

# Anderson Defeats Hargett In Election

Democrat Richard Anderson is the new State Senator for the First District, after the Saturday special election that pitted him against Republican Edd Hargett.

Anderson carried fourteen of the fifteen counties in the district, and took 58% of the votes over Hargett.

72,125 votes were cast in the district.

Anderson is the Harrison County Judge, and will resign before taking

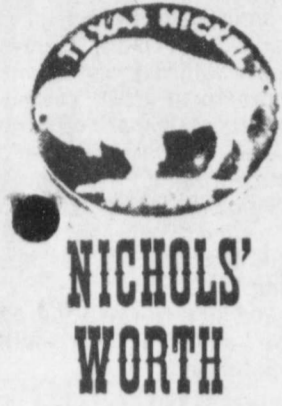
his position in Austin.

## Prairiland Loses To North Lamar In 21-20 Thriller

When the Prairiland Patriots and the North Lamar Panthers meet each year, it's not just a football game, but a season thriller. Last Friday night was no exception at Pattonville, Texas. The Panthers compiled 21 points and the Patriots 20, in a game packed with excitement.

The Patriots wasted no time invading the Panther's endzone with Steven Johnston receiving the honors after a 35-yard spring for the first

touchdown of the night. Craig Ladd couldn't get the ball down in time for the PAT kick and was held short on an attempted run. The score was six to zip for the Patriots with seven minutes and fifty-one seconds still on the clock in the first quarter.

Big Rusty Anderson, Rodney Jones and Joseph Whelchel were unyielding to the Panther running attack. Late in the first quarter, however, with one minute and eighteen seconds left, a

face mask penalty on the Patriots sent the Panthers to the Patriot's 16-yard line.

Panther Terry Anderson managed to escape to the Patriot six yard line before big Eric Foster squelched his effort. Unfortunately for the Patriots and their fans, two plays later the Panthers had tied the game with a touchdown of their own. The PAT was good and the Patriots trailed by one point.

The Patriots started off with excellent field position after a 15-yard penalty was assessed against the Panthers for unsportsmanship conduct. They controlled the ball from their own 49-yard line. Two short runs, one incomplete pass and a holding penalty for the Patriots left them in what seemed a most undesirable situation.

Deep in their own territory with a third down and 20-yards for a first down, the Patriot coaching staff called for a quick kick from play formation. That play could have been one of the most important calls of the night.

The Panthers claimed the pig on their own three yard line. The Panthers offense held together however and the Patriot defense seemed to relax somewhat, and five first downs later, the Panthers were parked on the Patriot 8-yard line.

Panther quarterback Chad Fleming raced across the Patriot goal line for the go-ahead touchdown. A short toss from Chad Fleming to Bryan Mabry left the Patriots with just over three minutes on the clock and nine points behind.

The Patriots matched from their own ten yard line to within striking distance on the Panther twenty yard line on the fine running of Mike Ray, Craig Ladd, Jeff Fendley and Steven Johnston; but the old clock wasn't patient and the half ended fifteen to six in favor of the Panthers.

Both teams battled back and forth for some advantage without much success, until late in the third quarter.

With the help of a penalty, the Panthers huddled on the Patriot 21-yard line. The next play, quarterback Chad Fleming hit Steve Davis for six more points. The PAT failed, though, and the Panthers led by fifteen points.

It didn't look good for the Patriots at that point, but the defense came alive and the Panthers were finished as far as scoring the rest of the night.

Patriot quarterback Craig Ladd raced all over the field to set up Steven Johnston's touchdown run from deep in Panther territory. Johnston wasn't finished however. The next play, he raced across the goal line for the two point conversion.

