There had to be instructions about the wall plugs on the east side of the kitchen, and a half page of notes about keeping the chlorine level correct in the above-ground swimming pool we picked up at a garage sale last year.

In other words, there is absolutely nothing simple about our life. The possibility of simply locking up a door and going doesn't exist.

By the time we were through with giving all the notes and instructions we were exhausted, tense and more than a little startled to realise just how complicated things really are!

At intervals throughout my life I've had the desire to simplify things...and this is definitely one of those times.

I dream of having one dog, one cat, nothing else to tie me down. I dream of an easy maintenance yard and house, a 9 to 5 put your time in job.

I also know, deep, deep down in the bottom of my soul, that it won't ever be that way.

There won't come a time when strays aren't welcome, when pets aren't a part of our lives, when work doesn't require lots of extra miles.

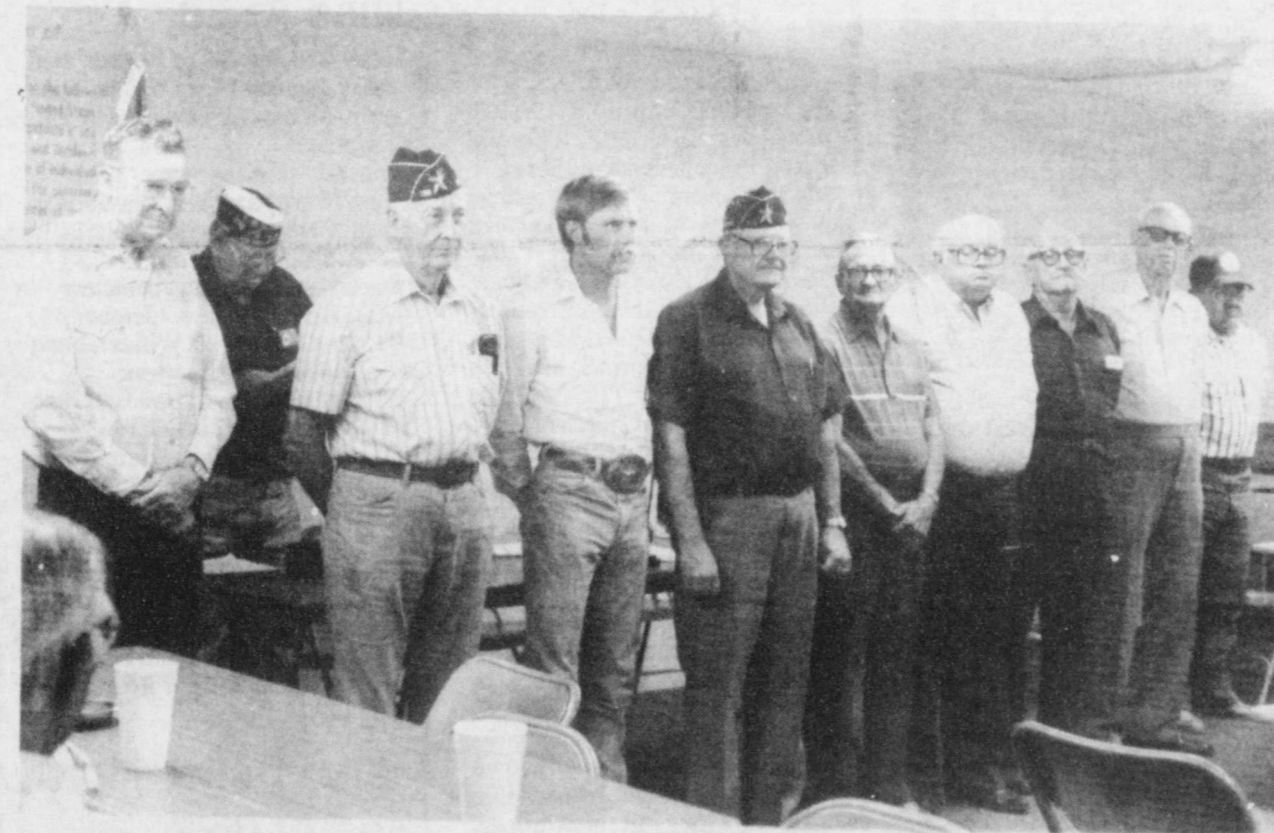

Burglaries Cleared Up

Three burglaries and one theft were apparently cleared up with the confessions of three juveniles Tuesday afternoon.

The burglary of two motor vehicles at Paris Lanes and one burglary of a motor vehicle at Ma and Pa's recreation center in Paris, and a theft from Hastings in Paris all occurred Monday night, August 14.

