It stated the assets and the liabilities, then proceeded to say that this had resulted in a negative financial-regulatory net worth. Does couching it in this terms soften the facts. Anyone can figure out that what happened was the liabilites were larger than the assets!

Yet another newspaper ran a headline with the statement that "Area Families Enter Back-To-School

MODE! People do not enter modes, thank you very much. Machines can be programmed or switched into "Modes". Mode is simply not a word applicable to the human condition.

Want to quit smoking? Or eating? There was an ad in a Dallas magazine that said that their program worked because of their careful use of 'Negative reinforcement therapy". What's that? Electric shocks, administered when the urge to indulge struck! Perhaps it sounds better

stated as a"therapy" but the whole thing was pretty vicious, investigators discovered.

"Image Enhancement" why doesn't someone just say "we made the picture a little better", for heaven's sake! The high tech terms can reach

unbelievable limits. A lot of this is due to the computer technology that has entered our world.

Computors, like the one this column is produced with, are wonderful things. But they are tools, and should be thought of as such, not as a way of life, dominating everything, including our language.

Perhaps a cartoonist said it best. Thecartoon read: "Ultimate Portable Computer. Multi-Program Flexibility. Cost Effective. Interfaces With Almost anything. Pressure operated Output Deletiton Module. Contoured Digital Text Manipulator-Formater.. Graphite-Tipped Cursor/Optical CharacterGenerator". What was it?....a common pencil. Pressure operated Output Deletion Module was the eraser. Graphite-Tipped Cursor/ Optical Character Generator was the lead, and so on.

Almost anything can be made to sound very complex by using long

ords strung together. But what really bothers me isn't the use of this "language" in ads, articles or information, but the fact that there must be a lot of people somewhere thinking these terms up.

Give that some consideration. Hundreds of highly paid people, probably with degrees, sitting around trying to find the most confusing or the most over-complicated way to describe a product, course, or job description.

And out there in the hall, on the expensive teak door ,there is probably a sign that reads Terminological Utilization Department.

The people inside may be sending memos using phrases like "maximizpotential re-sale phrase market-" or "negative rehabilitative feedback on the modum".

Let's get right to the point, and call apples - apples. Not "decidious borne fruits, crimson colored packaging, semi-solid flesh, highly edible, with a central core containing germination pods".





Patterson Requesting Review Of Bailout

Pete Patterson is requesting Texas Attorney General Jim Mattox to review the constitutionality of the First Republic Bank bailout by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation and North Carolina National Bank. Patterson's request stems from an opin-Ion the Attorney General held in 1987 regarding the way branch banks and bailout mergers by bank holding companies are to operate in Texas.

This is only the first step Patterson plan to take in questioing the validity of the First Republic takeover by NCNB and the actio of the FDIC.

Rep. Patterson is concerned because the FDIC did not actively pursue a Texas solution to First Republic's problems. Patterson also contends the FDIC is bailing out stockholders and managers rather than protecting depositors and local credit needs, and that the FDIC's actions of financial concentration into major bank's hands run against today's economic reality.

Patterson believes the state missed an opportunity for First Republic's and all its branches' deposits and assets to flow to local independent banks that have been well managed. Instead, the FDIC selected a path through NCNB that reduced the loss to stockholdes of First Republic, rewarded bad management, and placed at ri the competitive standing of local banks that have been managed well.