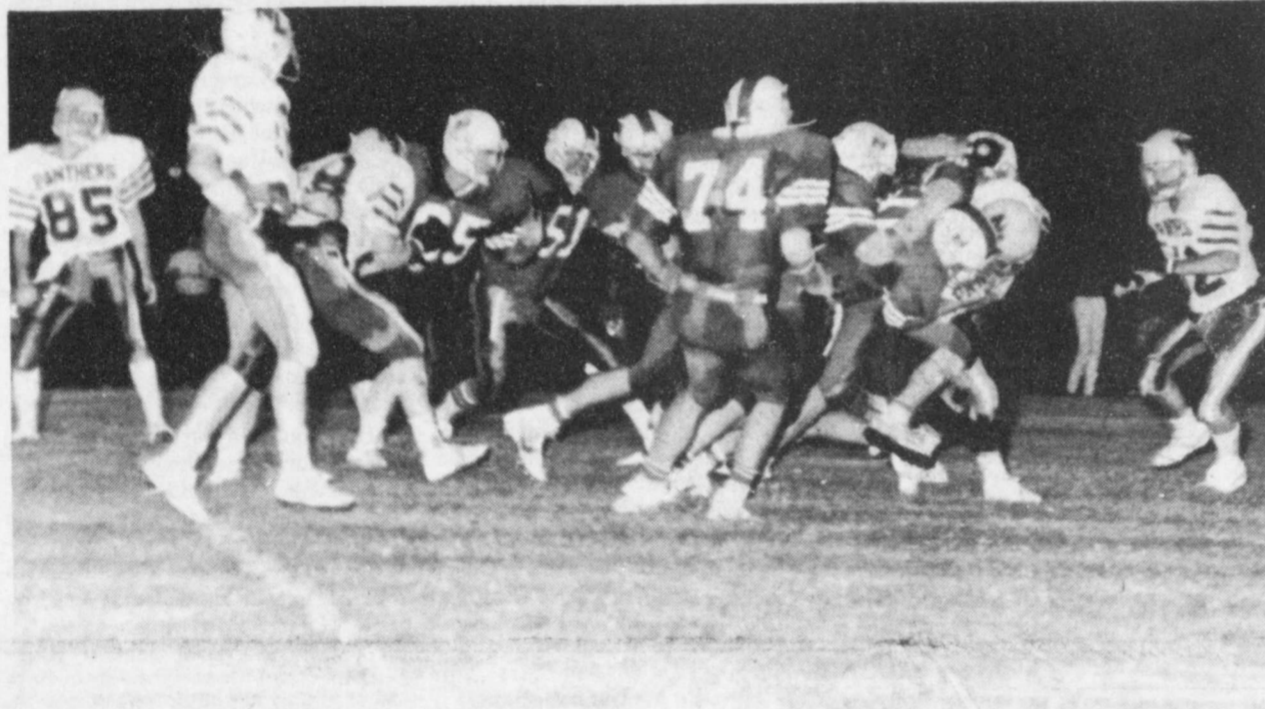
Trailing by seven points and three minutes seventeen seconds to play in the game, the Patriots tried an on-side kick, but failed.

The Patriot defense forced the Panthers to cough up the ball, and the Patriots had less than one minute to make a touchdown and conversion.

Craig Ladd and Steven Johnston managed to make the trip for the touchdown with 46-seconds to spare. With a score of 21 to 20, the Patriots elected to go for the win with a two point conversion instead of the extra point kick, but Lady Luck wasn't with the Patriots on that play.

With 39 seconds left to play, the Panthers didn't take anymore chances with a fired up Patriot team. Quarterback Toby Deupree simply backed up five yards two times, fell on the ball and let the clock run out.

Next week the Patriots face Cooper at Pattonville at 8 p.m.