The information concernign them occurred when Constable Randy Boren was called to Deport Tuesday

on a Juvenile Disturbance Call, and questioning revealed information leading to the involvement of all three juveniles.

What is believed to be stolen merchandise was recovered Tuesday afternoon from three Deport residences. Among the recovered items were a small air compressor, several cassette tapes, clothing and a knife.

According to Constable Boren all three juveniles confessed to their involvement in the burglaries.

Deport Council Names Streets

The Deport City Council decided to name the streets at Mustang and Glover Housing Authorities after each of the housing projects, and named the unnamed street north of Nobles Street Read Street after Bob Read.

They discussed the progress that John Denison has made on the numbering system for the city, and it was decided to go ahead on the system as presented.

Charles Foster's Life Insurance was re-instated, and Hayter Engineering was hired to make application for the Sewer Renewal Permit.

It was decided to pay Administrative Expenses for the Community and Economic Development Pro-

gram, and the city council meeting dates were placed on the community calendar.

The 1989 Property Tax Rate of .3609 was approved, and the Texas New Mexico Power Company rate increase was laid aside for the present time.

It was decided to pay the mayor's expenses to attend a meeting in San Antonio for T.A.R.C., and the council rejected the resignation of City Water and Sewer Superintendent Donald Crawford.

The Elrod trial date has been rescheduled for August 28 at 10 a.m.

Work on Jeffus street is expected to begin August 17.

Rafting Is a Key To Understanding The Power Of The River

Okay, here's a little more vacation account. Thanks for the kind words regarding the first installment of our trip!

I believe that last week we left ourselves floating along in a big raft down the Arkansas river with new found friends. Brown's canyon is part of that river, and provides some rapids with names like Pinball (guess why) Zoom Flume, Numbers, Toilet Bowl and Widow Maker. Most are neat, but not very scary.

They provided lots of hard work for our oarsman, Mike, though. And nonstop screaming from Ester for at least the first hour! That young lady of the open personality and bright red hair did possess some voluumn when the first wave curled up at the front of the raft and sucked us in!

Mike kept things interesting too, by pointing out the various animals or people that with a little imagination could be "seen" in the rock formations during slow times. There was Winnie the Poo Rock, a sleeping lion, a hippo, what he called Jay Hawk Rock (being from Kansas, he would, of course) and yet another one. This one sat high up on top of the ridge and he told us it was called "moon rock". We didn't quite catch on for a moment, until he clued us in that it's other name was "baby bottom rock" I muttered something about that isn't what we'd call it down in Texas.

We pulled over and climbed up above one larger rapid to look down at the swirling waters below.

This gives the guide the chance to check out what and where he needs to try and go, and the passengers time to say their prayers or ponder on the nature of the universe. It also gave me

a chance to drop a brand new roll of film off the cliff into the water below as I tried to reload.

So very quickly the first day of our trip was behind us and it was time to change into dry clothes. That was a real treat after a whole day immersed in ice water.

As we began to set up camp, or watch Mike set it up, the wind began to howl and the clouds clattered up for what was surely going to be a wet night.

We rigged a tarp up and pitched our little dome tents quickly, then sat around the campfire while Mike whipped up an excellent camp meal of fetuccini, dutch oven bread, cheesecake and other goodies.

We sat dry under the little tarp and discussed a world of things, from the Wright's time spent in Bolivia to Mike's forestry knowledge and our newspaper experiences.

During the day he had told us about what "Turons" were. That's a tourist that is a pretty good moron too. Keep it in mind, there will be more about that later.

At dark we crawled into our sleeping bags and settled in. It's hard to describe the wonderful freedom of lying under a tent, hearing pattering rain and the river running only a few feet away.

The river made it's promises that night, promises about it's grandeur and glory, it's incredible strength and power, and it's lighter, happy side.

Rivers, to me, are almost alive. They run silent and swift, or noisy and ebullient. They grind huge boulders and they smooth fine sand.

Water is life itself, and nowhere is it more glorious than in a river.

At sunup we all rose, tucked into breakfast, and were treated to a golden sun shining on a pink mountaintop with the river beneath it. Before breakfast was over we also watched as a mule deer buck came down to the watershed, then shied away and disappeared.

The Royal Gorge run means wet suits. After the typical tussel with the form-fitting suits, we donned the final ludicrous item...a skate boarder's helmet! What a group we made, waddling around in our body gloves with our bright colored helmets on!

The gorge provided the rapids we had been looking for. Spike Buck, Raft Ripper, Corner Pocket, Sledge Hammer provided a series of huge waves, swirling pools and drops that kept the guide very, very busy. At one point John came loose, slammed into Mike, who lost anoar just as we were coming into Sunshine Falls. That provided a few moments of excitement for sure.

