He was getting tired. To entertain himself he was sliding carefully from side to side across the pew.

When he tired of that, he tried flipping through the hymn book, but it contained no pictures, and very little of interest.

He turned to look back at the congregation, looking me straight in the eye. I grinned and gave him a big wink. Delightedly, he lowered himself behind the pew back, then slowly raised up again. I rewarded him with another smile.

With all apologies to my minister, watching the little boy in the pew ahead of me caused a wave of memory so strong that the gist of the sermon faded to the back.

Summer services when I was a child weren't punctuated with the rumble of air conditioning, but with the faint, rhythmic "fup, fup, fup" of the old-fashioned ceiling fans.

My grandmother and grandfather, Jeffus, with whom I did a great deal of my church attendance, would place me between them, thus effectively corraling their charge from getting up to too much mischief.

Grandmother was a great believer in starch. Not wimpy spray starch, nor even cold starch. We're talking boiled starch that would provide enough stiffness to support at least a hundred pounds dead weight!

I always remember her ironing grandfather's white dress shirts that he wore to the bank. They stood like soldiers at attention, leaning only slightly against the wall, upright thanks to that starch!

The problem was, I had tender skin. She wanted to starch my little cotton dresses (pre-perma-press, obviously) like she did his shirts.

This created tension. My mom, who also has tender skin, wouldn't subject me to starch, preferring my skirts to be a little limp rather than listening to me whimper over the rash on my skin.

Then, protesting loudly, she dressed me for church, pronouncing the dress suitable and further irritating me by giving her forefinger a quick lick and swiping back an errant lock or two of hair.

Upon arrival the huge old church sanctuary always felt so cool. The blistering Texas sun hadn't yet had a chance to heat the building, and the fans were stirring the air.

But as service progressed, the room became warmer, and the starch in my dress would begin to sting and prickle. Pretty soon, perspiration would break out, and I began trying to stealthily scratch.

Before long grandmother would admonish me to "Sit Still, Young Lady" in a firm whisper.

Like the little boy today, I employed methods of passing the time. Of course, singing the hymns was fun. The passing of the collection plate was always a high point.

It was only the sermon that dragged on. Most kids feel the same.

As I grew older I began to sit with the other youngsters, all in a row at the front, where we came under the scrutiny not just of our particular guardians, but the entire congregation. If we began to giggle or whisper too loud, or overused our note-passing privileges, it became the job of the adult sitting directly behind us to provide a little discipline.

Eventually, of course, the service ended, and we could while away a few minutes running like colts turned out into pasture, exercising our vocal cords (reduced to almost no use for an entire HOUR), and generally getting rid of the excess energy we were so abundantly blessed with.

Things change, the church, like most churches, is air conditioned. The floor has carpet, the decor is different. But some things are as constant as summer itself.

The familiar hymns, the ritual of collection, the soft amen's and scripture readings.

That's why I winked at the little boy ahead of me...because I knew how he felt...and because that's exactly what my Grandfather always did to me. You see, he understood too...remembering back when he was a youngster, before the turn of the century, when sermons were a little wearisome to children, and summer services had the same hymns, the same rituals, the same wonderful continuity.

Four-Year Old Cowboy Has Passion For Percussion

He loves county and western music, and he loves playing the drums. He sticks a horse like a burr, brands calves, and is about as handsome a cowboy as can be found.

When he walks into a room his jeans break across the tops of his boots just right, and his cowboy hat is tilted at a confident angle.

His eyes are blue and full of mischief, and he's never met a stranger in his life. His name is John William Stoney Musgrove, and he's seen a lot of the country from the cab of an eighteen wheeler.

Home to Stoney is a brown house on the Musgrove Ranch in Cunningham, Texas.

He lives there with his dad, Stacy, and mom, Linda.

What makes any of these things unusual is that Stoney is only four years old!

Stoney's most amazing talent is his drumming. It comes to him as naturally as climbing trees comes to baby squirrels.

When Stoney was barely walking and talking he would ride in the big semi rig that Stacy hauls cattle or hay with, along with his mother.

