We extend our thanks to Mrs. Burkett for her information, and to all those who allowed us to use their class pictures during the past few weeks. We hope each ex-student, and ex-patron who has read this history, and is unacquainted with the 1973 Homecoming, will take the time to write Mrs. Burkett a note, if they wish to contribute to this feature.

were held in the school gym. The following resolutions were adopted:

**Name:** Haskell School Homecoming Association.

**Eligibility for Membership:** All ex-students, all present and former teachers, employees, school board members and patrons.

**Purpose:** Promote contact, friendship and good will among members. Promote the welfare and advancement of Haskell Public Schools.

**Year of Meeting:** To be decided at each general assembly meeting by the association at large.

**Place of Meeting:** Haskell School Plant.

And so, on Friday, Oct. 7,

1955, the school held its second Homecoming, with Hill Oates as president. Speaker was Dr. Herman Pittman of Warrenburg, Mo. J. J. Ballard of Winnemucca, Nev., traveled the farthest, and was also the earliest day ex-student, from the class of 1885. The largest family of ex-students were the six children of I. D. Killingsworth.

Oct. 26, 1957, the third association meeting was held, with Royce Adkins as president. The Hon. Clyde Grissom, Chief Justice of the Court of Civil Appeals in Eastland was the speaker. Ex-students from the earliest classes were Iron Pearsey, Mrs. Ada Rike, Albert English and Miss May Fields. Ex-student traveling the farthest was

Dale Cook, class of '34, from St. Louis, Mo. The largest families were the five children of I. D. Killingsworth and the five children of the J. T. Hester family.

It was decided by the General Assembly at this meeting for the Haskell Homecoming Association to meet every two years.

Next meeting was held Sept. 26, 1959 with Mrs. Allie Irby Payne as president. Speaker was Charles Bates Thornton, of Litton Industries of Los Angeles, Calif. Ex-student traveling the farthest was Miss Maybelle Taylor, class of '23, from Recife, Brazil, South America. Largest family were the seven

## Homecoming Speakers

Persons attending the 1973 Haskell School Homecoming will be privileged with a double treat at the General Assembly program Saturday afternoon at 2:30 p. m. in the Haskell National Bank Community Building.

Not only will they hear Dr. Gaines Post, who after a lifetime of world travels has returned home to Haskell to enjoy his retirement; but they will also hear his cousin, Troy Victor Post, who was also born here in Haskell. Both men are listed in "Who's Who in America."

Both men have achieved what all men aspire to—they have gained the heights of their fields of endeavor. Dr. Gaines Post in the field of education, and Troy Post in the insurance field. Both men, too, have branched out from their field to excel in many things.

Dr. Gaines Post, class of '20, the son of the late Henry S. and Rachel Ballard Post, married Katherine Rike, H. H. S. Class of '27, and the couple has two sons, John Frederic and Gaines Jr.

He received his BA from Texas University; his M.A. from Harvard; his Ph.D. from Harvard and received a Harvard Fellowship for study in Paris and Rome. He has been author and instructor at Harvard, Professor of History at the University of Wisconsin, Professor of History at Princeton, and retired in 1970 as Professor Emeritus of History.

Honors received include Phi Beta Kappa; Fellowships for research in European libraries and archives—Guggenheim and Fulbright; and special honors of Fellow of the Medieval Academy of America, of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences, of the Institute for Advanced Study, and of the American Society for Legal History. He is also a corresponding Member of the Heideberg Akademik der Wissenschaften, Philosophisch-historische Klasse.



DR. GAINES POST

Publications by Dr. Post include many articles and book reviews in professional, learned periodicals in the United States and Europe, a book—*Studies in Medieval Learning*—Thought and articles in the *Dictionary of History of Ideas*. He was awarded the Gold Medal by the Medieval Academy.

Troy Victor Post of Dallas was born on a farm near Haskell, to Sid and Effie Hisey Post. When he was 6, the family moved to Waco. He attended Waco and Fort Worth public schools, and quit high school before graduation to go to work for a Fort Worth bank.

At the age of 20, he left the bank to take a job with a life insurance company in Fort Worth, and soon went on to Dallas to work for a well-known life insurance company, where, in less than a year, he was assistant to the vice president-agency director.

When 27, he returned to Haskell where he formed his first life insurance company with \$138 of personal assets, in 1933, the depth of the great depression. By 1936 he moved his company headquarters to Dallas and succeeded within a year (Continued to Page 4, Sec. 1)

Mrs. Ann Taylor Fisher of Tyler, assisted by a group of ex-students, and the "Nineteens", singing group, under direction of Mr. and Mrs. Hubert Bell, gave the program. At this meeting, Life Memberships were offered, to help finance future Homecomings. Membership fees were set at \$10.00, and cover all future registrations. Oldest ex-students present were T. I. Pearsey and Mrs. Ola Beavers Frazier; oldest teacher was Miss May Fields; ex traveling the farthest was R. L. Lemmon from Los Angeles, Calif. Mr. Iron Pearsey was recognized at this meeting for his 35 years of faithful service to the Haskell schools.