The first act of the new club's board of directors was to appoint a special committee to arrange for a charter

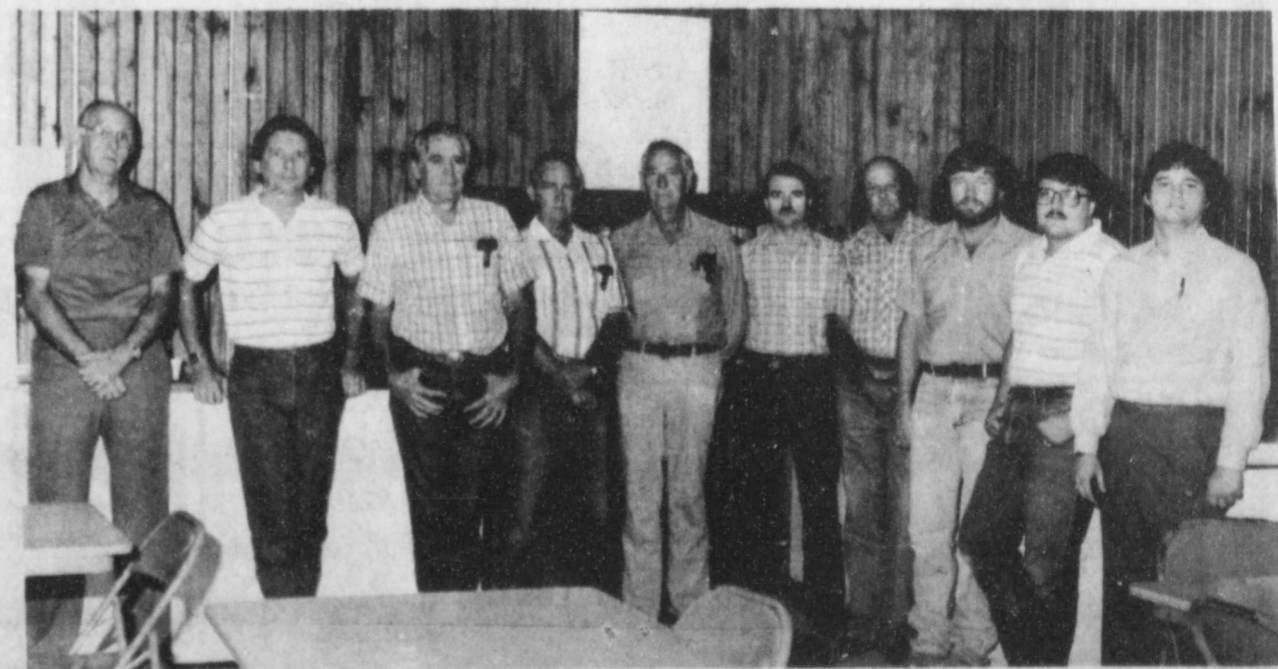

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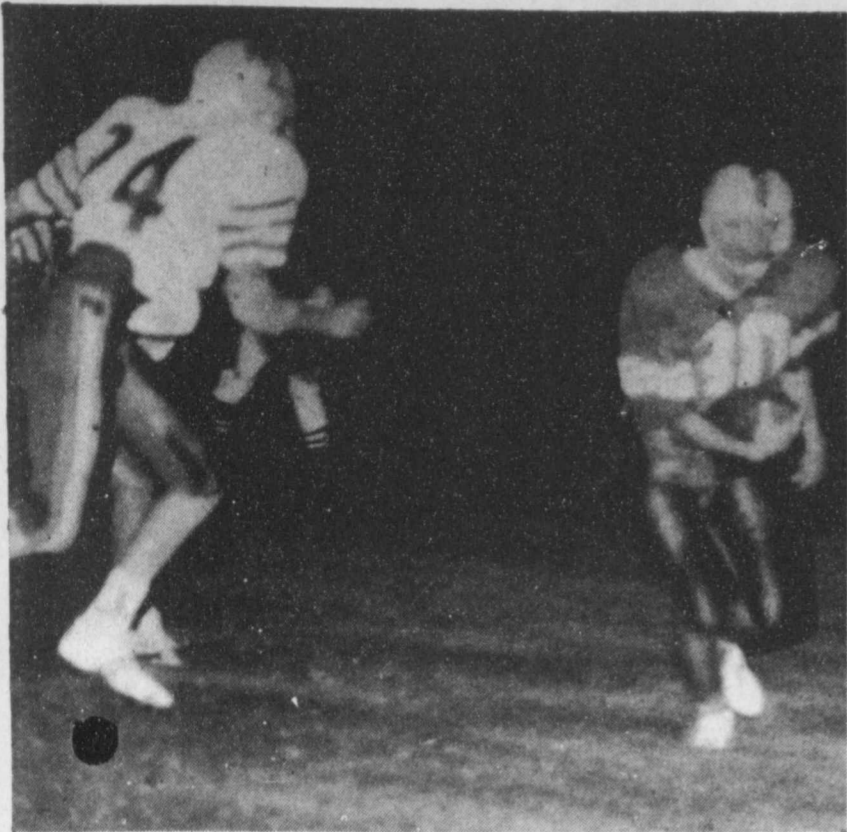

