He's kinda wide at the shoulders and narrow at the hip, and everyone knows you don't give no lip...to Little Red. Red has a wonderful personality. He guards the bank from prowlers, and he welcomes strangers to town only after careful investiga-

He leads an active social life, and has a host of friends.

Occasionally he gets a little loud mouthed and irritating, but there's nothing malicious about him...it's sheer high spirits.

No one knows what his real name is, his nickname comes from the bright reddish hue of his hair.

There are "reds" in almost every little community across the country. He's a phenomenon perculiar to business districts small enough that residents wave at everyone, regardless of whether they know them or not.

Red is Deport's Town Dog.

A medium sized shorthair, his ancestors may have included a hound (witness the ears), beagle (look at the body shape) and who knows what

Having been hit by cars several times, his hips are a little narrow, and his shoulders have developed to make up for the weakness. He has some brawling scars, and a pronounced

No one knows exactly when Red showed up on main street in Deport, but it's been several years now.

When he first arrived he was in serious shape, crippled and starving.

Jane Swint, an employee of First National Bank of Deport, took pity on him and began to bring him food. Soon the other girls at the bank joined in, taking turns bringing dog food, and he was fattened up.

Brenda Watson, Glenda Watson and Eva Brooks along with Jane, all see to it that Red doesn'tmiss any more meals.

Carlos Ladd, the local insurance agent, began bringing Milk Bones for him to add a little variety to Red's

Across the street at the local grocery store the handouts began to come in too. Down at the Deport Times he was given special treats such as cake

or cookies. Next door at the drug store people began to take notice of the little dog. C.G. (Bud) Nobles makes sure that Red alwaysgets his vaccinations, especially for rabies.

In return Red began to guard the bank, barking fiercely at strange dogs that came up, sleeping under the deep porch there.

He makes a daily round of all the local businesses, pausing to "whoo, whoo, whoo" in response to someone's cheery "Hello red dog, how ya doing today"

Last winter there were several bitterly cold nights. No one had to tell Red what to do. He left main street and trotted down to Mike Francies' house, several blocks away. Mike always gets Red his flea collar for the summer. Somehow, the crafty canine seemed to know that there would be a nice, heated back porch to sleep on

when the mercury dropped below 20 degrees. But as soon as the termperatures were a little warmer he was right back on main street, keeping his

When his shoulder was slashed by a bigger, tougher dog he went to Mike again. For several days he was content to lie on the porch, being fed milk and food, until the cut helaed. Then he limped back downtown!

He doesn't ask to be petted a lot, just an occasional pat on the head.

Once or twice a non-dog-oriented person has made some comment or another about him...only to wish they had kept their mouth shut. Almost every person in every business is willing to jump to Red's defense!


Red Dog doesn't mind not having one specific home, he seems happy instead of consider all of downtown his domain.

#### **ASCS News**

By James B. Allcorn

How many times have you heard the boss come in and say, "I've got good news and bad news. Which do you want first?" Farm programs shadow both the good and bad aspects of our economy. When things are bad, they pour money into the farm sector to keep farmers farming. When things get a little easier, or the laws change, the helping hand becomes a deathgrip for those who didn't change fast enough or anticipate the future correctly.


That's what we see happening now with ASCS payments. We knew it could happen anytime, we just hadn't seen it actually take place before. If you haven't figured out what I'm talking about yet, I'll be blunt. Somefolks who received payments under the 1988 farm program will have to pay ASCS a part of the payment back. That is the bad news. The good news is that you don't have to repay it until after Christmas, December 31 to be exact.

Refund would hav ebeen repayable on July 31 for wheat, barley, oats, upland cotton, and rice and September 1 for corn and grain sorghum. However, President Bush's signature on the 1989 Dire Emergency Supplemental Appropriation provided for the postponement of this date to December 31.

Barley and oat producers who received advance deficiency payments have to pay money back at the rate of 30.4 cents per bushel for barley and 12 cents for oats. Their refund sare due because the final 1988 payments for these crops are less than the payment they received as an advance payment from ASCS.

Then there are those folks who received both advance deficiency payments and disaster payments under the Disaster Assistance Act of 1988 for loss of production. They have to refund advance payments on part of their intended production for which they received a disaster payment. These refunds are set on a per bushel basis as follows: Wheat, 61.2 cents; corn, 44 cents; grain sorghum 43.2 cents; barley, 30.4 cents; oats, 12 cents; rice, 1.65 cents per pound and cotton at 6.4 cents per pound. Part of the refund is supposed to be forgiven for folks enrolled in the disaster program, but more on that

USDA hasn't determined thefinal payment rate for 1988 corn and grain sorghum producers, but it is expected that a refund will be required for com but not grain sorghum. Notifications to affected producers will be mailed somewhere around December 1. Like I said, just in time for Christmas.







#### **Keeping Healthy**

What Is Your Cholesterol Level?

Like high blood pressure, a high cholesterol level is a major risk factor for heart disease and it, too, can be "a silent killer" because it usually presents no symptoms.

Following a diet low in fat and cholesterol is the mainstay of treatment for elevated blood cholesterol, and the physician may refer the patient to a qualified dietitian to design one especially for the individual patient's needs.

When the patient does not respond sufficiently to the diet, an effective cholesterollowering drug may be added. This may be a drug belonging to a group called "resins"either cholestyramine or colestipol in powder-which is usually mixed with a liquid such as a fruit juice, large amounts of nicotinic acid, or probucol tablets, which physicians report are particularly well-tolerated by patients.

Everyone should know what his or her cholesterol level is and many physicians now routinely check cholesterol levels as part of the annual physical examination. In families where there is a history of heart diseases before the age of 55 they recommend that children be checked at an early age.


