It's all the same, there's just more of it. Something we've all suspected, but finally have confirmed.

Mark Gale is a photographer for the Ft. Worth Star Telegram.

He's worked for newspapers in his home town of Baltimore, Maryland, in Mississippi, Louisiana, and a number in Texas. He's worked for USA Today.

Sam and Margie Rice introduced him to us back when he was working in this area.

Saturday night we had the opportunity to look over several boxes of work, which was great.

Thumbing through sports shots of football teams taken in California, horse shots from an assignment at a racetrack, firebomb pictures, and people from Michael Jackson to George Bush, I got that feeling most weekly newsmen get...that we've missed a boat loaded down with glamour, fame and excitement.

While we are snapping away at high school football, these professional photojournalists are standing in a perfectly lit stadium taking pictures of famous sports figures.

While we are covering Girl Scout Banquets they are covering presidential rallies.

The contrast is, at first glance, startling...the gap too wide for closing.

But then, one begins to realize that it all boils down to the same thing.

Indeed, it actually takes more skills to cover high school football than professional. The lighting and footing at high school games is pretty primitive compared to the layout of a pro game. The same can be said for most sports contests...

The events that generate those prize photos we all dream of: spectacular rescues, daring fire fighters, amazing news events, certainly occur with more frequency in a town of one million than in a town of one thousand.

Of course, being able to work in color would be nice, and only daily papers with large circulations can afford that luxury.

Like those of us on weeklies, the "big guys" have to cover plenty of assignments that have little or no possibilities for drama or creativity.

They get calls from people complaining that photos made them look old, look bad, were omitted, deliberately discriminated by cutting someone from the picture- all the complaints that simply go with the territory.

They have one thing most weekly photographers don't have, however. That's a certain amount of respect. Photographs published in the New York Times obviously demand national attention. The person who is responsible for those pictures becomes well-known and well-paid.

They also have something else...the luxury of doing one thing...photography.

When they go to take pictures they don't have to worry about getting down names, times, information or anything but the best shots they can get.

Then they can go back to a roomy darkroom and process and print, with little thought to cost, their glossy color prints.

Weekly folks usually go back to a darkroom in a converted closet, and remind themselves with every print they make that "there went another dollar". They usually have several other people's film to process too.

After they get all that done they can go out to their desk and pound out the cutlines to go under the pictures, then write the story to accompany it.

Weekly people have something to compensate for most of that, though. That's the trust and, usually, affection, of the people in their community.

There isn't much respect, no one considers that weekly people have any great talent, nor does a picture on the front page of a weekly have the same prestige (or pay) of a huge city daily.

But there is gentle jesting, trust that people's sorrow will not be used for sensationalism, and genuine welcome when the weekly "paper person" shows up. Offers to sit down and eat, join in the festivities, or

## Fifteen Year Old Lists Limousin Achievements

For most people, saying that you own 25 head of registered Limousin cattle in addition to market steers, calves, show heifers and bulls would be saying a lot. And if you are a 15-year old girl that is saying a whole lot!

For Tracy Hicks of Blossom, it's just an every day head count of her cattle herd. Tracy has been raising registered Limousin cattle ever since her father started in the business in 1979. She has also been showing cattle since she was eight years old.

"I showed in the kiddy class with kids who all had little calves and rabbits," Tracy said, "and there I was with a two year old heifer!"

After that early win in the kiddy class at the Paris Junior Livestock Show, Tracy was hooked. What started as a show heifer has bloomed into a prosperous business, as well as a project program for 4-H and FFA.

Tracy's cattle are not only numerous for a person her age, but they are also very good.

Tracy's bull, Comanche, won Reserve Champion at the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo.

"It surprised me since I was competing against all the big ranches," Tracy said.

She has also had the Grand Champion Bull at the Louisiana State Junior Show and won six silver cups for her heifers as well. Two weeks ago

she won Grand Champion with her bull at the Texas Club Calf Association Show held in Paris.

Perhaps the award she is most proud of is a resolution from the Texas House of Representatives. The resolution recognizes her accomplishments in the cattle business.

Tracy is an active member of the Texas Junior Limousin Association and served as secretary-treasurer last year. This year, Tracy will serve as vice-president of the organization. Tracy is also a member of the North American Junior Limousin Foundation and the Texas Club Calf Association.

But Tracy's activities are not limited to her cattle. She is also an active member of the Prairiland FFA Chapter. She was a member of the Greenhand Chapter Conducting Team that competed at the District and Area levels. She also was named Star Greenhand for the Paris District and placed second in the area. Tracy will also serve as vice-president of the chapter next year.

Tracy is also active in 4-H where she competed in the State Food Show this last year.

