Christmas trees are everywhere. Symbol of the season, they can be as elaborate or as simple as anyone desires.

The "Tannebaum" is a German tradition which began many years ago. The evergreen, of course, is the symbol for eternal life.

Sales Tax Grew 12.3% Over 1987's Payments

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said Friday that this year's sales tax payments to Texas cities grew 12.3% over 1987's payments, continuing a trend that is expected to last for several years.

"We're projecting that local sales tax allocations will steadily rise through 1991. I'm sure the extra income from sales tax revenues will be welcomed by local governments," Bullock said.

Bullock added that, while the future of oil prices remains rocky, the stronger tax base will bolster state and local revenues, keeping them at a steady increase of about 7 to 8 percent a year through 1991.

Checks totaling \$64.1 million were

sent Friday to 885 cities that collect local sales tax at either one or one and one-half percent.

The state's six metropolitan transit authorities and one city transit department received \$30.9 million in rebates, a 14.4 percent increase over last year's December payment and a 10.6 percent increase for this year's total.

Checks totaling \$6.4 million were also mailed to 81 counties that collect the one-half percent county tax, Bullock said.

Locally, Bogata received \$1,153.12 for its payment this period, for a 3.45 percent decrease over the payments for 1987 during the same period.

Clarksville received \$19,526.85, a 9.79 percent increase. Detroit received no payment this period, for an 18.83 percent increase over payments to date over last year.

Blossom received \$813.94 this period, for a 30.07 percent increase in payments to date from one year ago. Deport received no payment for this period, for a 3.53 percent increase in payments to date. Paris received \$130,305.42 for a 5.30 percent increase over last year's payment for the same period.

Talco received \$1,050.70 for a 29.49 percent decrease over payments to date from last year. Mt. Pleasant received \$74,146.85 for a 7.57 percent increase over payments to date one year ago.

Tips On "Shaping Up" Your Holiday Parcels

Aerobics instructors regularly remind their students to keep their tummies "tight" and "tucked".

The same advice applies to preparing holiday parcels for mailing.

All that's necessary is choosing sturdy cartons or boxes, and sealing them smoothly and tightly with the proper tape. Padded mailing bags work well for small items.

Don't wrap cartons in bulky brown paper or tie them with string or twine. The paper can tear and the twine can get tangled in our mailing processing equipment.

Using paper and string isn't necessary if you're using proper boxes or cartons. If you feel a need to wrap a tie a box, that may be a signal that you don't think the box is sturdy enough to begin with. Get another one instead.

Parcels should be sealed with a type of tape designed for sealing packages: pressure sensitive, nylon-reinforced kraft paper or class-fiber-reinforced pressure sensitive. Don't use cellophane or masking tapes because they're not strong enough.

Correct addressing is as important for parcels as for letters. If the box has

been used before, be sure first to remove all old labels and addresses. The top of the package should show the name of the person to whom you're sending it, their house number and street and the apartment number, if there is one. The last address line should contain the city, state and ZIP code, and be sure to use the ZIP code.

Your own return address and ZIP code should be in the upper left corner. Please use smudge-proof ink.

Preparing the inside of a package or box is as important as preparing the outside. The contents should be cushioned carefully with crumpled paper, with foam shell or air-pocket padding that is commercially available. Don't leave any empty space in the box.

Before you seal the package, it's also a good idea to enclose a slip of paper showing the name and address of the person to whom you're sending it. Although it doesn't happen very often, parcels can get damaged so the outside address can't be read.

Finally, if a package contains irreplaceable items, send it by registered mail.