One of the treats was watching the "yakkers" run the rapids near us. These hardy young men, fitted into tiny kayaks, challenge the rapids on a one to one basis.

Just hanging on, or working as an inexperienced paddler is a challenge that makes the blood race and the soul feel in tune with the natural world. How much more these intrepid yakkers must be able to appreciate that!

One died only a few weeks before we were there, a reminder that as much fun as this was, there was a serious side to it too.

At our river-side lunch stop I made my way up to the outhouse. There I met the "touron" Mike had warned us of. For as I left the VERY typical

outhouse toilet a girl in a tight wet bathing suit came up to me, and entered...bearing in one hand a partially eaten sandwich. I'm not even going to consider what one does with a sandwich in one hand in an outhouse...I'm going to be charitable and assume she didn't realise about outhouses!

Now all of us had given 17 year old Ester a hard time. We teased her about filing her nails, or needing her makeup, or whatever. It was sunshine falls that she managed to get her own licks in, though.

We came tearing up to the falls, which loomed big and awesome. They formed a hole big enough to swallow two or three rafts the size of ours, and the roar of the water drowned out sound and thought. Just as we hung poised at the brink, oarsman madly working, Ester's tiny voice came

through loud and clear..."would this be a bad time to ask for the nail file?" she queried! We almost lost it laughing...as she had known we would!

After scouting yet another monster rapid we managed to go right under the Royal Gorge Bridge, then finally hit calmer waters. Exuberant and triumphant, we laughed and laughed over virtually nothing.

All too soon the river was done and over with. It was with regret that we all parted, after exchanging addresses and promises to write. Our patient, helpful guide waved goodbye and it was over except for the memories. The recollection of the power, the force within the water, the excitement and yes, it's dangerous coldness and imperviousness would last a long time, however. Then it was time to turn to thoughts of what was yet to come and aim the car westward.

I.L. (Bob) Read Dies At Age 87

Isaac Louis (Bob) Read died August 14, 1989 at McCuiston Regional Medical Center.
He was born April 2, 1902 in Deport, a son of Isacc Lee Read and Margaret Francis Woodard Read.
Services were held Thursday, August 17, at 11 a.m. at the First Presbyterian Church of Deport with the Rev. Sam Rice officiating.
Burial was in Highland Cemetery with Masonic Service at the cemetery.
He married Dorcas Miriam Cameron on May 7, 1926, at the Central Presbyterian Church in Paris.
Read served as mayor of the city of Deport from 1960 until 1966, and served as a member of the city council for many years. He was always extremely active in community affairs.
In recognition of this the Deport city Council passed a resolution designating a street as "Read Street" in his honor. This occurred, co-incidentally, only hours before his death.
He was a member of the well known pioneer Read family who helped settle the area, and a long time area farmer.
He was a mason for 50 years, and a member of the First Presbyterian Church of Deport all his life. He served in the church as a deacon since 1939, and an elder since 1956, and as Sunday School Superintendent.
He is survived by his wife, two grandsons and four great-grandsons. A daughter, Olga Bob Pearson, preceded him in death.
Bearers were grandsons Eric and Read Pearson, Kyle Read, Lawrence Wood, Gary Nixon and Bill Read. Members of the Masonic Lodge served in the graveside service.

Drug Enforcement Funds Awarded To First District

Students will be required to provide proof of residency during registration.

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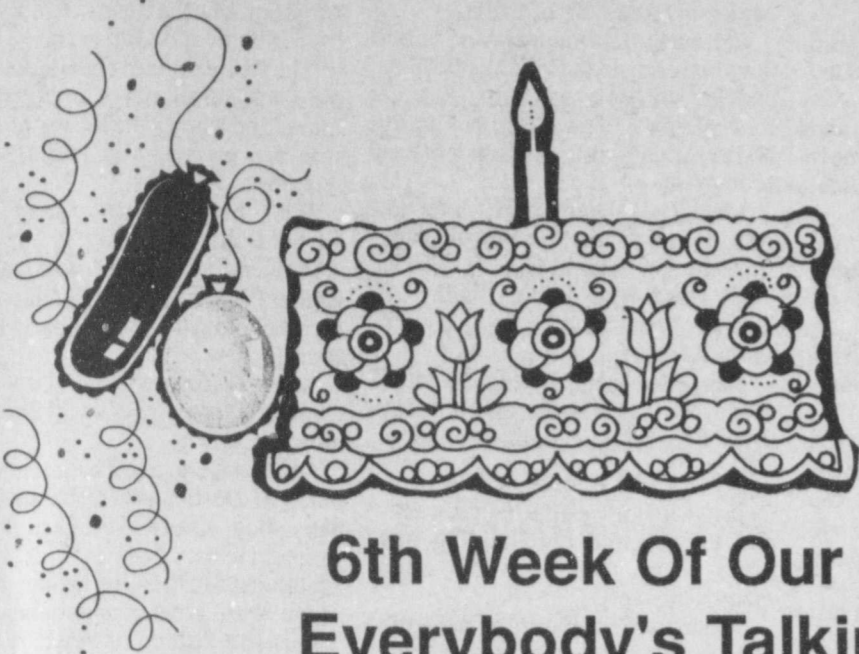
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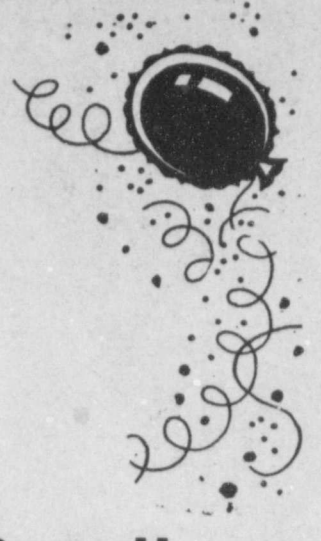