The bi-annual meeting Oct. 5, 1963, saw Clay Smith as president, and Woodrow Adeock, class of '32, Dist. Supt. of Abilene Dist. of United Methodist Church, gave the program. Oldest student attending was Iron Pearsey; oldest teacher was again Miss May Fields; oldest music teacher was Mrs. H. R. (Miss Connie) Jones, 90 years old; traveling the farthest was Mrs. Ruth Lewis Reid from Australia and her twin brother, Raymond Lewis of Vanderhoof, B. C. Another ex, Edwin Lusk, of Tacna, Peru, was also present. Largest family was that of Mr. and Mrs. C. D. Long.

On Oct. 9, 1965, Ira Hester was president of the Homecoming association, and speaker was Virgil Reynolds, class of '28, Assistant Administrator of the office of General Aviation of the FFA of Washington, D. C. Iron Pearsey was again the oldest student and Miss May Fields was again recognized as the oldest teacher present.

The 9th bi-annual meeting was held Nov. 8, 1969 in the First Methodist Church with Raja Hassen as president. The guest speaker was Bishop Kenneth Copeland, Bishop of the Houston Area Texas Conference & Gulf Coast Conference of Houston. Special awards that year were a 'key to the city' to Bishop Copeland; Honorary Life Membership to Mrs. Lucretia Brooks. Education Award to T. C. Williams of Cisco, the first County Superintendent; and to Mr. T. I. Pearsey, again for being the oldest ex-grad. Largest family was that of Jesse Jones, with 27 family members present, with their family nurse, Sammie Aldridge, who helped to raise them. Ex-student traveling the farthest were Charles Bates Thornton of Los Angeles, Calif., and Virgil Reynolds of Washington, D. C.

Homecoming for 1971 was held in the high school gym Oct. 23, with Dr. Wm. J. Kemp presiding. Guest speakers were Dr. Frank Spencer, class of '41, a noted heart surgeon from New York City; and Dr. Henry Post, class of '41, of Louisville, Kentucky. Denise Roberson was crowned Homecoming queen; Mr. Iron Pearsey was the oldest ex present; the J. M. Crawford family was the largest present, and Buddy Herren, of Pontomac, Maryland, traveled the farthest. Plans for building of a Haskell Memorial Civic Center, honoring the pioneers and 'exes' who have left us the heritage we now enjoy, were presented to the assembly.

Memorial services are conducted each year, the association meets, and persons conducting the services, and the year, include: Wallace Cox Sr., 1937; W. E. Kirkpatrick, 1939; Royce Adkins, 1961; W. P. Ratliff, 1963; Ira Hester, 1965; and R. C. Couch Jr., 1967, 1969 and 1971.

Up until 1961, the Haskell Homecoming Association had only had a small registration fee to help defray expenses of the Association.

At the 1961 meeting, it was decided to offer life memberships of \$10 each to finance future Homecomings when needed. Haskell ex-students responded well. The money from Life Memberships has been placed in the Haskell National Bank in a savings account, drawing interest.

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# Accident Injures 3 Youths

Haskell County was shocked and saddened by another serious one-vehicle accident last week, that put two youths in the hospital, and injured another.

The three boys, William Jeffery Wilson, 17, James Derrol Crain, 18, and David Moreno, 18, all of Rochester, were in a 1961 Ford pickup owned by the Rochester school, and Wilson was driving. All three boys are Rochester High School students.

