

Most Area Sales Taxes Increase

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Wednesday sent checks totaling \$54.8 million in local sales tax to 1,022 cities that levy the one-percent city tax. Bullock said the 1986 payments to date were down .5 percent as compared to the payments to date in September of 1985. The decrease in August and September checks

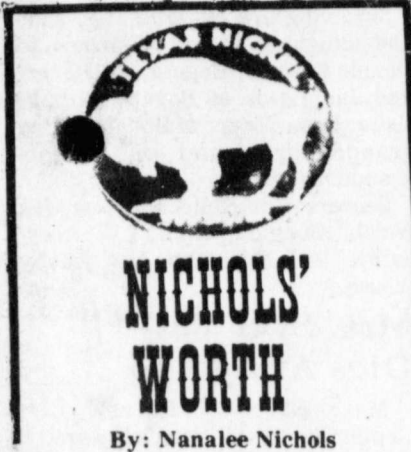
amounts reflects a downturn in the Texas economy, he said. Houston's check for \$8.6 million was the largest, bringing total payments this year to \$108.3 million, down five percent from last year. Bogata received \$2,021.07 for this period's payment, for a 33.7 percent increase over the 1985 payments to

date of \$18,014.99, as compared to \$24,090.93 for this year. Clarksville received \$11,974.69 for their payment this period, for a 5.38 percent increase over 1985. Detroit received \$509.06 for a 10.73 percent increase over the 1985 payments.

Mt. Pleasant received \$68,873.66, a 3.24 percent increase over last year's payment of \$67,291.46. Talco received \$978.86 for their payment this period, compared to a \$1,555.75 payment for the same period last year, marking a 15.99 percent decrease in total payments to date.

Blossom received \$927.80 for their payment this period, compared to \$856.08 for last year, with a yearly total of \$10,300.91 to date for a .52 percent increase over 1985. Deport received \$557.54 for this period, a 3.18 percent increase over the 1985 payments to date of

\$10,247.12. Paris received \$145,493.73 for their payment for this period, for a 1.10 percent increase over 1985. September checks represent taxes collected on sales made in July and reported to the Comptroller's office by August 20.

Prairiland Loses To High-Ranked Cooper

The Prairiland Patriots were held scoreless all four quarters of last Friday night's football game at Pattonville, while their opponents, the Cooper Bulldogs, racked up fourteen points.

The Bulldogs, picked to be state contenders in their division, mounted an impressive drive from their own 19-yard line after Chris Carter fielded the ball on their own 23-yard line. Patriot Cary Borden forced Carter to retreat to the Bulldogs' 19 for the first and ten.

Four first downs and four penalties later, the Bulldogs threatened from the Patriot six yard line. Two plays later, Bart Tatum raced into the end-zone to put the Bulldogs on the board. The point after was perfect, and the Patriots trailed by seven.

The Patriots came right back with some fireworks of their own. Richard Eatherly took the Cooper kickoff from the Patriot 15-yard line all the way to their own 33.

Steven Johnston picked up some good yardage on two plays, but the pigskin was too much to hold on to on the third and three, and the Patriots were just lucky to recover their own fumble. And so it went for the Patriots the rest of the first quarter and late in the half.

It looked as if the Patriots would make a game of the contest after Cary Borden returned a Cooper punt from their own sixteen yard line all the way to their forty-eight. The very next play from scrimmage, Steven Johnston weaved his way through the Bulldog defense, all the way for a

Patriot touchdown. Unfortunately for the Patriots, a penalty wiped the play out and it was back to the drawing board.

The Bulldog defense held tough and the Patriots were forced to punt the ball away.

The Patriot defense proved to be unyielding and forced a fumble in Cooper territory with 47 seconds to play in the half. The Patriot offense moved the ball inside the Cooper ten yard line with six seconds left in play.