Keeping Healthy

Salt-Sensitivity May Be a Warning for High Blood Pressure

Tests which may predict whether a person with normal blood pressure will later develop high blood pressure based on their sensitivity or resitancy to salt have been developed, it was reported at a meeting of the American Heart Association.

Myron H. Weinberger, M.D., and his Indianapolis research group reported that the tests they have developed may someday suggest ways for a person to prevent high blood pressure from happening.

The excessive consumption of sodium mainly in the form of table salt (sodium chloride) has been linked with high blood pressure, which is a leading contributor to the risk of heart attack and stroke, says the AHA. Based on Weinberger's research, 40 to 50 percent of the estimated 57.7 million Americans with high blood pressure may be sensitive to salt.

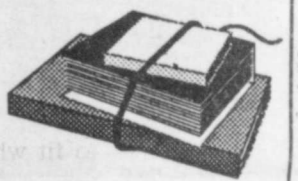
Weinberger believes that individuals with normal pressure who are salt-sensitive will eventually develop high blood pressure. If future studies prove this to be correct, it may also be true that people identified as salt-sensitive can prevent or postpone high blood pressure by reducing the salt in their diet.

production purposes. Then bring all of your production records to ASCS and get it on file. Next, fill out Form ASCS 574, Disaster Application, if you haven't already done so. There will be more forms to sign as we find out just what they are, but for now this is all we know for sure that you must do.

I hate to always have to include a statement like this, but it seems that more and more folks are trying to cheat the program each year. Just call it a word of warning. Be sure you file all of your grain production for each farm correctly. Don't leave any settlement sheets on your desk hoping to increase your payment a few dollars or combine a couple of receipts together making one farm look like it did better than another. We spot check any file that looks a little weird and we will check with every grain dealer, dairy, and feeder operation in the State if we have to. Besides, I understand that the new farm bill will contain provisions for proven crop yields again, and these records will be important for a long time. Tell the truth and you don't have to remember what you told anybody.

passed. Now comes the part when you wonder bout out of bed. We anticipate having the regulations in our office sometime around the middle of September. The law states (according to rumor) that payments to framers on all fall 1988 seeded crops (wheat, oats and barley) which suffered a loss in production due to adverse weather must be paid by October 1. The idea is to bring the 1990 fiscal year budget more in line by braming all of these payments into 1989 fiscal year. In case you don't know, the Government's fiscal year changes on October 1.

Now the fun begins. How do we accomplish this? Obviously we can't sit around and wait until we get the regulations, the computer software, and the forms to start planning for the program. On the other hand, nobody knows what forms will be required, if last years will work for 1989, what the payment rates will be, and the list goes on. About all we can do right this minute is ask that you sit down and get all of your 1989 production data for wheat, oats and barley together for each farm. If you have grain stored on the farm, you need to pay ASCS to measure the grain for

The meeting was to train u (and everyone else in Texas who works for ASCS) on how to administer the Cropland Reserve Program (CRP). At first glance that looks like a good idea. 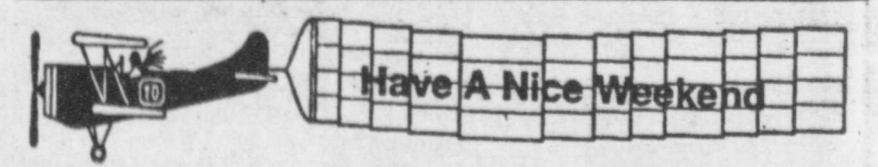