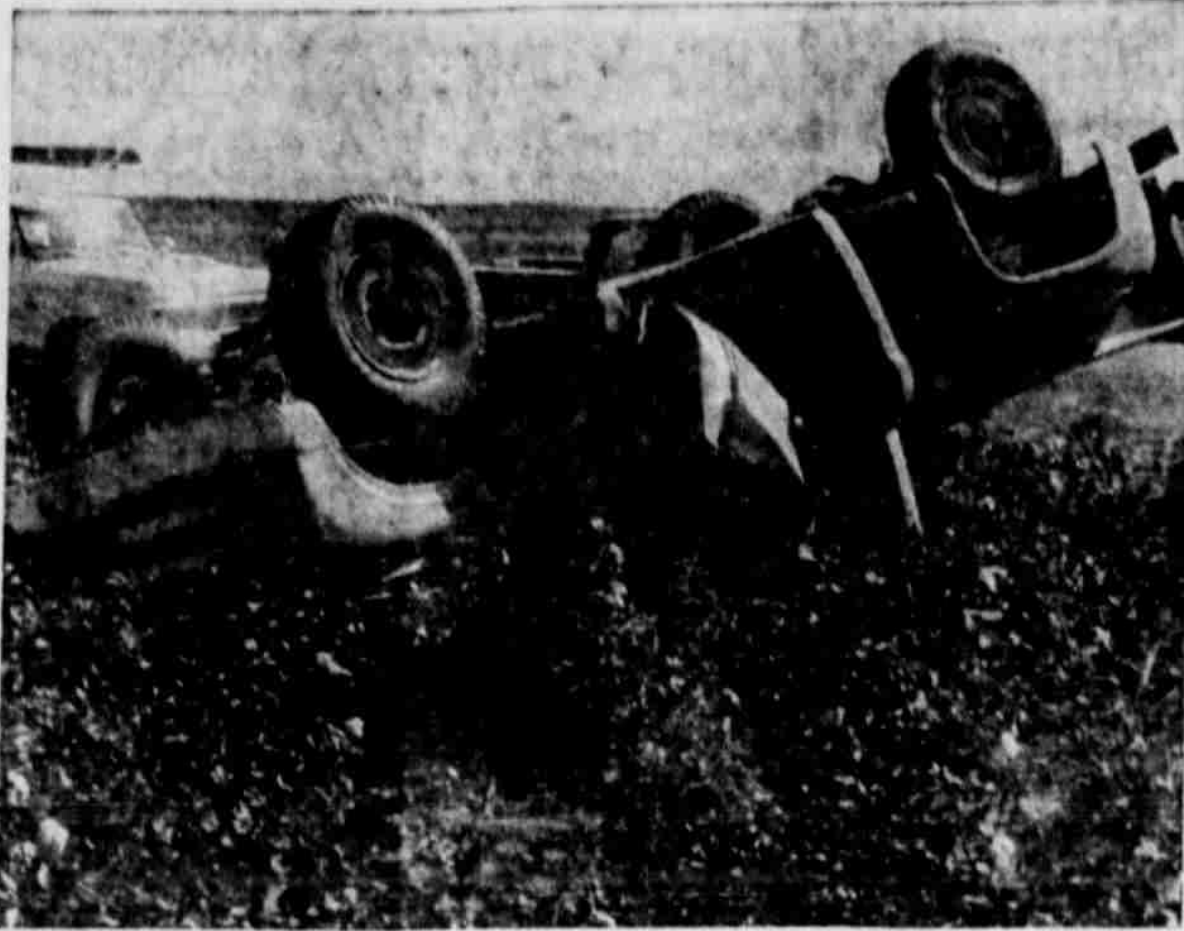
The accident occurred at approximately 12:25 p. m., Nov. 1, 7/10 of a mile east of O'Brien on FM 2229. They were traveling east, and there is a double curve on the road there. According to Texas Highway Patrolman Larry Gilbreath, the driver apparently lost control of the vehicle on the second curve. The pickup went into the left barrow ditch and overturned, then struck a highline pole and turned over on its top.

The impact evidently threw Wilson and Crain out of the pickup. Impact also broke the highline pole off at the ground, and the wires were entangled in the bed of the pickup, which received extensive damage.

Moreno, least injured of the three, went into O'Brien to notify authorities, and then was taken to Knox City Hospital in a private car. Wilson and Crane were taken to the Knox City Hospital by Smith Funeral Home ambulance.

According to a report received by THP Gilbreath, Wilson was transferred immediately to Wichita General Hospital with broken ribs and extensive internal injuries. Crain, who had minor visible injuries, also reported pain in his legs, and Moreno received minor injuries.

At this time, Mr. Post was reputed to be the youngest man ever to hold the presidency of a full capital stock legal reserve life insurance company in the United States. With a reputation for thorough knowledge of the business, for imagination, for initiative, for judgment, enthusiasm and character, and for unexcelled determination and leadership, he attained this when only five other such companies were organized in the entire United States during this 8-year period.

He is somewhat of a legend in the life insurance industry, with a lot of firsts to his credit. When the nation entered WWII, he was ordered to the Air Force School in Miami and was subsequently assigned as Assistant to the Chief of Finance in Washington, D. C.

After the war years, he turned again to Texas in 1946. He resigned the presidency of his original insurance company and organized his own stock life insurance company. He gradually moved to the forefront of the industry and in 1962 became President and Chairman of the Board of one of the nation's largest life insurance and financial management firms, Great-America Corp., which controlled seven companies with combined assets of approximately \$3 billion. He was Chairman of the Board or a top executive of each. In 1967, Mr. Post agreed to place the Great-America complex under the control and management of Ling-Temco-Vought complex, which then became the 14th largest corporation in the United States.

While his formal education is little, his informal education is comprehensive, acquired from a life of study, a keen and analytical mind, and a complete rejection of the proposition that it 'can't be done.'

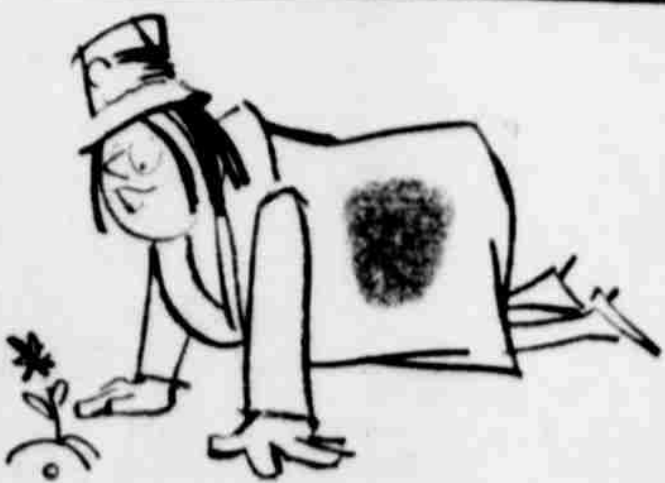

## 230 Turn Out For Election

Only 230 voters went to the polls Tuesday to vote on nine proposed amendments to the Constitution, in what was one of the lightest turnouts in recent elections.