### Crime Stoppers "Crime Of The Week" To Begin

Crime Stoppers is a program that offers a cash reward for information leading to the arrest and indictment of persons responsible for crime. The caller does not identify himself or herself. For identification purpose, the caller is given a number and from that time on is known as caller No. XXX. The information provided by the caller is investigated and if a crime is cleared, arrest made and indictments handed down then the caller qualifies for a reward, the amount of which is decided by a point system that allows for rewards beginning at \$50 and going up to \$1,000 which is the maximum. A person who provides information that clears a burglary with one arrest and indictment could expect a reward that will average from \$200 to \$400 depending on the amount of property recovered, if any. The reward is paid in cash and in a manner chosen by the caller that will let him/her remain anonymous. Reward monies come from a fund that is supported by donations and fund raising efforts, not from taxes or any county operating budgets.

Crime of the Week is a brief synopsis of an unsolved crime, usually a felony, recent or past, for which all leads have been exhausted by investigators. It is featured with the intent of providing incentive to any person that may have knowledge of the crime but has not come forward, by offering a flat \$1,000 reward good for one week only for information that leads to the arrest and indictment of the persons responsible for the crime. The pressure on the individual builds as the end of the week approaches because he knows that the reward will diminish considerably after the week has passed, this information, sought by law enforcement will never again be worth so much.

Although the name implies that a new crime will be featured each week, that is not always the case, especially in a community the size of Paris and Lamar County. A Crime of the Week will be run at least once a month but sometimes more, each a different crime. Spot announcements that can be run in addition to and in place of Crime of the Week, when no crime of the week is available, will be provided. Some flexibility may be exercised by the media on the spot announcements but it is suggested that the Crime of the Week be used as provided, if any question of liability should arise from the use of a particular crime in the Crime of the Week then the issue is not clouded, the responsibility rests in its proper place, with the Lamar County Crime Stopper Coordinator that selected and wrote the Crime of the Week.

Call back request is a request made by the Crime Stoppers Coordinator to a caller that was given a number when he or she originally called, for

that person to call Crime Stoppers again. Usually this situation arises because information given was not complete or more information may be needed but this was not apparent when the call was first taken. Call Back Requests are usually run in addition to any Crime of the Week and/or Crime Stoppers spot announcements, this is necessary because the identity of the caller and how to contact him is not known.

On January 16, 1977, around midnight, a pedestrian was hit and killed by an automobile in the 3000 block of Clarksville Street in front of the Walmart store in Paris.

The victim, an 18 year old Iranian male, Elias Kallimi Beroukham, was crossing Clarksville Street, apparently returning to his dormitory room at Paris Junior College, where he was a student. The vehicle was traveling east at the time he was hit.

Although the victim was dead at the time emergency personnel arrived, it is believed that the driver, who did not stop, is the person who called the ambulance reporting "a body on the ground in front of Walmart".

Crime Stoppers will pay \$1,000 this week for information leading to the arrest and indictment of persons responsible for this crime. You do not have to give your name. Crime Stoppers will pay for information on other felony crimes. Call Crime Stoppers at 785-TIPS.

