Patriots Take Second Win Of Season

For the second week in a row, the Prairiland Patriots faced a bigger opponent and once again, came out on top.

The Patriots earned a hard-fought 12-6 victory over the Bells Panthers their home opener.

After a 33-yard opening kick off, return by Wade Sparks, the Patriot offense was held tough by stubborn Bells defense, led by junior Shane Rolan.

Starting at their own 23, the Panthers kept it on the ground behind the power running of Roger McGehee. On the fourth play of the drive, McGehee fumbled at his own 42 and senior Jack Kindle made the recovery for the Patriots.

On a designed roll out, Martin Babb connected with Sparks who rambled to the Panther 15. Babb then pitched out to Trevor Upchurch, who carried for 11 yards to the four. After a QB keeper to the two, Babb handed off to Upchurch, who bulled his way into the endzone for the first of his two TD's of the night.

The point after attempt by Kindle was partially blocked and the Patriots led 6-0 with 6:34 left in the first.

After the kickoff, Bells picked up where they left off with McGehee running right, left and up the middle. On the fourth play of the drive, McGehee picked up 25 quick yards and a Patriot face mask penalty tacked on 10 more.

Workhorse McGehee then took a pitchout from QB Ray Smith and dashed in for the score from 15 yards out. But the play was nullified by a clipping penalty and after two incomplete passes and another penalty, the Panthers were forced to punt.

With neither team able to accomplish much in the relatively quiet second quarter, Bells decided to live things up with a fake kick snap to QB Smith on the fourth down. The Patriots were not fooled and Smith was levelled at the line by Wade Sparks.

After four running plays, Babb found a wide open Sparks at the Panther 20. Sparks cruised to the four yard line before he was finally stopped. Trevor Upchurch carried to the two, but an illegal procedure penalty brought the ball back to the seven yard line.

After a Patriot time out, Upchurch

got the penalty yardage back and on the next play, he was not to be denied his second touchdown of the night. The two point conversion by Babb failed as he was knocked down at the one, leaving the halftime score at 12-0, Patriots.

The Patriots started started the second half like a house afire with a 47-yard drive, behind the fancy footwork of P.G. Morrison and a beautiful 18-yard strike from Babb to Jack Kindle. The Panther defense tightened down and on fourth and five from the Bells' 15, Babb overshot an open Kindle to end the third quarter.

The fourth quarter saw the Panthers go back to their bread and butter running game with McGehee and Thomas Sanford sharing the load on a 19-play drive. The Patriot defense rose to the occasion and finally halted the drive at the Patriot 15.

Prairiland had run only two plays when Sparks fumbled at his own 22 and Shane Rolan recovered for the Panthers.

The Panthers ran off six plays and still found themselves facing a fourth and one at the Patriot two yard line.

With 2:43 remaining, McGehee dove over everybody for the score. The two point conversion attempt failed and the score stood at 12-6 with 2:35 remaining in the game.

The Panthers on-side kick attempt was foiled by an alert David Harrelson who grabbed the ball at the Patriot 44.

Prairiland took over and Morrison rolled up 43 yards on three carries, ending up at the Panther five yard line. Linebackers Rodney Monk made a TD saving tackle on Morrison and took out a little frustration on him as well.

When Morrison jumped up to complain, he got the unsportsmanlike conduct penalty instead of Monk.

On the following play, a bench clearing brawl caused the officials to end the game with 41 seconds left and Prairiland the winner, 12-6.

Morrison led the Patriots in rushing with 78 yards on 10 carries and Upchurch added 40 yards on eight carries. In the receiving departments, Wade Sparks had 2 receptions for 68 yards and Jack Kindle had 2 for 26.

The Patriots are 2-0 on the season and will host Fannindel this Friday night.