They say that the toddler would be sound asleep as they drove down the highway on some long haul, and the radio would be playing. The youngster awoke beating time with both little fists to the rhythm of whatever song was on the radio.

There is a tremendous amount of musical talent on both sides of Stoney's family, and it isn't surprising that he has a natural knack for music-making.

His mother is an accomplished pianist with a clear, true voice that was a feature on the Prairiland FFA Talent team in state competition when she was in high school. His dad plays drums and guitar, and is a natural clown. They join with family and friends to "make music" whenever the opportunity arises.

Stacy's younger sister Zariska sings with them, as do Linda's sister Treda and brother-in-law Scotty Norwood. The Norwood's daughter Amber is learning to sing with the group. Jarvis Watson, Allen Dale Huddleston, and whoever else may be on hand when the band starts up join in. There isn't a name for the band, it simply forms. In Cunningham music is a major factor in almost everyone's life. The churches hold every "sings", the homecoming draws back hundreds of people every year, and "wouldn't be complete without some "homemade" music.

Linda's family has Gospel singers who have produced albums, and her younger brother Tony is an excellent vocalist.

Linda says with a shy smile that even her granddad and great-granddad had bands.

When asked if they are ever awakened by the sound of Stoney on his drum set they grimace a little ruefully.

"Yeah, sometimes he wakes his mama up wanting breakfast He'll eat and watch cartoons for about five minutes...then he heads for the drum set and begins banging away" Stacy grins.

Young Stoney's passion for percussion has resulted in his parents having to set up some rules. When the phone rings he has to stop. Watching him, it is obvious that it takes every bit of self-control he has, and he watches whoever is talking impatiently so that he can return.

The drum set won't fit in the bedroom, but resides in the living room, which means that for the sake of adult nerves his playing has to be limited occasionally. It isn't that his playing is unpleasant, it's just a little loud.

Stoney makes up rhythms of his own, or can listen to a song for just a moment or two and pick up the beat.

His big drum set is at Life Tabernacle Church, it's too large for the house! He has to share occasionally, which he does with surprising grace for such a little guy!

Like his father, Stoney enjoys rodeos, music and working cattle. He tags along to the fields when combining season is on, helps move vehicles around. He rides his horse, Trixie,

and has been helping round up cattle for some time. He has ridden in rodeo grand entries, and gone on many a trucking trip. The four-year-old has been in California, Colorado, Mississippi, Alabama, Arkansas, Oklahoma, Kansas and most of his native state of Texas, to name a few places.

He talks a local teenager, Jarvis Watson, into taking him fishing at every opportunity, and likes nothing better than to be right in the middle of whatever is going on.

When asked what they hope Stoney will be his mother replies softly that she just "hopes he doesn't want to rodeo."

His dad, always a clown, grins the same grin his son does and says "why I want him to go to Nashville and make millions and millions of dollars and take care of his folks!"

Then Stacy goes on to say that what he would really like would be for himself to go to Nashville and become a star.

"Then Stoney could do just what he wants". Stacy talks about his desire to become a star wistfully. It's a dream that has been around since he was a child himself, and one that is far from abandoned.

Stoney's paternal grandparents are Johnie and Nelta Musgrove, who live near by and have owned and operated the only store in Cunningham for nearly 30 years.

His maternal grandparents are Laura Davidson Duncan, and the late Virgil Duncan of Blossom.

None of the family can really remember the exact day that Stoney began playing drums, or riding, or helping with branding, it just happened the way the seasons change, gradually, naturally.

He will display his two sets of tiny spurs, his cattle whips, his drums, his trucks and toys as eagerly as any other youngster shows off his prized possessions.

In April of this year the loose-knit band was asked to perform at the Denver Pyle benefit dinner in Deport. The gym was crowded, and stars from the cast of the **Dukes of Hazzard** TV show and others, including **Knots Landing** actor Mafe Nutter, were on hand. Nutter leaped up with the performers. Drumming at that time was Brandon Oates, another Cunningham musician. Nutter was happily singing and playing guitar when Stacy whispered to him to "Look at your drummer". Behind the man's back they had handed over the drum stick to little Stoney. Nutter apparently didn't understand why he should look at his drummer, and launched into another number. Stoney just launched into it too!

