contributed by Mrs. Olarence West. The background, painted eapecially or this window, hrought memoriee of the horrors of war
Slightly in front of the background was a "cut out"-an old shattered building, reduced to ruins by the artillery fire of the Germans. Stumps and atubs of trees, also cut out and painted in the most realistic colors, stood as monumental memo ries of the awful conflict.
A battered cannon with a wheel added to n-a gun lost in action scene. Between the cutouts and the background of this realistic scene, were hidden numerous red lights, and at night, when the window was luridily illuminated, only those who had seen a resl battlefully this marvellous color appreciate With the colors artiatically ble ed it produced the illusion of a golden sun casting its last rays upward as it sank benesth the red hormains of beautiful trees, spline reand mown down by artillery fire, and the wire entanglemente, and fire, and and-most pitiful sight of all-the little white crosses, standing out in tark relief, dumb memonal tribcoung Americang the those gallant young Americans who bad entered

The Sterling City News-Record of riday, November 9 makes serioue charges against upper class atudente of A. \& M. College, whom it is al-
leged make a regular practice of bruleged make a reguiar practice of bru tally "hazing' Freshmen.
The News-Record declares that Seth Sowell, of that eity, returned to his home in disgust the previous Sunday, the fourth member of the 1922-23 graduating class of Sterling City High sehool to try the A. \& M. this fall and the fourth young man to get enough "hazing" and come home.
The News-Record did not interview Seth, but has it "on good anthority that the 'hazers' of that in. stitution gave him a course of bazing that evena nigger would be ashamed to accord his mule."
But-the News-Record declares that it has the attested written atatements of Douglas Boswell, Clyde Reynolds and David Glass, who went along with Sowell to \(\mathbf{A}\). \& M., and from these statements that paper is led to conclude that "hazing" is the chief occupation of some of the upper clasemen and, consideriag the fact that about 800 freshmea entered the college this fall, "it nust'keep the 'hazers' busy to whip and beat them all; but it is known that some of the freshmen have gone two whole days without some orm of hazing. and the upper clase. men must be overworked."
According to the affidavit of young Boawell, "one Eitt, a big beast, who poses as an upper classmab," introduced himself to the former by forcing him to hold bis ansles while he, Eitt, spelled his name Qn Boswell's posterior anatomy by kicking him nearly blind,