The Patriots kicked the field goal, but again a costly penalty wiped the scoreboard clean for the home team. With the penalty walked off, the Patriots tried for a second field goal, but this time the pig refused to go between the uprights, leaving the Patriots seven points behind at half time.

The two teams battled back and forth to what seemed to be a stalemate until late in the fourth quarter. With three minutes and thirty-nine seconds in the game, Bart Tatum refusing to go down, rna over everyone on the field it seemed, before Patriot Mike Blackburn nailed him inside the Patriot ten yard line. The next play, however, Tatum wouldn't be denied, and the Bulldogs tacked on six more.

The point after kick was good and the scoring ended with the Bulldogs at fourteen and the Patriots zip!

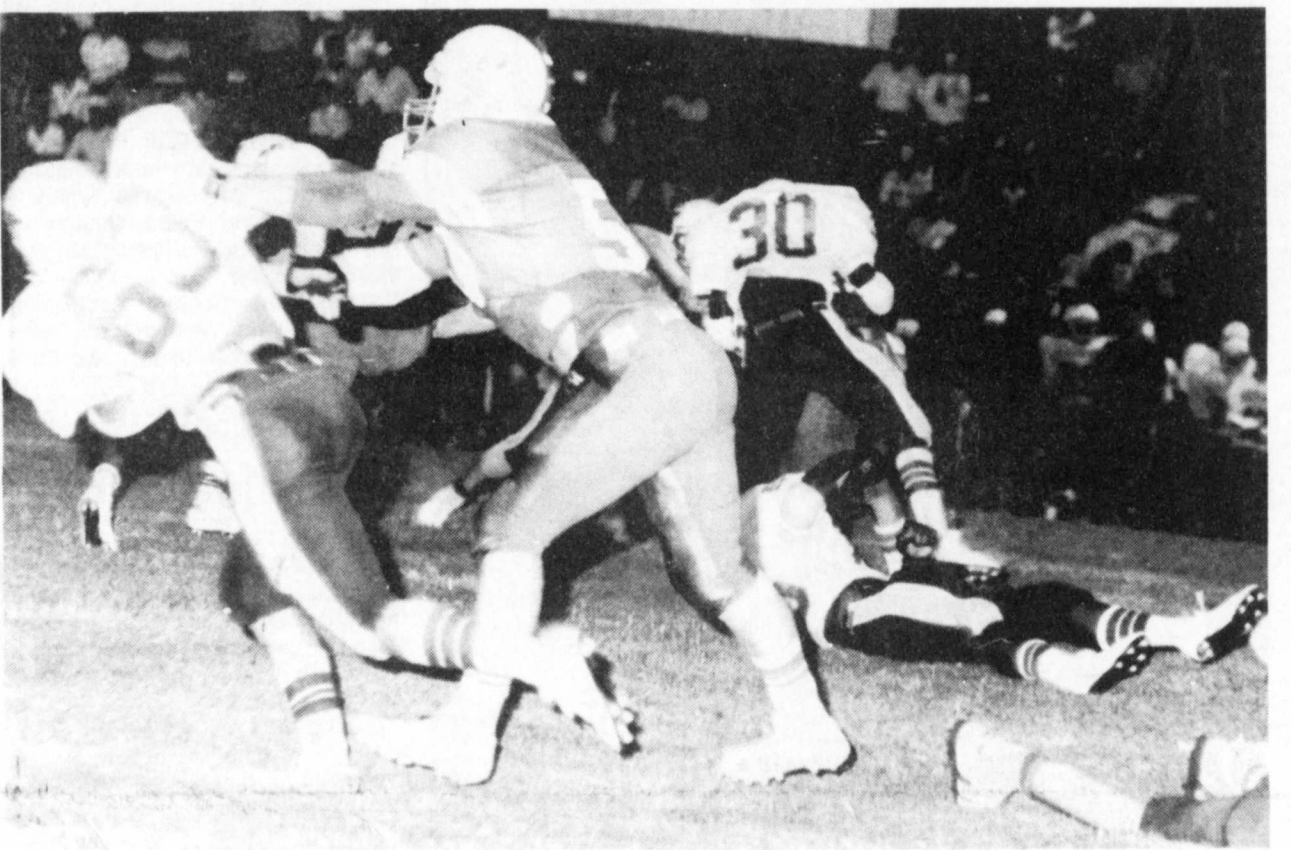
The Patriots travel to Caddo Mills next Friday. Game time will be at 8 p.m.