When Nutter finally did look around his jaw dropped. The look of amazement was quickly replaced with delight, however, as he challenged his drummer to do "Wipe Out", and the drummer complied!

Stoney will announce to one and all that his mother is going to have a baby. Asked whether he wants a girl or a boy he gives a look and says "I want us to get a boy".

Girl or boy, when the young Musgrove family has increased in October, it's a cinch that the infant will grow up in an environment rich with love, blessed with lots of family ties, and overflowing with music, both at home and where ever he goes.

With Stoney around, the baby will also have to learn how to nap with the sound of drumming going on somewhere near, for it is inconceivable that he won't be practicing, trying to get, as he says with an impish grin "Better than my dad!"

Man Indicted For Shooting At DPS Helicopter, Growing Pot

A 41-year old Blossom man, who last month allegedly shot at a DPS helicopter after its officers detected a large crop of marijuana growing on his property, has been indicted on three felony counts.

The subject was indicted for possession of marijuana over five pounds, one count of attempted murder and theft over \$750.00.

He was one of 25 individuals indicted on 29 felony counts last week by the Lamar County Grand Jury.

Two DPS officers were aboard the craft operating June 28 in conjunction with a multi-agency drug task force on a marijuana eradication program. The officers spotted a large marijuana field growing on a 50-acre plot in the Blossom area.

Shortly after making the discovery, a man opened fire on the helicopter using what authorities believed was a .22-caliber Magnum rifle. One shot pierced the helicopter's fuselage.

The officers were not injured and were able to return the damaged craft to Cox Field.

Lamar County Sheriff's deputies then obtained an arrest warrant and the man was arrested without incident. He remains in Lamar County Jail under bonds totaling \$160,000. More than 800 marijuana plants

were confiscated from what authorities described as a sophisticated cultivation, as well as a tractor believed stolen in Denton.

A pre-trial date for the man, as well as those indicted last week, is expected to be set July 29.

A list of indictments will be made available at a later date.

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

Michael D. Byram Dies July 20

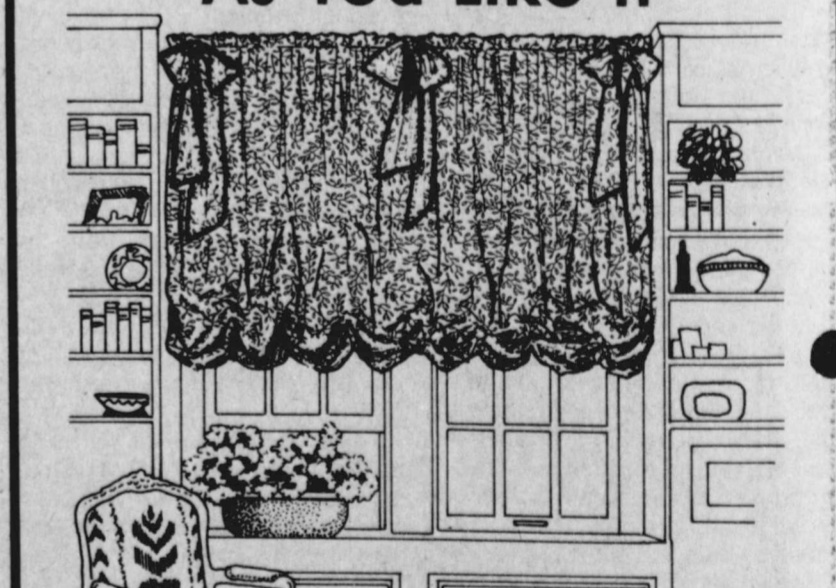
Michael Doyle Byram, 14 months old, of Paris, died Wednesday, July 20 in Longview.

