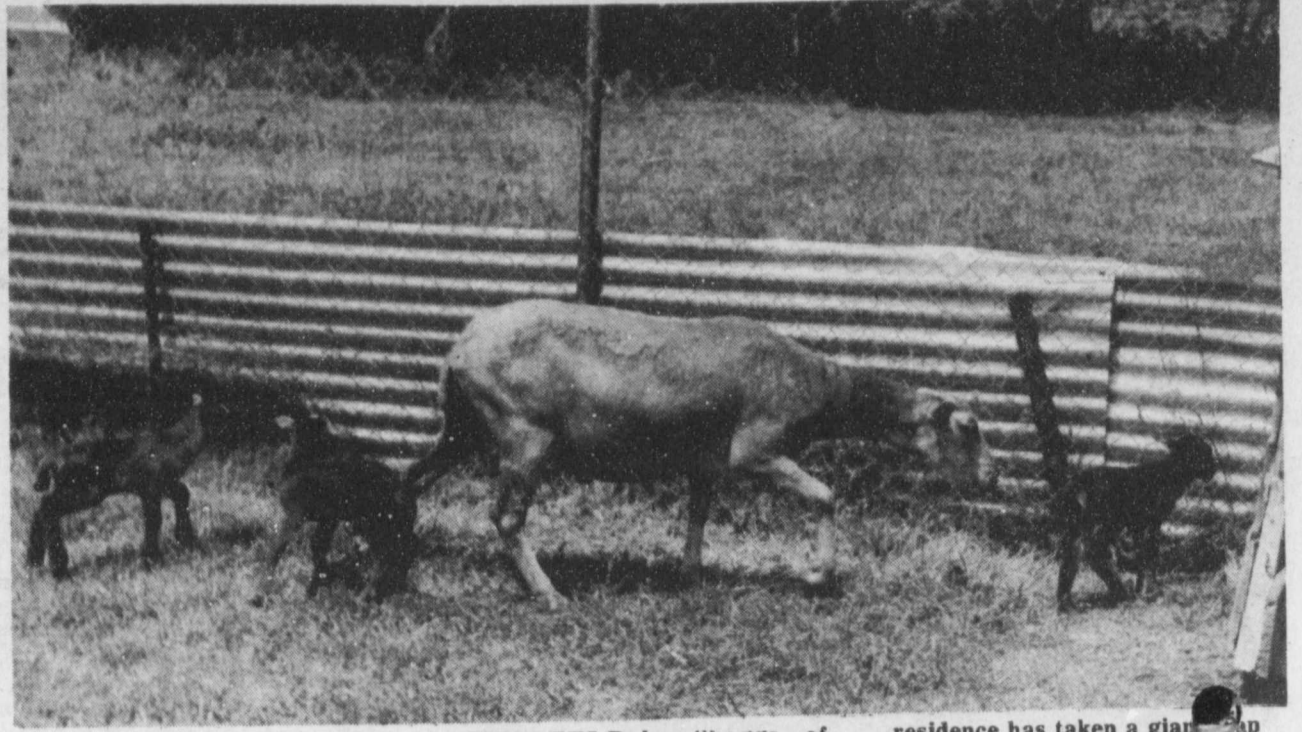