Casey Grant Is "True Texan"

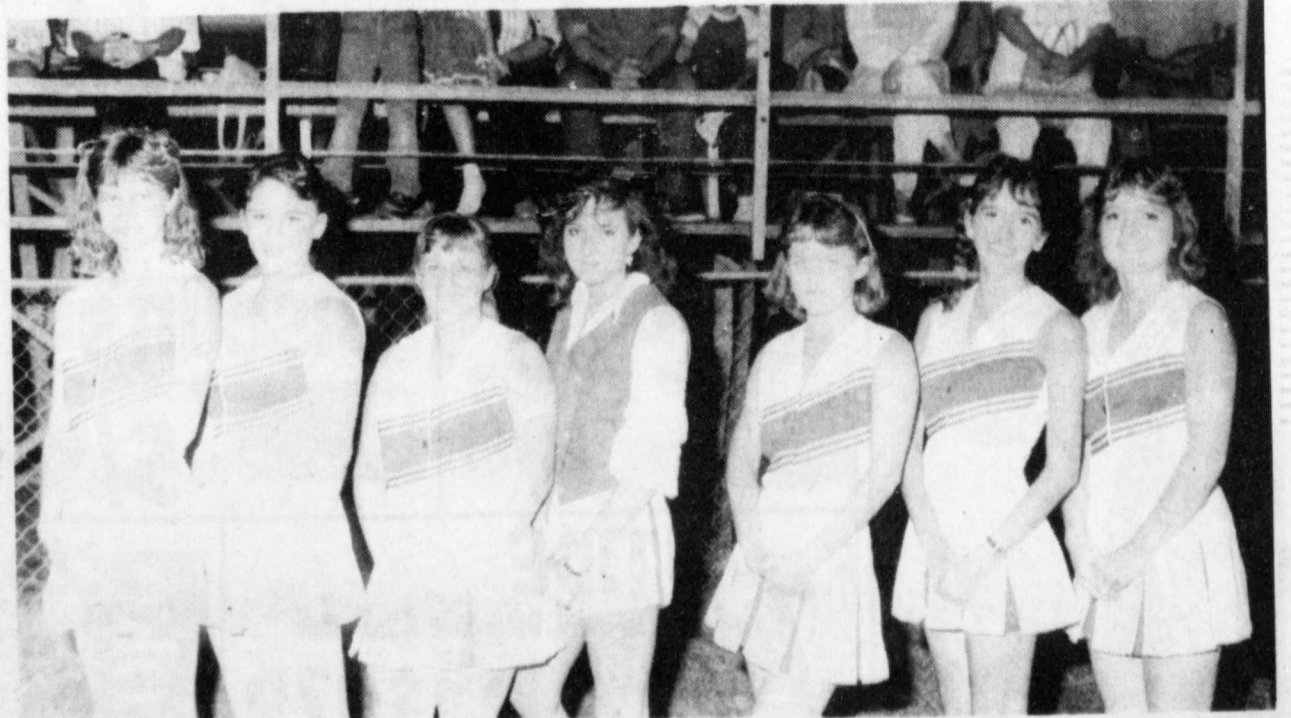
Casey Grant of Deport is a true Texan...even though she was born in Sacramento, California!

State Fair Of Texas Set For Sept. 26-Oct. 26

The State Fair of Texas always offers a just-right combination of the old and the new, some crowd favorites that are brought back year after year, as well as an exciting array of first-time-ever events and activities.