Prairiland JV Split Games

The Prairiland junior varsity opened their season on a winning note with a 12-0 win over Rivercrest last week. First quarter action saw the Patriots scoring first after a 70-yard drive and a two yard run by Buddy McMikel. The PAT run by QB Chris Harrelson was short. Both teams' defenses held until 4:00 left in the game when RB Chris Lutz scored on a 10-yard run after several good runs by Richard Rockey. The PAT attempt by McMikel was stopped short. Defensively, Harrelson, Lutz, McMikel and Rockey were instrumental in keeping the Rebels out of the endzone.

In this week's game, the junior varsity was overpowered by a good Bells team, 20-0. After two possessions, the Patriots were unable to move the ball whereas their opponent scored twice. At the end of the first

quarter, the Pats were down 14-0 and also lost the services of QB Chris Harrelson due to an injury. The young Patriot team rallied behind freshman QB Skip Chapman and running backs Gary Don Davis and Chris Lutz to several first downs but failed to score.

The Panthers scored once more bringing the score to a 20-0 final. Defensive standouts which held Bells

on several occasions were Chris McEwin, Dexter Baker, David Brown, Freddy Wilson and Shaen Kienast.

The Patriot JV stands 1-1 and will be traveling to Wolfe City this week while the junior varsity will be going to Fannindel for their first game of the season on Thursday.

PUBLIC NOTICE BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS GENERAL ELECTION NOVEMBER 8, 1988

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 8 proposes a constitutional amendment providing that when the federal government reimburses the state for expenditures of state funds dedicated to acquiring rights-of-way and for constructing, maintaining, and policing public roadways, such federal funds must also be used for those purposes.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment and/or clarification providing that federal reimbursement of state highway dedicated funds are themselves dedicated for the purpose of acquiring rights-of-way and constructing, maintaining, and policing public roadways."

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 2 proposes constitutional amendment to establish an economic stabilization fund in the state treasury. The fund would consist of one half of the unencumbered balance of general revenues at the end of a biennium and three fourths of the difference between the net oil and gas production taxes received in a fiscal year and the net oil and gas production taxes received in the 1987 fiscal year. During any fiscal biennium, the amount in the economic stabilization fund could not exceed 10% of the total deposited in general revenue in the preceding biennium.

The state comptroller and the state treasurer could decide to trans-

fer monies from the fund into the general revenue fund to alleviate a temporary cash shortage in general revenue. The legislature could make appropriations from the fund on approval by a three fifths vote of each house to make up the difference between anticipated general revenue and appropriations. On approval of two thirds of the members of each house of the legislature, the legislature could appropriate monies from the fund for any purpose.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment establishing an economic stabilization fund in the state treasury to be used to offset unforeseen shortfalls in revenue."

PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 5 proposes a constitutional amendment that establishes the Texas growth fund. All investments of the Texas growth fund must be directly related to furthering economic growth and employment opportunities in Texas. At least 50 percent of the fund must be invested in equity and/or debt security for the initial construction, expansion, or modernization of business or industrial facilities in Texas. Not more than ten percent of the fund may be invested in venture capital investments. Of the funds available for venture capital investments, not more than 25 percent may be invested unilaterally, and the remaining investments must be matched at least equally by funds from other sources. The Texas

growth fund will be managed by a board of trustees consisting of four members appointed by the Governor and one member from and elected by the membership of each of the following: The Board of Regents of the University of Texas System; The Board of Regents of the Texas A&M System; The Board of Trustees of the Teacher's Retirement System of Texas; The Board of Trustees of the Employee's Retirement System of Texas; and the State Board of Education. The trustees may set the investment policy of the fund, enter into investment contracts, and take any action necessary for the creation, administration, and protection of the fund. The amendment authorizes the Board of Regents of the University of Texas System and the State Board of Education, in managing the permanent university fund and the permanent school fund, to acquire, exchange, sell, supervise, manage, or retain any kind of investment, including investments in the Texas growth fund. The fund will be phased out after the tenth anniversary of its creation, but the Legislature may create a second growth fund by a two thirds vote of each house.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to provide for the investment of the permanent university fund, the permanent school fund, and public employee retirement systems in the Texas growth fund created by the amendment, which will directly create, retain, and expand job opportunity and economic growth in Texas."