County voters passed all but three of the proposed amendments—No. 1, the homestead amendment; No. 6, that the district and county court shall have the general jurisdiction of a probate court; and No. 8, to authorize cities, towns and villages to levy ad valorem taxes to pay principal and interest on general obligations.

The other amendments all passed, including extending the \$3,000 ad valorem tax exemption to homesteads of unmarried adults; establishing requirements relative to laws creating conservation and reclamation districts; adding \$100 million in bonds or obligations of Texas for the Veterans' Land Fund, and proposal 9, which is vital to small towns—the amendment authorizing the legislature to exempt from property taxes certain property used by a nonprofit water supply corporation or a nonprofit water supply cooperative.

The nine amendments following vote counts for 199 against; No. 43; No. 3, 182 to 60 to 185; No. 7, 148 to 98; No. 5, 136 to 8, 96 to 120; and No. 7.

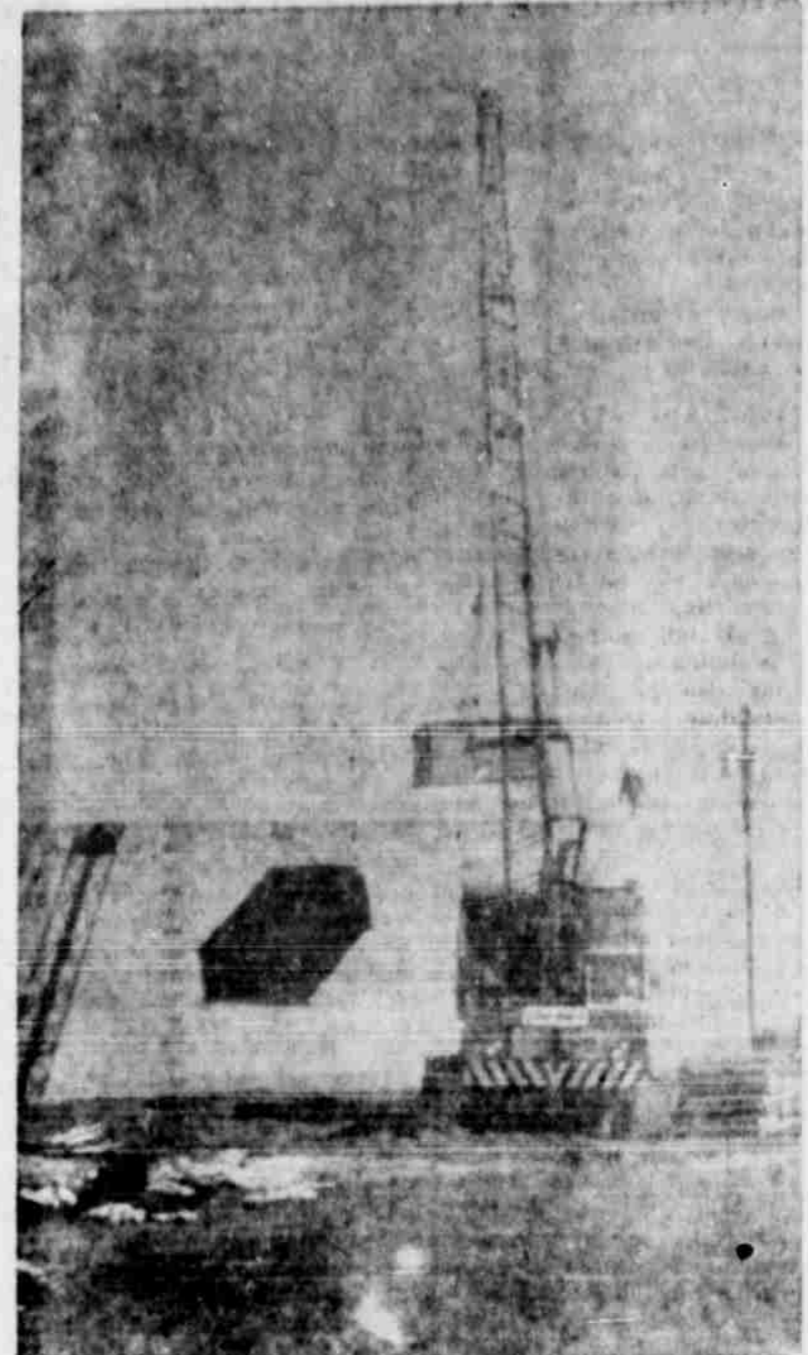

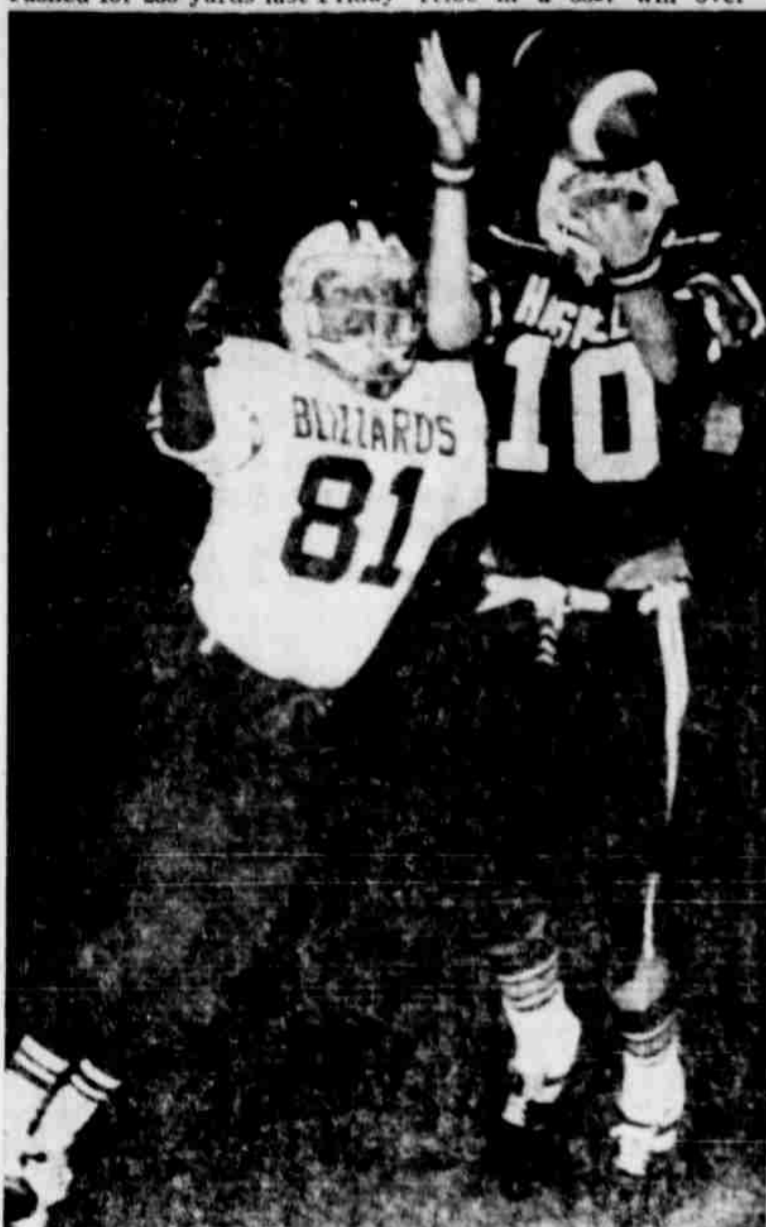

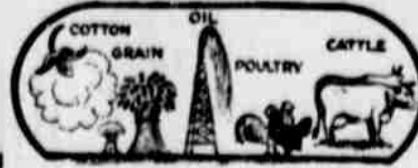

## S-Z Plus Tardies Should Check SSI Benefits Now

Many of the more than 1,000 persons who have applied with the Abilene social security office for the new Supplemental Security Income (SSI) that will replace the adult assistance payments from the state of Texas as of January 1974 followed the request that they stagger their filings according to their last names, reports Bob Tuley, district manager. Persons whose last names start with S-Z, or who put off action, are reminded that November is the last month the social security people feel completely confident that they'll have enough time to get that Jan. 2, 1974, check out on time. Tuley reminds our readers that although his office will be handling the SSI claims, the money does not come from the trust funds for retirement, survivors, disability, and medicare to which workers and self-employed people have been paying in taxes.