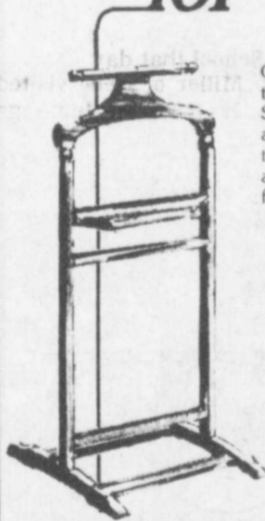

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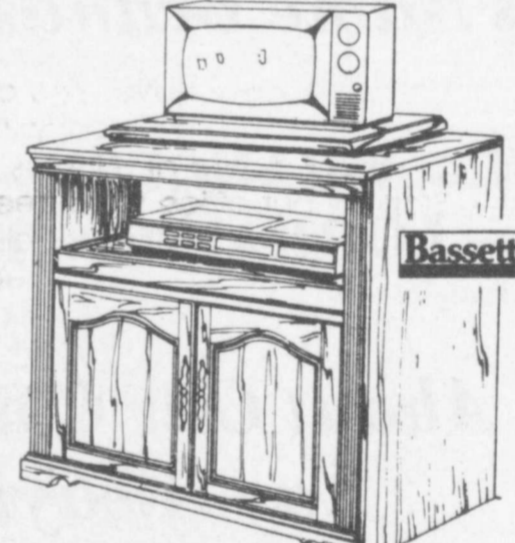
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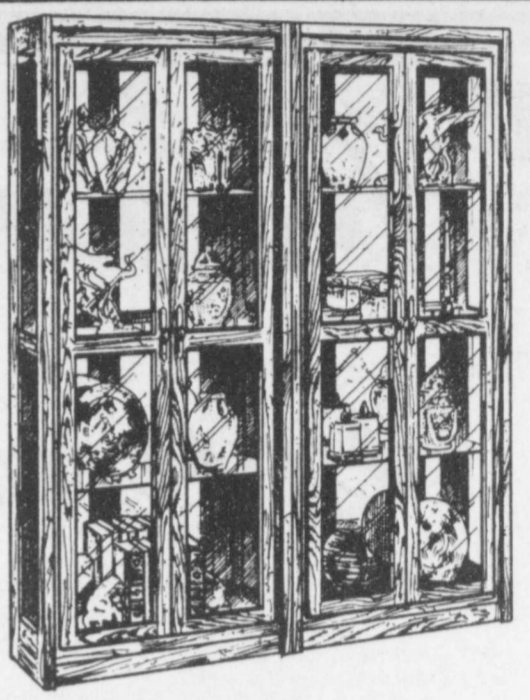

North Lamar intercepted a pass in the endzone but was penalized and Patriots got the ball on the 4-yard line which resulted in another Wade Sparks touchdown.

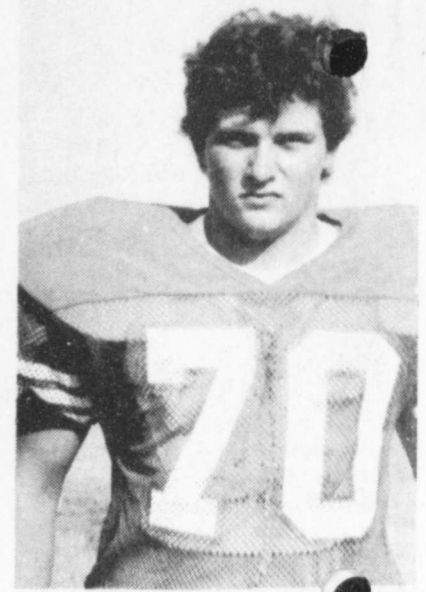
Prairiland attempted a two point conversion after each touchdown but North Lamar held them back.

