Crammed into a tiny cup of grass, sticks or mud, the tiny little baby birds push, shove, quarrel d do their best to be the only member of the family to get anything to eat. When mom or dad comes sailing in with a mouthful of tasty worm, bug or fish (depending on the kind of bird), a fight erupts that would put a wolf pack to shame!

Some little birds will even shove their weaker brothers or sisters out of the nest. The only thing baby fledglings agree on is that they are all hungry, all the time.

Adult birds aren't a lot better.

Look at the amazingly agressive little hummingbird. A classic example of big belligrence in a miniscule body, they dart around fighting any and all comers,not only among themselves, but challenging wasps, bees, other birds and even passing humans!

One will frequently sit on a feeder or blooming plant, squeaking tiny hummingbird profanity at others whenever they appear, and flying right into them. The audible swish of feathers as they clash is startling.

Blue Jays, a lovely bird with the temperment of an ax murderer, will raid the nest of other birds, killing and eating infants and eggs alike. If that doesn't do they can fight each other, screaming, scratching and flogging one another in mid air.

They even resort to killing baby squirrals if they come upon a nest.

The birds of prey, the hawks, eagles and other majestic large raptors, have earned their name by being superbly adapted to catching everything from huge Salmon down to grasshoppers. And within their nests the same overwhelming goal exists....the drive for food, no matter at whose expense.

Ducks, chickens, all the fowl resort to "foul play" (Ohhhh, I can't believe I said that) when it comes to food, a mate, or anything else they want to obtain. Where did the expression "pecking order" come from? Take a guess.

At any rate, the little poem is charming. It conjures up visions tiny birds chirping happily, adly letting little sister have the incoming morsel of food, and growing up in perfect harmony. Hardly!





CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS GENERAL ELECTION **NOVEMBER 8, 1988** 

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 8 proses a constitutional amendment widing that when the federal ernment reimburses the state for expenditures of state funds dedicated to acquiring rights-of-way and for constructing, maintaining, and policing public roadways, such federal funds must also be used for those purposes.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment and/or clarification providing that federal reimbursement of state highway dedicated funds are themselves dedicated for the purpose of acquiring rights-of-way and constructing, maintaining, and policing public roadways.'

### PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

ouse Joint Resolution 2 proposes nstitutional amendment to establish an economic stabilization fund in the state treasury. The fund would consist of one half of the unencumbered balance of general revenues at the end of a biennium and three fourths of the difference between the net oil and gas production taxes received in a fiscal year and the net oil and gas production taxes received in the 1987 fiscal year. During any fiscal biennium, the amount in the economic stabilization fund could not exceed 10% of the total deposited in general revenue in the preceding biennium.

The state comptroller and the

fer monies from the fund into the general revenue fund to alleviate a temporary cash shortage in general revenue. The legislature could make appropriations from the fund on approval by a three fifths vote of each house to make up the difference between anticipated general revenue and appropriations. On approval of two thirds of the members of each house of the legislature, the legislature could appropriate monies from the fund for any purpose.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment establishing an economic stabilization fund in the state treasury to be used to offset unforeseen shortfalls in revenue.

### PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT House Joint Resolution 5 pro-

poses a constitutional amendment that establishes the Texas growth fund. All investments of the Texas growth fund must be directly related to furthering economic growth and employment opportunities in Texas. At least 50 percent of the fund must be invested in equity and/or debt security for the initial construction, expansion, or modernization of business or industrial facilities in Texas. Not more than ten percent of the fund may be invested in venture capital investments. Of the funds available for venture capital investments, not more than 25 percent may be invested unilaterally, and the remaining investments must be matched at least equally by state treasurer could decide to trans- funds from other sources. The Texas

growth fund will be managed by a board of trustees consisting of four members appointed by the Governor and one member from and elected by the membership of each of the following: The Board of Regents of the University of Texas System; The Board of Regents of the Texas A&M System; The Board of Trustees of the Teacher's Retirement System of Texas; The Board of Trustees of the Employee's Retirement System of Texas; and the State Board of Education. The trustees may set the investment policy of the fund, enter into investment contracts, and take any action necessary for the creation, administration, and protection of the fund. The amendment authorizes the Board of Regents of the University of Texas System and the State Board of Education, in managing the permanent university fund and the permanent school fund, to acquire, exchange, sell, supervise, manage, or retain any kind of investment, including investments in the Texas growth fund. The fund will be phased out after the tenth anniversary of its creation, but the Legislature may create a second growth fund by a two thirds vote of each house.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to provide for the investment of the permanent university fund, the permanent school fund, and public employee retirement systems in the Texas growth fund created by the amendment, which will directly create, retain, and expand job opportunity and economic growth in Texas."

nected with Jack Kindle for the TD pass and put the Patriots on the


Five minutes later, Trevor Upchurch pounded across the goal line for the Patriot second TD.