He also repeated previous information that anyone with a social security, railroad retirement, or other state or federal monthly benefit of more than \$150 will not qualify for SSI. Other matters that can affect entitlement or size of payment include ownership of a home valued at over \$25,000, ownership of one or more cars or trucks with a total value of over \$1200, living in the household of another, earnings of more than \$65 per month, etc. Anyone over 65, blind, or disabled who does not already get an assistance check from Austin, and who cannot get in to a social security office or to a local meeting point to see a representative, may—DURING NOVEMBER—make a collect telephone call to the social security office in Abilene, (915) 677-5262, to file for SSI payments, or to get authoritative decisions as to eligibility. Time's a-wastin'.

## US Air Force Needs Pilots

ARLINGTON, Texas—The U. S. Air Force has a continuing need for qualified male applicants to fill pilot and navigator vacancies between now and June 1974. Applications received during the next few months will be used to fill classes beginning after Jan. 1, 1974. Applicants must possess a Baccalaureate degree, have excellent physical health, and fall between the ages of 20 and 27. Selection rate is over 95% for persons meeting the above criteria and offers a starting salary of \$889.00 monthly. Accepted candidates into the program will be scheduled to attend the School of Military Sciences-Officer (SMS-O) in San Antonio and receive a commission as a Second Lieutenant upon completion of the course. The new officer will then enter undergraduate pilot or navigator training to earn his wings. Applications can be processed during the senior year with entry into the program up to 150 days prior to graduation. Local Air Force Recruiting Offices listed in the white pages can provide additional details.

