WASHINGTON, D. C. Congreseman Omar Burleson, who represents the 17th District of Texas in the U.S. House of Representatives, has announced for re-election. He has filed for a place on the ballot in the Democratic Primary Election on May 4, 1974.

Burleson was elected to the 80th Congress from the 17th District and has been re-elected to each succeeding Congress. He is a member of the Ways and Means Committee, considered to be the most powerful and prestigious in the House.

No pre-registration is planned, but students may schedule pre-enrollment conferences with counselors through Jan. 11. Students who plan to apply for Basic Education Opportunity Grants must do so by Feb. 1.

Sophomore students are to register from 1:00-5:00 p. m. on Jan. 14. Evening students will register from 6:30-9:30 on that date. Freshmen will register from 8 a. m. to noon on Jan. 15. Classes begin the following day.

Tuition at WTC is \$4 per hour with a \$25 minimum charge. There are some vacancies in

the dormitories, and inquiries about rooms may be directed to Dr. Hood.

WTC offers both academic and occupational - technical courses. The college, now beginning its third year, was voted full accreditation by the Southern Association of Schools and Colleges in December, having fulfilled requirements for the accreditation in the shortest time possible.

Dr. Robert Clinton, president of Western Texas College in Snyder, and Dr. Ben Brock, vice president of WTC, will be special guests at an open meeting for all interested Haskell citizens, Friday night, Jan. 11, at 7:30 p. m. in Haskell Community Room.

The meeting, although coordinated by Haskell Chamber of Commerce, is not a Chamber meeting, but a public meeting open to anyone and everyone who is interested in Western Texas College, and the extension classes they offer at Haskell High School.

'We are extremely fortunate to have these extension classes available in Haskell," said Chamber President Royce Williams, "and we felt it would be a good way for all our citizens to become acquainted with the college -fficials, and with what Western Texas College has to

the college. Persons attending then may ask any questions they may

wonder about, concerning the college, its opportunities, and its goals.