The 1986 State Fair, set for Sept. 26-Oct. 26, will include the SMU-TCU football game, pig races, a Centennial Reunion Day and a number of special exhibits in its list.

With a theme of "Texas 150", this year's State Fair celebrates both the Lone Star State's Sesquicentennial and the 100th anniversary of the first state fair.

The Centennial Building will feature a 17,000 square foot exhibit from the People's Republic of China. This year's new fair attractions will join a traditional assortment which includes the Texas-Oklahoma football game, the western hemisphere's tallest ferris wheel, the 1987 auto show; daily entertainment and an array of rides, games and food.

Admission is \$5 for adults and \$2 for children ages 5 to 12. Senior citizens are free each Tuesday. Fairgrounds hours are 7 a.m. to 11:30 p.m. daily.

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Volleyball Girls To Be Recognized

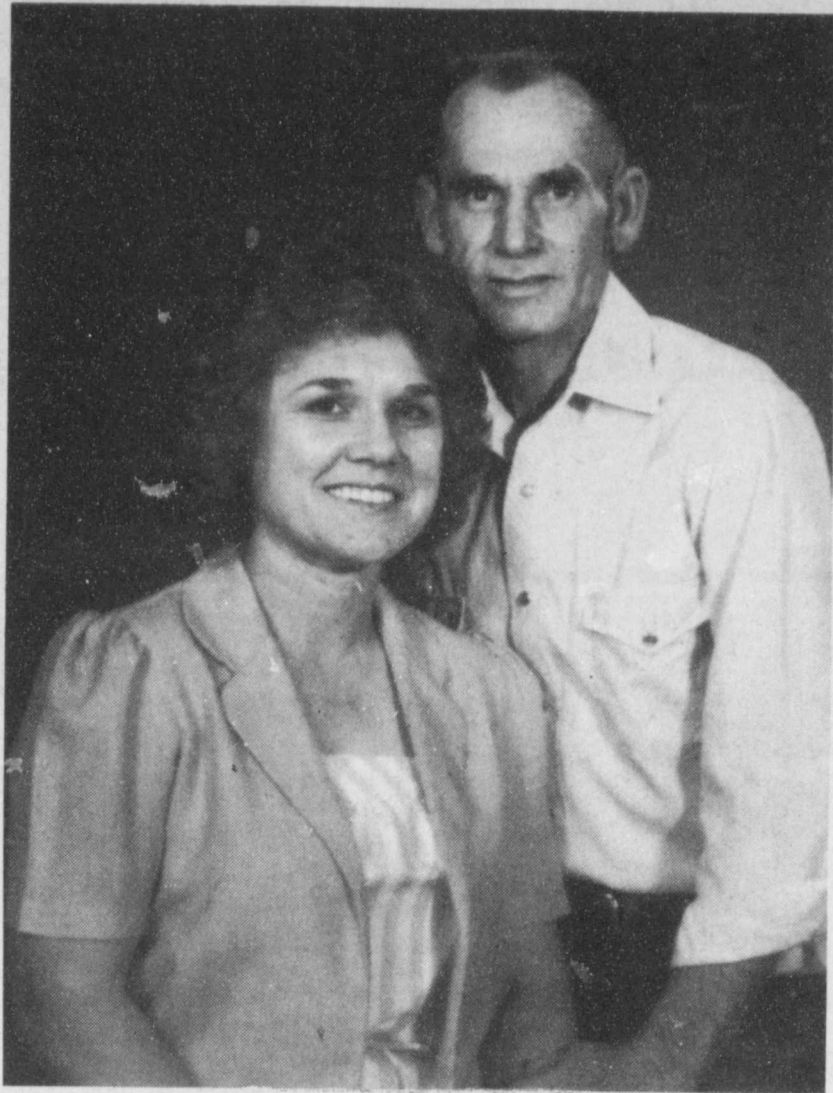
Approximately sixty people attended the Prairiland Booster Club meeting and "pot luck supper" which was held Tuesday night, September 16.