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## Cotton Classing Office Report

Grade 41 accounted for 38% of the cotton classed in the Munday Classing Office since opening on Oct. 29, 1973. USDA's Agricultural Marketing Service Office classed 3,620 samples during the week ending Friday, Nov. 2. At the same time last year, 12,500 samples had been classed. Percentages of other grades are as follows: grade 31 was

7%; grade 51, 11%; grade 32, 17%; and grade 42, 18%.

The predominant staple length was 30 with 45%, followed by staple 31 with 38%. Other percentages are as follows: staple 29 with 7%; staple 32 with 9%. Mike readings are good with 94% in the 3.5-4.9 range. Cotton miking below 3.5 accounted for 2%, and that making 5.0 and up was 4%.

Demand for uncontracted cotton is very light. No prices information is available.

The cotton harvest in the ar-

ea served by the USDA's Abilene Classing Office appears to have leveled at around 7,000 bales per day, reports B. B. Manly, Jr., Officer In Charge of the office.

This week the Abilene office processed 41,000 samples by working Saturday and Sunday. As of Nov. 1, 1973, the office is three working days behind. The office has processed around 80,500 samples this season, from a crop expected to produce something over 1/2 million bales.

Quality of cotton classed showed little change from ear-

lier trends. One change found grades 31 and 41 dropping from 44% last week to 31% this week. Grades 32, 42 and 52 increased from 37% last week to 55% this week. Cotton reduced on account of bark was 24% in both periods.

Staple was a little shorter this week with lengths 29 and 30 increasing from 0% to 25% last week to 7% and 47%. Staples 31 and 32 decreased this week from 50% and 21% last week to 34% and 8% this week. Micronaire readings were almost identical to the prior

week, with 90% in the premium range of 3.5 thru 4.9.

For producers the market was bad news this week. Prices quoted by the Agricultural Marketing Service show they dropped from 10 to 13 cents per pound. Our most predominant quality, 4.230 premium mike now brings from 46 to 49 cents per pound. Grade 4131 brings from 47.35 to 50.35 cents per pound.

## Gov. Dolph Briscoe Proclaims Food And Fiber Month In Texas

Gov. Dolph Briscoe has officially proclaimed November as "Food and Fiber Appreciation Month" in Texas, and various observances are being planned in the state's 254 counties.

Local chairmen and their committees have indicated that a wide array of activities are being planned to highlight the month-long educational event saluting agriculture's contributions.

Briscoe, in the official proclamation, noted that Texas—long a giant in the production of agricultural products—is third in the nation in total farm and ranch output, yet currently leads the 50 states in annual production of beef cattle, sheep, goats, grain sorghum, cotton, rice, onions and wool.

Texas also harvests substantial amounts of peanuts, vegetables, citrus, fruits, honey, cereal grains, soybeans, turkeys and dairy products, the Governor noted.

"The unparalleled efficiency of Texas agricultural producers and associated agri-business has helped provide food and fiber that allows Texas consumers to purchase more milk, bread, steak, butter, eggs and other food and fiber products for fewer minutes of work than ever before in recorded history," Briscoe said.

Today, only one-half as much

work time is required to purchase as much food and fiber products as in the "good old days," the governor added.

"Even with a declining farm population, each farmer produces enough food and fiber for himself and more than 50 others. Therefore, it is fitting that November be observed to recognize contributions of Texas Agriculture and to encourage

renewed appreciation culture by every citizen," Briscoe said.

Briscoe is serving as honorary chairman for the observance, along with G. Seruggs, editor of the Progressive Farmer.

Officers for the observance are Jack Johnson, president; Schroeder, treasurer; H. Meischen, coordinator; Austin. There are 254 county chairmen.