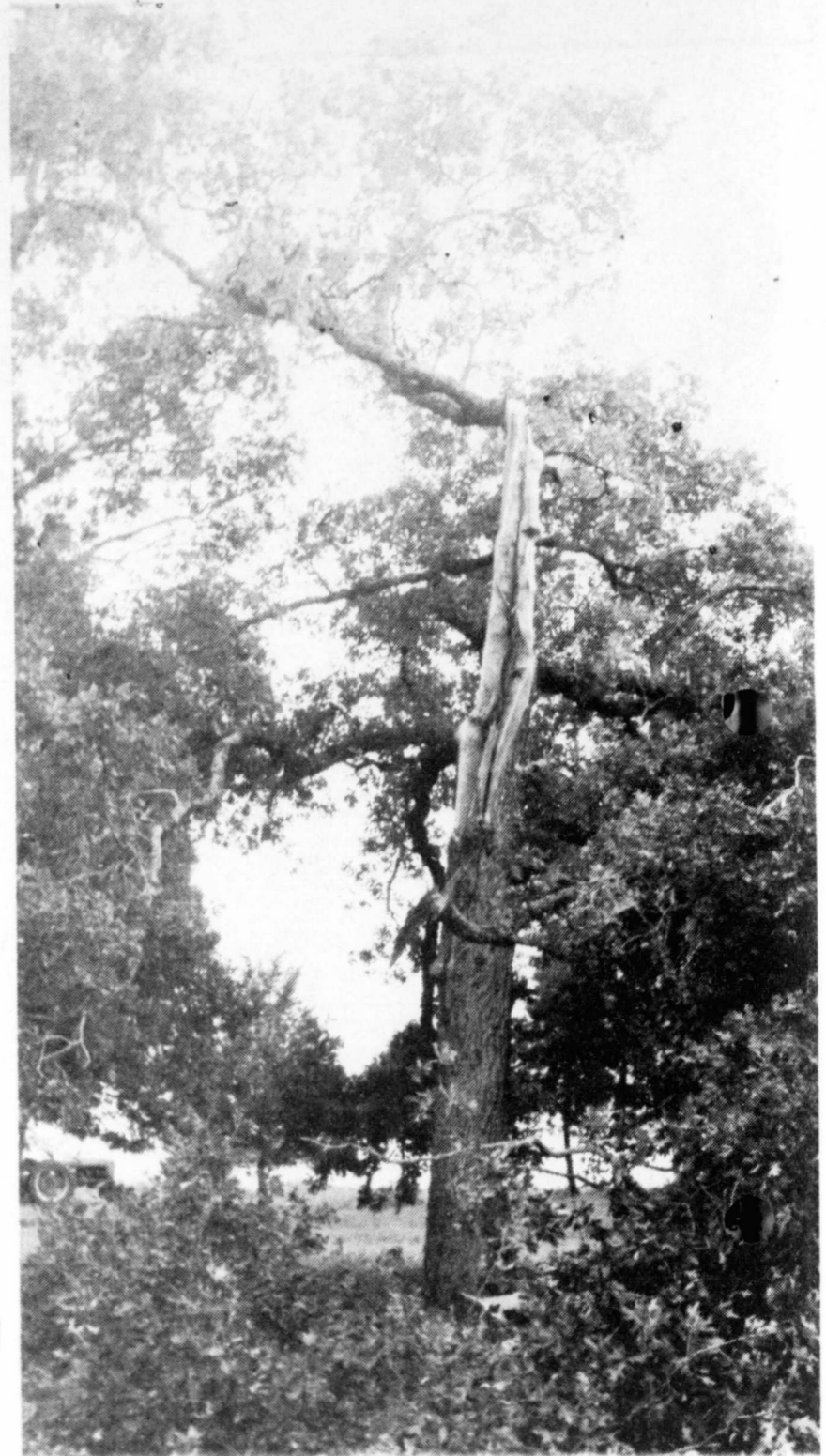