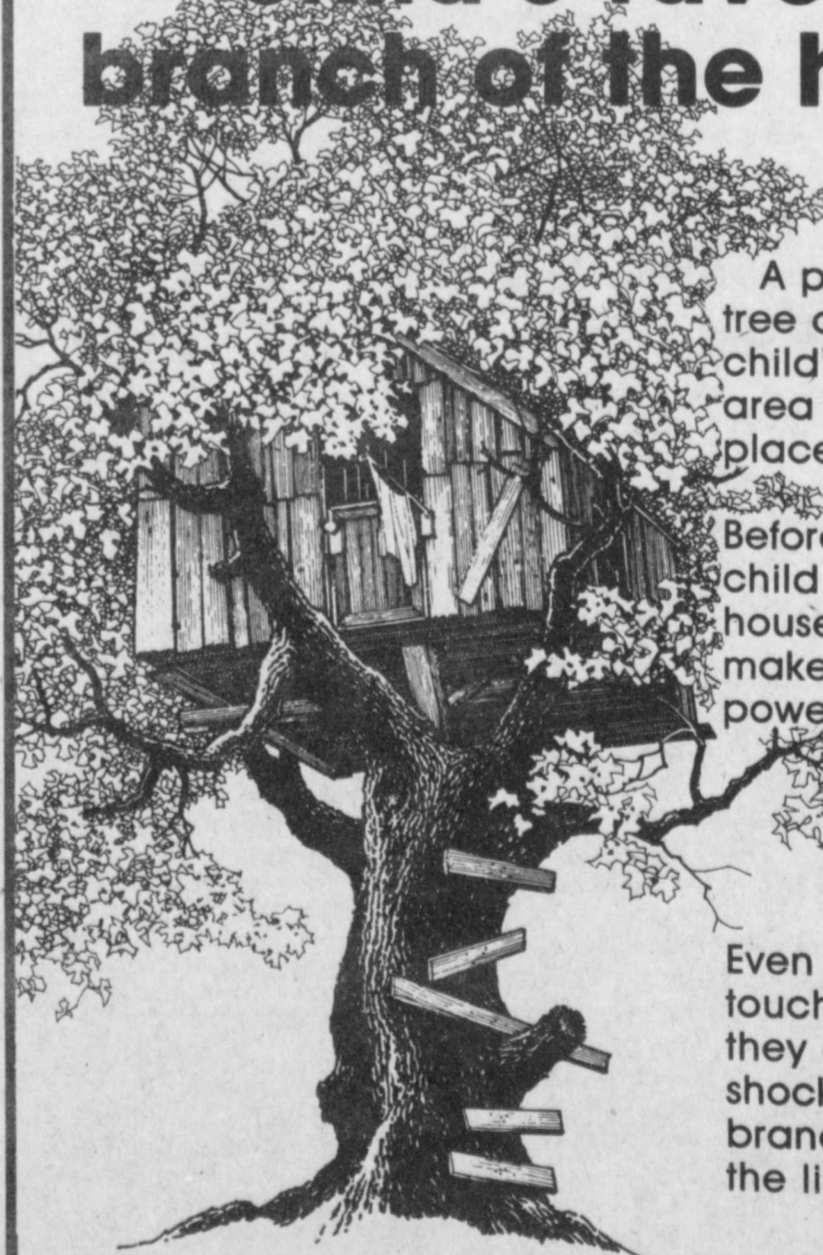

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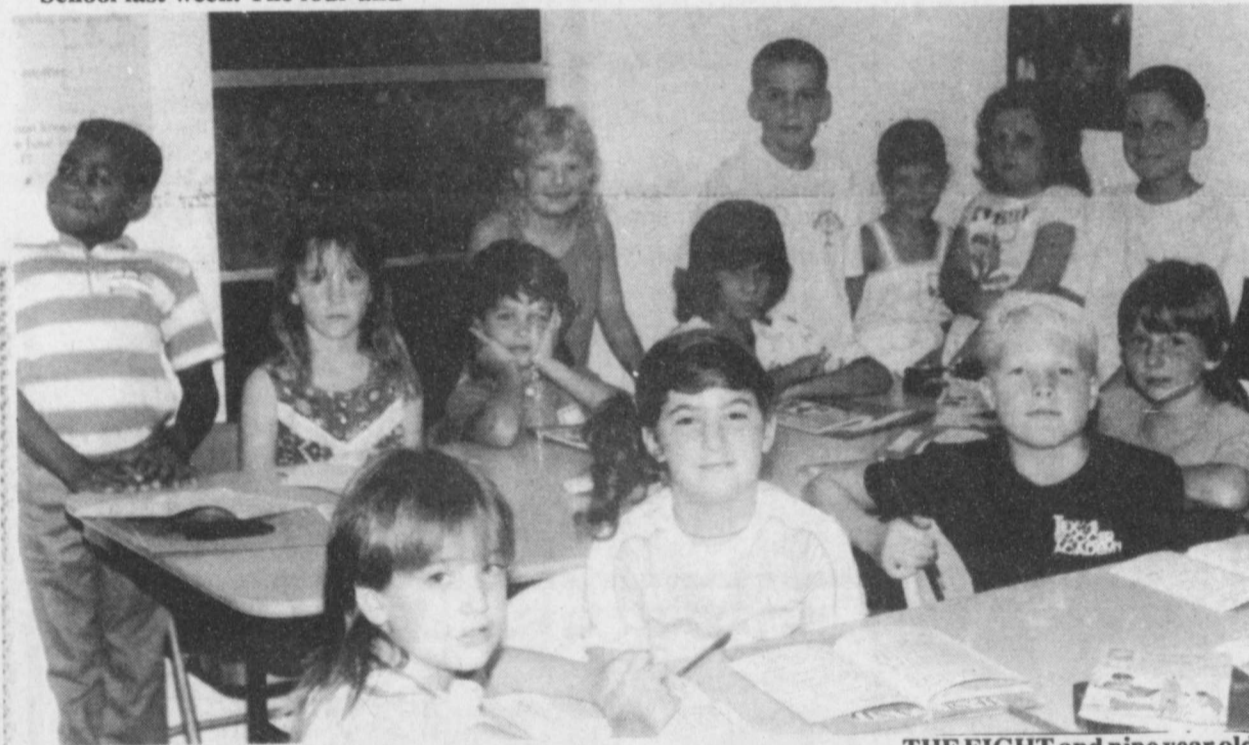

Timing Is Critical In Hay Production

Most areas have received some rain and grass is growing. With limited soil moisture, producers should monitor the growth of the forage and harvest before it completely dries out, said Dr. Sim A. Reeves, Jr., agronomist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. AS long as the grass is actively growing and getting thicker and taller, Reeves suggests letting it grow until seed heads begin.

If dry weather continues and no prospects for rain exists, the forage