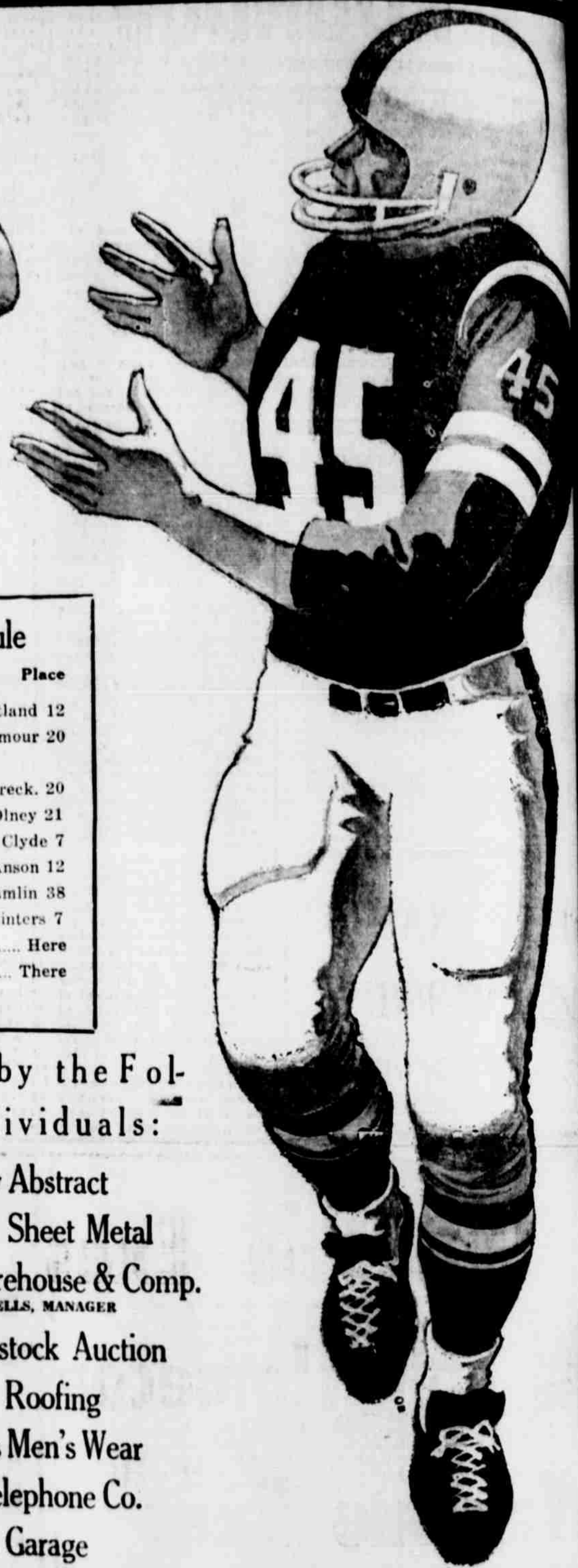
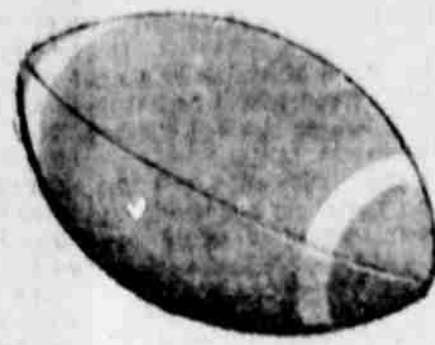

The average wheat price in Texas is \$4.24 compared with parity at \$3.51 per bushel. Corn at \$2.75 per bushel compares with parity of \$2.36. Rice at \$11 per hundredweight compares with \$9.65 parity. Potatoes at \$6.50 per hundredweight compares with \$4.32 parity.

parity at \$37.10. Beef cattle averaged \$56.30 per hundredweight; parity is \$44.70. Calves at \$68 per hundred average compares with parity at \$54.20. Sheep at \$19.40 per hundred compare with parity at \$12.60. Lambs averaged \$37.60, but this is \$8.20 per hundred under parity.

Turkeys averaged 46 cents per pound with parity at 40.5 cents per pound. Eggs averaged 69.2 cents per dozen with parity at 64 cents. Mohair averaged \$2.30 per pound with parity at \$1.49 per pound.

Cotton prices to farmers averaged 34 cents per pound while parity was 66.05 cents per pound.

The all-farm products index of prices received by Texas farmers and ranchers is 20 per cent above the month of August and 61 per cent above a year ago. The livestock and livestock products index is 21 per cent above a month ago and 69 per cent higher than a year ago. The all-crops index is 18 per cent above a month ago and 50 percent above a year ago.

And though farm prices go up, they also come down. During the period from August 15 to Sept. 6, for example, prices had dropped 14 per cent.

Farm production costs also continue to rise. The index of prices paid by farmers is 19 per cent above a year ago.

Drylot sheep feeders with a capacity of 2,000 head or more had 117,000 sheep and lambs on feed for slaughter as of Sept. 1. This is 7 per cent below the number on feed a month earlier and 9 per cent below the number on feed a year ago.

Current intentions to market are: Sept. 55,000; Oct. 36,000; Nov. 26,000. Placements during August totaled 54,000 head with a total of 10 feeders reporting 1,000 or more head on feed as of Sept. 1.

## BARBERING EXAMINATION

During the past two years, more than 15 adults have received their GED as a result of the adult education classes offered at the Agency. New classes for this type of training began this month.

Another project that has proven of tremendous importance to the low-income families in the area is the garden and canning project. Vegetables have been raised and many jars canned at the Center during the past year. A Home Demonstration Club for women, and a 4-H Club provide instruction for this type home management activity.

About six or seven hundred children have been helped through the Community Clinic. This clinic is held each first Saturday of each month. The Chest Clinic is also held at the CAP Center each first Thursday of each month.

In taking census for the Negro families for the past four and one-half years, the population has dropped from about 250 to about 150. This is about 100 church members and 50 non-church members.

The rabbit project has about 10 families participating, and quilting is yet a project at the Center.