Although Tracy has accomplished a great deal at such a young age, she is not going to let it stop there. After graduating from high school, Tracy would like to attend Paris Junior College and Texas A&M University.

## River Cable To Upgrade, Raise Rates

River Cablevision, which has purchased Cook Cablevision, has announced that they are ready to begin upgrading the local Cable TV system and adding services.

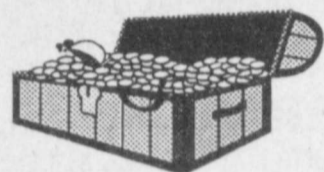

**River Thrills And Souvenirs**

I believe we left most of you back on the Kicking Horse River last week? How I wish we were still there!

The Kicking Horse is smooth, blue as a jewel and placid as a lamb at the point we paddled our rafts out. The morning part of that raft trip was spent staring up at spectacularly beautiful mountains, watching deer drink from the other shore, and bobbing up and down over gentle class I or II rapids.

During that time we talked to our Australian guide and Canadian and English companions. While we were anxious to learn about their life-styles, they wanted to know about ours. A few place names like Cuthand, Monkey Run, Shadowland, Bug Tussell and so on impressed them quite as much as their stories impressed us!

Since there were only four passengers in the raft, and Jeff knew all four of us were interested in whitewater, we went through a rapid called "Hogies Hole" while other rafts went around it. That was our first taste of real whitewater, and it was fun. Shortly thereafter we all rendezvoused on the river bank for lunch.

Our guides then put on another face, turning into gourmet cooks. In the least time imaginable they had a driftwood fire going, and were grilling thick juicy steaks. Our five gallon bailing buckets served as table legs, and a cloth covered the piece of plank that served as a table. Logs with flattened tops served for chairs.

Fresh vegetables and fruits, chips, dips, cheeses and those delectable steaks made a tasty lunch paddling had provided an appetite for.

Then it was back to the river for another taste of "being kicked by the Kicking Horse". One man in the raft ahead was thrown out...true to promise, the floatation devices kept him above the rushing flood until he could be hauled back aboard. A little later we discovered that even the different raft companies look out for one another, as we waited on the shore for ten minutes to make sure another companies raft was okay after a paddle

came floating downriver. Then we pulled up while every inch of equipment was checked, tied down and all our cameras stowed in locked, waterproof boxes. Several people, including our traveling companions had to go at that point. We acquired a new group of people, a Spanish man and wife with their 12 year old, and a Minnesota couple.

Portage rapid loomed around the bend. Everyone from both raft companies climbed the steep path to look down upon the roiling, roaring, rock studded waters we were about to go into. Kids aren't allowed on Portage rapid, so they were walked around it on the high banks. About 10 more people look a long look and chose to walk too.

The rest of us loaded up and prepared ourselves.

I won't repeat what our Spanish friend Laura said the first time she was yelled at to "Bail, bail!" A little later she accused our guide of thinking he was Crocodile Dundee!

But bail she did, and hold on to the paddlers I did. With a firm grip of life jacket in each hand, I kept my charges in the raft while we were thrown about like peas in a pod.

Directly though, I was faced with a dilemma. Laura needed a "Klingon" too! Thrown loose from her grip, she was on her knees scrabbling for a hand hold. Now, there isn't any way one person can grip three life jackets at one time.

I let go of Thomas. I keep trying to explain to him that it was because I had a great deal more confidence in his strength and ability to take care of himself. He suspects me of wanting to get rid of him.

Portage behind us we stopped for the rest of our passengers. The rest of the afternoon was spent running rapids that were pretty exciting, although not like Portage. Rapids with names like Thread-The-Needle, Last Waltz, and Roller Coaster kept us plenty busy. Finally though, we had to leave the river and head back to Banff, where, needless to say, we were ready for a good nights rest.

We had a good nights rest until about 3 in the morning, too. Then we both sat straight up in bed, with the hair, literally, standing up on our necks. Our motel was built on a mountain, and was the last building on Banff Avenue. High up on that mountain some timber wolf had decided to howl. After a life-long love affair with the songs that coyotes sing, who would have thought that a wolf would sound so different. But sound different, it did...bigger, much more primitive, and downright spooky! We decided to close the sliding doors so that some of that sound would filter out!

After rafting we spent the next day prowling, prowling dirt and gravel roads, wandering into mountain wilderness on hiking trails, and visiting the matriarch of Banff, the Banff Springs Hotel.

Picture a hotel built of gray stone, towering high above town, on a mountain ridge, and with the wide and handsome Bow River for a front yard. Add Scottish kilted valets, bagpipers and fourteen restaurants to this six hundred room, century-old hotel and you get a magnificent picture.

Once the applications are handed out, parents and guardians are urged by the school administration to return the forms within 10 days. However, applications will be received any time during the year, especially if a family's income changes significantly,
