Not only will they hear Dr. Gaines Post, who after a lifetime of world travels has returned home to Haskell to enjoy his retirement; but they will also hear his cousin. Troy Victor Post, who was also born here in Haskell. Both men are listed in "Who's Who In Amer-

Both men have achieved what all men aspire to - they have gained the heights of their fields of endeavor ... Dr. Gaines Post in the field of education, and Troy Post in the insurance field. Both men, too, have branched out from their field to excell in many things

Dr. Gaines Post, class of '20, the son of the late Henry S. and Rachel Ballard Post, married Katherine Rike, H. H. S. Class of '27, and the couple has two sons. John Frederic and Gaines Jr.

He received his BA from Texas University; his M.A. from Harvard; his Ph.D. from Harvard and received a Harvard Fellowship for study in Paris and Rome. He has been author and instructor at Harvard, Professor of History at the University of Wisconsin. Professor of History at Princeton; and retired in 1970 as Pro-

fessor Emeritus of History. Honors received include Phi Beta Kappa; Fellowships for research in European libraries and archives-Guggenheim and Fullbright; and special honorof Fellow of the Medieval Academy of America, of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences, of the Institute for Advanced Study, and of the American Society for Legal History. He is also a corresponding Member of the Heidelberg Akademic der Wissenshaften, Philosophish-historische Klasse.


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



At this time, Mr. Post was reputed to be the youngest man ever to hold the presidency of a full capital stock legal reserve life insurance company in the United States. With a repstation for thorough knowledge of the business, for imagination, for initiative, for judgment, enthusiasm and character, and for unexcelled determination and leadership, he attained this when only five other such companies were organized in the entire United States during this 8-year period.

He is somewhat of a legend in the life insurance industry, with a lot of firsts to his credit. When the nation entered WWII, Air Force School in Miami and was subsequently assigned as Lion. Proceeds will go toward Assistant to the Chief of Finthe Goodfellow fund ance in Washington, D. C.

After the war years, he turned again to Texas in 1946. He resigned the presidency of his original insurance company and organized his own stock life insurance company. Great-america Corp., which controlled seven companies with combined assets of approximately \$3 billion. He was Chairman of the Board or a top executive of each. In 1967, Mr. Post agreed to place the Great - america complex under the control and management of Ling - Temco - Vought complex, which then became the 14th largest corporation in the United States.

While his formal education is little, his informal education is comprehensive, acquired from a life of study, a keen and analytical mind, and a complete rejection of the proposition that it 'can't be done.'





He also repeated previous information that anyone with a social security, railroad retirement, or other state or federal monthly benefit of more than \$150 will not qualify for SSI. Other matters that can affect entitlement or size of payment include ownership of a home valued at over \$25,000, ownership of one or more cars or trucks with a total value of over \$1200, living in the household of another, earnings of more than \$65 per month, etc.

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
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


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