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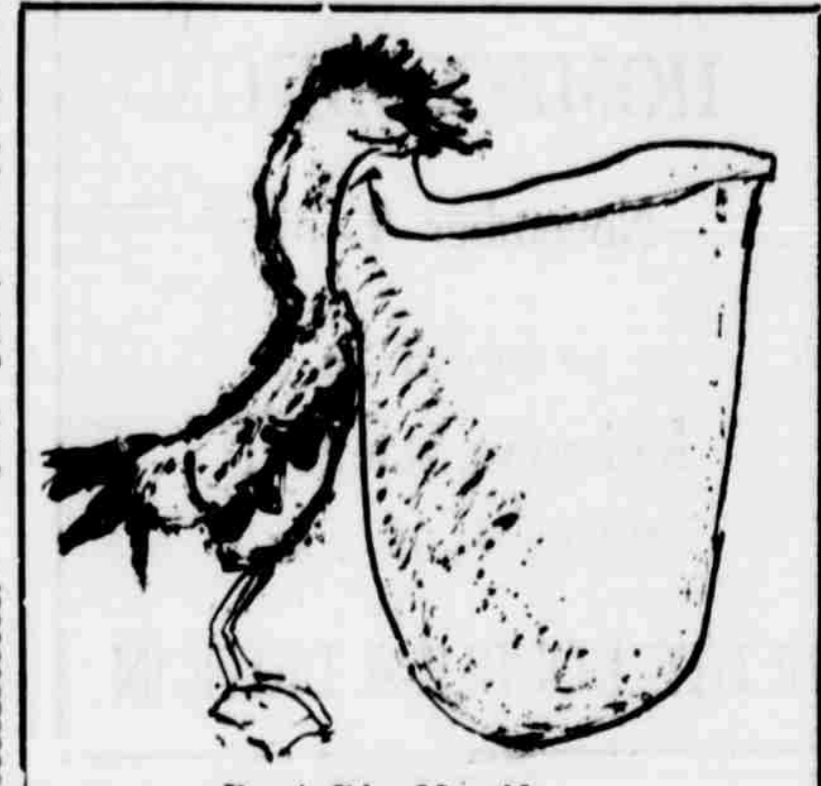

WASHINGTON, D. C.—Crisis is not new to America. When it has occurred, Americans have not panicked. We remember from the past that the most splendid accomplishments of our Nation have been under just such conditions—crisis.

It is evident that America and her people are now in one of these infrequent combinations of challenges and dangers which traditionally have called for our best. And our best—a very good "best" indeed—has always been forthcoming. History indicates that not until the Nation's security or its way of life is imperiled will it gather its strength and organize its potentials to keep the triumphs of its destiny.

In two wars in the first half of this century, the American people were moved as they had not been moved for many years before. It was under terrific pressure that Americans in each of these world cataclysms called upon their inner strengths in times of crisis and developed, through unlimited commitment to their goals, the results which brought about needed victories.

The crisis now is one of confidence in government, coupled with our economic well-being. In the latter, ill-starred Government policies are sapping our economic strength, preventing it from a renewal of itself to continue serving the public interest and for continued sound growth. Strait-jacketed controls on business, some well intended, are resulting in shortages by crippling production.

Out of the pressures of crisis of confidence can come a re-birth of understanding and a reawakening which will contribute to making this a stronger Nation than ever. It can come about because people will have been aroused to fundamental wrongs and dangers that have been threatening the good of the Country.

We have confidence that a reordering and a correcting of priorities will develop through reconjunction of two great American assets—its rich and still available store of natural resources and the driving genius of the American individual. Expressed by increasing utilization

of our science and technology and a combination of a need for protecting our National security and a return to a system of sound incentives to maximize all our strengths, this Nation once again will demonstrate accomplishments in the face of challenge. It will bring forth results to show why our Nation has been and still is unique in the world.

If we come to realize the facts, face them with courage, calmness, and orderliness, opportunity will continue for the finest accomplishments when crisis exists.

So we may look upon our present troubles as a symbol that there is coming another American renaissance of spirit and understanding which can help make this Nation stronger.

Stated differently, what is happening may represent for America and its people a true opportunity to meet and overcome another of its traditional great challenges. In the meantime, we do not panic but rather accept the line from Hamlet: "And make us rather bear the ills we have than flee to others that we know not of."

### Veterans Should Advise Families Of Benefits

The Veterans Administration urges veterans who haven't done so to "advise survivors of benefits they are entitled to from the agency in event of your death."

Jack Coker, VA Regional Director, emphasized that "failure to do so could cause undue anguish during times of great emotional stress."

"It's a good idea for veteran and spouse to sit down and openly discuss family matters, including locations of family documents, which would facilitate filing of claims for VA benefits, he further suggested.

Such documents as military discharge papers, divorce decrees, guardianship or child custody evidence, birth, marriage and death certificates should be kept safe from fire and theft, yet readily accessible.

Other important details include keeping track of GI and commercial insurance policies, "C" numbers from VA correspondence, Social Security numbers and naturalization papers.

Veterans also were advised that in event of death, the deceased's family or close friends should know they can check with veterans service organizations, as well as VA offices, for information or other assistance.
