Tennesse Walkers Make Dream Come True

June Stanley of Bogata always dreamed of raising horses. Now, with the help of her husband, Carlton, she has seen that dream come true by raising Tennessee Walking horses. Their first Walker named "Traveler" was purchased in 1982. Although they owned an American Saddlehorse and a registered Quarterhorse at that time, they found that trail rides on the Walker were by far more pleasurable. Traveler was also the pick of their horses to accompany Carlton on his Colorado hunting trips where he used the horse for packing and riding the mountain trails.

In 1984, the Carltons bought an-other registered Walker mare named "Delights Glory Chessy". Pleased by the performance of the new Walker and interested in the Tennessee Walking horse breed, June began to learn more about the horses by attending shows and making acquaintances with other Walker owners. After a while, with the encouragement and support of her family, June gained the courage to enter the show ring with "Chessy".

By studying about the horses, the

Stanleys learned that the Tennessee Walking horse is a true American horse, originating from many breeds. Careful breeding led to the true idea of the American "melting pot" to produce a horse suitable for peoples purposes. By 1988 there were over 250,000 registered in the United States. In Texas, they are found roping and working cattle, hunter-jumpers, in harness, field trials, trail rides and the show ring. They are noted for their overall gentle disposition, longer life, versatility, rocking chair gait and endurance. An endurance test or ride is 50 miles for an experienced ride and 30 miles for the inexperienced. "With increased interest in trail and endurance rides across the country, the riding value of the Tennessee Walker steadily climbs," said June. "Both horse and rider come through less fatigued because of the durabil-

tack during the Bogata Rodeo Parade. Anita and Kevin Stanley rode Walkers dressed in western attire and

The Stanleys say that the Walkers are gentle and intelligent and are ideal mounts for youngsters. They have proved these qualities in their horses by allowing their grandchildren to ride them. Although the Walkers are gentle, the Stanleys say the Walker is strong, versatile, willing and a readyto-go horse for the experienced rider. They have learned that Tennessee Walking horses can be found all across America thrilling the crowds in the show ring, providing smooth and fun rides along trails, working for their keep on farms and ranches or just babysitting the children.

According to the Stanleys, the Tennessee Walker doesn't claim to be better, just one of the best. Carlton and June now have six Walkers and although raising the Walkers is a lucrative business, they say their main reason for raising the horses is personal gratification in making a lifelong dream become a reality.

Hunter Safety Course Offered At PJC

TASP Test Not Required For Admission To PJC

Texas Academic Skills Program test may still enroll at Paris Junior College for the fall slemester, according to Mary Griffith, vice-president of instructional affairs.

The TASP test, a state mandated skills test, is used for placement purposes only, not to determine admission status, and can be taken after enrolling in classes. "The TASP test is not an admissions test. It is simply a devise used to ensure that students have the skills necessary for the successful completion of college-level work," said Ms. Griffith. "Students who have not taken the TASP test

Persons who have not yet taken the should not let it keep them from enrolling for classes this fall."

Students who have at least three semester credit hours of collegelevel work prior to the fall 1989 semester are exempt from the TASP test, as are students enrolled in a certificate program containing less than nine semester credit hours of general education courses.

ASCS News

By James B. Allcorn Drought aid is about the last thing Northeast Texas farmers need this year, but it looks like we will be getting it one of these days. The argument in Congress right now is whether to spend \$1 billion or \$870 million on theprogram, and whether it will be available only to winter wheat growers or expanded to all crops. If I were to guess, a dangerous thing to do when Congress is awake, I would speculate that the bill will include program and non program crops alike, and work pretty much like the disaster program ASCS administered in

Such legislation, when it becomes law, will compensate farmers whose crops are adversely affected by weather conditions. The obvious condition will be drought, but it will probably include coverage for hail

and flooding. Wanting to do less and get paid for it? What about not work so hard? Maybe even retire? Sounds like one of the old advertisements selling Arizona ocean front property. The program may not be quite as good as the hype sounds at first, but the Conservation Reserve Program is a pretty good program removing eligible cropland from farming for 10 years. It also sees the acreage estab-

lished in trees or other permanent

vegetative cover. Eligible CRP acres include erodible cropland, cropped wetlands, filter strips and cropland subject to scour erosion. The program has authorization to accept acreage only through 1990.

The voluntary program authorizes each farmer to receive up to \$50,000 per year in payments, based upon a per acre rental rate and the number of acres under contract. Rental payments are made to producers with approved contracts on October 1 of each year. Cost share payments provide onehalf of he cost of establishing permanent vegetative cover on contracted land.

In order to enrol in the CRP, both the land and the landowner or farm operator must qualify. The land must have been farmed in two of the five years from 1981 to 1985. The landowner or farm operator must have owned and operated the farm for the three prior calendar years. Eligible persons may submit bids to ASCS indicating the per acre rental payment they would accept to keep these acres out of crop production and in conserving uses for 10 years. Harvesting and grazing of CRP land is prohibited during the life of the

Students learn according to their own goals. There is no stop or start date in the program. The classes will resume evening offerings this fall.







Keeping Healthy

Obesity: Treatment and Prevention Obesity is the most important

nutritional disorder in the United States today. Children as well as adults are afflicted, and the percentage of obese individuals ranges from 10-30 percent.

According to the Academy's nutrition handbook, the tendency for childhood obesity to persist into the adult years is well-known. Recent evidence also suggests that overweight infants are more likely to become fat adults. Thus, it is possible to identify children at risk early on: those born to obese parents, those who gain weight rapidly during infancy and those whose mothers use food to control behavior.

Reasonable, though as yet unproven, preventive measures include: breastfeeding;

• delay in introduction of solid foods and counseling of mothers to give foods only in response to hunger, not as a pacifier;

a reorientation of family life toward low calorie foods and the ritualization of total mealtime behavior;

promotion of physical exercise.