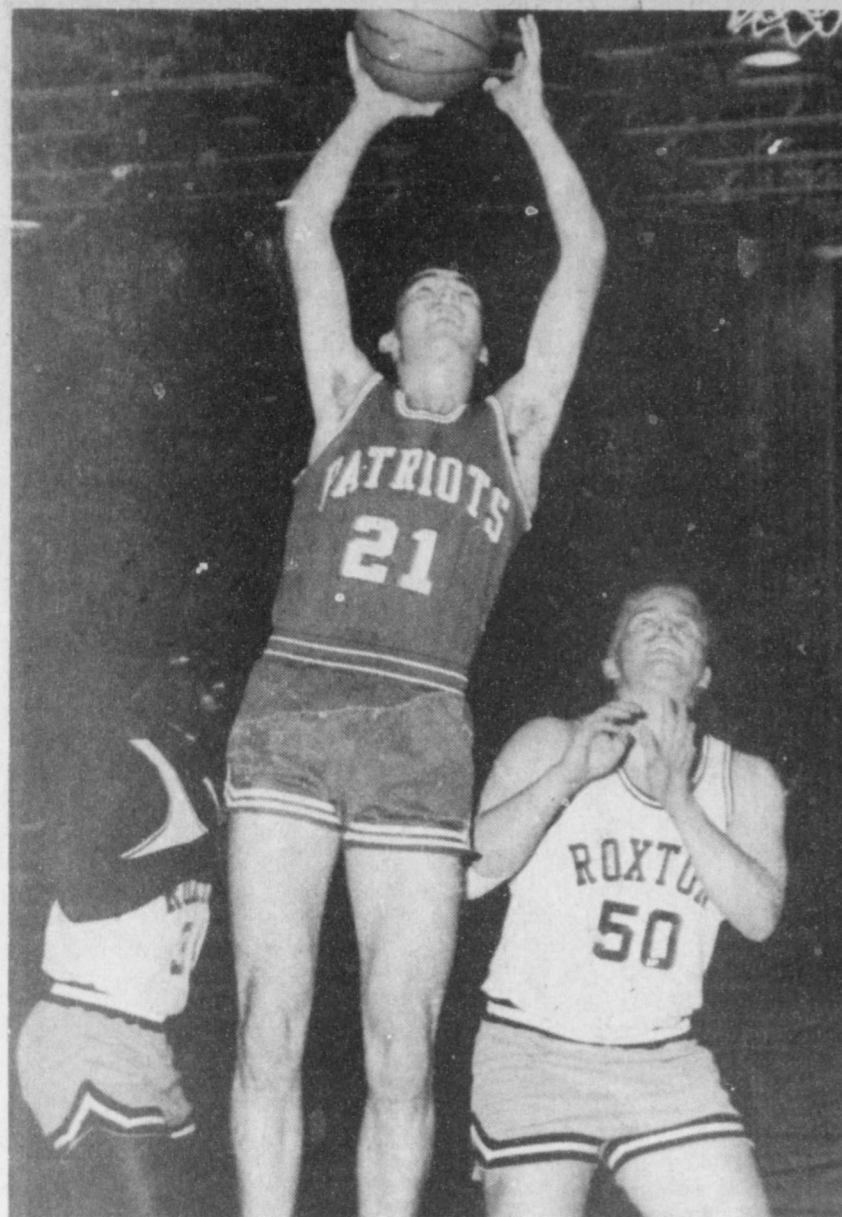

Prairiland Sports Report

Patriots Fall In First Round Of Prairiland Tournament

After leading midway through the third quarter, the Prairiland Patriots dropped its opener to the Roxton Lions, 73-50, Thursday night during the annual Prairiland Invitational Tournament.

Roxton's Lester Green, who had a game-high 21 points, downed a couple of jumpshots in the first quarter as the Lions took a quick 7-0 lead. Jack Kindle, who led the Pats' scoring with 18 points, broke the ice for Prairiland with a 3-pointer at the 4:15 mark. Shannon Baker rolled in a pair just before the quarter ended to even the game at 11 all.