should be cut while moisture is in the grass. If harvesting is delayed until the grass dries, both yield and quality suffers. Grass grows faster after a rain from areas which have been cut.

After cutting, Reeves said that a decision must be made concerning fertilizing. It is generally risky to fertilize in August. However, if forage is short, it might pay to gamble and apply about 50 pounds of actual nitrogen per acre. The fertilizer put out on dry soil will remain there until moisture is received, Reeves concluded.

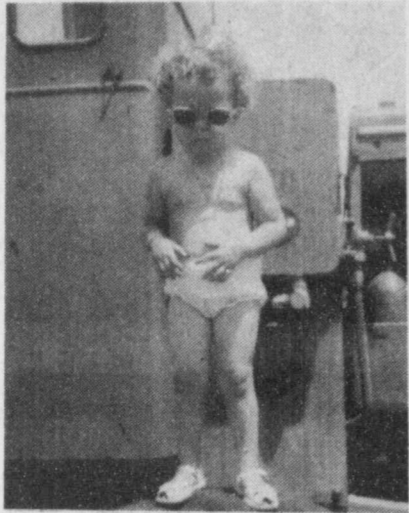

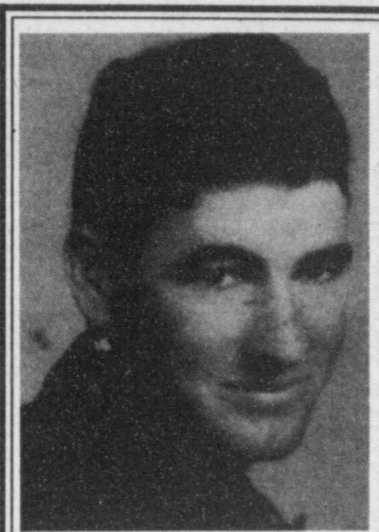