Randy Huddleston hit a nine-footer at the beginning of the second quarter to give the Patriots their first lead of the night, however, Sidney Johnson and Green scored eight unanswered points to give the Lions a 19-13 lead. Kindle scored six more points for the Pats as they trailed, 27-23 at the half. Huddleston scored six of his 12 points in the third quarter, including two that evened the game at 27-27. 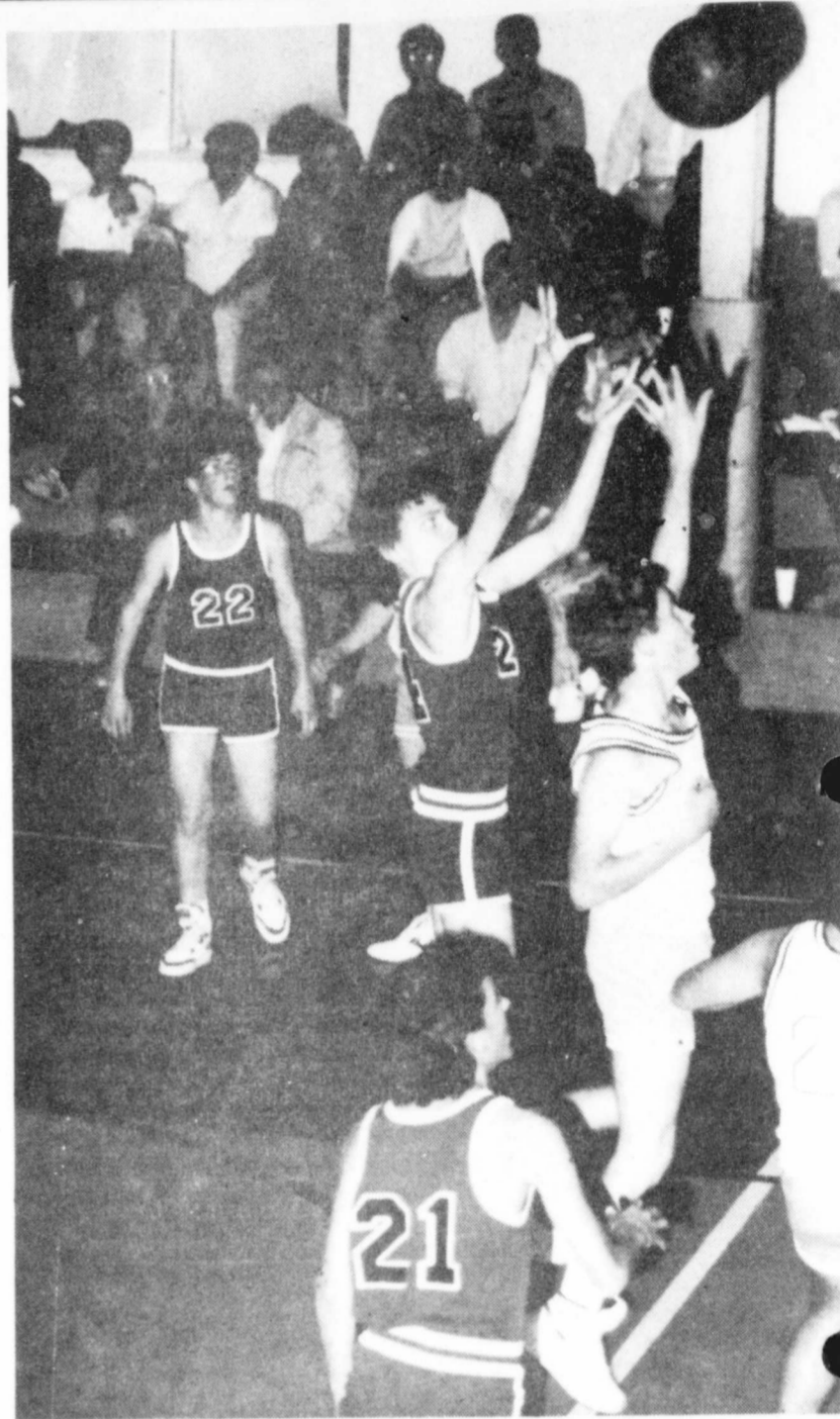

This ended the Deport Lady Patriots pre-Christmas schedule. Their next game will be January 5 in Avery.

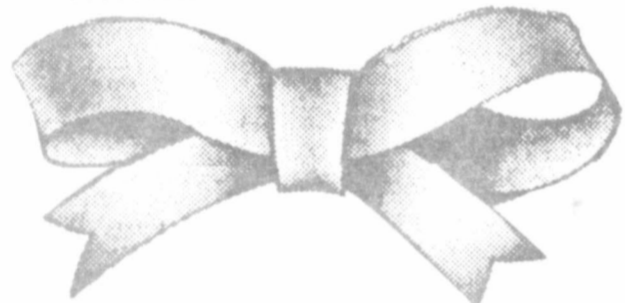
